Last week I took a day off. I phoned my best friend Alicia, told her I had the day free, and ended up lounging with her in her swimming pool. It was perfect.

Later on, over a vicious game of Yatzee, she broke some news to me.

"I'm going to get married," she said while going for her small straight. "I'm going to marry Luke so he can stay in the country."

Luke is the boyfriend of a mutual friend of ours. Luke is a hard working, intelligent gay guy from the Czech Republic in the States on a student visa that's expiring far too quickly. I know that he and his boyfriend are deeply in love. It would devastate them both if Luke were deported.

But Alicia seemed reluctant to tell me the news. You see I sometimes get defensive over issues that affect the gay and lesbian community and I always preach about how we must fight for our rights on our terms. In this case, though, my response I think surprised her.

"Oh," I said gathering up the dice. "That's cool."

She didn't say anything — but the look she gave me sure did. It said, "What? No lecture? No high-and-mighty opinion? No nothing?"

"Screw the system," I went on to explain. "We didn't make these stupid rules, but it's our prerogative if we want to exploit them."

Lately I've been all about challenging the status quo. I think it stems from how often I hear the term "special rights" tossed around. Isn't "marriage" a special right offered to the heterosexual community? Don't employers that refuse to offer domestic partnership benefits ultimately give their married workers an added bonus for doing the same job as people who are partnered? These examples sound pretty "special" to me — and I think they should be contested. If we don't have rights or benefits no one should.

This got me thinking about the constitutionality of all these imposed rules. So I consulted the most respected source of information I could find: the *School House Rock* DVD.

In the "Fireworks" cartoon they sing, "The Continental Congress said that we were free. They said we had the right of life and liberty... and the pursuit of happiness." That sounds pretty non-discriminatory to me. Nowhere does it say that *some* deserve the right of life and

liberty more than others. And in "Preamble" they sing, "In 1787, I'm told, our founding fathers did agree to write a list of principles for keepin' people free."

Well, I'm sad to say our founding fathers' plan has become bastardized by fear-based religious beliefs. I just wish more people would consult the Constitution before the Bible. But to date I don't believe that either document defines marriage as a union between one man and one woman. I think the writers had more important things to think about.

Anyway, I hope Alicia and Luke will be very happy together. But if you want to help in the battle for immigration rights for gays and lesbians, call or write your elected officials and ask if they support Jerry Nadler's Permanent Partners Immigration Act. 

VOTERS KEEP MIAMI-DADE **GAY RIGHTS LAW**

MIAMI - Miami-Dade's gay and lesbian community celebrated a landmark in the struggle for equality on Sept. 10: the defeat of a ballot question that had attempted to repeal a four year-old provision of the Miami-Dade County Human Rights Ordinance prohibiting discrimination against

gays and lesbians in housing, credit, employment, and other commerce.

The county's political and business leaders had pushed to keep the ordinance, fearing a boycott from gay and liberal groups and the rejection of the region's bid to hold the 2004 Democratic National Convention.

In Tuesday's primary, 53 percent were against repealing the law while 47 percent were in favor.

Miami-Dade County Mayor Alex Penelas, an outspoken supporter of the law, said the repeal's defeat reinforced Miami's image as a progressive, world-class city.

"All ethnic groups were on the same page today on this issue," Penelas said. "There's no room for discrimination of

A similar ordinance was repealed in 1977 after a successful campaign led by Anita Bryant. Gay rights were restored in 1998 after a new ordinance was passed.

Lorri Jean, executive director of the NGLTF, said voters' endorsement of the ordinance confirms the country's growing acceptance of gays and lesbians.

'The victory is sweet," she said. "Miami-Dade has come a long way."

The victory occurred despite widespread voting irregularities and reports of illegalities that effectively disenfranchised swaths of Miami Beach and other GLBT voting strongholds in Miami-Dade County. The National Gay & Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) called on Fla. Gov. Jeb Bush and the U.S. Department of Justice to investigate the failures of the Florida election system.

Georg Ketelhohn, co-chair of No to Discrimination/Save Dade, added, "It's a shame that so many of the votes of our supporters were not counted. Had the election gone properly, our margin of victory would have been even greater."

'We have made history with this campaign," Jean added. "The people of Miami-Dade County have sent the Christian Coalition and its small band of gay-obsessed zealots packing! The Christian Coalition's campaign of outright lies and scare tactics didn't work."

GAY CANDIDATES EXCELLED - IN PRIMARIES

Openly gay and lesbian candidates competing in the Sept. 10 and Sept. 17 primaries claimed many victories. Those advancing from the primaries will join at least 20 other gay office seekers on the Nov. 5 general election ballot.

SEPT.10 & SEPT. 17 PRIMARY RESULTS

JACK JACKSON JR. (D) for State House (Dist. 2, Flagstaff): With 24 percent of the vote, Jackson has claimed one of the two nominations possible. He is expected to win in November, becoming the first openly gay American Indian to win elective office. STEVE MAY (R) for re-election to State House (Dist. 11, Paradise Valley): May, appeared poised to claim one of the two nominations possible, just 13 votes ahead. But final primary election results showed May losing by 58 votes.

PETER MORAGA (D) for State House (Dist. 14, Phoenix): With 24 percent of the vote, Moraga has placed third. He needed to place in one of the top two spots to claim his party's nomination.

WALLY STRAUGHN (D) for State House (Dist. 15, Phoenix): With 40 percent of the vote, Straughn is one of the top two finishers and has secured his party's nomination. THOM VON HAPSBURG (R)

for State House (Dist. 7, Phoenix): With 18 percent of the vote, Von Hapsburg has finished third but needed to place in the top two for the nomination.

DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

DAVID CATANIA (R) for reelection to the City Council (At-large): Scoring 93 percent

of the vote, Catania is running strong toward November.

JIM GRAHAM (D) for re-election to the City Council (Ward 1): With 74 percent of precincts reporting and 65 percent of the vote, Graham has prevailed in a five-way primary and is expected to win in November.

FLORIDA

XAVIER CORTADA, nonpartisan candidate for Circuit Court (11th Circuit, Dade Co.): With 19 percent of the vote, Cortada placed third in a four-way race.

MARYLAND

RICH MADALENO (D) for State House (Dist. 18, Kensington): Competing for one of the three nominations possible, Madaleno won with 17 percent of the vote and is set to become the first openly gay man in the Maryland legislature in November.

MAGGIE MCINTOSH (D) for re-election to the State House (Dist. 43, Baltimore): With 26 percent of the vote, McIntosh was the top vote-getter and will claim one of the district's three seats in November.

MASSACHUSETTS

JARRETT BARRIOS (D) for State Senate

(Middlesex-Suffolk-Essex Dist.): With 48 percent of the vote, Barrios has won the Democratic nod, prevailing in a 3 way race. LIZ MALIA (D) for re-election to State House (11th Suffolk Dist.): With 60 percent of the vote, incumbent Liz Malia fended off two challengers and has secured her party's nomination for the November general. RICK MUSIOL (D) for State House (2nd Plymouth Dist.): This race is too close to call and will likely be decided in a recount. Musiol has scored 2,128 votes, just three votes behind his opponent.

MINNESOTA

SCOTT DIBBLE (DFL) for State Senate (Dist. 60, Minneapolis): With 85 percent of the vote, Dibble has won the Democratic-Farmer-Labor nomination and is strongly favored to win in November. If elected, he will be the state's second openly gay

senator.



Arizona State House incumbent STEVE MAY lost his reelection bid

NEW YORK DANNY O'DONNELL (D) for State Assembly (Dist. 69, New York City): With 34 percent of the vote, O'Donnell has taken home the Democratic nomination and is expected to claim victory in November. Danny O'Donnell is Rosie

RHODE ISLAND DAVID CICILLINE (D) for Mayor of Providence (citywide): With 53 percent of

O'Donnell's brother.

the vote, Cicilline has won his four-way Democratic primary race. Because Providence is heavily Democratic, it is expected to become the largest city in America with an openly gay mayor this November, replacing Tempe, Arizona.

VERMONT

ED FLANAGAN (D) for State Treasurer (statewide): With 32 percent of the vote, Ed Flanagan has succumbed to Jeb Spaulding for the Democratic nomination.

WASHINGTON STATE

JIM MOELLER (D) for State House (Dist. 49, Vancouver): With 33 percent of the vote, Moeller secured his party's nomination in the "blanket" primary. (A blanket primary is one in which the voter may cast his or her ballot for a candidate of any party.)

WISCONSIN

TIM CARPENTER (D) for State Senate (Dist. 3, Milwaukee): With 53 percent of the vote, Carpenter has secured the Democratic nod and is favored to win in November. If elected, he will be the state's first openly gay senator.

LESBIAN OFFICER ORDERED NOT TO WEAR UNIFORM

SARASOTA - In honor of the anniversary of 9/11, the Southwest Florida Business Guild honored four openly gay law enforcement

officers at their Sep. 16 meeting — but one was conspicuously out of uniform. Following orders by Sarasota County Sheriff Bill Balkwill, Corrections Officer Cheryl Yuzik accepted her Certificate of Appreciation in street clothes.

Balkwill's decision was booed by more than 65 who attended the SWFBG meeting — the first after a summer hiatus for the group. It was also roundly criticized in highprofile columns in the Sarasota Herald Tribune.

Columnist Tom Lyons castigated Balkwill for his "small minded" directive.

"The normally low-key, bland Sarasota County Sheriff, Bill Balkwill, looks cloddish and mean just now," Lyons wrote on Sep. 19.

The newspaper's editorial board was equally direct.

"Pride is the appropriate response for a sheriff whose valued employee is honored by the public," a Sep. 20

editorial noted.

"Balkwill's reasoning is... well, it's hard to find much reason in it."

Balkwill claimed that Yuzik's sexual orientation had nothing to do with his decision, saying that he refused to let her wear her uniform because his office had no say in which employee would be honored.

But the Sarasota, Venice and Key West police departments had no similar objections. Their honorees — Detective Chris Catanzaro, Officer

Daniel Whittaker, and Lieutenant Alan Newby — wore their uniforms proudly.

"We're putting language in our charter about celebrating diversity," Sarasota Police Deputy Chief Ed Whitehead told the *Herald Tribune*. "You've got to walk the talk."

Yuzik, 39, is limiting her comments regarding her boss's decision.

"I'm really proud to work for the Sarasota Sheriff's Office," said the threeyear veteran. "I was hurt and disappointed that I couldn't stand beside my colleagues in my uniform and represent my department."

But Florida LEGAL (Law Enforcement Gays And Lesbians) Vicepresident Carroll Hunter was less guarded.

"Cheryl has no protection from discrimination based on sexual orientation, either from a union or from the city or county," Hunter said. "Her job has not been threatened, but we're concerned. Sheriff Balkwill's decision demonstrates an insensitivity towards gays and lesbians that would not be tolerated for other minorities."

