Do you know how hard it is to be so angry all the time? It's exhausting and ulcer-inducing. Why all the rage? Let's get started — I'm in a mood!

Howell. McInvale. Howell. McInvale. Howell. McInvale... seems like six of one, half a dozen of the other if you ask me. I see McInvale as a conservative Democrat and Howell as a fairly liberal Republican. So, really, what's the difference?

The best thing I can say for McInvale is that she doesn't embarrass me. I can't tell you how many times I've groaned over Howell's campaign tactics. I mean, come on. Putting a picture of John F. Kennedy — a Democratic — on his campaign mailer? That's tacky. To be fair, though, I don't think Howell is necessarily a bad guy. I just think he's a little misguided.

And let's talk about being misguided. Did you hear about the ad that ran in the *Orlando Sentinel* urging Orlandoans to rally against equal rights? It was a shameful display.

In it, the "People For A United Orlando" asserted that "militant national gay and lesbian organizations have targeted Orlando as a key conquest." What? There aren't any militant gay groups — hell, gays aren't even allowed in the military.

If we did have militant groups, I still doubt that we would be extremists like the Iranian cleric who called for Jerry Falwell's death after the religious zealot made anti-Muslim statements. And guess what happened in that situation? A few days later Falwell apologized. I love that story.

Instead, we need our own version of Larry Flynt. In 1998, Flynt set up a hot line and offered to pay up to \$1 million for true tales of adultery with politicians. "I don't believe there is a need to change the law," she said.

Her statement sent ripples though all of Orlando. And, thankfully, the *Orlando Sentinel*'s editorial board was brave enough to challenge her.

"It takes real leadership with vision and courage, qualities that Mrs. Hood apparently lacks, to open minds and help a community face and resolve divisive issues," the board wrote.

And speaking of ineffectual leadership, how about those Bush brothers? I hate to break it to you, Barbara, but Rosemary had a better baby than you ever did.

Now do you see why I'm miffed?

ORLANDO'S GAY COMMUNITY RALLIES FOR VOTE

ORLANDO - Several hundred people gathered on the steps of Orlando's City Hall on Oct. 14 to rally in support of adding "sexual orientation" as a protected class to Chapter 57 of the Orlando city code. The protest was organized by the

Orlando Anti-Discrimination Ordinance Committee (OADO), in an effort to persuade Mayor Glenda Hood to bring the proposal to a vote before the City Council. The well-

behaved crowd carried signs that ran the gamut from "end workplace

discrimination" to "hate is not a family value." Rainbow flags could be seen being waved everywhere, including some of the historic rainbow banners that were flown throughout downtown Orlando several years ago.

More than twenty speakers addressed the crowd including members of the OADO Committee, Orange County Deputy Sheriff Tom Woodard, Rollins College professor Lisa Tilman-Healy, mental health counselor Nancy Newbie, and openly lesbian City Commissioner Patty Sheehan.

"Equality cannot exist for anyone until it exists for everyone," said Larry Smith, an attorney and member of the OADO committee.

Many supporters of the ordinance believe that Mayor Hood is stalling the vote until after the November elections. The mayor has repeatedly denied these allegations. According to an earlier memo from Mayor Hood to the city council, an Oct. 21 workshop will include an opportunity for council members to move toward a preliminary vote, which could be held Nov. 18. A final vote could then be held in December, the memo suggests.

"The delay has proved to be nothing more than expensive, needless, and divisive," says Smith. "Her actions will speak louder than her words. Mayor Hood needs to lead, follow, or get out of the way."

If approved, the antidiscrimination ordinance would prohibit employers from firing

someone because they are gay. Property owners couldn't refuse to rent or sell to someone because they are gay. And public accommodations such as restaurants or hotels could not refuse service to someone just because they are lesbian or gay.

"We are not asking for special rights," says Newton. "We are asking for the right to be who we are."

A small handful of people protesting

HUNDREDS DEMONSTRATE AGAINST ANTI-GAY PROTESTERS

FORT COLLINS, Colo. - Hundreds of people demonstrated against a handful of antigay protesters marking the fourth anniversary of the death of Matthew Shepard. The Rev. Fred Phelps and eight others from the Westboro Baptist Church in Topeka, Kan., picketed outside Hughes Stadium Saturday during the Colorado State-Wyoming football game.

Phelps held a sign with Shepard's picture and the words "Matt 4 years in hell." "We've got good police protection, there are a lot of people, the weather's pretty good," he said.

Across the street, 300 to 400 attend a counterprotest organized by CSU's Gay Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender Student Services. Some signs read "Your Hate is Your Hell" and "Stop Hate." (*AP*)

REPUBLICAN CANDIDATE DROPS OUT OF MONTANA SENATE RACE

HELENA, Mont. - Republican Senate candidate Mike Taylor dropped out of the U.S. Senate race against incumbent Democratic Sen. Max Baucus on Oct. 10, saying a recent Democratic ad insinuated he is gay.

Taylor called the ad slanderous and full of lies, and saying it had irreparably harmed his campaign.

"I simply never thought my opponent would run television ads that lied, assassinated my character and misled the citizens of Montana," Taylor said at a news conference.

The ad, which the Democratic Party began airing last week includes videotape of Taylor from the 1980s in which he is wearing an open-front shirt and gold chains while massaging a man's face. The video was part of an infomerical Taylor had produced.

A Taylor spokesman said the ad clearly was intended to imply Taylor was gay. (AP)

TWO MEN ACCUSED OF HATE CRIMES IN BASEBALL-BAT ATTACKS

LOS ANGELES - Two men accused of separate baseball-bat attacks were charged on with committing a hate crime after prosecutors concluded the alleged attackers thought their victims were gay.

The attacks occurred on Sunday, Oct. 13, just east of the city of West Hollywood, where a Sept. 1 attack on a gay actor is being prosecuted as a robbery and assault. The decision by county District Attorney Steve Cooley not to file hate-crime charges in that case has prompted picketing of Cooley's office and a petition drive to recall him.

Ever Wilfredo Rivera and Selvin Orlando Campos, both 19 and from Los Angeles, were charged with two counts each of hate crime, robbery and assault with a deadly weapon by means likely to produce great bodily injury. The hate crime counts can add up to four years on any sentence. (AP)

WORLD BRIEFS

MOTHER OF SLAIN SOLDIER OPPOSES GENERAL'S NOMINATION

Patricia Kutteles, mother of Private First Class Barry Winchell, appeared in Washington last week to oppose President Bush's nomination of Major General Robert T. Clark to Lieutenant General. Clark is former Commanding General of Fort Campbell, where Winchell was murdered in 1999 by fellow soldiers because he was believed to be gay. The Senate Armed Services Committee has scheduled a closed door session to consider the nomination.

BRITISH LEGISLATORS NIX GAY ADOPTION

British government plans to let unmarried couples — including gays — adopt children were thrown out on Oct. 16 by the upper house of Parliament. Opposition Conservatives in the House of Lords and independents combined to defeat the government by 196 votes to 162. The bill now may bounce between the upper and lower houses of Parliament until a compromise is reached.

PARIS MAYOR LEAVES INTENSIVE CARE FOLLOWING STABBING

Paris Mayor Bertrand Delanoe was transferred out of intensive care on Oct. 11, five days after being stabbed in the abdomen during an all-night public party at City Hall. The mayor underwent emergency surgery shortly after being attacked. The 52-year-old mayor suffered injuries to the stomach, the intestines and the major vein that brings blood from the lower body to the heart. Delanoe is expected to be released from the hospital in about five days but won't be back on the job for several weeks.

LESBIAN SERIAL KILLER EXECUTED DESPITE QUESTIONS OVER HER SANITY

STARKE, Fla. - Aileen Wuornos, a hitchhiking lesbian prostitute who killed six men along Florida's highways more than a decade ago, was executed by injection on Oct. 8 after dropping her appeals and firing her lawyers.

