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Usually I use this space to make a point on a political or social topic of interest to the GLBT community. But I don't want to do that in this issue. Instead, I'd like to introduce you to Watermark's fantastic columnists and give you a chance to get to know these talented individuals a little better.

First up is Jim Crescitelli. Jim has penned a "Water Cress" column in every edition of Watermark since 1995. That's seven years worth of skewed perspectives from one of the wittiest and nicest people I've ever had the privilege of knowing. Reading "Water Cress" for me is a little bit like watching a David Lynch or Tim Burton film. Even though some of their movies are better than others, I always enjoy them. I enjoy being inside their heads for a little while. It makes reality so much easier to deal with.

Sarah Viren, who writes "Liberal Arts Lesbian," is a gem, too. I don't know if Sarah is aware of the impact her column has on readers. She always offers honest glimpses into her world as a gay woman, but so many of her experience resonate with a universal quality. On the surface, she seems to write with a touch of naivete, but if one reads between the lines there's a lot of truth and wisdom in her prose. Sarah's only been with Watermark for a year or so, but we want her to write for us as long as she wants to.

I'm so grateful for our roster of contributing "Viewpoint" columnists each with his or her unique voice. Award-winning Jayelle Wiggins is invaluable. Her "Lipstick Graffiti," about her experiences as a bisexual Wiccan, is consistently amazing. I used to think of her as our own Sylvia Plath: a wise woman that cannot break free of her own deep thoughts. But as the years go by I'm realizing she's more like Lenny Bruce, pointing out the vicissitudes of life in a biting and satirical manner. And Jayelle doesn't just poke fun at human behavior; she stabs it in the stomach and twists the knife. I love "Lipstick Graffiti."

Greg Triggs has written for Watermark for several years, supplying our readers with a wide array of news and features. Last year he started contributing semi-regularly with "What Would Greg Do?" His column is quite reflective. He speaks of experiences he's had over the years and how these

episodes have strengthened him as a gay man. Sometimes funny, sometimes a little sad, all of his columns are written straight from the heart — and Greg has a big heart.

Then there's Syd and Enid Jackowitz's "Parent's Perspective," a viewpoint column by a straight married couple who have a grown, successful gay son. What can I say about Enid and Syd? Their column is always so hard for me to edit because it's filled with so much poignancy that I'm teary-eyed by the end of each and every one. Watermark is so lucky to have them — and so is their son. They exude thoughtful love.

Lastly there's Rick Walen's "The Bottom Line," also a difficult edit because word for word Rick is an incredibly tight and concise writer. Rick's thoughts and ideas — usually of a political nature — so closely reflect my own that I'm often amazed to read my opinions so eloquently put. Rick is a master at finding the hidden truth beneath the rhetoric. His column on p. 22 of this issue - an acutely observant look at Governor Bush's fantasyland — is another in a string of must-read columns by the thought-provoking writer.

So there you have it: a group of writers that everyone at Watermark is very proud of. They are a diverse bunch that we feel reflect the richness of the gay and lesbian community. I hope you enjoy their columns as much as I appreciate each and every one of the authors.

In this edition of *Watermark* we take you from a candidates forum in Orlando ("Headline News" on p. 6) to Bear Bust at the Moon (in our "Water Colors" section). ORLANDO - There are several important races in the coming mid-term election, but Central Florida's gay and lesbian community has been most energized by the battle for State House District 36. As many as 25 percent of registered voters in mostly Democratic downtown Orlando are gay, setting up an interesting battle between two political newcomers: Democrat Sheri McInvale and Republican Patrick Howell.

If elected, Howell

will join Orlando City **Commissioner Patty** Sheehan as Central Florida's second high profile openly gay elected official. And it was Sheehan who fired the most direct shots at Howell during the Oct. 3 Metropolitan Business Association Candidate's Forum. Her remarks made clear that for some present at the event, particularly Democrats, being gay might not always translate into gay vote.

Eight candidates for public office addressed members and guests of the local gay and lesbian business group at the Four Points Sheraton Hotel. More than 100 in attendance couldn't help noticing that — except for Howell — all of the candidates were Democrats.

"Look at who's here tonight, and look at the platforms of the parties," McInvale said. "It should be clear who has been there for you, and who will continue to be there for you."

"The makeup of this panel is reflective of the values and priorities of the two parties," added State House District 49 candidate Jose Fernandez.

Candidates present included Howell, McInvale, Fernandez, Eddie Diaz (U.S. House District 8), Marni Berger (State House District 35), Jim Martin (State House District 38), Tim Shea (Orange County School Board District 2), and Joie Cadle (Orange County School Board District 1). Harry Jacobs (U.S. House District 24) had to cancel at the last minute due to his wife's illness, but he sent a statement of support.

All were articulate in their support of broad non-discrimination laws, making it clear that gay voters have appealing options in many pivotal local races. Each candidate expressed strong support for the Dignity for All Students Act and for overturning Florida's ban on gay adoptions, and many proactively endorsed legal domestice partnerships status for same-sex couples.

"Take note that I'm running against the person who single-handedly killed the Dignity for All Students Act during the last legislative session," said Martin in

reference to his Republican opponent, incumbent Fred Brummer. "I have a lesbian sister and I've seen what she's experienced. For me these things are no-brainers."

"There is nothing more important than finding loving homes for our children," said Fernandez, "and its absurd that we have laws that deny them that."

Diaz and Jacobs both expressed eagerness to pass the federal Employee Non Discrimination Act and federal Hate Crimes legislation.

"It is a gross oversight not to include sexual orientation in every category of discrimination protection," said Diaz, who is running against Republican first-term incumbent Ric Keller. Cadle and Shea promised to seek specific contractual protections for gay teachers and other school board employees, and to protect local schoolchildren from harassment. 'We know there's

discrimination," said Shea. "The question for all of us is what

we're going to do about it." "No child in Orange County should be afraid to go to school," Cadle said.

Howell and McInvale were clear in their support of a broad range of pro-gay measures, but as the only candidates present in opposition, they also sought ways to distinguish themselves. Howell said Florida's legislature needs openly gay representatives, and touted his endorsement by the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund. In addition to her party affiliation, McInvale noted her local ties and years of volunteer service to the community.

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MANATEE COMMUNITY COLLEGE GLBT STUDENTS REGROUP

BRADENTON - Two years ago, a gay female student at Manatee Community College in Bradenton approached faculty advisors with the idea of starting a new student group. Her idea was to initiate a club that GLBT students could turn to and get the support they needed while attending the two-year college. With faculty assistance GLAD (Gays and Lesbians Advocating Diversity) was born. But according to current GLAD president John Fuss, keeping the group going proved to be a difficult task.

"Since the college is only a two year college it was hard to keep students actively involved," Fuss said. "Last semester the GLAD club seemed to not exist."

Fuss said that two of his advisors, Christy Burch and Kristen Moudy, began work in the beginning of the fall semester to rebuild GLAD. Using simple means and available resources, Burch and Moudy created posters and advertised the re-envisioned club across campus.

"That's how I learned about the group," Fuss said. "And now GLAD has approximately 13 active members. We hope that number increases once we hang up some more advertisements on campus."

Fuss said that the group has only had one official introductory meeting since the beginning of the semester. But, he said, members from the group regularly get together for social activities.

"We are producing an activity calendar for this semester that will include a mini gay and lesbian film festival in which proceeds will go toward having a prom at the end of the spring semester," he said. "We also are going to have little outings and have movie nights for our members."

Fuss said that since the group's resurgence, he and his advisors have focused on ways to make other gay and lesbian students aware of GLAD's existence. He said that immediate plans include starting an informational Web site that will list meetings and the group's activity calendar.

TRIBUNE CRITICIZED FOR SAME-SEX ANNOUNCEMENTS

The Tampa Tribune's Sep. 21 announcement that they would begin publishing announcements of same-sex unions outraged some readers. "Open homosexuals form a very small part of the community," wrote Steven Parsley. "This policy is a serious error on your part." Patricia Walenta said, "Gay unions are not a natural act, and should not be encouraged or condoned. This is a serious threat to my religious beliefs." More than 125 newspapers, including The Orlando Sentinel now accept same-sex union announcements.