A former New York City corrections officer who now lives in Sarasota, Hunter noted that uniform privileges have been

used to oppress police officers in the past. When gay cops were not allowed to wear their uniforms in the city's Gay Pride Parade, Hunter sued in 1995 and won.

The mission statement for the Sarasota County Sheriff's

Office states, "We will provide fair and impartial treatment to all people." The members of the SWFBG likely want to know whether Balkwill includes employees — and gays and lesbians — in this lofty pronouncement.



TAMPA - St. Petersburg Times reporter Kathryn Wexler found unexpected controversy when she dropped by A Different Grind coffeehouse and brought up the subject of same-sex commitment announcements.

The New York Times recently began printing such notices, and the Orlando Sentinel and dozens of other papers followed suit. Neither the St. Petersburg Times nor the Tampa Tribune print announcements of same-sex unions.

Gus Ignas, a cashier at A Different Grind, expressed concern that the male couple featured in the first New York Times announcement looked "too gay."

"I wish they were better looking," he said. "...to put a better face on our community."

Ignas' comments elicited outrage from several patrons."Which just goes to show you, it's our own repression that's holding us back," said pharmacist Dennis DelVecchio.

NON-BIOLOGICAL MOTHER FIGHTS FOR VISITATION RIGHTS

ORLANDO - Lisa Coons-Andersen continues to work for "legal standing" for non-biological gay and lesbian parents of children in Florida

On Sept. 18, Orlando resident Coons-Andersen flew to Texas for an appeals hearing regarding her own daughter, Savannah, who she has not been allowed to see in several years. Lisa has diligently worked toward an agreement with her former partner that would allow them joint custody of Savannah.

"There must be a high level of cooperation between the two parents," Coons-Andersen said. "Our society must understand that this is a very emotional issue, with potential long term, damaging consequences to our children if handled

inappropriately."

Coons-Andersen said that she feels that the appeal went well.

"My attorney did a great job in oral arguments," she said. "Our side won on style and presentation and the judges were attentive and engaged."

She said that she still believes that her case has a chance.

"Unfortunately we will not know the ruling for months, hopefully by the holidays," she said.

Coons-Andersen said that she recommends that same-sex parents not only legally document their life as a family with things such as a will but also create records of parental involvement through photos, school documents, or proof of their participation in their children's extracurricular activities.

"These may not be legally binding," she acknowledged, "but if you're caught in a dispute over the kids with your expartner, they can at least give your lawyer something concrete."

Coons-Andersen started a non-profit foundation called We 2 Have Parental Rights

STILL NO DATE SET BY MAYOR TO VOTE ON DISCRIMINATION ORDINANCE

ORLANDO - Despite evidence that shows the majority of Orlando citizens are in favor of adding "sexual orientation" to the city's list of protected classes, Mayor Glenda Hood has yet to schedule a date to vote on the proposed language change.

Earlier this year, the Human Relations Board voted 5 - 0 in favor of protecting gays in lesbians against discrimination in housing and employment. Soon afterward, the mayor conducted a survey of Orlando citizens that showed that 56 percent of those polled are in favor of adding the amendment.

At a Sept. 9 workshop where Hood and the City Council were encouraged to ask the Human Relations Board about their endorsement of the language change, the mayor learned that letters and postcards from local residents totaled 1,300 in favor of equal rights and 700 opposed.

"She says it's not time," said City

Commissioner Patty Sheehan.

Sheehan said that she's unhappy with the mayor's unwillingness to put the ordinance to a vote.

"Win or lose, we just need to move on this issue," Sheehan said. "I have always fought for the community, and the community deserves an answer."

Sheehan said that until the issue goes to a vote she will vote negative on annexing any areas into the city of Orlando.

"I don't want to bring anyone else into a city that discriminates," Sheehan said.



HOSTS WITHDRAW FROM MIAMI CEREMONY IN PROTEST OF ANTI-GAY HONOREE

MIAMI - Cristina Saralegui, host of Univision's El Show de Cristina, and John Quinones, a correspondent for ABC's 20/ 20, have withdrawn as hosts for Hispanic

Media 100's awards ceremony after becoming aware of defamatory antigay attacks by one of the honorees, Eladio Jose Armesto.

Armesto, publisher of *El Nuevo Patria*, was one of the leaders of Take Back Miami-Dade, a Christian Coalition-affiliated group that unsuccessfully attempted to overturn Miami's anti-discrimination ordinance earlier this month. As part of that campaign, Armesto went on record in the *Miami Herald* and elsewhere calling gay men and lesbians "multisexual extremists" and "perverts." *El Nuevo Patria* has

continuously printed defamatory statements about the gay and lesbian community, including claims that, "Homosexualists aren't interested in adults. They seek to attract boys and youths," and headlines like "Privileges for Perverts?"

Hispanic Media 100, which honors 100 reporters, publishers and broadcast

leaders of the Hispanic community for their work in Spanish-language media, announced last month that it would honor Armesto at its annual awards ceremony

held in Miami on Sept. 20.

"To honor Armesto, who has used his media experience and skills to defame and oppress others, is a slap in the face to the Miami community," said Saralegui.

Quinones agreed to emcee the event after Saralegui withdrew late last week. But a few days later, Quinones also withdrew and, in a letter to event organizer Chris Day, expressed concern that the reasons for Saralegui's withdrawal were concealed from him.

"I've also spent the last 24 hours reading some of the virulent antigay comments attributed to him in print — and in his own newspaper," Quinones wrote. "Mr. Armesto certainly reserves his right to express his opinions. But, I too, want to express my own right not to be a part of any event that will pay tribute to anyone associated with such anti-gay views."

GAY LATINO GROUP TO KEEP NEXT MONTH'S CONFERENCE IN MIAMI-DADE

MIAMI - LLEGO — a national Latina/o GLBT organization — said it will keep next month's Encuentro, the group's conference, in Miami-Dade County. The decision is based on Dade County's vote to maintain basic rights for sexual minorities.

The international conference, is expected to attract about 1,500 attendees and generate roughly \$3 million for the Miami area.

"LLEGO will continue its plans to hold the Encuentro in Miami," said LLEGO executive director Martin Ornelas-Quintero. "Having a presence in Miami will send the message that protecting people's basic rights is morally and economically viable to a community."

LLEGO helped mobilize and educate Latinas and Latinos, who make up an estimated 57 percent of the county population, on the issue. The organization gave more than \$30,000 in financial contributions to the Miami-Dade Unity Coalition and People for the American Way for Spanish-language campaigns on the referendum.

"Vote results prove that Miami residents are not willing to tolerate discrimination and bias in their community," said Ornelas-Quintero.

NGLTF RECEIVES \$1 MILLION GRANT TO EXPAND TRAINING IN MIAMI

In the wake of the historic defeat of the effort to repeal anti-discrimination protections for gays and lesbians in Miami-Dade, the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) announced that the organization received a \$1 million grant from the Arcus Foundation to expand field organizing and training programs. The mission of the Arcus Foundation is to contribute to a pluralistic society that celebrates diversity and dignity, invests in youth and justice, and promotes tolerance and compassion.

COURT STRIKES DOWN TRANSGENDERED CASE AGAINST WINN-DIXIE

NEW ORLEANS - On Sept. 16, a United States District Judge decided that the federal ban on sex discrimination does not apply to people who are transgendered. He then dismissed Peter Oiler's case against the Winn-Dixie grocery store chain, even though Winn-Dixie never claimed that Oiler's off-the-job cross-dressing interfered with his work in any way.

Oiler had worked for Winn-Dixie for 21 years, but in January of 2000 he was fired because he cross-dresses off-duty. Oiler and his wife Shirley lost their health insurance, and nearly lost their home. The American Civil Liberties Union filed a federal lawsuit on Peter's behalf, charging that Winn-Dixie violated state and federal sex discrimination laws.

"Discrimination based on gender identity is just as foolish and wrongheaded as all the other practices that deny people jobs and homes on account of something that has no bearing on ability or work ethic," said Joe Cook, executive director of the Louisiana ACLU.

DOMESTIC PARTNER, TERROR VICTIM LAW SIGNED

SACRAMENTO - California became by far the largest state to recognize domestic partners' inheritance rights on Sept. 10, as Gov. Gray Davis signed a law championed by the partner of a victim of last year's terrorist attacks. California joins only Hawaii and Vermont in recognizing such rights.

The bill lets domestic partners inherit a partner's property if the partner dies without a will. Domestic partners must be registered with the secretary of state to qualify.

It might not have become law were it not for Keith Bradkowski, said the bill's author, Assemblyman Fred Keeley, D-Boulder Creek.

Bradkowski's partner of 11 years, Jeff Collman, 41, was an American Airlines flight attendant who died on the first plane to strike the World Trade Center. Collman's benefits and belongings went to his parents; the new law comes too late to help Bradkowski. (AP)

SOUTH AFRICAN COURT RULES GAY COUPLES CAN ADOPT CHILDREN

JOHANNESBURG, *South Africa* - South Africa's highest court ruled on Sept. 10 that gay couples had the right to adopt children, saying legislation preventing them from doing so violated their constitutional rights.

The Constitutional Court found that people in permanent same-sex partnerships could provide children with the stability, support and affection they needed.

Lesbian judges Anne-Marie De Vos and Suzanne Du Toit, who have been partners since 1989, had asked the court to overturn laws that prevented Du Toit from adopting De Vos's two children.

"I am ecstatic," De Vos told the South African Press Association. "I needed to know that if something happened to me, Suzanne would be able to take care of the children." (AP)

AS PRESIDENT, DEAN WOULD RECOGNIZE SAME SEX UNIONS

Vermont Gov. Howard Dean said on Sept. 15 that if elected president he would recognize the marriage rights of same-sex couples. Dean said he would not propose a federal law to give gay and lesbian couples the right to get married, but he would advocate that the federal government recognize state laws that granted gays and lesbians the rights and benefits of marriage. "I will recognize civil unions, which will then allow full equality under the law as far the federal government is concerned," Dean said.

OKLAHOMA CITY JUDGE RULES AGAINST CITY'S BANNER ORDINANCE

An Oklahoma City ordinance that kept a gay pride group's banners off city light poles has been struck down by a federal judge. The ordinance is an unconstitutional infringement of free speech rights, U.S. District Judge Robin J. Cauthron ruled. The order, handed down on Sept. 16, is a victory for the Cimarron Alliance Foundation, which sued the city after its application to post banners was rejected.

SMALL PA. BOROUGH IS FIRST SMALL TOWN IN STATE TO BAN GAY DISCRIMINATION

Council members unanimously passed an ordinance that made New Hope the first small town in the state to ban discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation. The ordinance approved on Sept. 12 bans discrimination in housing, employment and public accommodations. Geri Delvich, the councilwoman who introduced the bill for the ordinance, said New Hope, an eclectic mix of antique stores, boutiques and restaurants about 30 miles north of Philadelphia, is a popular home for gay men and lesbians.

