School Nears Close

The following statement concerning the close of the year's work has been issued by Mr. Thompson:

1. Time
 2. Final Examinations
- Final examinations in all academic work will commence not earlier than Monday of the last week and end on the Wednesday following. The second semester work closes at the end of the 3rd period on Thursday of the 36th or last week of the year. Pupils are to be dismissed at that time. They are to return on day following (Friday) at 1 p.m. for their Report Cards, and held in their home rooms only long enough for these to be issued.

3. Exemptions
- If a teacher so chooses, he may exempt any pupil from a semester examination in his subject provided the following conditions are satisfied:

1. A grade of B plus or A for each six weeks work.
 2. Not more than three days absent per semester for any reason except sickness.
 3. Not tardy more five times in all classes.
 4. Citizen record of a high order.
 4. Grades
- Semester grades will be based on the average of the six week grades and the final examination grade.