GAY COMMUNITY, SUPPORTERS TO RALLY AT CITY HALL

ORLANDO - To counter Orlando Mayor Glenda Hood's reluctance to schedule a vote for adding "sexual orientation" to Chapter 57 of the city's antidiscrimination law, a "Give Us Our Vote Rally" has been scheduled for Monday, Oct. 14 at 6 PM at City Hall.

Noted speakers from across the cultural, political and religious spectrum have said that they will attend the rally in support of Orlando's gay and lesbian community. At a candidate's forum on Oct. 3, all eight politicians in attendance also agreed to take part in the rally. (See "Headline News" on p. 6.)

The rally is being organized by members of the Orlando Anti-Discrimination Ordinance Committee (OADO). They claim that Hood is stalling the vote because she's afraid that it could hurt her chances of being appointed to a position within Gov. Bush's administration.

Openly lesbian City Council member Patty Sheehan also accused the mayor of delaying the legislation to avoid any perceived controversy before Nov. 5.

"I don't think citizens' civil rights should have to wait until someone's political fortunes are decided," Sheehan told the *Sentinel*. "If we treated everything the way this legislation has been treated, we would never pass anything."

A spokesperson for the mayor's office denied Hood was purposely delaying the vote. \mathbf{W} Scott J. Smith

PROMOTERS WILL GO AHEAD WITH PRIDEFEST

ORLANDO - Organizers of this year's Pridefest celebration, scheduled for Oct. 12, have announced a change in venue. Originally the festivities, dubbed "Evolution," were to be held on Soundstage

33 at Universal Studios Orlando, but due to several factors the event will now be held at The Club at Firestone.

"It's actually a blessing in disguise for us because it allows us to give more back," says Alan Bounville, co-coordinator of this year's event. "We have overcome many challenges to do something that is going to benefit our community as a whole, which has always been the main goal."

Initially, Pridefest was designed as a benefit for Orlando's Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual Community Center (GLBCC) and organizers were able to secure the venue at Universal Studios for a fraction of the normal cost by using the Center's not for profit status.

But GLBCC decided to pull out of "Evolution" and cancelled their contract with Pridefest's promoters when they realized that both Bounville and coorganizer Bates Reed planned to take a cut of the profits to compensate for the time and effort they put into the event.

"We have never had a volunteer financially profit from Pridefest and we are not going to," says Bart Zarcone, president of the Center's board of directors.

Bounville says that he, Reed, and other Pridefest volunteers deserve compensation for giving up to 20 hours out of their own workweeks.

"When you take on something like Pridefest and you want to do it as big as possible it takes a lot more time than your traditional volunteer work," says Bounville.

Pridefest has traditionally been a fundraising event for the programs and services at the Center. This year event organizers decided to give an equal portion of the proceeds to Serenity House, a local pediatric AIDS charity. After the Center pulled out of the event, Bounville and other organizers decided to exclude GLBCC from any of the monies they were originally promised.

Instead, according to Bounville, the portion of the proceeds that were to benefit the Center will now go into an account to be used in the creation of a new "community leadership cooperative."

When it was announced that the Center would not be a beneficiary of this year's event many organizations, including *Watermark* and Universal Studios, also pulled their sponsorship.

"We are already working with Universal on next year's Pridefest, which will see it return to being a fundraiser for the Center," says Zarcone. "We learn by our mistakes and we really want it known that neither Reed or Bounville represents the Center in any way."

Andrea Meade, a Poinciana High School special education teacher, was arrested on Oct. 1 for assaulting her 16-year-old girlfriend — who was a student at the school where Meade taught. According to Osceloa sheriff's Bureau Chief, Meade went to the teen's home to discuss their relationship, became angered, and ended up hitting the girl about the head and neck. Meade admitted to a sexual relationship with the girl, but said that the affair started before she was hired at the teen's school. Meade is being charged for lewd and lascivious assault on a child and unlawful sexual activity. She also faces a misdemeanor battery charge.

MIAMI FILM FEST DIRECTOR LEAVES POSITION

Emmy Award-winning filmmaker Robert Rosenberg has departed from his position at the Miami Gay and Lesbian Film Festival. Rosenberg founded the Film Fest and has served as its director since the festival's inception five years ago. According to a press release issued by the festival, Rosenberg left to pursue other projects, and that the organization has been struggling with management, structural and financial issues. Fran Levey, co-chair of the festival board, said that there are no plans to replace Rosenberg.

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2002 Elections REVAMPED **CABINET MAKES VOTE IMPORTANT**

Florida Attorney General: Charlie Crist (Rep.) v. Buddy Dyer (Dem.) **By Tom Dyer**

This is the third in a series of profiles leading up to the Nov. 5 election. The Oct. 24 issue of Watermark will contain a preview of key national, state and local races appearing on ballots in Sarasota, Tampa Bay and the Orlando Area.

In Florida, state Cabinet elections usually draw the same level of interest as summer reruns. But a constitutional amendment approved by voters in 1998 halved the number of Cabinet offices from six to three beginning now, and those remaining will wield unprecedented influence particularly the Attorney General.

BUDDY DYER: "I don't think he has the aualifications

All three Cabinet officers (Agriculture Commissioner, Attorney General, and Chief Financial Officer) will sit on the Board of Administration, overseeing Florida's \$90 billion pension find. But the Attorney General is also the chief officer of what is in effect the state's law firm, directing and supervising teams of attorneys as they scrutinize everything from whitecollar crime to consumer fraud to civil rights violations.

It's a high profile position that many see as a logical stepping stone to the Governor's mansion in 2006. Democrat Bob Butterworth --- who declined to run for Governor in 2002 has held the office for the past sixteen years, and in that time he set a precedent for activism on behalf of Florida consumers. He successfully challenged industries ranging from baseball to Microsoft to Enron, and in 1999 he won a \$206 billion settlement against the tobacco industry.

not. Dyer has addressed the Metropolitan Business Association, Orlando's gay chamber of commerce, on more than one occasion. His campaign Web site states: "Buddy Dyer believes that discrimination of any kind by any individual, government agency or company should not be tolerated. As

Attorney General he will instruct the Office of Civil Rights to proactively seek out and prosecute any entity or individual practicing discrimination based on race, gender, color, age, religion, disability marital status or sexual orientation." Crist makes no such claims.

In fact, Crist is seen by many as a lightweight political opportunist with no clear agenda. When his position as Education Commissioner was

eliminated, it is speculated that he cast about for the most winnable state office. With good looks and an affable manner, he might be harmlessly ineffectual if not for his willingness to

advance the beliefs of the political powerbrokers that finance his forays into public office.

"We're 100 percent supporting Charlie Crist," said Tim Barnes, executive director of the Republican Attorneys General association, which seeks to elect pro-business candidates into the increasingly important state offices. "This is a top priority race for us this year."

Asked to define himself in this context, Crist's response was typical.

"Well, I like Florida businesses," he said. Dyer hopes that, among other more substantive differences, Crist's

unimpressive intellect will concern voters. Both are lawyers, and both served in the Florida Senate, but Dyer was editor of the Law Review at the University of Florida, and got the highest score in the state when he took the Bar exam. Crist attended lowranked Cumberland School of Law and needed three tries to pass the Bar exam. The issue came up when Pinellas

> Park police Chief David Milchan asked Crist if he would hire Dyer if elected. "Why not?" responded Crist. When asked the same question, Dyer said, "As nice as Charlie is,

I don't think he has the qualifications." Crist has a five-point lead in recent

polls, but 23 percent remain undecided so the race is currently considered a toss-up. Next to Governor, Attorney General is the most important statewide election in 2002. The winner will have enormous influence on passage and enforcement of civil rights laws in Florida. By all means, cast your vote for Buddy Dyer.

Not Just Family Friendly

PROVIDENCE, *R.I.* - Mayoral candidate David Cicilline is a one-man political rainbow: Italian, Jewish, liberal, wealthy and gay.He is also setting the stage for Providence to become the largest U.S. city to elect an openly gay mayor.