2002 ELECTIONS CLEAR CHOICE IN SARASOTA

U.S. House - District 13:Katherine Harris (Rep.) v. Jan Schneider (Dem.)

This is the second in a series of profiles leading up to the Nov. 5 elections.

SARASOTA - It's unusual for a state cabinet member to become a nationally known figure, but that's what happened when Katherine Harris was thrust into the spotlight as the elected official responsible for overseeing Florida's controversial election results two years ago. With her thick mane of brown hair, Tammy Faye Baker eye makeup, and Ann Taylor-on-steroids business attire,

it's no surprise that she was parodied on Saturday Night Live and all the late night talk shows.

A wealthy fourth generation Floridian from Bartow, Harris has a Masters

degree from Harvard and has worked as a marketing executive and vice president of a commercial real estate firm. She served four years in the Florida Senate before being elected Secretary of State along with Gov. Jeb Bush in 1998. In 2000 Harris made several pivotal postelection decisions, all favoring Republican candidate and now President George W. Bush.

Her opponent is Democrat Jan Schneider, an attorney and author with even more impressive credentials. Schneider graduated from Yale Law School in the same class with Bill and Hillary Clinton. She also received a Ph.D. in political science (international relations) from Yale, and a Certificate in International Organizations from the University of Geneva. For the past 25 years, Schneider has divided her time between Sarasota and Washington, D.C., but for the last several years she has called Southwest Florida home.

As a legislator, Harris described herself as a "proactive champion of

business and economic development." No surprise then that her endorsements include the homebuilders and realtors associations for Sarasota and Manatee Counties. Sarasota County Sheriff Bill Balkwill (see story p. 8) is also a fan.

Schneider says she'll focus on restoring confidence in the national economy, ensuring affordable health care for all, and protecting Social Security and the environment. Unlike Harris, she's also out front in terms of non-discrimination based on sexual orientation.

"Equality is the birthright of all Americans, regardless of race, gender or sexual orientation," she says. "And that includes, among other things, equal economic treatment, recognition of rights and contributions of couples, and elimination of violence and discrimination."

Triangle Democratic Caucus president Jim Merritt says Schneider is the clear choice for the GLBT community in this race.

"I've known Jan for quite a while," he says, "and she demonstrates in her own life a commitment to

inclusiveness and diversity that Katherine Harris has never embraced."





The HIV-infected character was created at the urging of the South African government, which helps sponsor the show, to reduce stigma about the disease. According to the show's creators, Kami is a healthy, affectionate orphan who is a little shy but quickly joins in when approached in a friendly way. She also knows a lot about HIV.

Generic Name: nelfinavir (nel-FIN-na-veer) mesvlate

For the Treatment of Hum Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) Infection

Please read this information carefully before taking VIRACEPT, Also, please Please read this information carefully before taking VIRACEPT. Also, please read this leaflet each time you renew the prescription, just in case anything has changed. This is a summary and not a replacement for a careful discussion with your doctor. You and your doctor should discuss VIRACEPT when you start taking this medication and at regular checkups. You should remain under a doctor's care when taking VIRACEPT and should not change or stop treatment without first talking with your doctor.

Alert: Find out about medicines that should NOT be taken with VIRACEPT. Please also read the section "MEDICINES YOU SHOULD NOT TAKE WITH VIRACEPT".

WHAT IS VIRACEPT AND HOW DOES IT WORK?

VIRACEPT is used in combination with other antiretroviral drugs in the treatment of people with human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) infection. Infection with HIV leads to the destruction of CD4 T cells, which are important to the immune system. After a large number of CD4 cells have been destroyed, the infected person develops acquired immune deficienc syndrome (AIDS).

WIRACEPT works by blocking HIV protease (a protein-cutting enzyme), which is required for HIV to multiply. VIRACEPT has been shown to significantly reduce the amount of HIV in the blood. Although VIRACEPT is not a cure for HIV or AIDS. VIRACEPT can help reduce your risk for death and illness associated with HIV. Patients who took VIRACEPT also had significant increases in the number of CD4 cell count.

VIRACEPT should be taken together with other antiretroviral drugs such as Retrovir[®] (zidovudine, AZT), Epivir[®] (lamivudine, 3TC), or Zerit[®] (stavudine, d4T) Taking VIRACEPT in combination with other antiretroviral drugs reduces the amount of HIV in the body (viral load) and raises CD4 counts.

VIRACEPT may be taken by adults, adolescents, and children 2 years of age or older. Studies in infants younger than 2 years of age are now taking place.

DOES VIRACEPT CURE HIV OR AIDS?

VIRACEPT is not a cure for HIV infection or AIDS. People taking VIRACEPT may still develop opportunistic infections or other conditions associated with HIV infection. Some of these conditions are pneumonia, herpes virus infections, *Mycobacterium avium* complex (MAC) infections, and Kaposi's sarcoma.

There is no proof that VIRACEPT can reduce the risk of transmitting HIV to

WHO SHOULD OR SHOULD NOT TAKE VIRACEPT?

Together with your doctor, you need to decide whether VIRACEPT is appropriate for you. In making your decision, the following should be considered:

Allergies: If you have had a serious allergic reaction to VIRACEPT, you must not take VIRACEPT. You should also inform your doctor, nurse, or pharmacist of any known allergies to substances such as other medicines, foods, preservatives, or dyes.

If you are pregnant: The effects of VIRACEPT on pregnant women or their unborn babies are not known. If you are pregnant or plan to become pregnant, you should tell your doctor before taking VIRACEPT.

If you are breast-feeding: You should discuss with your doctor the best way to feed your baby. You should be aware that if your baby does not already have HIV, there is a chance that it can be transmitted through breast-feeding. n should not breast-feed if they have HIV.

Children: VIRACEPT is available for the treatment of children 2 through 13 years of age with HIV. There is a powder form of VIRACEPT that can be mixed with milk, baby formula, or foods like pudding. Instructions on how to take VIRACEPT powder can be found in a later section that discusses how VIRACEPT Oral Powder should be prepared.

If you have liver disease: VIRACEPT has not been studied in people with liver disease. If you have liver disease, you should tell your doctor before taking VIRACEPT.

Other medical problems: Certain medical problems may affect the use of VIRACEPT. Some people taking protease inhibitors have developed new or more serious diabetes or high blood sugar. Some people with hemophilia have had increased bleeding, it is not known whether the protease inhibitors caused these problems. Be sure to tell your doctor if you have hemophilia types A and B, diabetes mellitus, or an increase in thirst and/or frequent urination.

Changes in body fat have been seen in some patients taking protea Changes in body lat have been seen in some patients taking protease inhibitors. These changes may include increased amount of fat in the upper back and neck ("buffalo hump"), breast, and around the trunk. Loss of fat from the face, legs and arms may also happen. The cause and long-term health effects of these conditions are not known at this time.

CAN VIRACEPT BE TAKEN WITH OTHER MEDICATIONS?

VIRACEPT may interact with other drugs, including those you take without a prescription. You must discuss with your doctor any drugs that you are taking or are planning to take before you take VIRACEPT.

Medicines you should <u>not</u> take with VIRACEPT:

Propulsid® (cisapride, for heartburn)

Cordarone® (amiodarone, for irregular heartbeat)

Quinidine (for irregular heartbeat), also known as Quinaglute $^\circledR,$ Cardioquin $^\circledR,$ Quinidex $^\circledR,$ and others

Ergot derivatives (Cafergot® and others, for migraine headache)

Halcion® (triazolam) Versed® (midazolam)

Mevacor® (lovastatin, for cholesterol lowering) Zocor® (simvastatin, for cholesterol lowering)

Taking the above drugs with VIRACEPT may cause serious and/or life-threatening adverse events.

Rifampin® (for tuberculosis), also known as Rimactane®, Rifadin®

Rifater[®], or Rifamate[®]
This drug reduces blood levels of VIRACEPT.

Dose reduction required if you take VIRACEPT with: Mycobutin[®] (rifabutin, for MAC); you will need to take a lower dose of Mycobutin.

A change of therapy should be considered if you are taking VIRACEPT with:

Phenobarbital

Phenytoin (Dilantin® and others)

Carbamazepine (Tegretol® and others)

These agents may reduce the amount of VIRACEPT in your blood and make it less effective.

Oral contraceptives ("the pill")

If you are taking the pill to prevent pregnancy, you should use a different type of contraception since VIRACEPT may reduce the effectiveness of oral contraceptives.

Before you take Viagra® (sildenafil) with VIRACEPT, talk to your doctor about possible drug interactions and side effects. If you take Viagra and VIRACEPT together, you may be at increased risk of side effects of Viagra such as low blood pressure, visual changes, and penile erection lasting more than 4 hours. If an erection lasts longer than 4 hours, you should seek immediate medical assistance to avoid permanent damage to you penis. Your doctor can explain these symptoms to you.

It is not recommended to take VIRACEPT with the cholesterol-lowering drugs Mevacor® (lovastatin) or Zocor® (simvastatin) because of possible drug interactions. There is also an increased risk of drug interactions between VIRACEPT and Lipitor® (atorvastatin) and Baycol® (cerivastatin); talk to your doctor before you take either of these cholesterol reducing drugs with VIRACEPT.

Taking St. John's wort (hypericum perforatum), an herbal product sold as a dietary supplement, or products containing St. John's wort with VIRACEPT is not recommended. Talk with your doctor if you are taking or are planning to take St. John's wort. Taking St. John's wort may decrease VIRACEPT levels and lead to increased viral load and possible resistance to VIRACEPT or cross resistance to other antiretroviral drugs.

HOW SHOULD VIRACEPT BE TAKEN WITH OTHER ANTI-HIV DRUGS?

Taking VIRACEPT together with other anti-HIV drugs increases their ability to fight the virus. It also reduces the opportunity for resistant viruses to grow. Based on your history of taking other anti-HIV medicine, your doctor will direct you on how to take VIRACEPT and other anti-HIV medicines. These drugs should be taken in a certain order or at specific times. This will depend on how many times a day each medicine should be taken. It will also depend on whether it should be taken with or without food.

Nucleoside analogues: No drug interaction problems were seen when

Retrovir (zidovudine, AZT)

Epivir (lamivudine, 3TC) Zerit (stavudine, d4T)

Videx® (didanosine, ddl)

If you are taking both Videx (ddl) and VIRACEPT: Videx should be taken without food, on an empty stomach. Therefore, you should take VIRACEPT with food one hour after or more than two hours before you take Videx

Nonnucleoside reverse transcriptase inhibitors (NNRTIs):

When VIRACEPT is taken together with:

Viramune® (nevirapine)

The amount of VIRACEPT in your blood is unchanged. A dose adjustment is not needed when VIRACEPT is used with Viramune.

