


After a lovely visit I bade farewell to OHS in the land of sunshine, and return to my home and husband in Indiana.

They started the season slowly by losing their first three games by closs margins; however, the forwards found their eye for the basket and won from their last opponents with decisive victories.


Lillian Jakubein, with 81 points, was high point girl for the year, and Vivian Wheaton and Josephine Godwin were the outstanding decensive players.




