THE CLASS D FLORIDA STATE LEAGUE SEASON OF 1947

WITH most of its difficulties being of the "front office" variety, the Class D Florida State League's eighth season of play went into the records primarily as one attracting the largest crowds in history, crowds that were treated to night after night of highly competitive although largely non-record establishing games, offensively and defensively speaking.

Don Anderson's St. Augustine Saints, one of the most evenly balanced and certainly one of the smoothest operating clubs in league history, used speed and daring during the latter stages of the season to nose

out Myril Hoag's G-Men and capture the 1947 pennant by a five and one-half game margin.

It was the Saints' third pennant in eight seasons, and they came from behind twice to win it. Bill Steinecke's DeLand Red-Hats led until June 5 when the Saints moved

in, only to be shunted aside by the faststepping G-Men who, winning 12 straight, took first place July 10, and again on July 19 to stay there until Aug. 16 when the Saints came back with a bang.

Naturally, the Saints led in pitching with a staff that produced a season's earned run average of only 2.73 runs per game; fielding with a .960 mark that was second only to Sanford's .963 of 1939; and were second in batting with a .256.

Breezing thru the Shaughnessy playoff semi-finals with three victories in five games with Lou Bevil's Orlando Senators, the Saints, however, fell to the G-Men in the finals which went into the records as the most turbulent in league history.

The G-Men had eliminated DeLand, four games to three, after a hot series in which one game was called off because the umpires failed to appear, an incident that, matched by another in the finale with St. Augustine, brought about an official investigation by President George M. Troutman of the National Association.

In the finale, won by Gainesville four games to three, it was charged that Gainesville officials, eager to provide another night's rest for the hurling staff, acted too hastily in

calling off a scheduled game. The same charge had been aired in the Gainesville-DeLand series except that the non-appearance of the umpires at the Gainesville park was the point at issue.

However, President Troutman closed the book on both cases by declaring officially that "No evidence was produced at the hearing that would lead one to believe there was collusion on the part of any person or any club related in any way to the regrettable incidents."

That the confusion attending the final days of the season was quickly forgotten was evidenced by the thoroly harmonious annual meeting of Nov. 2 when directors unanimously re-elected Judge A. S. Her-

long, Jr., of Leesburg as president, and quickly acceded to his request that several steps be taken that would eliminate similar situations in the coming seasons.

Judge Herlong had assumed presidential duties on August 3 when Al Combs of Gainesville resigned for the second time in two years.

The G-Men represented the league in the eighth annual inter-league play-offs with the Georgia-Florida League Shaughnessy winner—the Moultrie Packers. They dropped the series, three games to four, thus evening the series at four for each league.

For the first time in league history, perhaps in the history of the minor leagues, the same player won the batting and the pitching title for the year. He was Myril Hoag, former New York Yankee outfielder who managed Gaines-

ville.


Hoag won the batting crown with a .350 average acquired in 102 games, and won the pitching honors in both departments, games won and lost and earned run average. He won 17 and lost three for an average of .850, and allowed but 1.82 runs per game.

It was Hoag's second league batting title, for he won the honors in 1946 with a .343 average while managing Palatka. Twelve of Hoag's 17 wins were consecutive, the longest winning streak of the year. His most brilliant showing of the

season came during the play-off finale with the Saints whom he turned back twice with but two hits, the second game going 11 brilliant innings and returning the G-Men as play-off winners.

While Hoag was high man, one of his players won almost all the other important season slugging honors. He was rookie Bob Thorpe who came up with the most hits (153), most total bases (229), most homers (10), most runs batted in (96), and most times at bat (552). He was tied with Mario Perez of DeLand for second place with 13 triples.

Gainesville also offered two other players whose work was outstanding. One was right-hander George Fultz who, after ty-

Leeper, left-hander, who probably drew more of Gainesville's record-smashing 89,763 regular season paid admissions than any other player on the club.

Unpredictable on the mound, Leeper set a new league record by striking out 20 Orlando Senators on May 30, and still another league record by walking 19 Sanford Celeryfeds on July 10. He had previously set a new mark by walking 18 men on June 23. It was not uncommon for Leeper to walk 11 or 12 men while striking out 13 or 15 men in the same game, and his name and brief season's appearance (May 24 through Aug. 5) will be unique in league history.

Except for Leeper's strike-out and base-on-ball records, only two other existing offensive or defensive marks were broken in 1947. Orlando's Rex Throop, rookie outfielder, set a new mark by being hit 15 times during the season, while DeLand's veteran outfielder, Joe Vitter, set a new mark by hitting consecutively in 27 games.