Sustiva[™] (efavirenz)

The amount of VIRACEPT in your blood may be increased. A dose adjustment is not needed when VIRACEPT is used with Sustiva.

Other NNRTIs

VIRACEPT has not been studied with other NNRTIs.

Other protease inhibitors:

When VIRACEPT is taken together with:

Crixivan® (indinavir)

The amount of both drugs in your blood may be increased. Currently, there are no safety and efficacy data available from the use of this combination. Norvir[™] (ritonavir)

The amount of VIRACEPT in your blood may be increased. Currently, there are no safety and efficacy data available from the use of this combination

Invirase® (saguinavir) The amount of saquinavir in your blood may be increased. Currently, there are no safety and efficacy data available from the use of this combination.

WHAT ARE THE SIDE EFFECTS OF VIRACEPT?

WHAT ARE THE SIDE EFFECTS OF VIRACEPT?

Like all medicines, VIRACEPT can cause side effects. Most of the side effects experienced with VIRACEPT have been mild to moderate. Diarrhea is the most common side effect in people taking VIRACEPT, and most adult patients had at least mild diarrhea at some point during treatment. In clinical studies, about 15-20% of patients receiving VIRACEPT 750 mg (three tablets) three times daily or 1250 mg (five tablets) two times daily had four or more loose stools a day. In most cases, diarrhea can be controlled using antidiarrheal medicines, such as Imodium® A-D (loperamide) and others, which are available without a prescription.

Other side effects that occurred in 2% or more of patients receive VIRACEPT include nausea, gas and rash.

There were other side effects noted in clinical studies that occurred in less than 2% of patients receiving VIRACEPT. However, these side effects may have been due to other drugs that patients were taking or to the illness itself. Except for diarrhea, there were not many differences in side effects in patients who took VIRACEPT along with other drugs compared with those who took only the other drugs. For a complete list of side effects, ask your doctor, nurse, or pharmacist.

HOW SHOULD I TAKE VIRACEPT?

VIRACEPT is available only with your doctor's prescription. Your doctor may prescribe the light blue VIRACEPT Tablets either as 1250 mg (five tablets) taken two times a day or as 750 mg (three tablets) taken three times a day. VIRACEPT should always be taken with a meal or a light snack. VIRACEPT tablets are film-coated to help make the tablets easier to swallow

Take VIRACEPT exactly as directed by your doctor. Do not increase or decrease any dose or the number of doses per day, Also, take this medicine for the exact period of time that your doctor has instructed. Do not stop taking VIRACEPT without first consulting with your doctor, even if you are feeling better.

Only take medicine that has been prescribed specifically for you. Do not give VIRACEPT to others or take medicine prescribed for someone else.

The dosing of VIRACEPT may be different for you than for other patients. Follow the directions from your doctor, exactly as written on the label. The amount of VIRACEPT in the blood should remain somewhat consistent over time. Missing doses will cause the concentration of VIRACEPT to decrease; therefore, **you should not miss any doses**. However, if you miss a dose, you should take the dose as soon as possible and then take your next scheduled dose and future doses as originally scheduled.

Dosing in adults (including children 14 years of age and older)

The recommended adult dose of VIRACEPT is 1250 mg (five tablets) taken two times a day or 750 mg (three tablets) taken three times a day. Each dose should be taken with a meal or light snack.

Dosing in children 2 to 13 years of age

The VIRACEPT dose in children depends on their weight. The recommended dose is 20 to 30 mg/kg (or 9 to 14 mg/pound) per dose, taken three times daily with a meal or light snack. This can be administered either in tablet form or, in children unable to take tablets, as VIRACEPT Oral Powder

Dose instructions will be provided by the child's doctor. The dose will be given three times daily using the measuring scoop provided, a measuring teaspoon, or one or more tablets depending on the weight and age of the child. The amount of oral powder or tablets to be given to a child is described in the chart below.

In measuring oral powder, the scoop or teaspoon should be level.

* 1 level scoop contains 50 mg of VIRACEPT. Use only the scoop provided with your VIRACEPT bottle.

† 1 level teaspoon contains 200 mg of VIRACEPT. Note: A measuring treaspoon used for dispensing medication should be used for measuring VIRACEPT Oral Powder. Ask your pharmacist to make sure you have a medication dispensing teaspoon.

How should VIRACEPT Oral Powder be prepared?

The oral powder may be mixed with a small amount of water, milk, formula, soy formula, soy milk, dietary supplements, or dairy foods such as pudding or ice cream. Once mixed, the entire amount must be taken t obtain the full dose.

Do not mix the powder with any acidic food or juice, such as orange or grapefruit juice, apple juice, or apple sauce, because this may create a bitter taste.

Once the powder is mixed, it may be stored at room temperature or refrigerated for up to 6 hours. Do not heat the mixed dose once it has

Do **not** add water to bottles of oral powder.

VIRACEPT powder is supplied with a scoop for measuring. For help in determining the exact dose of powder for your child, please ask your doctor, nurse, or pharmacist.

VIRACEPT Oral Powder contains aspartame, a low-calorie sweetener, and therefore should not be taken by children with phenylketonuria (PKU).

HOW SHOULD VIRACEPT BE STORED?

Keep VIRACEPT and all other medicines out of the reach of children. Keep bottle closed and store at room temperature (between 59°F and 86°F) away from sources of moisture such as a sink or other damp place. Heat and moisture may reduce the effectiveness of VIRACEPT.

Do not keep medicine that is out of date or that you no longer need. Be sure that if you throw any medicine away, it is out of the reach of children.

Discuss all questions about your health with your doctor. If you have questions about VIRACEPT or any other medication you are taking, ask your doctor, nurse, or pharmacist. You can also call 1.888.VIRACEPT (1.888.847.2237) toll free.

> is associated with many other gay interests. Damron Inc., started by Bob Damron even remarks online that as businesses have grown to notice the value of the gay


dollar, competition has picked up.

SENTINEL "BEING GAY" SERIES NABS NLGJA AWARD

PHILADELPHIA - The Orlando Sentinel, cited in the past for lackluster coverage of the local gay community, took home the National Lesbian and Gay Journalists Association first place award for "Excellence in News/Feature Writing." The three-part series entitled "Coming Out, Blending In: Being Gay in Central Florida" impressed judges with its scope and sensitivity. Sentinel columnist Mark

Schlueb accepted the award at NLGJA's annual convention in Philadelphia on behalf of co-writers Kelly Brewington and Jeff Kunerth.

Other NLGJA Excellence in Journalism winners included The Atlanta Journal-Constitution. Newsweek, The Dallas Morning News, The Kansas City Star, and ABC News Nightline.

The NLGJA convention, drew

more than 600 journalists and media professionals from around the country to the City of Brotherly Love, including Sarasota Herald Tribune columnist Jay Handelman and Watermark publisher Tom Dyer. Philadelphia mayor John F. Street and Philadelphia Inquirer publisher Robert J. Hall welcomed conventioneers to Loew's Hotel, in the heart of downtown and just north of the city's thriving and historic gay neighborhood.

Street noted that Philadelphia's groundbreaking citywide domestic partnership ordinance is currently under legal attack.

"I will do everything in my power to defend domestic partnership in Philadelphia," Street said. "Philadelphia is proud of its GLBT community, and recognizes the importance of this

community to the vitality of this city."

Professionals from every major newspaper and television network enjoyed three days of stimulating panels and workshops. On opening night, 60 Minutes correspondent Steve Kroft enjoyed repartee with Philadelphia Inquirer television columnist Gail Shister. After questioning Kroft about his famous interview with then presidential candidate Bill Clinton and his

wife Hillary, Shister asked, "If you were drunk enough, Steve, would you sleep with Bill Clinton?"


'I've been around long enough to know that you don't fuck with sources," Kroft countered to laughter and loud applause.

Convention keynote speaker, Vermont Gov. Howard Dean, all but officially announced his candidacy for the 2004 Democratic presidential

nomination, and said that as president he would support federal recognition of same-sex civil unions. He encouraged gays and lesbians to be out and proud.

Rep. Barney Frank (D-Mass.) participated in a lively discussion on coverage of Islamic gays, noting that people throughout the world and from all different religions suffer because of their sexual orientation.

At a forum on emerging gay cable options, Showtime's Gene Falk noted that the number of GLBT characters appearing regularly on primetime network television had declined by almost two-thirds. "The Fall 2002 season includes only seven lesbian and gay characters — all of whom are white," Falk said. "The diversity of the gay community cannot be conveyed this way." **▼** Tom Dyer

ROSIE O'DONNELL PULLS PLUG **ON MAGAZINE**

NEW YORK - Rosie O'Donnell abruptly quit her namesake magazine last week, citing a deteriorating relationship with the magazine's publisher Gruner + Jahr USA.

The former talk show host said G+J had been gradually taking editorial control away from her in violation of their contract, and it was no longer possible for the magazine to continue. The last issue will be in December, G+J said.

"I'm sorry to have to tell my readers and my staff that my involvement in the magazine is ending, but my integrity and name are at stake, and that price is too high," O'Donnell said at a news conference. "I cannot have my name on a magazine that will not represent my vision and ideas."

A legal battle is a possibility, although no lawsuits have been filed yet. Both sides have been feuding for months and have hired lawyers. In a memo sent to employees, G+J said that O'Donnell's sudden departure was "shocking and disappointing.'

GAY NEWSPAPER GIANT BEING SUED BY FORMER EMPLOYEES

WASHINGTON, D.C. - A lawsuit for nonpayment filed by two former owners of the Washington Blade is another sign of the perilous condition of Window Media, the holding company that last year purchased the gay newspaper and its sister publication in New York City for approximately \$3.6 million. The company also owns gay newspapers in Atlanta and Houston, and closed one in New Orleans that it had purchased.

Donald J. Michaels and James H. Lamont Jr., former publisher and assistant publisher and principle stockholders of the *Blades*, filed suit in D.C. Superior Court against Window Media for nonpayment of money owed them as part of that sale.

Purchase of the Blades was completed on May 16, 2001, with Michaels and Lamont agreeing to finance a share of the deal through a deferral of payments and interest to them that would stretch out over seven years.

Since that time, employees of the Washington Blade petitioned to form a union, the paper has gone through three news editors, and few editorial employees remain from pre-purchase days. The New York paper has cut publication from weekly to every other week and has

lost its entire editorial staff. The office is being run by an employee on temporary assignment from Atlanta.

The financial underpinnings of the purchase seem to have come apart practically from the start. In a letter dated Feb. 12, 2002, Silicon Valley Bank issued a notice of default by Window Media on their million-dollar loan. Standard banking practice is to try to work out these types of issues prior to issuing a formal letter. It suggests that the company had not been compliant with their agreement for some time.

Window Media in turn used their nonpayment to the Bank to argue that it was no longer obligated to pay the full purchase price. It sought to adjust downward the amount that it owed Michaels and Lamont by \$428,350. It failed to make payments to the pair scheduled for May 16.

