We spoke last week of the legis-lative power of the Council. On them falls the burden of making laws for the government of the town, and through their committees they also assist in the carrying out of these laws, although the chief executive officer is the Mayor.

The actual work of the town comes under the general heads of

(1) Administrative—The keeping of records, attending to finance, all clerical work. This is done by the town clerk under the direction with the advice and assistance of the mayor and chairmen of committees.

(2) Police-The arrest of law breakers and the patroling of public places. This is done by the marshall, under the direction of the mayor, and with the help of any deputies who

may be appointed.

(3) Fire Protection-This includes the enforcing of ordinances relative to fire hazards, building regulations, etc., and the work of the fire de-partment which has recently been or-ganized under a chief. A committee of the council is especially responsible for fire protection.

(4) Streets and Sanitary-This, (4) Streets and Sanutary—This, one of the most important committees and the hardest worked, is expected to attend to all repairs, maintenance, cleaning and beautification of streets and public places. A portion of the time of the marshall is given to this work, and extra labor is employed as needed.

(5) Water Works-This department is only now beginning to func-tion and has not yet been permanent ly organized.

(6) Cemetery and Charities-Council committee takes charge of this work, and the actual labor in-volved is drawn from the time of the marshall and other paid employees of the town.

These departments cover the main divisions into which the executive work is organized. There is a certain amount of division of authority, but the person who is held responsible for the whole working out of the system is the Mayor.

WATER CONNECTION RATES REVISED

At a Council meeting held Friday evening atcion was taken which re-sulted in a substantial reduction in the charge for water connection. L. M. Barton made an informal bid to put in all taps and connections and bring pipe to curb at a cost of \$7.50. This offer was accepted and the rate to connection was fixed at \$12.00 and a \$6.00 meter deposit. The latter will be refunded when service is disontinued.

This is the same rate as that charged by Winter Park and is a great re-duction over the tentative rate of \$30.00, which was established temporarily until definite costs could be

With the decrease in the rate it is expected that there will be a much larger number ready to connect up with the city water, and people are urged to get in their applications soon in order that there may be no delay

The Council also authorized the installation of a telephone in the Town Hall.

CHINCH BUG CONTROL ON ST. AUGUSTINE GRASS

By A. H. Bever, Assistant Entomologist Experiment Station

> (Centinued from last week) Conditions Favoring Outbreaks

An observation of certain weather conditions is the best indication of an outbreak of chinch bugs in lawns. Warm and fairly dry weather during the spring and fall are the most favorable periods for the abundant hatch-ing of chinch bug eggs, as they are deposited by the females in the great est numbers during these seasons. structive outbreaks are sometimes pre-vented by a series of drenching rains, or a prolonged rainy or humid sca-son during the hatching period.

Control Methods

Natural control has been found to be undependable, because the chinch bug can withstand almost any con-ceivable climatic condition or variation. The range of temperature through which the chinch bug has been found to subsist is from 15 de-grees below acro (Fahrenheit) to 137 degrees (Fahrenheit). Under these extreme temperatures, however, the chinch bugs are found to die in a few minutes.

Fungous Diseases

Fungous diseases known to attack the chinch bug, among which is Beauterus globulefera, are entirely de-pendent on the frequency of cloudy or wer weather during the hatching period of the young bugs. This de-pendent of the pound bugs are before of period of the young bugs. This de-pendency upon certain kinds of weather prevents these diseases from destroying the bugs in large numbers. This disease attacks many other in-sects and is present every year throughout chinch bug territory.

FIRST C. OF C. CARD PARTY HELD Therefore, it becomes abundant under favorable weather conditions without artificial introduction. Another disease which has been found of value in chinch bug control during humid seasons, and which also attacks the cutworm and other insects, ia Sovospella uvella

Because of the fact that these fungous diseases are dependent on weather conditions, it is readily seen that their introduction in the control of chinch bogs is of little economic value.