Recent polls show him with a commanding lead over three other contenders in the race to succeed Vincent "Buddy" Cianci Jr., an old-school politician who held office for parts of four decades before he was sentenced to five years in prison for corruption. The 41-year-old son of the state's best-known organized crime lawyer, Cicilline has tried not to be known as "the gay candidate." That led some in the gay community to revolt during the recent primary and back his chief opponent, former Mayor Joseph Paolino Jr.

PROVIDENCE POISED TO ELECT OPENLY GAY MAYOR

If elected, Providence will surpass Tempe, Ariz. as the largest U.S. city with an openly gay mayor, according to the Washington-based Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund. (*AP*)

APPEALS COURT REVERSES DECISION, FINDS HOMOSEXUALITY PROTECTED

LAS VEGAS - An eleven-judge panel reversed an earlier decision, ruling on Sept. 24 that federal civil rights laws protect gay workers physically harassed on the job. The 7-4 ruling by the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco reverses a March 2001 decision by three judges in the same court.

They had upheld a 1979 decision that the law protects workers against discrimination only on the basis of race, color, religion, gender or national origin.

The case extends protection to workers regardless of sexual orientation or offender's intent.

The seven-judge majority cited a unanimous 1998 U.S. Supreme Court ruling that sexual harassment at work can be illegal even when the offender and victim are the same sex. (AP)

THREE MEN ARRESTED IN WEST HOLLYWOOD ATTACK ON GAY ACTOR

WEST HOLLYWOOD - Three men were arrested for investigation of beating a gay actor with a baseball bat outside his home last month in a suspected hate crime attack. Los Angeles County sheriff's Capt. Lynda Castro announced the arrests during a news conference late on Oct. 2. She declined to identify the men.

Investigators are looking into whether the suspects were involved in other assaults on gay men in West Hollywood, including one that took place just hours after actor Treve Broudy was attacked.

Broudy, 33, was attacked on Labor Day. Another man was similarly attacked the same night, and a fourth was beaten later in September by two men yelling anti-gay epithets and wielding a bat and a pipe. The attacks put the city on alert, and police stepped up patrols.

The men were originally arrested for investigation of robbery and automobile grand theft before they were linked to the beating, Castro said. (AP)

NAVY TO KEEP WON'T DISCHARGE GAY SERVICE MEMBERS

Navy officials are refusing to discharge two openly gay service members despite the military's Don't Ask, Don't Tell policy. In two cases at separate naval commands, Ensign Thang Nguyen and Hospitalman Roy Hill recently made statements acknowledging their sexual orientation. In both cases, their commands have refused to initiate discharge proceedings while also refusing to provide any guarantee of the service members' safety.

FOUR GAY MEN RELEASED FROM EGYPTIAN PRISON

Four men were released from an Egyptian prison on Sept. 24 after their convictions for "consensual homosexual behavior" were overturned on appeal. The men were in prison for 10 months. According to the International Gay and Lesbian Human Rights Commission (IGLHRC), the rulings were appealed to the Boulak Appeals Court of Misdemeanors, which reversed the decisions based on lack of evidence.

TASMANIA TO RECOGNIZE DOMESTIC PARTNERS

On Sept. 24, the state government of Tasmania said it would begin recognizing domestic partnerships. Tasmania Attorney-General Judy Jackson said, "This is not about morality. It's about human rights and the respect for the equal dignity of all persons without discrimination."

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BUSH BLAMED FOR UNDERMINING AIDS PREVENTION EFFORTS

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Human Rights Watch and Gay Men's Health Crisis, the nation's oldest and largest AIDS service organization, will discuss how the Bush Administration is threatening adolescent health by censoring basic information about how to prevent HIV/AIDS.

Human Rights Watch has just issued a new report documenting how federally funded "abstinence-only-until-marriage" programs threaten the health of young people by censoring and distorting basic information about how to prevent HIV.

The report focuses on programs in Texas, where advertising campaigns warn that parents who advise their children to use condoms may actually be putting their children's lives at risk and where programs either convey the message that teenagers should not use condoms because they don't work or do not mention condoms at all.

"The Bush administration wants to spend millions more dollars on abstinenceonly programs that put teenagers at higher risk for HIV," said Rebecca Schleifer, an HIV/AIDS researcher at Human Rights Watch and the author of the report. "Our research shows that these programs don't just censor information, they actively promote misinformation about condoms. And they deprive adolescents of one of the most important tools that they need to protect themselves from HIV."

HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES DECLINES TO FUND LESBIAN HEALTH

WASHINGTON, *D.C.* - The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) pulled a promised \$85,000 grant for Healing Works, almost scuttling the national lesbian health conference before it took place.

The Office of Women's Health at HHS had put money into their budget for the conference and The Mautner Project bid on the request for a proposal (RFP), a standard process with government funding.

Kathleen DeBold, executive director of The Mautner Project, explained the machinations of how the RFP was withdrawn and a second issued and then withdrawn before she was told by HHS official Cristina Beato that the conference "did not fit into [Secretary Tommy Thompson's] vision for women's health. He wants to fund inclusive conferences."

DeBold noted that that "vision" did not preclude HHS from funding youth conferences, women of color conferences, and Native American conferences.

Healing Works ended up getting the money "through the back door," in smaller bits and pieces from the CDC, National Cancer Institute, and other parts of HHS farther removed from the Secretary's office. That funded travel fellowships for some of the attendees and speakers. \mathbf{N} Bob Roehr

NATURAL PROTEINS MAY BLOCK PROGRESSION OF HIV

Scientists have identified a group of proteins that inhibit the progression of HIV in people who are resistant to the virus. A study, using a new protein-identification tool, identified the proteins in a disease-blocking substance, called CAF. Researchers said the proteins in CAF are part of a large family of disease-fighters known as alpha-defensins. These natural antibiotics were first discovered in 1985 and were known to play a role in protecting the body from bacteria and infections. The new study finds they also inhibit HIV.

SYPHILIS OUTBREAK INDICATES DANGER OF HIV INCREASING AMONG GAY MEN

An increase in syphilis infections among gay and bisexual men indicates they may be letting their guard down against sexually transmitted diseases, the government said on Sept. 26. The increase suggests the men may be abandoning safe sex practices because life-extending AIDS-treatment drugs are more widely available. Outbreaks of syphilis among gay men also have been recorded in New York, Seattle, Chicago, San Francisco and Miami.

SOME LUBRICANTS MAY HELP SPREAD HIV

A recent report from the World Health Organization (WHO) warns that using sexual lubricants containing a popular spermicide could increase the risk of HIV infection. The WHO report said that using lube containing nonoxynol-9 (N-9) during anal sex could lead to rectal inflammation and the shedding of cells lining the rectum, causing a much higher risk of contracting the AIDS virus.

While searching and viewing any item on Amazon, the option, of course, to buy shows up on the side of your navigation window, but so does a link that reads, "Add to wish list." CREDITORS OF SYDNEY'S GAY MARDI GRAS ACCEPT DEAL TO SAVE PARADE

Creditors of Australia's Gay and Lesbian Mardi Gras on Monday accepted a deal that organizers said would guarantee the future of one of the world's biggest street parades. The company that runs the annual gay rights festival faced bankruptcy and in July called in independent administrators who found that the company's board had debts of \$379,392. The deal involves the sale of some of the parade's assets and hands the right to hold the annual event to a newly created corporate entity, to be known as New Mardis Gras.

ATTACKER STABS, INJURES PARIS MAYOR AT CITY HALL

PARIS - The man suspected of stabbing Paris' openly gay mayor early on Oct. 6 told interrogators he did it because he disliked politicians and homosexuals.

Bertrand Delance, 52, was attending a lively, all-night party at city hall as part of Paris' first-ever "Sleepless Night" festival when he was attacked. He is expected to remain hospitalized for at least week to recover from the single stab wound to his abdomen. His office had initially described the injury as minor. He had surgery for three hours after being rushed to the hospital.