This cascade of events caused Michaels and Lamont to seek legal redress and culminated with filing their lawsuit on August 9. They seek accelerated payment of all that is owed them, as is stipulated in a provision of the sale agreement, and barring that, foreclosure and return of their property, the Blades. W Bob Roehr

KEEPING THE FLAME ALIVE

A CANDLE CAN SHARE ITS LIGHT

WITHOUT LESSENING ITS OWN

SYD SAYS:

Happily the good citizens of Miami-Dade saw fit to reject the efforts of "Take Back Miami-Dade" (TBMD), a coalition of Christian conservatives who were trying to repeal the Miami-Dade law protecting gays and lesbians from discrimination. The effort was defeated by

a slim margin of about 53 percent to 47 percent.

A few weeks ago the *Orlando Sentinel* had a disturbing article about TBMD

and Nathaniel Wilcox, former civil rights activist and co-chairman of TBMD. Wilcox was focusing on the African-American vote, which many felt would be critical. His argument was that anti-gay discrimination pales against what African-Americans face.

"Don't come talking to me about discrimination." Wilcox was quoted as saying. "I don't find no gay slums. I don't find no gay water fountains. I don't see no gays riding the back of the bus."

What kind of thinking is that? In order to be entitled to civil rights protection must the gay community have suffered at least as much as the African-American community? With all the discrimination the African-American community has endured, I would think Wilcox and his group would be against discrimination of any kind. Denying one group their rights won't increase the size of anyone else's rights, doing so diminishes everyone. Civil rights are not a pie to be divided, with a limited number of slices. The concept of civil rights is that everyone is entitled to a full portion.

How can a former civil rights activist take this position? It makes no sense. The answer? Wilcox's organization, Pulse, was funded by 57 churches endorsing the repeal effort. In the *Orlando Sentinel* article, a noted African-American psychologist is quoted saying, "Most blacks believe God hates homosexuals, that it is an ungodly way of life, and that gays choose it." So the message becomes it's OK to discriminate against gays because the Bible says so. An interesting position since history has shown that a literal reading of the Bible has not always served African-Americans well.

It's shameful that those African-Americans supporting Pulse, who have suffered tremendous discrimination in this country, would be on the side of those attempting to deny others their civil rights. As an African-American substance abuse counselor in Miami said, "Any inch of discrimination is wrong. Everyone needs a fair opportunity."

This attempt to repeal the law is a reminder that even when victories are achieved, the gay community has to be vigilant in protecting its gains.

Unfortunately, the Christian Coalition continues to fight, even as the tide is changing. With only a 3 percent margin of victory, I would guess that Miami is not free of this issue yet.

ENID SAYS:

While on vacation in western North Carolina we heard about a great fabric store in a small South Carolina town, not far from where we were staying. Since it was a short trip, we went exploring.

As we approached the entrance to this small sleepy southern town, I did a double-take. There perched on the official town flagpole in the middle of the street was a large confederate flag proudly waving. On the side of the road, barely visible, I spotted a couple of small American flags and a sign with the town's name, dated 2002. From the look of things it could have been 1902.

Was the flag a symbol of historic pride? Maybe. But, I wondered how welcoming it would feel to African-Americans, to Jews, or gays? What if Michael and Shawn were with us, how welcome would they have felt? This wasn't a place we wanted to be, so we left. But, the trip was a reminder that prejudice is still alive in our country, sometimes in unlikely places... like Miami-Dade.

Nathaniel Wilcox seems to be saying in the *Sentinel* article that gay people haven't suffered enough to be entitled to civil rights. So, how much suffering is enough and who will be the judge? Wilcox?

It's not easy to lay your burden down when you feel others haven't grasped the full measure of your struggle. But, comparing pain and suffering is a trap that makes for a poor yardstick. Is anything gained by hoarding civil rights and denying them to gays and lesbians? Will it increase the rights of African-Americans? A candle can share its light without lessening its own glow. It's ironic to think that Wilcox's organization, Pulse, who knows full well what discrimination can do to the soul of a people, instead of illuminating the dark, would be the ones trying to douse the flame. W


CONCERNED ABOUT THE CENTER





Heath Ledger, star of the new film *The Four Feathers*, talks about his career that began by playing gay.

NEW YORK - Heath Ledger's name is not quite as famous as I thought. Not only did more than one friend of mine not know who Ledger — one of People's "50 Most Beautiful People" — was, but Ledger himself admits that not many people other than his friends, colleagues, and family know who he is.

At the moment it is not as surprising since he currently sports a nearly shaved head, (for a role in the upcoming *Ned Kelly*), and not the gorgeous curls that he is so somewhat well known for.

I asked Ledger what celebrity had done to him since we had last

talked during the summer of 2001, the month before his starring turn in *A Knight's Tale*, which was a year after he portrayed Mel Gibson's son in *The Patriot*. Ledger also co-starred in last year's art house hit, *Monster's Ball*, playing the son of executioner, Billy Bob Thornton

"I can walk down Fifth Avenue, here in New York City, sit at a table on the sidewalk, eat lunch and not be noticed, at least to my knowledge, even once," he proclaims. "The same in Los Angeles or London," he continues. "And I don't mind it one bit. I relish my anonymity."

If Paramount, The Four Feathers's domestic distributor, has its way, Ledger's drop dead gorgeous, prettyboy face and name, Heathcliff, derived from the book Wuthering Heights, will finally become famous in his own right. The Four Feathers, scheduled for release on Sept. 20, is the year's first big budget period piece and Ledger has the lead.

Shekhar Kapur, whose last movie, Elizabeth, was nominated for Best Picture, directs The Four Feathers. As did Elizabeth, The Four Feathers goes back in time to Victorian England. This time around Kapur tells the story not of "The Virgin Queen," but the fictional tale of Harry Fevershem, one of Britain's finest, youngest soldiers and accomplished rugby players. Harry's engagement — to Kate Hudson's Ethne — awakens a sense of self-doubt and when his regiment is called to active duty in North Africa to fight the Sudanese rebels, he resigns his commission; wherein come the four feathers.

Ledger tries to explain, in the simplest of terms, how the title of the movie is derived.

"My role reads as a coward on the surface and coward soldiers were handed a white feather, the symbol of cowardice, by any who thought of them as cowards." Excusing Harry's behavior, Ledger laughs, "But Harry was not a coward. Resigning from the army was the most honorable thing he could have done. He was honest to himself"

THE OUT & EQUAL WORKPLACE SUMMIT DELIVERED A POWERFUL MESSAGE TO CENTRAL FLORIDA BUSINESS AND GOVERNMENT. BY SCOTT J. SMITH

ORLANDO - "Leadership is not about telling people what they want to hear," said Vermont Gov. Howard Dean to a recordbreaking 450 GLBT workplace advocates who descended on Walt Disney World in Orlando from Sept. 13-15.

Dean was a keynote speaker at the 12th annual Out & Equal Workplace Summit, three days of workshops, keynotes, and awards. The summit marked the first time a

national GLBT group had been hosted in the state.

Dean, who was one of the three-day convention's keynote speakers, was not only making a statement about business leaders, but political ones as well. In his address, Dean took Orlando Mayor Glenda Hood to task for constantly pushing back the decision to add "sexual orientation" to the list of the city's protected classes.

"There will be those who are incensed, but 90 percent of people believe in equal rights, and she will earn those people's respect for doing the right thing," Dean said.

Dean, who championed the legislation that created civil unions in his state, received an enthusiastic response to his presidential aspirations at the summit by committing to take his leadership on GLBT civil rights to the White House. But although he is proud of those who supported the civil union bill in the face of severe criticism, he

The other day I was over at a friend's house. She was playing with Barbies. It may seem like a rather odd pasttime for a 24-year-old woman but, hey, she's a self-proclaimed bisexual fag-hag. She loves Barbies — always has.

I, on the other hand, have little interest in Barbies. As a child I liked to chop off their hair. I liked to change their outfits and I loved to contort their legs

and arms in a million different positions. My favorite part of the Barbie was her ability to bend her knee just one notch in the wrong direction — in a completely inhuman fashion. The leg always made a little pop at that point and you knew you could go no further. And no, I am not a sadist.

But I haven't seen or held a Barbie in a long while. I forgot how you could push their heads down to make them look like no-neck freaks. I forgot what fun it is to play with their slightly sticky straight and almost invariably blonde hair. I also forgot — until my friend put two particularly perky tanned dolls together in a mock kiss — how we used to make Barbie and Barbie perform acts of pseudo-lesbian sex together in the deep recesses of my huge childhood closet.

Of course we didn't call it lesbian sex. We just didn't have enough Kens to go around. I owned only one and he got boring after awhile. No real hair, no fun clothes, and his body parts were even stiffer than those belonging to his female counterpart. So we would pretend one Barbie was the girl and the other was the boy (if only we knew about drag queens in those days). You could push their hollow plastic heads together in a kiss or just bang their hard, pointy, cupped-hand bodies together to simulate sex. (Lord knows that if I tried the same moves on a woman now I would never get laid again.)

I know lots of people who have stories similar to this. It might have been with a couple G.I. Joes or Cabbage Patch Kids. Children usually have vague ideas about sex. Thinking back on this whole experience, it strikes me that the plethora of Barbies and other female dolls thrust upon

me by doting relatives almost forced me to explore the forbidden world of same-sex love.

There were so many Barbies and barely any Kens. Because of low supply, Ken and his clones were in high demand. Some kids may have mourned this fact. But my childhood friends and I just didn't care. We practically forgot about Ken. We forgot about the boys because the girls were just so much more interesting and present.

Did Mattel do this on purpose?

Perhaps just as the makers of Teletubbies are trying to turn infants gay with Tinky Winky, so too are Barbie's creators pumping out future lesbians by inundating us with masses of pointy-boobed women to play with.


I can't say that Barbie's body has had any effect on the kind of women I am attracted to, but being able to play "house" or "love" with Barbies did normalize the concept for me — at least in some abstract way. All my friends did it.

I agree with those that berate the unrealistic contours of Barbie's body. Her shape is an awful model for young girls to look up to. Obsessions with clothes and hair that Barbie propagates are unhealthy. Barbie is, in sum, a pretty shallow doll.

But, like anything commercialized in this world, she has her potential. It's called appropriation. Barbie can be self-esteem devaluating, superficial play toy. Or she can be an avenue to lesbian exploration for the curious and lost little tomboy.

For some, like my friend, she is both. ∇

WAS JAMES DEAN GAY?

Gay and Lesbian History by Paula Martinac

James Dean's premature death in a car crash, after having made only three movies, transformed the enigmatic young actor into a legend, the subject of books, films, and plays. Over the years, one of the most enduring questions about Dean, whose androgynous, almost delicate, looks were alluring to both men and women, concerns his sexuality — was he straight or gay, or did he fall somewhere between the two ends of the Kinsey scale?