DeLand won the club batting title with a .266, lowest figure since 1936 when Daytona won with a .261. The com-

bined club batting average was .252, lowest in league history by two points. Yet, Leesburg's low batting mark of .247 was the best in loop history by four points.

St. Augustine won fielding honors with a .960 while Daytona trailed with a .925, second lowest in history, Gainesville's .922

of 1936 being rock bottom.

Among the season's highlights was Gainesville's reversal of form in winning second place and Shaughnessy honors after setting an all-time record of losing 32 straight games in 1946, a streak interrupted by a tie after 18 games had been lost.

The year produced the longest game in loop records, Sanford's 1 to 0 decision over DeLand in 19 innings on July 19, and

the worst shutout, Orlando's 20 to 0 win over Palatka on May 20. Palatka had broken the old 1939 mark of 17 innings by defeating Leesburg, 9 to 8, in 18 innings on June 28.

Longest winning streak of the year was Gainesville's string of 12, while Daytona Beach was credited with the longest losing streak, 12 games.

Managerial changes were limited to three: Buddy Lake stepped aside at Sanford on June 4 to be succeeded by Don Murray who turned the reins over to non-playing manager John Krider on July 26; Grover Hartley gave way to Max Samuely for Daytona Beach in mid-August; Bill Steinecke resigned on June 9 but returned a few days later and finished the season.

No pitcher was able to turn in a nine-inning no-hitter in 1947, but two of them—Len Goicoechea and Alston Mc-Gahagin of Palatka conspired to turn back Leesburg, 7 to 1, on July 9 without a hit. Goicoechea hurled the first 4.2 innings, and McGahagin pitched the final 4.1.

Ralph Dulaney, Gainesville catcher, tied the loop mark by handling 17 putouts and four assists for 21 chances without error on July 10 when he handled Leeper's record-smashing slants.

Tony Vega, DeLand, tied the record at shortstop when he had four putouts, nine assists, and three errors, for 16 chances at the position on May 21. Don Murray set a new mark by handling 10 putouts and seven assists for 17 chances without error at second base on June 30.

Leesburg manager Bill Good tied the league record by batting in eight runs on June 6 at home to DeLand hurlers while Charlie Ridgway, Leesburg second-sacker, tied the league record of scoring five runs in the same game.

Dulaney struck out five times at Daytona on June 6 to tie the individual strike out record in one game.

Only six men felt the thrill of smacking a homer with the sacks full during 1947, and one of them did it twice. They were: Chuck Aleno, DeLand, at St. Augustine April 21; Bob Thorpe, Gainesville, home with St. Augustine May 25; Craig Lybrand, Orlando, at Gainesville June 27; Stan Karpinski, St. Augustine, at home with DeLand July 21; Rex Throop, Orlando, visiting Leesburg July 26; Aleno, visit-Gainesville Aug. 13; Vernon Pirtle, Palatka, home with Orlando Aug. 15.

Rookie Henry Filipski, Daytona Beach, had the best single night's showing by hitting six hits in six trips, while Earl Campbell, Leesburg, was the only player to get six for seven in 1947. Bill Rabe, Daytona, got five for six as the only player in that department, while the following were the only ones to come up with "five for five"; Manager Don Anderson of St. Augustine, Palatka's Fred Caswell and Carlos De-Souzas, Leesburg's Jimmy Herrington, and Filipski.

Sanford, DeLand, Daytona Beach, and Palatka operated independently during the season, with Washington operating Orlando, Pittsburgh controlling Leesburg, the Chicago Cubs providing a manager and players at St. Augustine, and Atlanta having a working agreement with Gainesville.

· A unique feature of the 1947 season found the league using umpires whose training had been sponsored at a first annual free umpires' school held at Orlando in the early spring with the cooperation of the American League.

Agreeing with League Director Jeff Emerson of Palatka that enough former players with real experience were residing within the circuit and were likely candidates as umpires, directors authorized the school and were deeply gratified to find President Will Harridge of the American League in full accord.

President Harridge assigned Bill Summers of his staff to the Orlando school, and, while the number of men who applied and received training was limited, it was generally agreed that the first year results were satisfactory. Six of the eight starting umpires finished the season.

The second annual school will be held in Orlando from Jan. 15 through Feb. 14, and the American League again will assign Umpire Summers to the task. However, the directors voted to do away with the 1947 restriction that all students must have had five years or more of actual playing experience in baseball. The 1948 school thus is a free tuition affair open to any man interested.

The annual meeting of Nov. 2, 1947 found the directors voting that for 1948, league rules be amended to require that all rained out or postponed games must be scheduled for play on the next meeting between the two clubs; that all clubs carry a minimum of six rookies on the active roster through the season; that not over three men of unlimited experience be under the control of any club at any one time during the season.

