They started the season slowly by losing their first three games by close margins; however, the forwards found their eye for the basket and won from their last opponents with decisive victories.

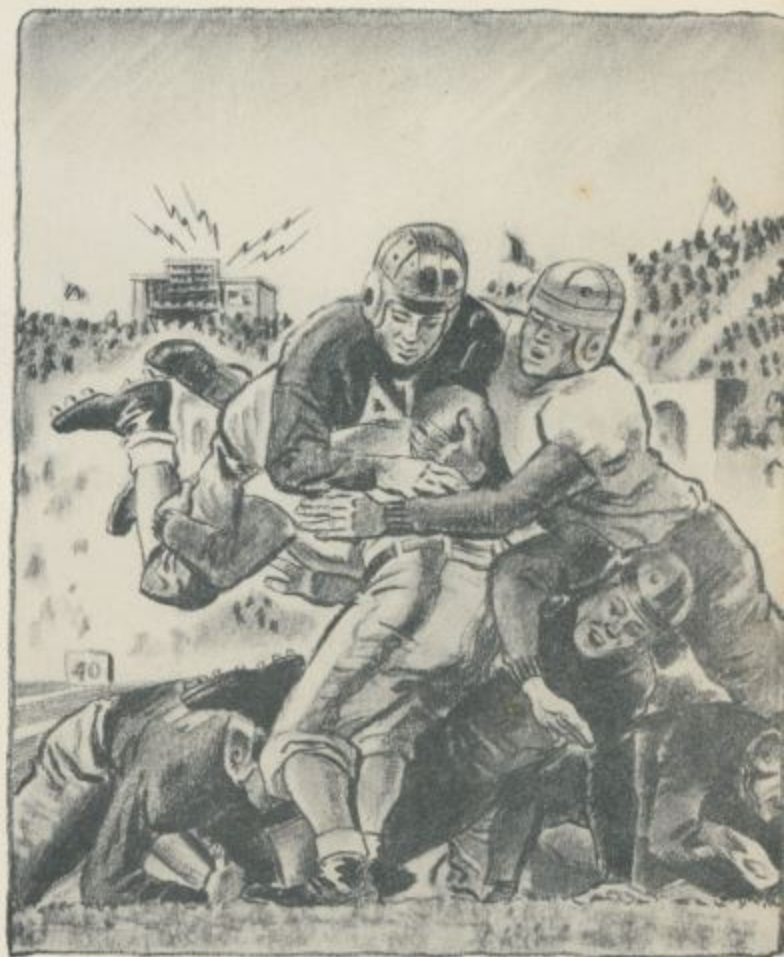
Lillian Jakubein, with 81 points, was high point girl for the year, and Vivian Wheaton and Josephine Godwin were the outstanding defensive players.