Dean's success in Hollywood where he moved from his Indiana hometown in 1949 at age 18 — did stem in large part from the contacts he made with influential gay men. One of his few documented homosexual relationships was with Rogers Brackett, the sophisticated, 35-year-old radio director of a prestigious advertising agency, whom Dean met in the summer of 1951 while working as a parking attendant at CBS. Just two weeks after they met, Dean began living with Brackett in his Hollywood flat. Brackett used his social and professional connections to find Dean work on radio shows like Hallmark Playhouse. By Labor Day, Dean was also

getting bit parts in movies.

Later that year, Dean moved with Brackett to New York, where Dean began getting television work and eventually theater parts, including a pivotal role as a gay Arab houseboy in Andre Gide's *The Immoralist*, opposite Louis Jourdan. That, in turn, garnered the young actor the lead role as Cal Trask in the Elia Kazan film *East of Eden*.

While in New York, Dean began dating a singer-dancer named Elizabeth "Dizzy" Sheridan, who seems to have been his only serious girlfriend; he even asked her to marry him.

"He did not want to be gay," Sheridan recalled years later, a telling statement that, coupled with the fact that he continued seeing Brackett, hints at a possible practical side to Dean's romantic involvement with Sheridan. Being openly (or even too suggestively) gay would have quickly ended his career at that time, when gay actors like Rock Hudson were being forced into sham marriages to protect their image.


It's not surprising, then, that when Dean's movie career began to take off, he

started appearing at Hollywood events with pretty starlets on his arm. The press—and his studio, Warner Brothers—made much of his supposedly passionate love affair with the lovely Italian-born Pier Angeli. But though Dean's colleagues and friends maintained that he was heartbroken when Angeli decided to marry singer Vic Damone, Dean's relationship with Angeli was, she herself later said, "all so innocent."

Another of Dean's documented gay relationships was with Jack Simmons, a young actor who, by all accounts, was devoted to him; they lived together at Simmons' apartment during the filming of *Rebel Without a Cause*. Studio officials did not seem to mind, perhaps because the Warner publicity machine was busily getting articles like "The Dean I've Dated," by Lori Nelson, into fan magazines.

Dean took the secret of his sexuality to his untimely death, which occurred soon after he finished filming *Giant*. Although Dean can hardly be called straight, it remains unclear if he identified as gay or bisexual, or if he was questioning. Since he was only 24, his sexual identity may, in fact, have been still in formation. ∇





Nonetheless, Harry's father and his three best friends disown him after sending their feathers. To add fuel to the fire, Harry's fiance breaks off the engagement and falls for his best friend, a real soldier, played by American Beauty's Wes Bentley.

'Harry is tormented," says Ledger, "and needs to do something to prove to all who doubt his reason for resigning from the army that he did so not out of cowardice but for personal reasons."

In his effort to regain the love and trust of his father, friends and former fiance, Harry embarks on an undercover journey, dressed as an Arab, through the North African desert, attempting to rejoin his

regiment in Khartoum, only to find out that they have been taken prisoner in their own British fortress by Sudanese rebels.

"Working on *The Four Feathers* was not fun and games," admits Ledger. "Unlike A Knight's Tale, a medieval fairy tale, which was filmed in Prague, there were no bars or clubs to go to in the middle of the desert for three months.'


So what did he do to keep from going crazy?

"I acted crazy," he says, explaining and demonstrating with his long fingers and arms what he did to keep himself occupied. "On many nights, I would play drums with the Sudanese, get drunk and smash red wine bottles around. It looked like a fucking tribal ritual, or something. Trust me, though. There was nothing else to do."

While Ledger looks better than ever during the first half hour of The Four Feathers, with greased down curls, devilish smile, university rugby uniform and barely clothed body during a locker room scene, his looks take a turn for the rougher when he is trudging through the desert.

"Those makeup women were amazing," he says. "They really made me look ugly.'

Ledger is speaking of the grizzly beard he sports, which he says, "I couldn't have grown on my own if I tried. I can't even grow a five o'clock shadow. The wigs were amazing, too. I can grow my hair long, as you have seen in some movies, but with this, the sand everywhere, my hair, if they used the real thing in the movie, would have gotten matted and really nasty. Come to think of it, perhaps they should have just let it go. It



Some may be surprised to know that Ledger gained fame not as a movie star, but as a television star.

"I finished high school a year early, at sixteen, and decided to make the move from Perth, Australia, where there is nothing, to Sydney. So my best friend and I drove 2,600 miles," searching for fame

His breakthrough role was that of a gay character on one of Australia's most popular shows, Sweat.

"My father didn't think I was going to

take a gay role," reveals Ledger. "But I wanted to take the role that no one thought I would take and give it all I had.'

Ledger's decision paid off. Not only did he get rave reviews for that performance, he soon landed an agent in the U.S. and starred in his first movie, Ten Things I Hate About

> You, the only "teen" movie he has ever done, and "will ever do."

While twentythree year old, bright-eyed, bushyhaired Australian, Ledger's professional career is one that satisfies him - his personal life is another matter.

"While not many regular people notice me on the street, it seems that the camera-toting tabloid reporters all know me," he says. "The stories that they write about me in those magazines aren't what offend me. I don't care what they write about me and who I am having sex

with. First of all, they aren't in my house or hotel room so they really don't know what's going on. What creeps me out is when people are so pathetic that they follow me around for the whole day, everywhere that I go, hiding behind a bush and popping out snapping pictures. They really need to get a life."

Whether his pictures snapped by tabloid photographers are worth anything, it seems that the big pictures are worth a lot. Ledger got a \$2 million paycheck for The Four Feathers alone. And if Ledger continues to make sound choices, as he has thus far in his fairly short movie career, he will see that his pictures, on and off screen, are worth more than he could ever have imagined. W





said, "The most important act of courage is gays, lesbians, bisexual and transgender people standing up to say who they are and demanding respect."

Orlando City Commissioner Patty Sheehan

echoed Dean's sentiment when she spoke the following day.

"The only way justice will prevail is if good people stand up and be counted," she told the crowd.

Summit Co-chair Stan Madray said that the Orlando conference was the most heavily attended conference in its 12-year history. He said that it shows that GLBT people are taking the message reiterated by both Dean and Sheehan to heart.

"Last year there were about 300 people in attendance at the summit in Cincinnati," Madray noted. "This year we've seen nearly 500 workplace equality advocates from across the country here in Orlando."

Out & Equal's Board President Allen Mann said that it was also gratifying to know that many conference attendees came to Florida with their partners and children.

"A lot of people's partners and kids are

out enjoying the theme parks," Mann said.
"Even though some of them may not attend
the summit, it's good to know that it's because
of the summit that they're here in Orlando
making themselves visible."

High visibility was a major theme that threaded its way through the entire summit. Not only were GLBT individuals there to find

out what they could do to push for more equitable workplace policies, but may corporations were also present to show their support of issues that affect the GLBT community. Diverse business giants like Procter & Gamble, Microsoft, Motorola, and the Walt Disney World Co. were all represented.

Disney's Coronado Springs Resort, where the conference took place, was a welcoming environment. Signs and marquees greeted guests, and the resort's employees were not only helpful, they were inquisitive about and supportive of the summit.

"One of the reasons we wanted to hold this

year's summit in Orlando was because we wanted to honor the work Disney and many other companies that have offices in the area have done for workplace equality," said Selisse Barry, executive director of Out & Equal.

Barry went on to say that conference

organizers also knew about the city's seeming reluctance to protect gays and lesbians from housing and employment discrimination.

"It's part of our mission to give a little push to entities that are not quite up to speed on issues of equality," she said.

At the Saturday night "Outies" Awards banquet, American Airlines was given the Workplace Excellence Award for companies that have historically supported GLBT employees. The Significant Achievement Award for a company that has made the most progress toward GLBT equality in the past year went to JP Morgan Chase, which added "transgender" to its corporate equal employment opportunity policies.

Transgender issues were prevalent during the summit. One of the Saturday plenary sessions, featuring American Airlines senior Vice President of Human Resources Susan Oliver, focused solely on the subject.

Following the "Transgender Issues on the Job" plenary was the "Working Across Borders: The International GLBT Experience," where those in attendance were surprised when transgender persons were not discussed. Stonewall U.K.'s Director of Policy and Public Affairs Debbie Gupta continuously referred to the community as "GLB."

At the Q & A afterwards, Gupta was asked about the omission of transgender individuals in her address.

"Transgendered persons have had governmental protections for over 10 years in the U.K.," she said. "Gays, lesbians, and bisexuals are still waiting. Policy should change this year, but so far the only entity in which GLB discrimination is not permitted is in the military."

The final keynote address from former

National Organization of Women (NOW) President Patricia Ireland focused on the link between the women's movement and the campaign for GLBT civil rights.

"Everyone suffers when masculine behavior is established as the norm," Ireland said. "The primary cause of homophobia is not sexuality but society's need to establish and enforce clear gender roles."

The 450 people who participated in this year's Out & Equal Workplace Summit were treated to quite of bit of eye-opening news and opinions. And with more that 60 workshops to choose from, it was impossible to gather all the information that was being offered over the course of three days.

"I had become pretty burned out when I came to this conference," said one participant on the way back to the airport. "But now I feel re-energized and ready to face the challenges ahead."

Barry said that next year's conference is being held in Minneapolis.

"There are a lot of corporations based in Minnesota that deserve recognition for their progressive workplace policies, "But," she said with a twinge of activism in her voice, "there are also businesses like Best Buy—and they still need that little push." W

ADVICE-O-RAMA THE AGE OF CONSENT

Dear Keith,

I have been going out with the same guy for almost two years. We have a great relationship and the sex is wonderful too. We love each other and have no problem saying it and we get along really well. There is only one problem: he's 28, I'm 17. Because of the age difference, we don't do a lot of hanging out with his friends or mine due to the fact that a lot of them would have a problem with it.

I am out to my mom and she knows I have a boyfriend but if she had any idea of his real age she would go through the roof. I love him and want to move in with him when I turn 18 next year but until then we have to keep things undercover and not let too many people know about it.

My friends that do know say they are concerned because they claim it is against the law. I do not want my boyfriend to get into trouble or even worse, end up in jail. He says things will be okay if we just keep on the way we have until I am legal age. I am afraid though that he might jump ship at the first sign of trouble or if his friends pressure him enough.

I don't go out with guys my own age because I am attracted to guys a little bit older and more mature. I met him online

and we chatted for a few weeks before we ever did anything, so it is not like I rushed into this I want to know if I should stay with him despite our friends' warnings or should I let him go to keep him out of trouble? Please let me know what you think.

Dear Young,

It is a challenge to develop and effectively maintain a relationship when there is a significant age discrepancy. The problem becomes more complicated when the individuals involved are from different generations. When one person is a minor there is an imbalance of power and a concern that the minor is being exploited.