The unidentified suspect, who was taken into custody immediately, confessed to the stabbing, said judicial officials, who spoke on condition of anonymity. They said the 39-year-old attacker told them that he was a devout Muslim and acted out of opposition to politicians and gays. Investigators believe the suspect isn't linked to any Islamic fundamentalist parties. (AP)

Clearly eager to put Howell on the spot, Sheehan — a Democrat — was the first to rise during the question and answer session. Brandishing a campaign finance report, she asked Howell why he accepted a contribution from John Dowless, a local political wag and former high-ranking member of the Christian Coalition. Howell answered that he refused Dowless' offer of consulting support, but accepted the money. Turning the tables, he then charged that Sheehan's campaign had been managed by right wing anti-tax firebrand Doug Guetzloe. Sheehan countered that Guetzloe's support was limited to an endorsement before forum moderator Michael Morris intervened.

A question about homestead exemptions from Rainbow Democratic Club president Carol Bartsch revealed substantive differences between Howell and McInvale. Howell supports a \$25,000 increase in the exemption to encourage home ownership.

"Studies clearly indicate that people who own their homes feel a greater stake in their community," Howell said, "and I think we should do everything we can to encourage that."

McInvale said Howell never shared how he would make up the loss in tax revenues.

"This is just the classic difference between Republican and Democratic philosophy," she said. "They want to help the wealthiest, at the expense of everyone else."

MBA board member Mike Ames scored a coup with the evening's final question.

"You've all expressed your support tonight," he said to the panel, "but will you demonstrate it by attending a rally at City Hall for Orlando's non-

discrimination ordinance on Oct. 14?" To a one, every candidate promised to be there. **▼** *Tom Dyer*

GOVERNOR BUSH'S REMARKS OUTRAGE GAY COMMUNITY

TALLAHASSEE - Equality Florida is calling on Governor Jeb Bush to apologize for homophobic remarks he made to a group of legislators about two



caregivers of a missing girl, Rilya Wilson. Bush told a delegation of Panhandle legislators during a meeting that he had

"some juicy details" about the sexual orientation of the caregivers.

Bush implied during the Oct. 2 meeting that Geralyn and Pamela Graham, who had just been charged with fraud stemming from the investigation into Wilson's disappearance, were lesbians.

"As [Pamela Graham] was being arrested, she told her co-workers, 'Tell my wife I've been arrested.' The wife is the grandmother, and the aunt is the husband," Bush explained, using his fingers to indicate quotation marks to emphasize the word "grandmother."

"Bet you don't get that in Pensacola," Bush told his guests.

Bush made his remarks to three Republican Panhandle legislators, two GOP state House candidates and aides during a meeting in the governor's office.

He apparently did not realize a reporter with Gannett Regional Newspapers of Florida accompanied the group. His comments were first reported in the *Pensacola News-Journal*.

Nadine Smith, executive director of Equality Florida called the comments "childish" and "locker room homophobia." She also said Bush should apologize for his comments.

"It's not the kind of comment you want to hear from the highest elected official in the state," she said.

WELCOME TO THE REAL WORLD, MR. BUSH

Well, the primary is behind us and Election Day is quickly approaching. The citizens of Florida have a decision to make. Do we want more of the same or are we ready to set our feet on the road to change? Lets look at what we've achieved after four years under the reign of Jeb Bush.

Bush calls himself the education governor. Maybe he is the governor of fantasyland. The Bush campaign has spent \$2 million on re-election ads that the Republican Party began airing on TV last spring. The ads flaunt Bush's record of increased spending on education. The

Bush Administration claims that state support for public education has increased by \$2.4-billion since he became governor, the biggest increase of any three-year period in state history. The problem with this misleading information is that they must have forgotten that during his term funding has barely kept up with inflation and the growing number of students in the state.

The ads say that because of Bush, student test scores are improving. They must not realize that the schools have been turned into test factories that teach almost exclusively to the FCAT. Furthermore, improving scores can be attributed to the fact that more and more poor performance students are being shifted into programs where their test scores don't count. These improved scores are

misleading as more than 40 percent of the state's 10thgraders failed the reading portion of the exam. Overall, students are not performing well. Bush never

attended public school where teachers have to reach into their own

pockets to pay for supplies because money is so scarce. Teachers' frustration levels are high as they try to keep up with an average of 30 students in a classroom. We are spending \$152-million in existing and new programs to recruit and keep teachers because Florida teachers' salaries rank below the national average and teachers are fleeing to other states in search of better pay. Bush blames the school districts for failure to effectively negotiate teacher pay, let's pass the buck shall we?

Last, but certainly not least, let's examine Bush's views on gay and lesbian issues.

"While I respect the great diversity of our state and the rights of individuals, I am not in favor of extending 'special rights' to the gay and lesbian community," Bush said in a written statement. "In the past, I have voiced my

opposition to samesex marriages, gay and lesbian adoptions, and the extension of domestic partner benefits. Since taking office, my views on these subjects have not changed. The state should not be in the business of actively sanctioning this

particular lifestyle."

In fact, in 1995 Bush called gay rights and feminism, "modern victim movements." Bush's divisive tenure as the top elected official in the state of Florida must come to an end. During his nearly four years in office, GLBT Floridians and their allies have been given ample reason to support his ouster. Jeb supports Florida remaining the only state with a ban on anti-gay adoption. He opposes the Dignity for All Students Act. He allocated \$500,000 in taxpayer money to a homophobic Internet filtering company that is a subsidiary of the rabidly anti-gay American Family Association. He has repeatedly refused to meet with GLBT community leaders. He has actively opposed a state domestic partnership bill and has countered efforts to extend pension benefits. Doesn't that make you feel all warm and fuzzy? I didn't think so.

On the other hand, gubernatorial candidate Bill McBride recently named Ted Howard, formerly of Equality Florida, to coordinate community outreach for the estimated one million GLBT residents of the Sunshine State. He'll be charged with raising awareness of McBride's longstanding record on issues of major importance to gays and lesbians.

"Under my leadership as governor, all Floridians will be treated with dignity and fairness," said McBride. "That means protecting people from unfair discrimination. No one should be mistreated because of who they are."

"There are clear and major differences between Bill McBride and Jeb Bush," said Howard. "As McBride has said, it's like Bush is living in a different state than the rest of us. McBride wants us to live in a state where everyone has an equal chance."

The bottom line is that I can't tell anyone how to vote in November, but from where I sit, the choice is crystal clear. $\mathbf{\nabla}$

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A respected child mentoring program wants more gays like Steve Lorenzo to get involved. By Michael Blake

TAMPA - For more than 100 years, children from single-parent homes have had the opportunity to be matched up with an adult mentor. While the program itself has changed over the last century, the basic principle of providing adult guidance from an outside source has never changed, and the Big Brothers Big Sisters program continues to flourish to this day.

While hundreds of children enter the program each year locally, the number of volunteers doesn't keep pace. In Hillsborough/Pasco/Polk alone, more than 300 boys sit on a waiting list — some for as long as two years — hoping to be matched with an adult mentor.

The screening process to become a mentor is intense — understandable since the beneficiaries can be young and impressionable, and mentors often take children away from the home for outings and other activities. But the agency is not as restrictive as some may think. Just ask 43-year-old Steve Lorenzo, one of many openly gay Big

Brothers in the program. For the past few months, Lorenzo has been matched with nineyear-old Josh. (The agency prefers not to release the last names of Little Brothers). But Josh is hardly the first boy with whom the electrical contractor has been matched. In fact, Lorenzo has been part of the Big Brothers program off and on since he was 18 years old and living in Long Island, N.Y.

"I was recruited to be a Big Brother when I was in high school," said

ORLANDO - Quietly perched behind her desk, Lani Brito, director of operations at the Gay, Lesbian Bisexual and Transgender Community Center of Central Florida (GLBTCC or simply "The Center"), types away at her computer. Once I inform her that *Watermark* wishes to run a profile on her, she looks up at me with a gaze of shock and bemusement.

