


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
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Aubrey Connelly, Director

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Guest Narrators-Saturday

Patty Sheehan

Patty was the first openly gay candidate to run for an Orlando City Council seat. Ms. Sheehan's narrow miss of the run-off by only seventy-five votes shows the growing support of the LesBiGay and progressive political community in Orlando. A long-time political activist, she is currently on the Board of Directors of the Rainbow Democratic Club, the Colonialtown Neighborhood Association, and serves on the Diversity Committee of the Healthy Community Initiative. She was a founding Board Member of Orlando Regional Pride (the Parade People) and was recently honored by the Community with a Spectrum Award for Outstanding Community Activism. Patty's interests include gardening, restoring her downtown bungalow, and jewelry making. She shares her life with a canine companion, Amber, and her very supportive and accepting family.

Tom Dyer

Tom is about as native to Central Florida as it gets; he moved here with his family in 1967 and attended Winter Park High School. His first exposure to local "gay color" occurred while working a summer job in the character department at Walt Disney World. (Tom adds, "Probably one of the gayest places on the planet in 1972.") He obtained his law degree from the University of Florida, and is currently a practicing attorney, specializing in estate planning and probate. A former officer of the Metropolitan Business Association, Tom currently sits on the board of the Delta Youth Alliance. He is founder, publisher, and editor of *Watermark*, Central Florida's bi-weekly lesbian and gay periodical, for which he has interviewed such diverse personalities as Orange County Chairman Linda Chapin, the fabulous "Miss P", Lily Tomlin, and Phyllis Diller. Tom is the recipient of two Spectrum Awards, one for Journalistic Excellence, and another as Outstanding Male Role Model.

Reverend Dr. Marni Harmony

Marni received her B.A. from Tufts University, a Th.M. from Boston's University School of Theology, and a D.Min. from Columbia. She was ordained in 1974 and served churches in both Milwaukee and Pennsylvania before coming to Central Florida. She has served as both hospital and college chaplain, a psychotherapist, as well as a VISTA volunteer. She lives with her partner Nancy and two feline children, Molly and Lucy. She has a full grown son, plays the flute, and eats lots and lots of vegetables. Marni has been minister of the First Unitarian Church of Orlando since 1988, and is very proud of the welcoming attitude of her congregation to all types of diversity.

Jack Harrell

Born in Jacksonville, Florida, Jack is a man of many talents. He was an actor, top-rated disc jockey, weatherman, and host for a television variety show. He then moved to New York City, where he choreographed night club acts. Jack placed second in a "talent contest" that was Barbra Streisand's very first public appearance. (Guess who won?) After touring with Camelot from 1963 to 1964, he finally settled in Los Angeles, where he worked in practically every position available with George Schlatter, producer of Laugh-In. He was an announcer on Cher (where he was also a performer), Real People, and Barbara Walters' specials; he also introduced the litigants on The People's Court. While in L.A., Jack worked frequently in television and on stage, until a 1994 earthquake sent him scrambling home to Florida. Since moving to Orlando, he has been busy appearing in several commercials, a play: You Should Be So Lucky, and featured roles in both SeaQuest and Walker, Texas Ranger.



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


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

Holiday Greetings From The Staff & Management



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A Checklist of Concert Etiquette

- 1. If you insist on arriving late, refrain from traipsing down the middle aisle. This is not a wedding and you are not the bride. Go sit someplace and be discreet. For a change.
- 2. Please remove all severe hats. The gentleman behind you may be searching for a husband, and we wouldn't want him to overlook the chorus.
- 3. Don't try to settle up who-owes-who while the chorus is performing. Honestly, you'd carp about "Who had the tuna fish?" in the middle of Do You Hear What I Hear?
- 4. Don't betray your lack of breeding. Keep your shoes on.
- 5. Do not snap your purse open and shut during a musical selection. This is tacky.
- 6. Stifle all sneezes, eructation, and flatulence. Even if it pops out your ears.
- 7. The experienced concertgoer will sorta preview the event by looking at his program and discovering what pieces are "grouped together." (This is a very technical concept.) If you have the slightest doubt as to whether a piece is finished, refrain from applause. You should be able to figure this out by the conductor lowering his hands and a visible look of relief sweeping across the baritones.
- 8. Eventually (believe it or not) you'll hear a song you recognize. You may even know the words. You may want to sing. Please don't! (The basses only learned their Fa-la-las last week and they're so easily swayed.)
- 9. When the chorus sings piano (i.e. softly), this is an achievement. This is not your opportunity to cough, murmur lovingly in your escort's ear, shuffle in your seat, or rearrange your coiff. (We do tape these events.)
- 10. Noise abatement is even more crucial when the chorus sings pianissimo (very softly) and pianissi-issimo (soft to the max). Our elegantly trained and demandingly precise music staff has spent countless hours of time perfecting OGC's goosepimpling piani, but alas, our recordings sound like we're doing a benefit at The Old Sinus Home.
- 11. Use the intermission for reviving your social calendar. Don't over commit yourself. Arrange no more than five "must-get-togethers" for after the concert. Avoid scheduling perennial no-shows. Above all, don't dump your date.
- 12. At the end of the evening, don't bruise people in your haste to get to your parking place. I thought only Uncle Elmer was that crass.

After the concert, warmly invite a favored performer to meet you for drinks. Introduce the performer to all eligible singles present (including yourself). Bug out when necessary. Should you not have a keenly developed social sense, one of your mutual friends should smile warmly and say, "It has been so nice of you to introduce us."



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