You state that your current age is seventeen and that you have been involved with a 28-year-old man for two years. If my math is correct then you started seeing him when you were 15 and he was 26. I am troubled that a man of his age would elect to become involved with a 15-yearold boy. I must question his motives. This relationship is inappropriate and illegal no matter how mature you view yourself.

When people find healthy relationships they want to celebrate and share their experiences with close friends. Your relationship appears to be based on secrets, lies and shame. If this relationship was right for you, your energy would be directed in a more positive way. You would not be writing to me about deceiving your mother, isolating yourselves and feeling worried about him being jailed for his actions.

I encourage you to end this relationship and seek counseling for yourself. Your participation in counseling will provide you with the opportunity for understanding why

Director Dirk Shafer makes sparks fly with *Circuit*, his sexy and dramatic look at gay club life. By John Sullivan

White Party, Black Party, Blue Ball,
Morning After Party, and on and on it
goes. Over the past ten years the circuit
party phenomenon has swept the gay
community and grown into something
that can no longer be ignored. Year
after year they get bigger and more
legendary than ever before. Love
'em or hate 'em, there is no
denying the role that these events
have come to play in gay culture.

And while we all don't mind admiring the beauty that the circuit has to offer — the sea of shirtless men dancing like their abs depended on it, the throbbing music and pulsing lights — many have turned a blind eye on the less than glamorous things like drugs and unsafe sex.

But still we are drawn to circuit parties like moths to a flame, and now someone has finally taken a no-holds-barred look at what makes the circuit life great — and not so great.

"If there were a party where straight men could go to where there would be beautiful topless women dancing and being free with their bodies, they would be the most popular parties on the face of the earth," says former Playgirl Man of the Year

turned filmmaker Dirk Shafer.

OK, so maybe he's never been to spring break in Florida. But Shafer will attend Tampa's International Gay And Lesbian Film Festival in October to promote his film *Circuit*, which takes a deep look into the oftmistook for shallow world of circuit parties.

Circuit tells the tale of John, an excop goodie two shoes from the Midwest, played by straight hottie Jonathon Wade Drahos, who succumbs to the lure of the circuit world and ends up tasting both ends of what it has to offer. With the help of plastic surgery junkie and hustler Hector, John tweaks his way into membership in the steroid-shooting, party drug abusing, circuit club.

Shafer, who wrote, directed, and starred in 1996's *Man of the Year*, based on his real life experiences as a closeted *Playgirl* centerfold, and fellow screen writer Gregory Hinton based most of the film's characters on real people that they have known in and around West Hollywood.

"I think I have met at least a dozen or so people that have lived the story of John. I see them everyday, the people who come out here and are relatively

LUCKY 13 FOR FILM FEST

The Tampa International Gay & Lesbian Film Festival mixes parties and crowd pleasers with cutting edge cinema in its 13th year. By Tom Dyer

TAMPA - According to Tampa International Gay & Lesbian Film Festival director Margaret Murray, the annual early October event really starts to take shape months earlier, usually around June.

"After hours of poring over film Web sites, attending festivals, and sitting through countless video screenings, some sort of theme usually begins to emerge," Murray says, surrounded by precarious towers of videotapes in her small office at Equality Florida headquarters on Swann Ave. "It's as if filmmakers have tapped into a common zeitgeist about the state of the world around them."

Murray says the theme of this year's festival is best described as journeys — both outward and inward. But her own journey as festival director is still gaining speed and direction. This will just be Murray's second year overseeing the festival, and already she's left a significant mark on the 13-year-old event that has become the pride of gay Tampa Bay. With an annual budget of more than \$180,000, and a lineup of between 60 and 70 films, the festival is expected to attract more than 15,000 this year.

Touted for her encyclopedic knowledge

of independent film, and an almost obsessive drive to view each new offering, Murray ensures that the Tampa Film Fest lineup will be diverse and respected.

"She does a wonderful job," says Film Fest board secretary Jim Harper. "We're very lucky to have her."

Murray hopes the board will keep her around for a while. She's proud of what the festival has accomplished, particularly staging last year's event on the heels of 9/11, and this year's strong lineup filled

with "hidden treasures." But as someone who has attended just about every GLBT film festival on the planet, she has an ambitious and energizing vision of what the Tampa Film Fest might become.

Murray points to a wish list with four key components.

"First I'd like to see us be more of a resource for filmmakers," she says, noting that this could be accomplished with some combination of prize money, completion funds, grants and residencies.

The San Francisco International Lesbian and Gay Film Festival is a good example. With close to 100,000 annual attendees and a budget in the millions, San Francisco's respected 26-year-old film festival is the driving force behind a thriving lesbian and gay film community. Levi Strauss sponsors a \$10,000 "First Feature Award" at the festival, and "Stu & Dave's Excellent Documentary Award" is worth the same amount for hungry filmmakers.

Next, Murray would like to see a stronger international lineup at the Tampa Film Fest. As an example, she points to an Oct. 7 offering this year. *Days (Giorni)* is a subtle and beautiful Italian film about the vagaries of the heart long after coming out has ceased to be an issue. Murray says its one of her favorite films in the festival.

"It's always a balancing act," she laments. "Some of the best gay and lesbian films are from other countries, but they're not always easy for American audiences to digest... there's that whole subtitle thing."

Just four years old, the Miami International Gay & Lesbian Film Festival features a lineup about the size of Tampa's, but a full fifty percent originate from outside the United States. Reflecting Miami's demographics, many are from Spanish-speaking countries. Likewise, San Francisco's festival highlights films from the Far East and Asia.

Preferring to feature a cross-section of the best from throughout the world, Murray doesn't want to similarly pigeonhole Tampa's international offerings. "I prefer to think of us as anti-niche," she says. Murray also wants to develop a reputation for screening cutting edge and thought-provoking documentaries. She particularly admires the London International Lesbian and Gay Film Festival in that regard.

"The longer I work in the film festival world, the more I see how incredibly politically correct they're getting," she observes. "London's not like that. They really take risks."

In that regard, Murray notes that the venue for Tampa's Film Fest - the gorgeous 1,400-seat Tampa Theatre - is a bit of a "double-edged sword."

"It's hard to justify showing a documentary about a transgender member of the New Zealand Parliament when you have that many seats to fill," she notes.

This year the
Tampa Film Fest will also screen a small
number of films at two smaller locations
— Centro Ybor Muvico and TECO Plaza.
Murray says that multiple sights are likely
part of the Film Festival's future.

Finally, Murray wants to see the Tampa Film Fest develop into a multi-leveled cultural event for the entire city. She notes that Seattle and Rochester, New York, have been particularly good at creating that kind of environment.

"While the festival is going on, I'd like to see art openings down the street and panel discussions three blocks away," she says, "...things that would transform the city for a brief but wonderful period of time each year."

To a great extent, Murray will create that kind of atmosphere at this year's festival, Oct. 3-13. The Opening Night Party in front of the Tampa Theatre on Franklin Street and at TECO Plaza is followed by the local premiere of *Notorious C.H.O.*. The film version of comedian Margaret Cho's outrageous and enormously

gay live show is expected to sell out.


During the next week-and-a-half there will be live appearances and panel discussions featuring actor/director Steve Gutenberg (P.S. Your Cat is Dead), director Dirk Shafer (Circuit), Native American actor Evan Adams (The Business of Fancydancing), acclaimed author David Leavitt (Food of Love), director Catherine Crouch (Pretty Ladies! A Super 8 Explosion), director Marilyn Freeman (Group), and Ruthie and Connie, the subjects of the acclaimed documentary of the same name.

On Oct. 9 the much-anticipated screening of *Claire*, a new silent movie filmed with a vintage 1920s hand-cranked

camera, will feature accompaniment by musicians from the Florida Orchestra. And on Oct. 13, Equality Florida once again sponsors an afternoon street festival and expo on Franklin St., while movies inside the Tampa Theatre are bookended with performances by Crescendo, the Men of Crescendo, the Tampa Bay Gay Men's Chorus and more.

Other highlights are too numerous to mention — a complete schedule of film offerings and events follows on page 5. Like the festival, Murray's goal for attendees began to crystallize last June.


"I hope that each person who sits in a darkened theater enjoying the festival is taken on a journey," she says. W





Sometimes love is found in the most unlikely places and with the most unlikely individuals. They do say, after all, that opposites attract. So why be surprised that a dog has found love with a chicken?

That's right, a male dog and a male chicken. Pedro the dog and Tony the chicken are the subjects of an animated short film that examines the ins and outs of an interspecies relationship.

Pedro and Tony shared a little bit about themselves with Watermark and brought new meaning to "doggy style" along the way.

WATERMARK: How long have you been together now?

PEDRO: Umm, I think it has been six years now.

TONY: No, no. We haven't been together for six years honey — you're imagining things. It's been about a year and a half. P: Well it feels like six years.

T: It would be about seven in dog years, wouldn't it?

How did you two meet?

T: It was old-fashioned animal magnetism actually. I saw him at a bar and he came over and licked me. Is that the way you remember it? **P:** I, um, guess so.

So it was love at first lick then?

T: It was love at first lick. That's they way I like to think of it.

When did you know for sure that you were in love?

T: I knew right away, but I don't think Pedro knows vet.

P: Well, you know, I am not that fast so it takes me a while. Maybe it took me a month or so to get to that point but I had my U-haul ready.

What was the coming out process like for each of you?

P: For me it was not so bad really. When you think about it, dogs are all about unconditional love. This kind of stuff is not so much an issue with us.

T: My family is very liberal so when I first came out I think everyone pretty much expected it. You see, I am the most colorful one in my family... literally. I have much more orange than my brothers or sisters.

P: And it looks good.

T: Thank you. So when I came out my parents basically just thought that they would accept it and I would end up turning straight. They thought it was a phase. About a year later, when I was bringing other attractive animals home, they were like, "OK, you need to get over this."

As an interspecies couple, what has been the hardest thing to overcome? P: Tony's a little cocky so it took me a while to get used to that. I guess in my eyes I expect that of poultry, but it took me a while to adjust because most of my partners before him were dogs. Like Tony said, his

parents are kind of patronizing, T: I sort of inherited that a little bit. **P:** A little bit? T: There are a lot of cultural differences that I didn't expect when I first met Pedro. He's cute, he's furry, and that's enough for me. But I realized that dogs and chickens really do things differently. It's very hard to hold a dog up to chicken standards and vice-versa. The more that I have known Pedro, the more I realize that there's a lot of different types of wisdom

out there. You just have to respect the ways other people do things.

So have you guys ever given any thought to parenting? And would you go for a puppy or a chick?

T: I think Pedro wants offspring more than I do.

P: Yeah, I have a lot of friends who have been going that route, so it has been on my mind.

T: Pedro, are you set on having it be a dog as a child? Do you care what species our kids are?