For a moment, she looks like a psychedelic, lesbian Buddha. "I've never been interviewed before," she says with a bashful, Cheshire Cat grin. She searches the air for some inspiration — perhaps from her favorite Me'Shell N'degeocello CD playing in the background.

Brito's work is not only widely felt, but also widely known. When rumors began circulating this earlier this summer about her leaving The Center, *Watermark* received dozens

A friend and I were recently talking about the myth of the ugly lesbian. Upon reflection, I realized there are actually a number of lesbian myths that circulate through popular culture. They are amusing at times and annoying at others. Like any myth, they are perpetuated through folklore, storytelling and, of course, everyday conservation.

1. THE MYTH OF THE UGLY LESBIAN (AN EXAMPLE):

Johnny likes Lucy. Lucy is a pretty girl and Johnny is a cute boy. Johnny asks Lucy's friend Sheila about Lucy. Sheila laughs. Johnny gets uncomfortable. Sheila's says,

"Lucy only likes women." Johnny looks confused so Sheila says; "Lucy's a lesbian." Johnny, shocked, responds, "But she's so pretty."

Now perhaps

this is more an instance of breaking the myth but it proves my point nonetheless. There are people out there who truly believe pretty women can't be lesbians unless they are in pornos — or that all lesbians are ugly dykes.

One of the most insulting assumption behind the ugly lesbian myth is that we lesbians only "sink to the level" of sleeping with other women because we are so goddamn hideous that no man will have us. My response to this is: "Have you ever slept with a woman? That's reason enough to climb the fence and set up camp in Lesbian Land."

While my friend and I were discussing this, she said in mock horror that it really is "unfair" to the heterosexual community that we keep any pretty dykes. They should be returned immediately to their rightful owners.

2. THE MYTH OF THE BLIND LESBIAN

Along with the ugly lesbian myth there is another more innocuous but still annoying myth. It says that lesbian women — being women (i.e. open, loving and sensitive) — don't really care about looks. I've even heard this myth circulated in the lesbian community.

"What?" I have to respond. Granted I have met woman that I don't find attractive at first but later change my mind about because of their personalities. But mostly the women I think are hot at first glance are hot. I like good-looking women. I hate to say it, but even while being an empathetic, caring woman, as a lesbian I am not going to sleep with someone out of goodwill.

3. THE MYTH OF THE CHAUVINISTIC LESBIAN

This is probably my least favorite of them all. It states: Because I am a lesbian I am also a pig. Here's an example of this lovely little untruth:

Sally is sitting next to her "pal" Frank. Frank sees a pretty girl wearing tight pants, sporting big tits and showing off her mid-drift. Sally glances in her direction while Frank stares, then tilts his head in that way I assume is supposed to give him a better

view of her ass. He then turns back to Sally, nudging and raising his eyebrows. Sally doesn't return the grunts and nudges. Frank gets upset. "What? You

didn't think she was hot?" he asks.

"Well I did," she says. "But not that much." Frank doesn't understand, nor will he ever. He thinks anyone that likes women must like to treat them like meat as well.

But before I go on let me say that there are chauvinistic lesbians. I have met *way* too many of them. For the most part, though, the dykes I know like women. They like looking at them, and fantasizing about them. But, because they are women themselves, won't disrespect them with stares or catcalls.

Although amusing at times, there are several problems with all these myths besides the fact that they are untrue. One major issue is that they insist that lesbianism is something that should be understood through the looking glass of heterosexuality. They think we can't get men so we reject heterosexuality. Or that we just haven't had a real man so we don't know what were missing. Or we must have no sex drive so we don't really care what our sexual partners look like. Or that we think like men so we will degrade and objectify other women.

It's all related to men, to male-female bonding, to bullshit. And so it makes me proud each time the myths are debunked. As lesbians we are pretty and pretty fucking scary at the same time. That's what the heterosexual world needs to learn — that's what they need to know. \mathbf{N}

PAST OUT WHO WAS ROBERT MAPPLETHORPE?

Gay and Lesbian History by Paula Martinac

A finger inserted into a penis. A man urinating into another man's mouth. A bullwhip protruding from a man's anus. For some people, these images are erotic. For others, they're repulsive. But are they art?

Toward the end of the 20th century, Americans actually debated that question because of the audacious genius and remarkable skill of one of the most talented queer photographers in history — Robert Mapplethorpe. The controversies surrounding Mapplethorpe's more boundary-pushing

works have played a key role in the debate over the boundaries of public art. Born in 1946 in Long Island,

Mapplethorpe was raised Catholic in a large family. He studied art in college, primarily painting and sculpture, though he soon began to include photographic images from magazines (including some pornography) in his works. At the start of the 1970s, he began taking the photos himself and, eventually, chose photography as his main medium.

At first he mostly took photos of himself and his friends, especially singer Patti Smith, with whom the bisexual Mapplethorpe also had a sexual relationship. He became friends with queer pop art phenomenon Andy Warhol, who introduced him to Manhattan's gay underground and urged him to further his career by finding a mentor from the city's elite.

Taking Warhol's advice, in 1972 Mapplethorpe found a patron — and lover — in wealthy art collector Sam Wagstaff, who underwrote much of his early career.

As word of Mapplethorpe's talent grew, prominent people began paying him thousands of dollars per sitting to photograph them.

Throughout the 1970s, he photographed socialites and artists, porn stars and gay activists. Other favorite subjects included children, flowers, and penises. By the end of the decade his interests were becoming more sharply focused on subjects that aroused both his aesthetic and sexual predilections — such as nude black men, bondage, or both. While these portraits were sometimes scandalous in their content, they were always technically proficient. The gay content of Mapplethorpe's art was overtly political. By shocking the public, he said, he could sensitize them to gay issues. At the same time, his Catholic upbringing found its way into his art. He described his nudes as having the orderliness of a church, while his still-life photographs (especially of calla lilies and other flowers) were starkly sexual in their curves and forms.

In 1986 Mapplethorpe was diagnosed with AIDS, and his final works recorded the ravages of the disease. One famous selfportrait showed him holding a cane topped by a miniature skull that resembled his own gaunt visage. In March 1989, the photographer died at age 43.

But the debate over his art had just begun. Soon after Mapplethorpe's death, a major Washington, D.C. exhibit of his works was canceled under pressure from conservative members of Congress, and one consequence of the ensuing debate was a cut in the budget for the National Endowment for the Arts and rules restricting future funding of explicit art.

The next year, the director of a Cincinnati museum set to display a Mapplethorpe exhibit was tried for pandering obscenity. Though he was acquitted, the brouhaha showed (as a sign at a pro-Mapplethorpe rally put it) that these controversies did what AIDS drugs never could — they "kept Mapplethorpe alive." ₩

of concerned letters and notes from shocked and upset readers.

Almost seven years ago, Brito began as a volunteer at the then titled Gay and Lesbian Community Services (GLCS) of Central Florida. After moving to Orlando, from her Hawaii, she became familiar to Orlando's art scene as well as to the GLBT community.

"I attended my first Womyn of GLCS meeting, which I later became the facilitator of," Brito says. "Although I had volunteered at The Center, working for a non-profit was a different animal altogether. The executive director resigned and I was suddenly in charge. Ack!

Brito said that her indoctrination into the world of non-profit work was hectic and harried at first — and it continues to be a learning experience.

"I had to rely on the volunteers, board members, and past staff to educate me," she says. "I did as much research as I could regarding the operations of The Center, and I'm learning more and more each day."

Brito takes great joy from being able to work at a job where she can create a foundation for change. She did, after all, leave a corporate job as a computer engineer to accept a position in this field

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where she's paid one-fourth what she used to earn. At one point, she had to go as far as to leave behind her paid scholarship at Crealde School of Art in Winter Park.

"It really hurt to give it up," she says. However, she feels that it may be justified. "I'm feeling very subtle changes occurring here at The Center... good changes."