Wuornos, 46, became the 10th woman executed in the U.S. since capital punishment resumed in 1977. In her final statement, she referred to Jesus the blockbuster movie, *Independence Day*.

The execution had been delayed while

experts evaluated her mental health. Gov. Jeb Bush lifted his stay last week after three psychiatrists concluded Wuornos was competent to choose execution.

Wuornos shot to death at least six middle-aged men along Florida highways in 1989 and 1990. She initially said the killings were in self-defense after she was assaulted by customers who picked her up. But she later said the self-defense claim was a lie and she intended to rob and kill the men. (AP)



BUSH, MCBRIDE CLASH ON FLORIDA'S GAY ADOPTION BAN

ORLANDO - Republican Gov. Jeb Bush accused his Democratic challenger of making empty promises, but Bill McBride said Florida was going down the wrong path under Bush's leadership during an Oct. 15 debate.

The one-hour debate, broadcast statewide on radio, touched on sales tax exemptions, gay adoptions and growth management, and education. The candidates differed on whether gay and lesbian couples should be able to adopt. Florida is the only state in the nation that has a blanket prohibition against homosexuals adopting.

Bush said he doesn't think gays should be allowed to adopt, while McBride called such a policy discrimination and said, "It's not the American way and it's not the right way." (*AP*)

CONVICTION OF PANHANDLE BOYS THROWN OUT

PENSACOLA - Calling the case of two teenage brothers convicted in the fatal bludgeoning of their father "unusual and bizarre," a judge tossed out the convictions and ordered prosecutors and defense attorneys to try to resolve the case in mediation.

Circuit Judge Frank Bell said on Oct. 17 that the boys' rights were violated in part by the way prosecutors simultaneously presented two contradictory theories of the crime.

Prosecutors won the conviction of Alex, 13, and Derek King, 14, last month by arguing that Derek swung the aluminum baseball bat that killed their father. In a trial that ended a week earlier, the prosecution's star witnesses — Alex and Derek testified an adult friend committed the crime.

The boys' adult friend, convicted child molester Ricky Chavis, was acquitted, but the verdict was sealed until the boys' trial was over. It remains unclear if Chavis had a sexual relationship with one or both of the boys.

Jurors in the boys' trial said they believed Chavis was the real killer and that the brothers had only helped him commit the crime. (AP)

MAYOR SAYS THERE'S NO NEED TO CHANGE ANTI-DISCRIMINATION LAW

ORLANDO - Orlando's City Council held another workshop on Monday, Oct. 21 to decide the fate of the proposed amendment to Chapter 57 of the Orlando City code. This meeting was a follow up to the September presentation by the city's Human Relations Board in which the

board unanimously suggested that the city add "sexual orientation" to the list of protected classes that are already a part of Orlando's antidiscrimination ordinance.

In front of a crowd of over 250 people, Mayor Glenda Hood asked each of the city

commissioners to weigh in on whether or not this should move forward through public hearings and an eventual vote.

Commissioner Phil Diamond said that the issue was something that the council should definitely consider and vote on. Commissioner Betty Wyman suggested

just the opposite, stating that this is not something that the city council should decide but that it should be voted on by the citizens of Orlando through a referendum.

Commissioner Vicki Vargo, the council's most vocal opponent of the proposed ordinance, again claimed that there is a lack of evidence to show widespread discrimination.

"We already are a progressive city, and I don't believe we need to divide our community," she said. "There is a lack of evidence to show that there is broadbased discrimination by the marketplace against gays in the city of Orlando."

Openly lesbian City Commissioner Patty Sheehan said that the amendment is not divisive as suggested by Vargo and Wyman.

"It is divisive to allow discrimination against gays and lesbians," Sheehan said, speaking candidly of her fear that a city like Orlando would deny basic rights to the gay population.

After seeing the anti-gay full-page ad in the Oct. 20 edition of the *Orlando Sentinel*, Sheehan admitted that she was "horrified to live in a town that feels that way." Sheehan said that she was fearful of one day returning to a workplace where gay people have no protections whatsoever. Sheehan also presented hundreds of postcards from the ordinance's detractors.

"These are the people who would

deny me a job," Sheehan said. Commissioner Daisy Lynum joined

Sheehan in voicing her support of the amendment

"The same arguments are now being made against gay people that I have heard about black people," Lynum said. She went on to point out to the church leaders in attendance at the

meeting that she has her own personal relationship with God, and that nowhere in the New Testament of the Bible did Jesus say anything against gay people. She did point out, however, that Christ became angry with the church leaders for wrongdoing.

"This is a human rights issue," Lynum told them. "And I will not be intimidated."

The only commissioner who did not offer his opinion on the matter was Ernest Page, although he did

say he supports a future vote on the issue by the council.

Perhaps the biggest surprise of the day came when Mayor Hood actually ceased her waffling and stated that she is against adding "sexual orientation" to the city's anti-discrimination policy.

"As an elected official I have looked at this issue from a personal, legal, and community perspective. Our community does support lifestyle choices," said Hood. "But I do not see evidence to warrant this, there is not a demonstrated need to change the law."

The following day, the *Orlando Sentinel*'s editorial board lambasted Hood for her statements.

"Mrs. Hood gave in to small-minded thinking when she formally expressed her opposition to a city ordinance to protect gay people from discrimination," the *Sentinel* board wrote.

Hoods sentiments did not come as a surprise to many in the gay community. Hood is a Republican and a Bush supporter. She is also a member of the congregation of First Baptist Church of Orlando, and her own pastor has spoken about opposing the measure.

The next meeting on Chapter 57 will take place on Nov. 18 at 2 PM when public comments will be taken. A second hearing and the vote are scheduled for Dec. 2. ♥ John Sullivan

ANTI-GAY AD IN THE SENTINEL SPARKS CONTROVERSY, QUESTIONS

ORLANDO - Orlando's gay and lesbian community was shocked by an advertisement that ran in the Sunday, Oct. 20 edition of the *Orlando Sentinel*. Opponents of the proposed amendment to add "sexual orientation" to Chapter 57 of the city antidiscrimination code placed a

language change to the ordinance. Calling themselves People For A United Orlando (PFAUO), the group paid \$14,000 for the ad that is signed by roughly 500 people including pastors, business people and local politicians.

full-page ad denouncing the

The ad claims that gays and lesbians in Orlando do not need to be protected from discrimination because it doesn't exist.

Alan Chambers, spokesperson for PFAUO and executive director of the exgay ministry Exodus, says that the proposed amendment is nothing more than a launching pad for other pro-gay legislation

and the legalization of pedophilia. "I believe the gay community is a good group of people but with groups like NAMBLA riding on their coattails," Chambers said.

The ad also claims that "this is a campaign being promoted from afar, by militant national gay and lesbian organizations."

When Chambers was asked about the identity of the "militant" group he said that he had no idea, that was a question he thought the Liberty Council could answer.

The Liberty Council, a branch of the Jerry Falwell ministries with offices in Leesburg, turned up nothing on the supposed militant national gay group. Not one person in their offices including two lawyers — had

any idea about the identity of the group. Chambers says that PFAUO is for

discrimination in housing, jobs, or public service, except for where religious organizations are concerned.

"But as an owner of property in downtown Orlando, I wouldn't rent to someone who is gay any more than I would rent to a person who is a practicing witch," Chambers said. *N John Sullivan*

SARASOTA - "This may well be the most important ballot initiative ever for our community," said Triangle Democratic Caucus president Rev. Jim Merritt. "And we need to make sure it passes this time."

Merritt was referring to the upcoming ballot referendum that would give Sarasota residents non-discrimination protections — including discrimination based on sexual orientation — for the first time in the city's history. The ballot initiative was unanimously approved by the Sarasota

HEADDRESS WINDFALL COMES JUST IN TIME FOR HOPE & HELP

ORLANDO - The Hope & Help Center of Central Florida netted a nifty sum as the beneficiary of the proceeds from the successful 2002 Headdress Ball. The HIV/AIDS organization said that they were awarded a check for \$203,000 from the producers of this year's annual event.

