SURVEY AUTHORIZED ON MAITLAND SECTION OF NEW HIGHWAY

L. L. Coudert, town surveyor, was authorized by the Council to make the necessary surveys required to prepare plans establishing grades for State Highway No. 3, from the north town limits to Lily Lake. This action was taken in consequence of instructions from the State Road Department asking that all plans and surveys be completed as soon as possible, as they expect the contracts to the Maitland line will be completed by January. The contractors are working now in Longwood and expect to reach Seminole Boulevard, running from the highway to the race track by the 1st of November.

COUNCIL ACTS ON STREET IMPROVEMENTS

Among the most important resolutions and ordinance relative to street improvements which were passed at the adjourned meeting of the Town Council held October 15, were those authorizing the widening of Horatio Avenue between Vanderpool Avenue and Maitland Avenue, the extension and widening of Vanderpool Avenue from the north town limits south to Lily Lake, and the widening and improvements of Maitland Avenue from George Street north to Lake Faith, the latter including the laying of a pavement on the east side of the street, making a two-way street, the approximate cost of \$35,000 to be borne by special assessments against the abutting property.

The town is showing a broad-minded and fair-sighted policy in thus obtaining adequate rights-of-way on three of the most important streets of the town—the old highway, which will always be the main artery for local traffic, the new State Highway, the Black Bear Trail, which will carry all through traffic from Jacksonville and the north, and Horatio Avenue, the connecting link between the two, which promises to be the main cross street in the business center of the town. These rights-of-way are comparatively easy to obtain now, but within the next five years their cost may be prohibitive.

A petition was also accepted for the improvement of Alpine Drive at an approximate cost of \$4,400 to be borne by a special assessment. Alpine Drive, which was laid out only a year ago, has shown a remarkable growth and bids fair to be solidly built up within the next year.

A petition signed by fourteen property owners requesting the extension of the water main from Lawrence Avenue south to Alpine Drive was referred to a committee consisting of L. L. Coudert, S. J. Stiggins and K. N. McPherson to investigate the approximate cost and feasibility of having same done.

An ordinance was passed establishing a building line on the east side of Independence Lane, between Horatio

NARROW STREETS AND NO THOROUGHFARES

The Council is to be congratulated on the progressive program of road building which they are undertaking. Perhaps the greatest thing they have done for the future of the town is to obtain adequate rights-of-way on the main business streets and highways now when it is possible to acquire them at a reasonable expense. We all know of cities where the business sections have been allowed to grow up with narrow streets, and the resulting congestion has caused untold trouble now that the erection of large business blocks makes the widening of the streets a practical impossibility. This danger has been averted in Maitland, at any rate on the main streets.

The Council is also inaugurating a good, conservative paving program, granting paving wherever the present development or that of the immediate future warrants it. This paving program is of more immediate value than the widening of the streets, for at the present it is impossible for the stranger to see the beauties of our town, as nearly all the most attractive spots are on sand roads, which a stranger finds it hard to negotiate. Even the paving already done has hardly bettered matters in this respect. The visitor who is lured from the highway

by the vista of a lake glimpsed under spreading trees at the end of a paved street finds himself confronted with a pile of sand from which, if he is rash enough to attempt passage through, he may have difficulty in extricating himself. His only alternative is to turn around on a street not much wider than the width of his car. And we all know how that damps our enthusiasm.

If we want to get the greatest present benefit from our paving program, let us have no culs-de-sac, but bend our energies toward connecting up the bits of paving already in, making it possible to complete a drive without turning around.

AUXILIARY PLANS EXTRA MEETING

The Maitland Auxiliary voted to have an extra all-day meeting the first Friday in November to work for the Children's Home Society in Jacksonville, which is in great need of immediate help owing to the influx of children made homeless by the recent tornado.
