WHITEFLY FUNGUS

Gainesville, Fla.—Have you got that whitefly-fungus growing in your whitefly-infested citrus trees as abundantly as you desired? This is the question being asked citrus growers by the Entomological Department of the State Plant Board. Fungus is the best remedy to apply during the period of summer rains.

The Plant Board has this fungus for sale, and one dollar will buy enough fungus in pure culture (prepaid) to treat about an acre of trees. There is still time to help Nature give the whitefly a hard lick. The Board furnishes directions with each culture.