The monies, it turns out, came just in time. On Sept. 10, Hope & Help and other area HIV/AIDS centers lost a significant amount of Ryan White Title I funding. In all, \$1.2 million was cut by the Orlando EMA HIV Health Planning Council, effecting 20 agencies whose missions are to serve people with HIV disease. Hope & Help said that these cuts to their budget will affect all of the services they provide, including food pantry, transportation, case management, health education, and adherence counseling. In addition, Hope & Help's consumers' drugs and co-pays may have to be cut and there is concern that HIV patients may have to be put on a waiting list for medications.

FLORIDA AIDS ACTION EXPANDS TO MEET NEEDS OF HIV/AIDS COMMUNITIES

TAMPA - Florida AIDS Action (FLAA) recently announced a series of proactive enhancements that are a result of the agency's strategic planning process intended to deal with the ever-changing face of AIDS and other healthcare issues now facing Florida and the nation.

"The past several months have been a period of growth and positive change." said Dr. Gene Copello, FLAA executive director.

Florida AIDS Action opened an office in Washington, D.C. in August of this year. Presently, the Washington office is staffed by consultants. FLAA also maintains fulltime offices in Tallahassee and Miami as well as its administrative center in Tampa.

"Our goal is to be able to advocate for the 100,000 Floridians living with HIV/ AIDS, as well as the nearly one million Americans with HIV disease," explained FLAA Board President Valerie Mincey. As well as opening the Washington office, FLAA also announced its affiliation with the University of South Florida (USF). Florida AIDS Action has launched a new Center for Public Policy Research and Ethics in partnership with the Division of Infectious and Tropical Diseases at the USF College of Medicine.

In addition to the work with USF, FLAA has transformed its Southeastern HIV/AIDS Resource Exchange (SHARE) Program into a high-quality healthcare advocacy association that focuses on networking, training and technical assistance to communities throughout Florida and the United States. It is now referred to as the Institute of Healthcare Advocacy Training.

MINNESOTA RESEARCHERS MAY HAVE UNLOCKED A KEY HIV MYSTERY University of Minnesota researchers may have unlocked another key mystery surround-

ing HIV. The discovery appears to explain why a quarter of the patients infected with the AIDS virus respond poorly to the powerful drug cocktails while others show dramatic improvements. It still has to be confirmed by a larger study. If the initial findings turn out to be accurate, the discovery could be used to predict how well patients will respond to drug treatments. It also could lead to more effective therapies and potential cures for a disease that currently infects about 60 million people worldwide.

OPTIMISM MAY HAVE A NEGATIVE IMPACT ON HIV PATIENTS

A new study suggests that optimism often breeds bad decisions, especially within the HIV community. In a survey of 220 people infected with HIV, researchers at the University of Pennsylvania found that those with the most hopeful views of the future were most likely to skip doses of AIDS drugs and have unsafe sex. Researchers judged levels of pessimism and optimism by asking HIV-positive people to describe their feelings when first diagnosed, their feelings now and how long they expect to live. Members of minority groups, along with women and drug users, were most optimistic about their futures. White people, those with low levels of education and those with weaker immune systems, were more likely to be pessimistic.

MY DOCUMENTS GAY.COM IS NOT EVERYONE'S FAVORITE

I love the "favorites" features in the major Web browsers; a place for every user to house all the sites they travel to frequently and then go back to them whenever they want with the click of a mouse. Being the horrible typist that I am, if I put a site in my "favorites" once, then I don't have to worry

about those pesky 404 errors telling me the page is not found. I can't seem to type in a Web address correctly to save my life. So it was

interesting to hear

from my editor that Gay.com <www.gay.com> was voted "Best Web site" by our readers in the annual WAVE Awards poll. Gay.com is not only *not* a member of my "favorites" folder, it doesn't even register in my drop-down history.

I decided to see what all the fuss was about and find out why it came in first, ahead of online destinations like PlanetOut <www.planetout.com> or LesbianNation <www.lesbiannation.com. I assume that LesbianNation didn't come in fist due to that site having little content for the gay male community. And PlanetOut — my personal favorite doesn't have specialized content for its global members nor does it have a particularly eye-pleasing layout.

When you first hit Gay.com you have to choose which version of the site suits you. By making users identify themselves geographically, Gay.com is really subtly boasting that it has a world market.

One look at Gay.com's homepage and I deduced that the majority of Gay.com's users are male. Every graphic on it has two guys cuddling or holding each other. And while this is a refreshing change from mainstream sites, it was a letdown for this cyber-dyke.

The Gay.com Web site does have some interesting features — aside from the obligatory personals and chat rooms. It has special interest pages on health/fitness and business/finance. A majority of gay sites do not have these pages anywhere, which

shows that the Outandabout Media Corporation, Gay.com's owner, has its finger on the pulse of the gay community. Featured prominently on the site is a section for

headline news. However, all the content was gay specific, dealing with the meltdown of the Dutch government because of a slain gay member and of two hate crime attacks in Los Angeles. All in all, their news channel wasn't very well rounded.

I went nosing around on the site and was frustrated by the incredibly slow loading pages. I work from a T1 line, the fastest on the consumer market and I should have no delay on pages. Gay.com's pages aren't even graphic heavy so I can't figure out how a global presence on the gay Web wasn't able to get fast enough servers to handle the load of many surfers.

In my search through the site — when all I really wanted to do was close the damn browser — I found out that Gay.com is part of Planet Out Partners Online. So I guess even though it was our readers' choice, the company realizes it doesn't meet the needs of the entire community.

I don't think this site will be going in my "favorites" folder any time soon, but I am not adverse to looking at every now and again. It really is the most visually pleasing gay site I have been to. Now if they could just do something about all those cuddly men. \mathbf{N}

Because it saves future options. When choosing a treatment plan, it's important to consider what options you will have in the future. Studies show taking VIRACEPT early on leaves you with choices in treatment for later. Ask your doctor about your future with VIRACEPT.

VIRACEPT is indicated in combination with other antiretroviral agents for the treatment of HIV infection. The most common side effect of VIRACEPT is diarrhea, which can usually be controlled with over-the-counter treatments. Some prescription and non-prescription drugs and supplements should not be taken with VIRACEPT, so talk to your doctor first. For some people, protease inhibitors have been associated with the onset or worsening of diabetes mellitus and hyperglycemia, changes in body fat, and increased bleeding in hemophiliacs. HIV drugs do not cure HIV infection or prevent you from spreading the virus.

Please read this information carefully before taking VIRACEPT, Also, please Please read this information carefully before taking VIRACEPT. Also, please read this leaflet each time you renew the prescription, just in case arything has changed. This is a summary and not a replacement for a careful discussion with your doctor. You and your doctor should discuss VIRACEPT when you start taking this medication and at regular checkups. You should remain under a doctor's care when taking VIRACEPT and should not change or stop treatment without first talking with your doctor.

Alert: Find out about medicines that should NOT be taken with VIRACEPT. Please also read the section "MEDICINES YOU SHOULD NOT TAKE WITH VIRACEPT".

WHAT IS VIRACEPT AND HOW DOES IT WORK?

VIRACEPT is used in combination with other antiretroviral drugs in the VirACEPT is used in combination with other antiretroviral orugs in the treatment of people with human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) infection. Infection with HIV leads to the destruction of CD4 T cells, which are important to the immune system. After a large number of CD4 cells have been destroyed, the infected person develops acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS).

VIRACEPT works by blocking HIV protease (a protein-cutting enzyme), which is required for HIV to multiply. VIRACEPT has been shown to significantly reduce the amount of HIV in the blood. Although VIRACEPT is not a cure for HIV or AIDS, VIRACEPT can help reduce your risk for death and illness associated with HIV. Patients who took VIRACEPT also had significant increases in the number of CD4 cell count.