One hundred and thirty four men, 16 less than the record set in 1938, tried their hands as pitchers during 1947. St. Augustine and Gainesville used the fewest, 13 each, while Palatka used 28, the most. Other clubs: Orlando and Sanford 14, Leesburg 19, Daytona 20, DeLand 23.

Nine inning shut-out victories: Jones, five; Hyde, Buonato, Fultz, Ketcher, four; Stanton (one 11), Juan Perez, Alonzo, Hoag, three; Zedalis, Kinnamon, Morton, Bissen, Rotunno, McGahagin, Hallman (one 10 inn), Kettles, Lake (one 19 inn), Coker, two; Stewart, Johns, Wenclewicz, Munch, Leeper, Loveys, Lemly, Prempas, Meadows, Davis, Driggers, Maseda, Gaddis, Tomat, Bumgarner, Heiner, O'Callaghan (10), Gormish and Bailes, one each.

Eighty five shut-outs were hurled, 68 of them going nine innings, two 10 innings, one 11 innings, one 19 innings for a new league record, 12 seven innings, and one six innings.

Only one 1947 contest ended in a tie. Rain halted Sanford's July 21 appearance at Palatka in the seventh inning with the score 4 to 4.

Forty seven extra innings games went into the 1947 records, the longest being Sanford's 1 to 0 victory over DeLand in 19 innings at DeLand on July 19. It was the longest game in league history, breaking the new record set on June 28 when Palatka won, 9 to 8, visiting at Leesburg after 18 innings. Lake of Sanford and Alonzo of DeLand, started and finished the 19-inning record-breaker, Lake allowing eight hits, fanning four, and walking none, while Alonzo allowed 10 hits, fanned four, and walked five. Winning run in the 19th was Lake's home run!

THE LEAGUE'S FIFTH ALL-STAR GAME

Unique in baseball history was the league's fifth all-star game, played at St. Augustine on Sunday afternoon, July 13, before 2,091 obviously satisfied customers.

It was the first time in organized baseball history that a fan-selected team of first year or "rookie" players played against a fan-selected team of limited service and veterans.

A month before, fans thruout the circuit had been urged to attend games on July 3 and 4 when they would receive ballots listing all eligible players. Each fan was asked to select a team of eight players, two right-handers, two left-handers, a utility player, and a manager, and 3,800 of the 6,400 ballots that were handed fans in eight cities on the two nights were returned marked.

Honor of being the host city was to fall to the city leading the league at midnight on July 4, and St. Augustine's handsome Francis Field provided a perfect setting under ideal baseball conditions.

While the league's several sportswriters and radio commentators were profuse with their descriptions of the contest, many were agreed that the story of the game, as told by Gordon Kipp in the DeLand Sun-News, was most complete. A portion of it follows:

"Youth can beat experience.

"That was proved to 2,091 sweating fans at Francis Field in St. Augustine yesterday afternoon when the Florida State League All-Star rookies whipped the All-Star veterans, 8 to 5, in the first post-war all-star contest.

"The rookies combined good pitching with power at the plate to rack up their win over the more experienced players. This was the first time in the history of organized ball that a fan-selected team of rookies has met a fan-selected team of veterans in an all-star contest.

"Rookie right-fielder Ty Braziel, Orlando, and Rookie left-fielder Bob Thorpe, Gainesville, shared the day's batting honors, each driving in three rookie runs to pace the win.

"Braziel played for five innings and connected for singles to left, right, and center fields respectively in three official trips to the platter. Thorpe had two for three, including a long triple to left that sent across two runs.

"Stan Karpinski, St. Augustine's veteran left-fielder, sent a 340-foot, two-run homer over the left-field wall in the fourth canto to keep the veterans in the ball game. Only veteran to collect two hits during the game was second baseman Lyle Judy, also of St. Augustine.

"Tiny Ralph Perez, little brother of Juan, twirled for three frames for the rookies and received credit for the win. He was preceded by Gainesville's Tom O'Callaghan, and followed by his DeLand team-mate, Yigi Alonzo. All worked three innings apiece.

"Jack Bumgarner, Leesburg mound ace, was tagged as the losing pitcher during his two inning tenure on the hill. The winning three runs were garnered off his efforts. He followed the two-inning stint of Orlando's Tommy Hyde, a southpaw, and was relieved by Gainesville's Mason Leeper, also a portsider."

Grover Hartley, former major league catching star and Daytona Beach manager, piloted the victorious rookies, while Bill Steinecke, DeLand manager, directed the veterans. Juan Perez, DeLand rookie left-hander, and George Fultz, Gainesville, veteran right-hander, did not see action.