P: You know, if you are more indifferent than I am, then we may as well have a dog, I guess. We can always get a bird dog, right? A pointer or a beagle.

Have you always been attracted to dogs

T: No, I've actually been attracted to a variety of barnyard animals.

Pedro have you always been attracted to chickens?

P: When I was younger I used to chase chickens a lot but I didn't take them seriously back then. I was more serious about dogs as far as relationships went so this is fairly new for me.

Who is the top and who is the bottom?


T: (clucking) What a silly question! **P:** I consider myself versatile, but you



THE UNLIKELIEST GATOR

ACCLAIMED NOVELIST DAVID LEAVITT NOW TEACHES AT U OF F, AND WILL VISIT TAMPA TO DISCUSS THE FILM ADAPTATION OF ONE OF HIS NOVELS. BY TOM DYER

GAINESVILLE - Some would say David Leavitt has led a charmed life.

He grew up in privileged Palo Alto, California, attended Yale University, and was published in *The New Yorker* at age 21. Award-winning novels and short story collections followed, bringing Leavitt success enough to divide his time between the states and such exotic locales

as Barcelona and Rome. His second full novel, *The Lost Language of Cranes*, was made into a groundbreaking film for public television.

And now he's landed in Florida's most atmospheric college town — Gainesville — where he lives with partner and collaborator Mark Mitchell in the bucolic Duck Pond district and

teaches creative writing to masters level students at the University of Florida.

But in truth, Leavitt is less like a character in a Jackie Collins novel, and more like a character in, well, one of his own. His stories are rich with the tortured internal dialogue of characters that are as ambitious as they are insecure. And he captures the superior self-loathing of the closeted intellectual with breathtaking insight. All in language that is as unexpected as it is beautiful.

As one reviewer noted, "Leavitt has no qualms about showing up his alter ego's moral and emotional shortcomings." For gay men skilled at ethical gymnastics, Leavitt's novels are liberating in their fluorescent truthfulness.

One of Leavitt's most plot-driven books — *The Page Turner* — is his second to be filmed, and it is one of the most anticipated offerings at this year's Tampa International Gay and Lesbian Film Festival. Re-titled

Food of Love, it was adapted for the screen and directed by Leavitt's friend, Spanish filmmaker Ventura Pons.

Food of Love is about gifted piano student Paul Porterfield, and his involvement with a famous and much older concert pianist.

"Ventura wrote me and said he wanted to do a movie based on the book, and I was all for it," Leavitt said. "His films are wonderful — very intimate and unflinching."

Although Pons lifts much of the dialogue from the book, Leavitt did not help directly with the screenplay. Instead, he reviewed a final draft and suggested minor revisions.

"I think it's a beautiful film," he said.
"The actors are very much like the characters I envisioned."

Until recently, Leavitt lived primarily in the Italian province of Tuscany. But Gainesville has been home for the past two years.

"The university was looking for a fiction writer, and they invited me to apply," Leavitt said. "Mark grew up near Tallahassee and I've always had a fondness for this part of the country. I love it."

Leavitt also loves teaching, despite a problematic relationship with some of his own mentors. In fact his most recent full novel, *Martin Bauman; or, A Sure Thing*, uses the title character's conflicted feelings for a charismatic mentor as a plot pivot.

"I learn an enormous amount from my students," Leavitt said. "But it's necessary to be tough sometimes. If not, they won't learn anything. Inevitably though, the students do most of the teaching themselves."

Asked if he participates in the University's best-known extracurricular activity, Leavitt chuckles.

"I wouldn't go to a football game for all the tea in china," he said. "I try to avoid those crowds."

Leavitt says Gainesville is a good place to write, but his students make clear that the process has changed for him.

"It comes naturally to young writers,"

Leavitt said. "They have stories that they urgently have to tell, and the writing is almost an intuitive, natural act. The older you get, the more inventing you have to do, and the more selfconscious you become. But in some ways it's more rewarding... you have to go into your imagination." Like Andrew Holleran, who also lives near Gainesville, Leavitt has mined all levels of the gay male experience in

his novels. But his next book will be different.

"I'm getting a little tired [of those themes]," he said. "I think historically they've been a part of gay experience, but I don't think they have to be... I don't think they reflect any sort of universal truth about our lives. And the novel I'm working on now is not gay at all. Human experience is universal. There's no reason to be limited." \textbf{\textsup}

David Leavitt will attend the screening of Food of Love at Centro Ybor Muvico on Sunday, Oct. 6 at 4 PM, and will answer questions afterward.



Out of breath actor Steve Guttenberg talks about his directorial debut P.S. Your Cat is Dead. Interview by John Sullivan

Steve Guttenberg was huffing and puffing when I spoke with him via telephone last week. I knew the adorable star of films like Can't Stop the Music, Cocoon, Police Academy, Three Men and a Baby, and Short Circuit was a busy guy, but it sounded like he was sprinting all over southern California as we chatted. I kept thinking that this poor guy needs a rest.

As it turned out, though, Guttenberg, was talking to me while he was putting miles on his treadmill from the comfort of his office. While going about his daily workout routine, Guttenberg explained that despite a successful film career, his roots are in theater. That's how he decided that his first project as director/ producer/co-screenwriter and star would be an adaptation of the stage comedy/ drama P.S. Your Cat is Dead.

In the movie, Guttenberg plays Jimmy Zoole, an actor/writer/avant-garde puppeteer. On New Years Eve, Jimmy is mourning the death of his best friend, is dumped by his girlfriend, and finds out his cat has died. Before he can

WATERMARK: What made you decide to write, direct, and star in PS. Your Cat is Dead?


STEVE GUTTENBERG: I've been making movies for 25 years and I felt that it was time. That's basically it. I felt that it was time to step out and do my own production.

What about the character Jimmy Zoole appealed to you?

I thought that it was going to be a little bit of work to play that part and I was up for the challenge. I felt that he comprises some qualities that are very topical today: loneliness and the desire for control. That really is something that is so prevalent in our world today.

The circumstances that lead to Jimmy snapping are all things that could happen to anyone. Do you think that we all have that potential in us, to just go over the edge like that?

Yes. That's the meaning of the whole piece, that we are all very common that

sometimes it takes a crisis to wake us up — and Jimmy's had a crisis.

What is it that you want the audience to take away from this film?

(Laughing) That they loved this movie and that it was great and they are going to tell all of their friends!

Why do you think it took as long as it did for a film version of the novel and play to be made?

There is no explaining art and how long art takes to do. Most movies take six or seven years from the time that the idea is borne and it develops. Everything takes a lot of time; it's the natural way.



STEVE GUTTENBERG says *P.S. Your Cat is Dead* is a darkly comedic look at the crisis it sometimes takes to wake us up.

The character of Jimmy seems to be mistaken for gay at every turn. Is this something that you have to deal with? Hmm, no. Yet I think that Jimmy is questioning his sexuality, without a doubt. He's questioning a lot of things in his life.

You spent some time in the Tampa Bay

area back in the mid-80s when you were filming *Cocoon*. Do you have fond memories of your stay here?

I have many and it would be hard to describe all of them. Just I thought it was an idyllic spot. The people were great. I really, really enjoyed myself.

He played the part originally onstage in San Francisco. He was also supposed to play the part in Los Angeles but two weeks before the play opened he was murdered as he

Do you have a favorite actor you have worked with?


I don't have a favorite of the people I have worked with. They were all pretty great. I would love to work with Jessica Lange and I would love to work with Sean Penn. I think he is just such an amazing power. I would also love to work with Martin Scorcese or to have the opportunity to work with Brett Ratner, who I think makes great movies. I think I would also like to have the opportunity to work with Wynona Ryder, she's really talented. I would also like to do something that has John Williams' music on it because I think he is just a tremendous icon.

What's next for Steve Guttenberg?



naãve and have stars in their eyes," says Shafer. "The whole mystique of being more beautiful, and becoming more popular seduces them. They get so caught up with being the queen of the prom that they end up losing their income and they become crystal addicts."

This aspect of the circuit scene isn't only visible in L.A. and the other gay Meccas but also in smaller cities across America. Shafer's film shows how easy and ugly the downward spiral into drug dependency can be.

"I think it's partly because society puts such a negative spin on being gay," says Shafer. "Growing up we are always taught that being gay is bad, it's different, and it's unusual. I think drugs open us up and allow us to be more warm and loving to each other. The down side is that unfortunately they are dangerous, unhealthy, and they make you depressed."

Without trying to pass moral judgement one way or the other, Shafer's film allows us to see the circuit world from every level. From the promoters and the entertainers to the party-goers, *Circuit* shines a light on more than just the dance floor. And Shafer, who annually attends at least one circuit party, says his film is very close to the truth.

"I have connected with guys at these things and I've had a twenty-minute kiss

session without coming up for air — so I know what it can be like." Shafer says. "I wanted to tell the dark and the light side and I wanted to keep it as truthful as possible."

The cast of *Circuit* is comprised mainly of straight actors, but several gay celebs make appearances. Jim J Bullock, *Grease* director Randal Kleiser, Bruce Vilanch, and a rock hard pop singer Paul Lekakis, who shows that he still has some

boom-boom left, are all in the movie.

Although it was fairly easy to find openly gay stars to fill the supporting roles it was a bit harder to find anyone who was willing to take on the lead roles and any implications about their private lives that came with it.

"There were a few soap stars and people on series that we approached that were just so afraid of the material. They read it on the page and they can't see it," says Shafer.

Many actors who were interested in the film were afraid that if they did the movie then they would be forced to confront being gay publicly. When it came time to promote this film they would have to risk being asked the inevitable questions about their own sexuality.

"They are just too afraid to come out," Shafer says of those closeted actors. "Most of the actors that I know who are working are still too afraid of gay roles or coming out."

So casting problems aside, one has to wonder what it was like to direct gorgeous straight guys in steamy gay sex scenes. Shafer says that before he cast his leads he sat the actors down and had a rather graphic talk about what was going to be expected of them.

"I tried to scare the shit out of them up front so they would know going in not to take the part if they were going to get cold feet," says Shafer.

Shafer says that he had to choreograph *Circuit*'s love scenes in order to get what he wanted.

"I had to tell them, 'OK, now your going to lick his neck from the bottom of his collarbone all the way up to his earlobe," says Shafer. "I couldn't just say, 'Spank his tight, sweet little virgin ass! You like that, don't you?"

With *Circuit* in the can and two more movies on the way — one that he wrote

and directed for MTV and the other a gay romantic comedy — Shafer admits that his centerfold days are far behind him. "Yeah, I would like to do a re-pose like Nancy Sinatra but I'd like to wear boots of my own," he says with a laugh. "The first time that I saw a naked guy was in *Playgirl*. I always thought that being in *Playgirl* would be the ultimate compliment. That was the only magazine that mattered to me so once I did it I had no desire to do it ever again." \textstyle \te