VIRACEPT should be taken together with other antiretroviral drugs such as Retrovir® (zidovudine, AZT), Epivir® (lamivudine, 3TC), or Zerit® (stavudine, d4T). Taking VIRACEPT in combination with other antiretroviral drugs es the amount of HIV in the body (viral load) and raises CD4 counts.

VIRACEPT may be taken by adults, adolescents, and children 2 years of age or older. Studies in infants younger than 2 years of age are now taking place. DOES VIRACEPT CURE HIV OR AIDS?

VIBACEPT is not a cure for HIV infection or AIDS. People taking VIBACEPT may

still develop opportunistic infections or other conditions associated with HIV infection. Some of these conditions are pneumonia, herpes virus infections, *Mycobacterium avium* complex (MAC) infections, and Kaposi's sarcoma. There is no proof that VIRACEPT can reduce the risk of transmitting HIV to others through sexual contact or blood contamination.

WHO SHOULD OR SHOULD NOT TAKE VIRACEPT?

Together with your doctor, you need to decide whether VIRACEPT is appropriate for you. In making your decision, the following should be considered:

Allergies: If you have had a serious allergic reaction to VIRACEPT, you must not take VIRACEPT. You should also inform your doctor, nurse, or pharmacist of any known allergies to substances such as other medicines, foods, preservatives, or dyes.

If you are pregnant: The effects of VIRACEPT on pregnant women or their unborn babies are not known. If you are pregnant or plan to become pregnant, you should tell your doctor before taking VIRACEPT.

If you are breast-feeding: You should discuss with your doctor the best way to feed your baby. You should be aware that if your baby does not already have HIV, there is a chance that it can be transmitted through breast-feeding. should not breast-feed if they have HIV.

Children: VIRACEPT is available for the treatment of children 2 through 13 years of age with HIV. There is a powder form of VIRACEPT that can be mixed with milk, baby formula, or foods like pudding. Instructions on how to take VIRACEPT powder can be found in a later section that discusses how VIRACEPT Oral Powder should be prepared.

If you have liver disease: VIRACEPT has not been studied in people with liver disease. If you have liver disease, you should tell your doctor before taking VIRACEPT.

Other medical problems: Certain medical problems may affect the use of VIRACET. Some people taking protesse inhibitors have developed new or more serious diabetes or high blood sugar. Some people with hemophila have had increased bleeding. It is not known whether the protease inhibitors caused these problems. Be sure to tell your doctor if you have hemophila types A and B, diabetes mellitus, or an increase in thirst and/or frequent winding.

Changes in body fat have been seen in some patients taking protease inhibitors. These changes may include increased amount of fat in the upper back and neck ("buffalo hump"), breast, and around the trunk. Loss of fat from the face, legs and arms may also happen. The cause and long-term health effects of these conditions are not known at this time.

CAN VIRACEPT BE TAKEN WITH OTHER MEDICATIONS

VIRACEPT may interact with other drugs, including those you take without a prescription. You must discuss with your doctor any drugs that you are taking or are planning to take before you take VIRACEPT.

Medicines you should not take with VIRACEPT:

Propulsid® (cisapride, for heartburn)

Cordarone® (amiodarone, for irregular heartbeat) Quinidine (for irregular heartbeat), also known as Quinaglute®, Cardioquin®, Quinidex®, and others

Ergot derivatives (Cafergot® and others, for migraine headache) Halcion® (triazolam)

- Versed® (midazolam)

Mevacor[®] (lovastatin, for cholesterol lowering) Zocor® (simvastatin, for cholesterol lowering)

Taking the above drugs with VIRACEPT may cause serious and/or life-threatening adverse events

Rifampin® (for tuberculosis), also known as Rimactane®, Rifadin® , or Rifamate This drug reduces blood levels of VIRACEPT.

Dose reduction required if you take VIRACEPT with: Mycobutin[®] (rifabutin, for MAC); you will need to take a lower dose of Mycobutin.

A change of therapy should be considered if you are taking VIRACEPT with:

Phenoharbital

Phenytoin (Dilantin® and others)

Carbamazepine (Tegretol® and others)

These agents may reduce the amount of VIRACEPT in your blood and make it less effective.

Oral contraceptives ("the pill")

If you are taking the pill to prevent pregnancy, you should use a different type of contraception since VIRACEPT may reduce the effectiveness of oral contraceptives.

Special consideration

Before you take Viagra[®] (sildenafii) with VIRACEPT, talk to your doctor about possible drug interactions and side effects. If you take Viagra and VIRACEPT together, you may be at increased risk of side effects of Viagra such as low blood pressure, visual changes, and penile erection lasting more than 4 hours. If an erection lasts longer than 4 hours, you should seek immediate medical assistance to avoid permanent damage to your penis. Your doctor can explain these symptoms to you.

It is not recommended to take VIRACEPT with the cholesterol-lowering It is not recommended to take VIRACEPT with the cholesterol-lowering drugs Mevacor® (lovastatin) or Zocor® (simvastatin) because of possible drug interactions. There is also an increased risk of drug interactions between VIRACEPT and Lipitor® (atorvastatin) and Baycol® (cerivastatin); talk to your doctor before you take either of these cholesterol reducing drugs with VIRACEPT.

Taking St. John's wort (hypericum perforatum), an herbal product sold as a dietary supplement, or products containing St. John's wort with VIRACEPT is not recommended. Talk with your doctor if you are taking or are planning to take St. John's wort. Taking St. John's wort may decrease VIRACEPT levels and lead to increased viral load and possible resistance to VIRACEPT or cross resistance to other antiretroviral drugs.

HOW SHOULD VIRACEPT BE TAKEN WITH OTHER ANTI-HIV DRUGS?

Taking VIRACEPT together with other anti-HIV drugs increases their ability to fight the virus. It also reduces the opportunity for resistant viruses to grow. Based on your history of taking other anti-HIV medicine, your doctor will direct you on how to take VIRACEPT and other anti-HIV medicines. These drugs should be taken in a certain order or at specific times. This will depend on how many times a day each medicine should be taken. It will also depend on whether it should be taken with or without food.

Retrovir (zidovudine, AZT)

Epivir (lamivudine, 3TC)

Zerit (stavudine, d4T)

Videx[®] (didanosine, ddl)

The amount of saquinavir in your blood may be increased. Currently, there are no safety and efficacy data available from the use of this combination. WHAT ARE THE SIDE EFFECTS OF VIRACEPT?

Like all medicines, VIRACEPT can cause side effects. Most of the side cts experienced with VIBACEPT have been mild to moderate. Diarrhea

ettects experienced with VIRACEPT have been mild to moderate. Diarrhea is the most common side effect in people taking VIRACEPT, and most adult patients had at least mild diarrhea at some point during treatment. In clinical studies, about 15-20% of patients receiving VIRACEPT 750 mg (three tablets) three times daily or 1250 mg (five tablets) two times daily had four or more loose stools a day. In most cases, diarrhea can be controlled using antidiarrheal medicines, such as Imodium® A-D (loperamide) and others, which are available without a prescription.

Other side effects that occurred in 2% or more of patients receiving VIRACEPT include nausea, gas and rash.

VIRACEPT include nausea, gas and rash. There were other side effects noted in clinical studies that occurred in less than 2% of patients receiving VIRACEPT. However, these side effects may have been due to other drugs that patients were taking or to the illness itself. Except for diarrhea, there were not many differences in side effects in patients who took VIRACEPT along with other drugs compared with those who took only the other drugs. For a complete list of side effects, ask your doctor, nurse, or pharmacist.

HOW SHOULD I TAKE VIRACEPT?

