BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF CONTENTS.

RED PATRIOTS is an octavo volume of 300 pages, profusely illustrated with half-tones from photographs and rare old paintings. It consists of 25 Chapters, divided into two parts, with an Appendix and a comprehensive Index.

Part I (18 Chapters): Early history, character, and condition; causes and principal events of the atrocious Seminole War and other hostilities; heroic struggle for home and country; sketch of OSCEOLA'S life and character; full exposure of our Government's repeated treachery and deception in the efforts to gain entire possession of Florida soil; the true story of the seizure of Osceola and others under flags of truce; Osceola in confinement, his sickness and death, comments of the press and eulogies; termination and stupendous cost of the war; reflex of public opinion of the day; trials of the emigrants; full account of a band of Seminoles who emigrated to Mexico, and who received grants of land and high praise from that government; the Seminole in the Civil War; present condition and customs of the main tribe in the West.

Part II (7 Chapters): The remnant left in Florida after the seven years' war; last hostilities, 1855-58; final and affecting emigration; the remnant of a remnant—those now living in the State; their high character, quaint customs, and self-supporting condition; the several efforts to help them.

The **Appendix** contains a sketch of a little nephew of Osceola, who was adopted by an Englishman and taken to London; curious treaties; list of all battles; names and locations of over 140 forts established in Florida during the war; bibliography; index.