Brito's personality is as vibrant as her appearance; her Hawaiian-Chinese-Filipino heritage is juxtaposed with a mixed assortment of body piercings and tattoos. She is also notorious for subjecting her hair to

more colors and styles than Tina Turner. "I'm addicted to the Manic Panic temporary hair

colors," she admits. To some, Brito's

physical appearance is somewhat startling. It was only a week after she had become the new director of operations that one member of the community wrote The Center a scathing e-mail. This person's sole concern was the kind of "image" The Center was projecting "with this tattooed, pierced, militant lesbian at the helm."

The next day, she came to work dressed how she pleased.

"I still can't get over the fact that people still make judgments of others based upon their appearance. This isn't a fashion and design firm," she muses. "I mean, I *could* don my Donna Karen suit, but why? Aren't we supposed to be teaching people to accept us for what we are?"

Many people are puzzled by where the winds of activism that fill her sails came from. Brito credits family.

"I'd have to credit my [community] involvement to my dad," she says. "He instilled in all seven of his children the importance of helping others. I always had my hand in something growing up. I remember first helping out at the local animal shelter as a teen, then things went crazy from there. I volunteered at homeless shelters, youth shelters, food pantries, churches...everywhere I thought I could help."

She pauses for a moment. Then she adds, "I sometimes think that my dad regretted teaching me the joys of community service because it sometimes took me away from my family. It gave me a good excuse to miss my piano and hula lessons," she says, laughing.

Sometimes the idea of people abstaining from community involvement puzzles her.

"Why wouldn't someone who is LGB or T want to work with the community?"

she ponders. "As a lesbian, I am always thinking about the overall health of the community that I am a part of. It only makes sense to me

that people in general would want to be an active part of creating the environment they want to live in."

Brito counts among her many blessings her boyfriend of two years: Jesse, her "favorite transgendered body-pillow."

"Jesse is so very supportive of my work here at The Center. Although I have to admit that he's expressed that I should 'marry The Center.' Jesse has spent many volunteer hours here and has helped me organize special events. He will even stay up late at night and help me fold and stamp hundreds of mailings every month. Jesse will help me with just about anything regarding The Center... but he draws the line at attending board meetings."

Despite the rumors, drama, and interpersonal issues associated with working within our community, Brito says she still feels good about being where she is now.

The phone on her desk begins to flutter with lights and a shrill ring. "Thank you for calling The Center. This is Lani..."

She's not going anywhere, anytime soon. $\mathbf{\nabla}$

She doesn't drink every day, or even every other day, but when she does drink she doesn't know when to stop. She drinks her beer until she can not stand and then usually ends up puking until she passes out.

I have tried to talk to her about this before but she will not listen to me or her other friends who are also concerned. She claims that she is not an alcoholic and that she is just having fun.

I know that both her father and her grandmother were heavy drinkers and I have heard that this kind of thing can be passed down in families. I really love her and I feel that we have a good thing going with each other — except for the drinking. Am I expecting too much or is there something that I can do to help her get on the right — and sober — track?

Dear Tapped Out,

The decision to move in with a romantic partner is a very significant life choice. It is wise to thoroughly evaluate all strengths and weaknesses regarding living together prior to making this decision.

An individual who repeatedly consumes alcohol to the point of falling down drunk and puking has a problem. Your girlfriend's pattern of alcohol abuse indicates that she is well on her way to developing a serious drinking problem. The fact that alcoholism runs in her family suggests that she is predisposed to developing the disease of alcoholism/ addiction.

And she is not listening to her friends that have voiced concern to her regarding her drinking and the physical consequences that she experiences. People can die from alcohol poisoning and the disease itself is progressive and life threatening. It would be foolish of you to move in together. For you to move in together and pretend that all is well would only enable her to continue her pattern of abusing alcohol. Your girlfriend is in need of counseling and your responsibility is to

direct her that way. If she denies and minimizes her problem and resists counseling you may want to gather all of her close friends together and plan on confronting her as a group. This intervention can sometime be effective. The bottom line is that until she truly and completely recognizes that she has a problem her prognosis for stopping the alcohol abuse is poor. **N**

GAY PRIESTS WRONGLY ATTACKED BY CHURCH HIERARCHY

AMHERST, Mass. - Catholic Church officials are wrongly accusing gay priests of child sexual abuse according to a new report released by the Institute for Gay and Lesbian Strategic Studies (IGLSS). The report outlines decades of research demonstrating that gay men are no more likely than heterosexual men to force sexual activity with children.

As the sexual abuse of children has been revealed in parishes across the country, Catholic Church officials and some news reports have described the perpetrators of the abuse as gay. In the IGLSS report, "Understanding Child Sexual Abuse and the Catholic Church: Gay Priests Are Not the Problem," the link made between pedophile priests and gay priests is debunked.

"Blaming gay priests for the sexual abuse of children by pedophile priests in the Catholic Church is unfounded," said Michael Stevenson, the author of the IGLSS report and a professor of psychology at Ball State University. "The accusation that pedophile priests are gay has no foundation in sound psychological research and amounts to the deliberate scapegoating of gays by Church officials."

Stevenson also points out that, 'Contrary to assumptions made at the papal summit, engaging in same-sex behavior with children is not synonymous with being gay. Misunderstanding the priests' abusive behavior will hinder efforts to prevent further crimes."

Lorenzo, who lives in Tampa. "They had so many kids, and they ended up matching me with a boy who was nine."

Lorenzo remained the boy's Big Brother for years - he's now grown up, married and thriving in Philadelphia. Lorenzo was inactive in Big Brothers for several years, but after he moved to Tampa he felt it was time to get back into the program. Of course, things were a little different. He was now openly gay, and he grew concerned when he discovered that there was a lot more

to the screening process than before.

None of those factors, however, hampered his becoming a mentor yet again. And he is

glad to be a part of a program that proves gay men and women really can be a positive influence on the lives of children.

"I've never had any problems with parents because I'm gay," Lorenzo said. "There are some people out there who think gay people in general are child molesters, but in actuality, it's generally heterosexual men who are the molesters. A lot of that stuff that people say is a scare tactic."

After a potential mentor submits an

application which can be done online or in the Big **Brothers Big Sisters** office - their background is checked while they go through an interview process. Tampa Bay applicants are usually asked directly whether they are gay, bisexual or straight. At first, this might seem like a question that could lead to automatic disqualification, but that is not the case. "We do not

discriminate on the basis of gender, race, religion, handicaps, and even sexual orientation," said

Lorie Briggs, spokesperson for the Hillsborough/Pasco/Polk chapter of Big Brothers Big Sisters. "In fact, we welcome gay men and lesbian women, and hope that they will be willing to become a part of a child's life."

So why ask? Briggs said it's because some parents state a preference that their child not be matched with a homosexual or bisexual mentor. Those preferences are respected, and only those parents who are open to having a mentor of any sexual orientation are matched with gay or bisexual mentors. Briggs said the vast majority of parents who bring their children into the program have no problem with the sexual orientation of their mentor.

Because they deal with children, it is perhaps surprising that Big Brothers and Big Sisters of America (BBBSA) has always been ahead of the curve when it comes to involving gays and lesbians. The organization adopted

nondiscrimination principles 25 years ago

that embrace sexual orientation. And last February, the BBBSA board made the policy mandatory among all 490 local chapters, meaning

that gay and lesbian volunteers can no longer be rejected as mentors. The policy became effective July 1.

Not surprisingly, right wing zealots denounced the move. Focus on Family's Bill Maier said that, "matching fatherless boys, starving for attention, with homosexual men is reckless and irresponsible, not to mention a recipe for disaster."

So far, however, there has been no indication that corporate backers are

shying away from BBBSA. "An

organization that's doing great work helping disadvantaged children should be applauded for standing up for the principles of nondiscrimination, and we think that's what most will do," noted David Smith of the Human Rights Campaign.

Tampa Bay's Big Brothers Big Sisters chapter actively recruits from the LGBT community - they had a booth at last summer's PrideFest — but there is still hesitation by

lesbians and gay men to join the program.