VIRACEPT is available only with your doctor's prescription. Only take medicine that has been prescribed specifically for you. Do not give VIRACEPT to others or take medicine prescribed for someone else. The dosing of VIRACEPT may be different for you than for other patie

Follow the directions from your doctor, exactly as written on the label. The amount of VIRACEPT in the blood should remain somewhat consistent over time. Nissing doses will cause the concentration of VIRACEPT to decrease; therefore, you should not miss any doses. However, if you miss a dose, you should take the dose as soon as possible and then ta your next scheduled dose and future doses as originally scheduled. Dosing in adults (including children 14 years of age and older)

The recommended adult dose of VIRACEPT is 1250 mg (five tablets) taken two times a day or 750 mg (three tablets) taken three times a day. Each dose should be taken with a meal or light snack.

Dosing in children 2 to 13 years of age

The VIRACEPT dose in children depends on their weight. The recommended dose is 20 to 30 mg/kg (or 9 to 14 mg/pound) per dose, taken three times daily with a meal or light snack. This can be administered either in tablet form or, in children unable to take tablets, as VIRACEPT Oral Powder.

Dose instructions will be provided by the child's doctor. The dose will be given three times daily using the measuring scoop provided, a measuring teaspoon, or one or more tablets depending on the weight and age of the child. The amount of oral powder or tablets to be given to a child is depended the back the back to be given to a child is described in the chart below

In measuring oral powder, the scoop or teaspoon should be level. * 1 level scoop contains 50 mg of VIRACEPT. Use only the scoop provided with your VIRACEPT bottle.

† 1 level teaspoon contains 200 mg of VIRACEPT. Note: A measuring aspoon used for dispensing medication should be used for easuring VIRACEPT Oral Powder. Ask your pharmacist to make sure you cation dispensing teaspoo

How should VIRACEPT Oral Powder be prepared?

The oral powder may be mixed with a small amount of water, milk, formula, soy formula, soy milk, dietary supplements, or dairy foods such as pudding or ice cream. Once mixed, the entire amount must be taken to obtain the full dose.

Do not mix the powder with any acidic food or juice, such as orange or grapefruit juice, apple juice, or apple sauce, because this may create a bitter taste.

Once the powder is mixed, it may be stored at room temperature or refrigerated for up to 6 hours. Do not heat the mixed dose once it has en prepared.

Do not add water to bottles of oral powder.

VIRACEPT powder is supplied with a scoop for measuring. For help in determining the exact dose of powder for your child, ple doctor, nurse, or pharmacist.

VIRACEPT Oral Powder contains aspartame, a low-calorie sweetener, therefore should not be taken by children with phenylketonuria (PKU). HOW SHOULD VIRACEPT BE STORED?

FLORIDA'S FIRST GAY AND LESBIAN DAY CENTER TO OPEN IN 2003

FT. LAUDERDALE - State officials announced that the state's first day center specializing in care for gay and lesbian elders will open in February 2003 in Ft. Lauderdale. The Area Agency on Aging, which funds eight senior day centers in Broward County, gave \$200,000 in federal seed money this past spring to start the day center at the Sunshine Cathedral.

"We have a lot of gay people here who are entering their senior years, and we aren't really doing anything for them," said Edith Lederberg, the area agency's executive director. About 15,000 gay and lesbian seniors live in Broward County, Lederberg said, and that number is growing. The board and foundation of the Sunshine Cathedral, a member of Metropolitan Community Church, approved the day center in January 2002. The day center will be open Mondays through Fridays, and it will provide activities, meals and support for seniors and their families and partners.

"I think gay and lesbian people will be more comfortable putting their family members in a situation like this where the whole family is respected, " said Sunshine Cathedral Rev. Grant Lynn Ford.

APPLEBEE'S SAYS AD ON *GAY WEDDINGS* RAN BY MISTAKE

KANSAS CITY, Mo. - The Applebee's restaurant group, which drew fire from a conservative Christian organization for advertising on the Bravo reality miniseries *Gay Weddings*, said on Oct. 1 that the ad ran by mistake.

A spokeswoman for Applebee's International said the company specifically asked the cable television channel not to run the spot during *Gay Weddings*.

"As an advertiser, we — like most companies — prefer to stay with noncontroversial shows," Laurie Ellison said. The ad ran once during the first episode of *Gay Weddings* on Sept. 2. The show ran for four nights, each time profiling a gay or lesbian couple preparing to exchange vows.

Cathy Renna, a spokeswoman for the national Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation, said she was disappointed with Applebee's.

"This is a lost opportunity for Applebee's, not to support a show that promotes understanding," she said. (*AP*)

"I've already received 10 death threats by e-mail." The security gate system was stolen, and the office building was demolished. Winkler said he called the ACLU and HRC about the vandalism.

U.S. HOUSE DISTRICT 6: David E. Bruderly (D) v. Cliff B. Stearns (R). Bruderly is mostly unknown, but incumbent Stearns is on record opposing ENDA and all other federal pro-gay initiatives. The office needs new blood. Watermark endorses David E. Bruderly.

U.S. HOUSE DISTRICT 7: Wayne Hogan (D) v. John L. Mica (R). Mica's influence in the House increases with each re-election. Now in his fifth term, he's been a strong and effective advocate for solving Central Florida's traffic problems. He also enacted an antidiscrimination policy within his office that includes sexual orientation. But he opposes ENDA and other pro-active gay initiatives. His well-funded Democratic opponent – who earned much of his money taking on tobacco companies has been mostly silent about gay issues, and trails by a wide margin in recent polls. Watermark recommends that you be informed and choose wisely.

U.S. HOUSE DISTRICT 8: Eddie Diaz (D) v. Ric Keller (R). First-termer Keller leads Diaz by a wide margin in the polls, and is expected to win. But the choice is clear. Dumpy and unimpressive (he and Mica have the worst toupees in Congress), Keller is aligned with the most conservative wing of his party. He will vote against us at every turn. the ordinance were on hand displaying signs that read "say no to special rights." Opponents of the measure say it is unnecessary, claiming that protections for Orlando's gay and lesbian citizens already exist under the constitution.

Recently the Christian Coalition sent out a mailing to registered voters in Orlando claiming that the purpose of Chapter 57 is actually to legalize gay marriage. Maitland-based Rev. John Butler Book even went so far as to give the Orlando City Council a tape of a gay street party in California that showed some unflattering behavior. Book claimed that the same behavior would run rampant in Orlando if gay and lesbian citizens were protected. "I would like to ask the heterosexual

by extremes," City Commissioner Patty Sheehan said to a cheering crowd. "It should be our goal as civilized people to assure the fair and equal treatment of

Orlando activist and rally organizer Debbie Simmons called the event a success, saying that the turnout really exceeded even her own expectations.

"Even though the turnout was good, there could have been more people out there," Simmons said after the rally. "I understand though, many people didn't come because they are still fearful of being outed or seen on the news and then fired from their jobs. It just reinforces the whole idea that we need this kind of protection to begin with." W John Sullivan

"PLEASE COME TO BOSTON," the song says, and so we did last weekend to see John and Chris. They have a lovely old house in Lexington, complete with cannonballs embedded in the bedroom walls. We stayed at a guesthouse in Cambridge, however, so as to be farther from the action.

Have you ever noticed how odd outof-town television is? I found Kirk watching a British show called *Vets In Practice* one afternoon when I woke up from a nap; let's just say there were a lot of cats being shaved and some horrifyingly-detailed scenes of breech lambs being forcibly born. Ewe!

Oh, *Rally*! I managed to attend the anti-discrimination rally on the steps of City Hall on Oct. 14, huffing and puffing my way down the avenue after closing up shop. It was so nice to see so many of you there... thanks for the phone calls encouraging my presence. I was happy to be in such good company, and I smiled when I found myself surrounded by representatives of all the major political parties. Who knew there were so many gay Republicans?

As I stood there politely wearing my McBride sticker — courtesy of Bill Pease — a gentleman standing next to me instructed his poodle *not* to be nice once he ascertained my political affiliation. THE LIBERAL ARTS LESBIAN THE MYSTERIOUS WORLD OF GAY MALES

Speaking Out by Sarah Viren

I didn't realize until this weekend that I am gay-male illiterate. I had thought because I have "gay friends" that I am familiar with gay male culture. But I'm not — at least not in the same way I am

knowledgeable of heterosexual culture.

The situation that precipitated this whole revelation was a weekend spent with not one but two gay boys, and two gay boys

hooking up at that. It was just them and me all weekend long. Me, a girl who likes country music, has no flair for fashion, and knows little about theater. But I learned that one thing overcame our differences: sarcasm. We were all three sarcastic bitches and got along merrily.

In our merry-making I got a chance to see and feel what it's like to be the girl among a group of gay men. Before — as I realized in retrospect — it had always been me, a bunch of my dyke friends and one of our gay male buddies. I was in the majority. Or it was just little old me in a group of straight folks. Then I was in the minority, but I was also used to it.

I had never really hung out with a group of gay men, let alone a gay male couple. It is hard for me to admit but I think I have fag-hagaphobia. I am scared of being labeled a "fag hag." I don't want my identity dependent on other people, especially other men.

I admit I was wrong and prejudiced. And I have suffered from this bias.

Hanging out with this gay male couple last weekend I realized how most of my life experiences have been limited to straights and lesbians only. I know a lot about straight people. I have to see them day in and day out — on TV, on the streets, in the grocery store. They are always kissing, grabbing each other's asses and in general making a bad name for their sexuality.

Lesbians I am with constantly as well. But I love them! They are a part of me: my culture, my friends, my past. To me the lesbian lifestyle is rich and textured. I revel in its intricacies.

Gay male culture is totally a foreign world. I know gay guys, I hang out with them, but I have never truly had a good gay male friend. And I think that this is often the case for many gay men as well.

My new gay buddy from this weekend was constantly surprised when I talked about hot women.

"I am so used to hanging out with other gay guys or straight girls," he said.

get used to you talking about women." But now we are friends and learning about each other bit by bit. It's a wonderful change. It makes the word "queer" a rounder, deeper word to me. But it also causes me to

"I keep thinking you're straight. I can't

question why. Why, if we are all queer, do gay men and lesbians keep separate so often? Our separateness stops us from knowing each other,

from learning interesting tidbits like, Do gay men have as many categories for themselves as lesbians do? As dykes we have the lipstick lesbian, the butch, the sporty dyke, the chic dyke, the Chap-stick lesbian, the Birkenstock/granola lesbian, the mullet lesbian, the nun lesbian and on and on.

So my deep but entirely superficial question of the day is, "What are the categories for gay men?" Is there a hippie fag, a theatre fag, a butch gay man, a flamer? And what do these categories mean? They may be superficial and totally unrealistic but they give culture and texture to this random group of people called queers.

These classifications help us to read and understand ourselves. If I am forced, because of the reality of our society, to know so much about straight people, I might as well try to learn equally as much about gay boys. They're cuter and more interesting if you ask me. They are my sisters — and my brothers.

They and all other transsexuals, trangendered people, bisexuals and questioning people of the world are my family. Alone we are ostracized and stigmatized. But together we are colorful, powerful, wonderful and queer.

PAST OUT WHAT'S SO QUEER ABOUT SONNY AND CHER

Gay and Lesbian History by Paula Martinac

Perhaps no celebrity straight couple has found its career as deeply intertwined with gays and lesbians as Salvatore Bono and Cherilyn Sarkisian LaPierre — better known as Sonny and Cher.

The story that the two met in a lesbian bar is probably apocryphal, though Cher has acknowledged erotic relationships with women in her youth, liaisons that, she later recalled, weren't "something that kept my interest."

What did keep the lanky, deep-voiced singer's interest, though, was the short, charming, goofy crooner 11 years her senior who was initially her roommate, but soon became her lover and in 1964 her husband. Sonny and Cher each had found limited solo success, and their first attempt at working together (touring bowling alleys and skating rinks as "Caesar and Cleo") brought little acclaim.

But in 1965, Sonny wrote a simple tribute to '60s-style love, and with "I Got You Babe," Sonny and Cher made it big. For the next two years, they ruled the rock scene, with hits like "Baby Don't Go" and "The Beat Goes On." But by the end of the decade, their music had lost its audience and two failed attempts at movie making left them deeply in debt.

The duo's romance frayed and their tensions played out onstage. But the audience loved it, so Cher's put-downs and Sonny's bumbling became trademarks. Their act caught Hollywood's attention, and in January 1972 their own comedy-variety TV series debuted. The show was all camp from outrageous Bob Mackie costumes to sexualized banter. Sonny and Cher began recording again, and their music career was on the upswing just as their marriage could no longer hold itself together.

One cause of their breakup was Cher's including with record producer David Geffen (who came out as gay two decades later) and southern rock guitarist Greg Allman (whom she married five days after her 1975 split from Sonny).

Cher's solo variety show (which had something of a gay sensibility — its debut featured Bette Midler and Elton John) overwhelmed her, and having failed in

his own solo show, Sonny accepted his ex-wife's invitation to create a new Sonny and Cher series, which lasted two seasons. Without abandoning entertainment (he played a theme park owner in the 1988 campy cult film Hairspray), post-Sonnyand-Cher Sonny made a bigger mark in the world of politics.

SONNY BONO and CHER have captivated gay and lesbian audiences for decades. But why do they have such a long-lasting appeal?

Despite having campaigned as a friend of the resort city's visible gay community, the Republican was widely criticized for slighting gays and lesbians personally and legislatively as mayor. In the 1994 Republican landslide, he was elected to Congress, where he consistently voted against the gay community's interests. He died in a skiing accident in 1998, and his wife, Mary, was elected to fill his seat.

Meanwhile, Cher pursued her acting career, nominated for an Oscar for her lesbian role in 1983's *Silkwood*, and winning one for *Moonstruck* four years later.

Cher's music career found new life with upbeat tunes like "One By One" and "Believe" that were embraced by audiences worldwide, but especially by gay men. Her icon status solidified as a VH-1 "Diva,"

Cher regularly recognizes the "fabulous gentlemen" who flock to her concerts and have consistently boosted her career. Perhaps the queerest product of the

Sonny and Cher partnership, though, was their lesbian daughter Chastity who was outed by the tabloids in 1990, but became a lesbian activist and writer after she came out on her own terms five years later. \mathbf{N}

Author Jade Fairall has turned a difficult journey into a successful career. By John Sullivan

LAKE COUNTY - Activist, fruit picker, plumber, bartender, security guard, Advocate cover person, journalist, and now published author, Jade Fairall has worn a lot of hats in her lifetime. And they have helped to make her the strong woman that she is today. With the recent publication of *Riddle* Maker, her first book, Fairall finds herself in the spotlight, but not for the first time.

Fairall's journey has not been an easy one. She spent her childhood and teen years in Freemont, Ohio, a less than accepting environment for a young woman coming to terms with her sexuality.

Her parents divorced when she was six and she spent a lot of time with her older sister foraging for food in garbage cans when their alcoholic mother would go on a binge and lock them out of the house.

As she got older, life in Ohio didn't get much better. She was outed in high school and was forced by the school to sit at a desk in the hallway where her peers would spit on her and call her names.

"At my graduation, when I walked up to receive my diploma I grabbed it, turned to face the crowd, and flipped them a double bird before blowing them a kiss." Fairall recalls with a laugh. "I left and never looked back."

Soon after, she decided that Freemont was not the ideal place for a young lesbian, so she packed her life into her van and headed south.

Fairall barely made it to Florida's state line when her van threw a rod. She and her van crawled to Orlando where she didn't know a soul — at about 40 miles per hour and ended up on Colonial Drive. After finding an ad

way we deserve to be heard

for the Parliament House she went there to get a room and something to eat.

"I was broke and didn't know what I was going to do. That's when Bill and Mike, who ran the P House back then, offered me a job," Fairall remembers.

Her friends at Parliament House liked to tease her and say she looked like a little boy. They encouraged her to compete on a talent night as a male impersonator, something she had never done before.