"All of my friends know that I'm a Big Brother, but they don't seem to talk to me about how they might want to volunteer," Lorenzo said. "I think there might be some insecurities about it still, and maybe some of them are just finally being confronted with the possibility that they can be a part of a child's life. Most gay men and women never think about

sharing their lives with children." Big Brothers Big Sisters offers a variety of mentoring programs in which volunteers can participate. The most common is community-based mentoring, where a volunteer spends about three hours a week, three times a month with their "Little" by taking him or her to the movies, to the park, somewhere to wash the car, and a variety of other activities which mentor training helps to foster.

Big Brothers aren't expected to spend a lot of money. In fact, Briggs said that "Bigs" are encouraged to spend as little as possible. Often, parents give their children money to pay for expenses during excursions. The program also offers a site-based mentoring program, where a volunteer spends one hour a week visiting the child's school to help with homework or just to talk. And there are specialized programs as well. Project Care deals with children affected by or infected with HIV; Project Dove is for children who have witnessed domestic violence; and Life Choices is a program for teens who are pregnant or at risk of getting pregnant.

Men always are matched with boys, and women are mostly matched with girls (although they can, on occasion, be matched with boys). "Littles" range from early elementary school age through high school, and volunteers usually get a choice

of age range with which they feel most comfortable. Matches are also based on compatible interests, preferences of the volunteer, and other factors. Briggs said the matching system is far more involved than "first-come, first-served."

Lorenzo notes that Josh's mother has been very accepting. He believes that good communication with the parent is one of the keys to a successful match.

"She's real cool, and I think she trusts me a lot," he said. "She's just a pretty open-minded person." \mathbf{N}

Shockey, who played on Miami's championship team last year, was asked by Stern if he believed there might be

some gay players in the NFL. "I don't know," Shockey replied. "I don't like to think about that. I hope not."

Stern went on to question Shockey if he thought there were any gay players on his college team.

"No," Shockey said. "I mean, if I knew there was a gay guy on my college football team, I probably wouldn't, you know, stand for it. You know, I think, you know, they're going to be in the shower with us and stuff, so I don't think that's going to work."

Since the incident, Pat Hanlon, vice president of communications for the Giants, said, "Those views don't represent the views of our organization."

Shockey did apologize for his comments on Sept. 26. "It's a show just for comedy,"

Shockey told the New York Daily News.

"I guess I do regret saying it. I didn't think anyone was going to make a big deal out of it. I'm not prejudiced against anybody's beliefs or what they do in their off time. I do regret saying something like that. Whatever I did to offend people, I apologize. I'm not prejudiced in any way."

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ORLANDO - In many ways, Bear Bust one of the largest annual Bear events in the country — has plotted the same trajectory as the whole Bear explosion among gay men. Founded ten years ago as a small but spirited party for locals and near-locals at the Full Moon Saloon, Bear Bust has grown in size and visibility ever since. But many believe the Bear phenomenon has peaked, and this year's event — from Oct. 17-21 — may represent the end of one era and the beginning of another.

There will be no shortage of big, furry guys at Bear Bust 2002 mind you. More than 500 from around the country and globe have registered for the "run," which gives them full access to five days worth of events. And as many as 2000 more will venture to the Full Moon Saloon and surrounding environs to enjoy the crowds and casually sexy atmosphere.

But organizers believe this year's attendance will likely top off at the same level as 2001 — a decline from previous years that was attributed to 9/11.

"I can only blame it on the economy and the fact that people seem to have lower travel budgets," said Steve Facella of the sponsoring Bears of Central Florida. Facella notes, however, that Bear Bust

Singer Alison Moyet gets better with age, but the English chanteuse says she's not exactly mellowing.

Interview by Gregg Shapiro

Alison Moyet possesses one of the most easily recognizable and powerful voices in the music industry. Embraced by the gay club community since the early eighties when, as a member of the electronic duo Yaz (with Vince Clarke, who later went on to co-found Erasure), her powerhouse performances on dance club standards such as "Situation" and "Don't Go" made her something of a sensation in both the disco and new wave scenes.

As a solo artist, Moyet continued to earn our respect and devotion with the songs "Invisible," "Love Resurrection," "Is This Love?" and "Whispering Your Name," to mention a few. On Moyet's splendid new album *Hometime* — her first studio release in eight years — her voice has lost none of its ability to inspire an emotional response. Moyet has definitely come home again. WATERMARK: There were eight years between the release of *Essex* and *Hometime*. Can you give me a capsule idea of what was going on in those years? ALISON MOYET: Basically, I reached a bit of an impasse with the record company (Sony Music), who wanted me to follow more of a commercial line of recording than I wanted to take. They didn't want to release me from my contract. I think they were hoping that I'd come to my senses and that never happened. After ten years, finally, they let me go.

I also understand that during that period of time you did some musical theater. You were in the musical *Chicago*. Yes, I was in *Chicago* in the West End and it was one of the most fantastic things I've ever done. I had a brilliant, brilliant time, just laughed everyday.

What part did you play? I played Mama Morton. You couldn't imagine me as Roxy with my thighs!

Several different musical influences can be heard on *Hometime*. For example, "Yesterday's Flame" has a

Latin beat. Were you listening to a lot of that type of music prior to writing that song?

No, I listen to very little music actually. I always find that my relationship with music has been more about doing it than listening to it. I didn't want to be influenced by anything other than just let it be quite an organic process.

"If You Don't Come Back To Me" and "Ski" both have a jazz flavor to them. Would you agree?

Yeah. You can sense a bit of that, a bit of jazz, a bit of blues, a bit of chanson. It's a mixture of things. I'm 41 now and I've been exposed to lots of different things. I can't tell you albums or album tracks or who the right artist is to listen to. None of that interests me, but everything that surrounds you everyday is what influences you.

"You Don't Have To Go" is the kind of emotional, belter's ballad that you do so well. Do you have a preference for ballads?

No, I really do like to mix it. My first bands I ever played in were punk bands. So, the first things I ever did were four on the floor thrash. My tastes are quite eclectic. Even if you go back to Yaz, you'll find that the songs were quite disparate and it was Vince's sound and my voice that tied them in to sounding like a common thread. So, no I don't have anything that I prefer.

Because of your previous success with dance music, are there plans for dance remixes of any of the tracks on *Hometime*?

I think they were talking about having someone remix a track on *Hometime*. They're talking about a guy called Mike Cruz. I was just trying to get to hear about some of his stuff. I'm completely out of touch with the dance movement. To be honest with you, I've never in touch with it. I never went clubbing — ever.

Hometime is on Sanctuary Records, which is home to Pet Shop Boys and James. How do you like your new label? So far, it's just been incredible. When my relationship broke up with Sony and I had this album and it wasn't an album that interested them, because I didn't feel they'd be able to sell it. I went to Sanctuary and I was completely blown away by the way they reacted just organically to the music. I'm really happy that it's come to them, because they care about the record. We're getting the most incredible reviews.

That's great. Congratulations.

Thank you. It's not that I'm feeling smug or anything like that. I'm just so happy. I feel so moved that the journalists out there, who it would've been very easy to say, "Alison Moyet, she's part of the 80s, it's not relevant now we're not going to give it the air space." I knew that if people listened to it, they'd see that there was depth to it.

It's wonderful to be appreciated.

Yeah! That's what we determined too. If it goes nowhere more than this, I don't care. I feel like I stood by my guns when I knew that I was giving up a commercial career to try and make this record that I would feel good about for my whole life.

Are there plans for a U.S. tour in support of the album?

I'm just starting a tour in October in England, just a little one. It's all about how it's received. If the album's received well, then the promoters have confidence and they book you. I would come to America tomorrow because I have some brilliant fans and I've had some great gigs out there, really good times. I'd love to come back there again, but it's very much whether people are interested in having me.

Are you aware of a queer fan-base? Oh yeah, and thank God for them!

Speaking of fans, I noticed that there were a number of fan sites on the Web. How does it feel to have inspired such devotion?

It's incredibly humbling, actually. Bare in mind, all I've ever done is sing. From the age of 15, I've never had a proper job. It's all I've ever done. [And] it's only in the last

couple of years that I've had a computer. To do little searches and suddenly find out that there are these communities of people talking about your work and supporting you was the most fantastic boost to my selfesteem. It was brilliant.

everything from shirts, sweatshirts, and underwear to ball caps, boxers and sunglasses and a whole lot more.