She entered the talent contest at the Palace Club, an after hours bottle club, and barely got a few steps into her act when the crowd swarmed the stage.

"Women and men were tipping me and that was it," recalls Fairall," "I started doing shows at the Palace and at P house. Miss P taught my two left feet how to dance."

Fairall continued to do male impersonation in clubs from Orlando to Houston and even won the Ms. Gay French Quarter New Orleans title in 1979. She was a big part of the gay and lesbian club scene in Orlando for almost two decades at P House, Faces, and the Key Largo Lounge.

Her activism was something that she fell into when some friends heard her ranting and raving about gay rights. "I was made co-chairman of GRAND, Gay Rights Amendments Never Die. I even went up against Governor Askew asking him at a press conference about gay rights,"

about gay rights, she remembers." Writing was something that Fairall always loved to do. As a child she would write skits for the neighborhood kids to perform. Then in high school she got into some trouble and her teacher told her she needed to write a ten-page fictional piece or she would fail the class.

"I went home and started writing and ended up with over twenty pages. I remember thinking, 'This is punishment?"

Fairall recalls. "I passed her class and she told me that if I didn't pursue writing as a vocation then I was a fool."

Two decades later, when a back injury forced her out of manual labor, Fairall went back to

school at Lake-Sumter Community College in Leesburg. "It was three of

the best years of my life. I did something that I

never thought I could do, and th

could do, and that was to go back and get my education," says Fairall.

She became the associate editor and then editor of the college paper and also freelanced for the *Orlando Sentinel Lake County Edition*.

With *Riddle Maker* she decided to take a new approach by having the novel published through Iuniverse.com, a Web-based publisher that prints on demand.

Fairall's says she always has sights on the future. She has completed her second

book, *Alone With Demons*, and has decided that her third book will most likely be autobiographical.

For now, though, she is happy living a somewhat quiet life in Umatilla with Darcie, her girlfriend and public relations wizard. She enjoys her day job as an office manager for Robert Vincent Sims, a.k.a. the Garden Rebel. One thing Fairall isn't ruling out is the prospect of running for political office someday.

"I believe that the only way to change how we are viewed is to speak up and speak out," Fairall says, with more than a

hint of determination in her voice. "If we continue to whisper about ourselves we will never be heard the way we deserve to be heard."

When asked, wes much of her succes

Fairall says she owes much of her success to her personal philosophy.

"Dream it, see it, do it, be it," says Fairall. "Only you can change the course of events in your life. We are the only ones that change, that can break those chains." \mathbf{N}

mirrors. Suffice to say that ABBA was probably better off being popular at a time when videos were not prevalent with Ulvaeus' puss prominently displayed.

However, his words have rung true — Bjorn Again has proved quite popular. Since forming in Melbourne, Australia in 1988, the facsimile has amassed more than 2,500 concerts during a career that has spanned 14 years — longer than the original group was together. The doppelganger band has played to sold out audiences at Royal Albert Hall and has recorded several albums.

One clever album, *Erasure-ish*, supplies two covers of Erasure songs as a thank you for Erasure's *ABBA-esque* on which they covered four ABBA songs. Try to wrap your mind around that; the tribute band pays homage to the band that covered the tunes of their inspiration with covers of their songs.

Today Bjorn Again is something of a machine with at least two sets of groups touring the planet. With duplicates of the duplicates, Bjorn Again will be appearing at House of Blues Orlando on November 1... and in the United Kingdom on the same night. In fact from time to time the group holds auditions — if you are musically inclined and look like a '70s Swede, then you too could be a copy of the doubles.

You might think that these ABBA clones treat their subject matter with complete reverence, perhaps keeping an alter with photographs and burning candles, but Bjorn Again does approach their job with a least a little tongue planted in their cheeks. The group's Web site <www.bjornagain.com> tells the tragic tale of how the band members' - Agnetha Falstart, Frida Longstokin, Benny Anderwear and Bjorn Volvo-us helicopter collided with a giant glittery platform shoe. The accident rendered each of them amnesiac, except for these strange melodies running through their heads.

To the delight of audiences, the four speak with bad Swedish accents.

"I am flattered by everything Bjorn Again do but the accents," weighs in Ulvaeus. "I hope my accent isn't as lousy as his one." (His one?)

Giving credit where credit is due, a tribute band's success is owed in large part to the affection afforded to the original band. According to NorwichBulletin.com: Total U.S. sales of ABBA albums in 2001 were up 32 percent from 2000 sales."

After Abba and Ace of Base, Sweden brings forth Alcazar. The group has stormed the European charts with their debut album *Casino*. The record features an energetic blend of old-school disco, eurodance, and poppy drum 'n base combined with a heavy dose of camp and confidence. Lead singer Andreas Lundstedt does not seem reluctant to acknowledge his homosexuality, but he stresses that he is protective of his privacy. "I am not making a secret of the fact that I'm gay, but I don't want to make it a big deal either," explains the singer. I get a lot of fan mail from

The group headlined Sydney's Mardi Gras in March 2002, and also performed at several Pride events in Europe this year. "The success is very much about our music, our attitude and our appearance." says Lundstedt. "We

When it comes to openly showing off his male sexuality, Lundstedt says, "I am very comfortable with that. Nothing too racy though, I am not a South Beach go-go boy. God no!"

SOULFORCE CONFRONTS FALWELL'S ANTI-GAY RHETORIC

LYNCHBURG, Va. - Anti-Muslim and anti-gay remarks made by Christian fundamentalist Reverend Jerry Falwell are the focus of protests and vigils to be held on Oct. 26 and 27 outside Falwell's Thomas Road Baptist Church in Lynchburg, VA. Hundreds of GLBT and allied supporters of Soulforce will descend on Lynchburg that weekend to confront Falwell for his anti-gay and anti-Muslim rhetoric.

According to reports, statements made by Falwell on a CBS television last Sunday calling the founder of Islam a terrorist sparked rioting in India, which killed five people and injured 47 others Friday.

"Words have power to hurt and kill, and Jerry Falwell must repent for his words," said Rev. Mel White, co-founder of Soulforce. "Falwell is notorious for his anti-gay statements. We have been saying for years that fundamentalist anti-gay rhetoric leads to suffering and death for GLBT people, and now we can say it also leads to death for Muslims." "We must stand together against the

fear-mongering tactics of the

fundamentalists among us, whether the

fundamentalists are Muslim or Christian -

for fundamentalism does not represent the

loving spirit of either faith," White said at a

joint press release issued by Soulforce and the gay Muslim organization Al-Fatiha.

TAMPA BAY ATHLETES HEAD DOWN UNDER

TAMPA - Twenty athletes from Tampa Bay's gay and lesbian community will head to Sydney, Australia to participate in the 2002 Gay Games as a part of Team Tampa Bay.

Team Tampa Bay was founded in 1997 by the current president and competitive wrestler Lou Hidu. The team went to the 1998 Gay Games in Amsterdam with 35 athletes and came home with fourteen medals, two of which were gold.

"We have a number of past medal winners going to Sydney to represent us, and I think that we have some really strong competitors in other fields," says Hidu. "I am confident that Team Tampa Bay will bring home a gold medal in wrestling this time."

The Gay Games, which runs Nov. 2 -9, is a quadrennial athletic and cultural event that brings gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgendered athletes together from around the world. Athletes compete in both traditional and non-traditional sporting events like bowling, aerobics, golf, wrestling, figure skating, swimming, and track and field competitions.

Hidu says he will not be going to Sydney with his team this time due to the cost of the trip coupled with the fundraising difficulties that the team has faced in the last year. The goal of their fundraising has always been to provide financial aid to athletes who would not otherwise be able to go. A number of factors made fundraising particularly difficult during the last year, one of which was the events of Sept. 11.

"I think that so many people gave to charities after 9-11 that consequently many non-profits suffered later on down the road," Hidu explains. "It's sort of like charity fatigue. Plus the economic down turn had an effect on a lot of people."

1998 Games came through a grant from the Sanderson Foundation, a local charitable organization that gives to gay and lesbian causes. The team applied for the same assistance this year but was told that the foundation would be unable to help this time.

Hidu says that looking back he's a little disappointed that his group wasn't more proactive when it came to fundraising.

"With fundraising, in order to make money you need to spend money. And if you have no money to spend then it's really difficult," says Hidu. "Team members dug deep into our own pockets to keep the team going until we were able to raise funds.'

Team Tampa Bay was able to raise enough funds for three scholarships, which they did through letter solicitations and actual presentations to groups within the community. Jim Garciga Travel came through for them in the form of a cruise that they raffled off, while additional sponsorship came from George's Alibi, the Pharaohs, and Larry Fisher, CPA.

Although the Gay Games, as visualized by the event's founder Tom Waddell, is an opportunity for any gay man or woman to strive for their personal best within the arena, there are many athletes who feel that the sports have taken a back seat to the "culture" and partying.

"This has been a real problem within the federation because there are people saying this is a sporting event while

others are saying it is a cultural event," says Hidu. "My personal feelings on this issue is I think we have enough circuit parties and we don't need another one. This is a chance for gay and lesbian athletes to meet and compete on a world class level, where they otherwise wouldn't have the opportunity."

After six years at the helm of the team, Hidu has resigned his position as president effective Nov. 9, the same day as the closing ceremonies for this year's games. Although he feels like he needs a break from the team, Hidu contends that he will always be there if anyone needs advice. His participation in the next Gay Games, scheduled for 2006 in Montreal, that is still up in the air.

"I don't know that in four years I will want to compete on the level that is demanded of someone competing in the Gay Games," Hidu says. "The standards are very high as there are some incredible athletes in the gay community, but that's the excitement of the games, to be up there with world class athletes and to be able to be open about who you are.'

Team Tampa Bay's newly elected officers are: Alan Ross, president; Jerry Keeran, vice president; Bob Lorenzen, secretary; and Eric Siglin, treasurer.

We got naked and had a lot of sex and since he had already told me twice that he was HIV negative we did all of this without condoms. I am HIV negative and had planned on staying that way, but now I have found out via mutual acquaintances that this guy is HIV positive and he goes around telling guys that he isn't, only to have unsafe sex with them.

Most of his playmates he meets online and I am sure he has infected or tried to infect a lot of people. I am afraid to get tested again and at the same time I am

I think that people need to know what this guy is doing. Are there any legal steps that can be taken in a case like this? Is it legal for me to go into a chat room where he is and warn the other people in there? What can we do about this?

Signed, Positively Negative

Dear Negative,

There are people in our world that will make destructive decisions that significantly affect themselves and others. What is important to keep in mind is that we ultimately have zero control over the decisions that others make. However, what we do have control over is how we choose to interact or respond to their actions. It is illegal for an individual to knowingly attempt to infect another with the HIV virus. Your best course of action for preventing this perpetrator from attempting to infect others is to report his actions to law enforcement.

A visit to a local HIV center for psycho-educational counseling would probably be in your best interest. The professionals at the center can talk with you about your behavior and make recommendations for any additional support services. The identification of safeguards that protect you from repeating this type of risky behavior in the future will assist you in the long run.

The decision to have an HIV test is a personal one. It is my belief that it is best to know because of basic medical preventative strategies that can be implemented and overall peace of mind. So I do advocate for testing.

ORLANDO - Most people know how to make their favorite cocktail, but finding the recipe for a great cocktail lounge isn't always so easy. Fortunately, for the owners of Orlando's trendiest new drinking spot, the decision to open a bar together was as easy as popping the top off a Miller Lite. It's just as well: despite having a full-fledged liquor license, it's about the only drink any of the owners know how to concoct.

"We met out by the pool one afternoon, ate pizza, got drunk, and said, 'Let's open a business,'" says Jeff Walton, 38, one of the owners of the Lava

Lounge, recalling how the decision to go into business together was made. The poolside relaxation

fests were a weekly ritual for Jeff, Kathy "Pete" Barma, 36, Koko Guevarra, 42, and Alan Miller, 44. When Alan's career in the health care industry was about to come to an end earlier this year, he convinced his pals to join him as he

followed

his life-long dream to open a bar.

While the plan was never to make the business a strictly "gay bar," the owners' initial location-scouting found them in the ViMi area, home to several gay and gayfriendly businesses. And when the building that once housed Art's Cigar Bar became available — and at an affordable price the foursome knew they had a found a perfect home for their venture.

With the building's outdoor patio area, lakefront view and trendy Orange Avenue Antique District address, the Lava Lounge was perfectly poised to become the

premier chic hangout in Orlando. The crew spent about nine weeks refurbishing the bar. When a planned soft opening during

Memorial Day weekend resulted in hordes of people pouring through the doors, the owners knew they had hit the ground running.

But gone now are the weekly laid back get-togethers. Instead, the owners have moved their socializing to their new home next to the railroad tracks on Ivanhoe Row. And what a gathering spot it is.

of three areas you've got nothing to complain about.

Moore, however, was recognized as the very *best* in gay Tampa Bay in two of these distinct categories! Along with business partner Brett Peeler, his hip Urban Body clothing stores were named "Best Clothing Store" in both Tampa Bay and Orlando. And Moore and life partner Sasha were also chosen Tampa Bay's "Most Dynamic Couple." We're not even going to ask what kind of house they live in.

COOL CLOTHING

"I haven't stopped blushing since I found out," Moore says, but he is also quick to point out that each of the awards is shared.

"Urban Body is a joint business venture," he notes, "and Brett is every bit as responsible for our success as I am."

Moore and Peeler took a calculated but still enormous risk when they opened Urban Body in the now-burgeoning SoHo (South Howard Ave.) area of Tampa in March of 2000. They hatched the idea while living together

in Atlanta, even though neither one had any direct retail experience. But their backgrounds meshed perfectly, otherwise. Peeler, a former insurance actuary, was the numbers guy; Moore, a marketing professional, would oversee promotions.

"We saw Tampa as an up-and-coming second tier city," Moore says, "and we knew that there was nothing like the store we envisioned in the area." With a clean uptown atmosphere, an emphasis on customer satisfaction, and clothes that fit muscled young gay male bodies with unique precision, Urban Body changed local shopping habits from the start.

"We never order more than six of anything," Moore says, "because we want people to know that they're not going to see the same shirt on 10 other guys on the dance floor."

But he notes that the shop is anything but "slut wear for 20-year-old club kids." Urban Body stocks jeans, dress shirts and slacks, bathing suits, and a variety of shoes, belts and other accessories.

Increasingly, the store also caters to more than just gay men. "The percentage of straight customers has increased drastically since we opened," Moore observes. "We've never made any bones about who we are, so I think the fact that straight men are comfortable shopping here is a wonderful example of how our

community has mainstreamed."

Peeler moved to Orlando in 2001 to open a second Urban Body store in the exploding Thornton Park neighborhood. That store won a WAVE award in its first year.

And Moore and Peeler also just opened a new Web site —

www.urbanbody.com with popular clothing items shipped the day after being ordered.

THE SUSHI TEST

As often happens, Moore met his partner through an ex — in this

case one of Sasha's. "He pointed him out to me at Metro Flex and said, 'That's the one that got away," Moore remembers. So Moore

submitted him to "the test". "I like to go to a Japanese restaurant on the first date," Moore laughs, "to see if he likes sushi, and if he can use chopsticks."

Apparently Sasha passed with flying colors. That was two years ago, and the couple married in Vermont this past August. Afterward, they celebrated at a huge "White Wedding" party at the St. Petersburg home of some friends. "Best DJ" Jeffrey J was in charge of music.

"We talk about everything," Moore says. "I never knew a relationship could be so easy." $\mathbf{\nabla}$