"I figured that [the gay and lesbian community was] coming out in so many ways, why not in the clothing industry? Why not have our own design?" says Brendell. "And if Butchwear crosses over then that is a beautiful thing. It's time for us all to embrace each other anyway and this is a great way to do that."

Last year Butchwear was among the more than 200 vendors to take part in the Gay Days at Disney vendor fair — and it turned out to be a smart move for Brendell and company. Sally Kidd from News Channel 2 was there with a camera crew to do a story on the event and was fascinated with the Butchwear products.

"I told her this was the next big thing so she did an interview. We ended up with coverage all weekend long on the local news," Brendell recalls. "Sally loved it! She wore one of our visors while she walked around the event. Everyone thought that what we had was nice and at the same time really different."

Different indeed, especially since Brendell decided to target both women and men when it came to marketing her products. "I love the men as much as the women," Brendell says with a laugh. "We are all family and what makes Butchwear so awesome is that it's not about gender. Butch is sexy, it's beautiful, and it is used on both sides of the spectrum anyway."

It was only a matter of time before the word spread and people everywhere wanted to get their hands on some Butchwear of their own: men and women, young and old, gay and straight, and, of course,

NEW YORK - "I'm such a bundle of ambivalence," says Isaac Mizrahi, looking perplexed. "That's my problem. Or," he adds helplessly, "my virtue." Either way, at age 41, he's still deciding what to do when he grows up. Already, he's been a fashion designer with his own celebrated line. He was the subject of the 1995 documentary *Unzipped*. He starred in a one-man off-Broadway show called *LES MIZrahi*. He even served as a residential makeover artist, helping retrofit a prewar Manhattan apartment house with luxury pieds-a-terres.

Then, last year, the openly-gay Mizrahi decided to freshen up the TV talk show scene.

Last month, *The Isaac Mizrahi Show* began its second season on cable's Oxygen network, and by now the method to Mizrahi's many-splendored madness comes clear: He does what he likes.

Originating both from within and beyond his gallery-like studio ("a big white box," he explains, "like a blank page"), the show often finds the host sharing a fun activity with his celebrity guest while they chat.

On future segments, he grooms his dog Harry with Natalie Portman, designs a cocktail dress for Selma Blair, works out with John Leguizamo, goes thriftshopping with Kristin Davis and bowls with Juliette Lewis.

Think of each encounter as a talkshow play date, not only amusing to watch, but also putting the guest at ease. Which facilitates disclosure.

Any subject, large or small, is fair game. "Someone talking about their favorite kind of pasta can be just as fascinating to listen to as them talking about global warming or any other monumental topic," Mizrahi says.

Another episode featured comedian Janeane Garofalo with her two large Labradors. Kid and Dewey frolic with Harry while their owners discussed smoking, standup comedy, sex (she swears she never slept with off-and-on friend and collaborator Ben Stiller) and the desperate self-image of so many young women.

"I want to know who everybody wants to like them," Mizrahi says.

But along the way, one of Garofalo's dogs interrupted things by urinating on her leg. This is not only a funny moment, but also, by provoking her into an unrehearsed response, as revealing as a talk show is ever likely to get.

"That's theater, people! Go with it!" laughed Garofalo, startled yet a good sport. Conversation resumed as she dutifully scrubbed Formula 409 into the stain.

"My favorite segments are when something like that happens," Mizrahi said later to a reporter. "Even when it's a foolish little thing — that's what really happened on that stage at that time with that person."

No wonder he embraces the unexpected. He embodies it. Although a darling of Manhattan's arty in-crowd, Mizrahi, whose surname in Hebrew means "man from the East," was raised just east of Manhattan in Brooklyn, in a close-knit community of Syrian Sephardic Jews.

His father, a children's-wear manufacturer with whom he had a "distant and complicated" relationship, nonetheless advised 12-year-old Isaac on buying his first sewing machine — and even threw in the extra \$40 it cost.

Mizrahi went on to study dance, music and drama at Manhattan's High School of Performing Arts. After graduation, he enrolled at the Parsons School of Design.

Although he created the dazzling 1930s costumes for last season's Broadway revival of *The Women*, he has been out of the rag trade since folding his couture line four years ago.

"I don't like fashion," he declares. "I like clothes."

Besides, he likes making things other than things you can wear: His TV show, for instance, which he approaches as a line of 30-minute video creations.

He's doing the show he set out to do, he says, and having a ball. But he does acknowledge one concern: that, with its all-white studio and voguish guests, *The Isaac Mizrahi Show* might at first glance strike a viewer as all too cool.

"Uh-uh!" he insists, drawing a sharp distinction between cool-as-pretentious and cool-as-smart. "Besides, I think there's always something about my show that brings it right back down to an *un*cool level."

Namely him. In many ways he is still that kid from Brooklyn: curious, creative, playful.

"I like really simple, basic things," Mizrahi says. "I'm really an earnest guy. I can't lie. I don't drink. Ice cream is my favorite thing in the world. I feel like that's what my show is about."

Maybe not such a bundle of ambivalence after all. $\mathbf{\nabla}$

substantial. When that many Bears come out of hibernation for five days, it gets noticed.

Bear Bust and the Bears of Central Florida remain closely associated with the Full Moon Saloon — "The Moon" to its hundreds of regular and devoted patrons. Owner Bob Graves is a member of BOCF,

and he mans his bar with employees and volunteers to ensure that Bear Bust runs smoothly each year. The result: wall to wall bears throughout the long weekend.

Facella notes that Graves and his staff are an

enormous help in coordinating the event.

"Bob and the guys at the Moon really help a lot," Facella said. "Bob charges us no fee to have the event in his bar and he handles lots of the arrangements himself. It really is a great relationship we have." With each passing year, the theme for Bear Bust has taken on more prominence. This year, according to Facella, everything from the decorations to the

parties will center around one concept: Halloween.

'We have a wide variety of Halloweenbased things," he said. "From a hauntedhouse style 'Walk Through to Hell,' to decorations that will be both funny and sinister, to the optional evening event at Islands of Adventure's Halloween Horror Nights. It should be a lot of fun.'

But the Bears of Central Florida also

know a good thing when they see it, and many aspects of Bear Bust remain constant. San Francisco comedian Danny Williams will once again serve as emcee for the requisite Bear

contests. The host hotel will remain the faded Ambassador Hotel just a city block from the Moon near the corner of Orange Blossom Tr. and Colonial Dr. And of course the main attraction will remain the Moon and its mountain lodge trappings, bursting with hirsute men of all shapes and sizes.

While Bear Bust remains popular, Facella expressed uncertainty about the

"Well, the economy obviously plays a large part in these things, but it remains to be seen whether Bear Bust and other Bear events will return to the same numbers as before," he said. "I would hate to say that Bear events have run their course."

One recent and significant change is the loss a key communitybuilding player — *Bear Magazine*. The publication, an unexpected phenomenon when it first came out more than 10 years ago, ceased operations a year ago.

"Bear was the best way that I knew of to share information about events like ours nationally and internationally," Facella noted. "The way a lot of the Bear community communicated with each other is gone now."

Former Bear publisher

Scott McGillivray now oversees a magazine called *100% Beef*, but that title has yet to provide the same opportunity for building a conduit for communication in the way *Bear* did.

With or without attendant media, Bear Bust continues to be one of the top tickets on the Bear run scene, along with Chicago's Bear Pride and San Francisco's Bear Rendezvous. And Facella notes that BOCF and the Moon are already planning improvements for next year.

Bowing to pressure from some attendees, Facella says they have begun scouting new hotels to replace the Ambassador Hotel, a former Howard Johnsons that has seen better days.

"We really want people to continue to have a reason to come to Bear Bust," Facella said. "We feel like it's a wonderful time, and we want to make sure the most people possible can join us." \mathbf{N}

BEAR BUST GLOSSARY OF TERMS
