

DR. CHARLES CALLAHAN, Music Director

Charles Callahan is a native of Cambridge, Massachusetts, where he began his musical studies with Theodore Marier while a student at Boston Archdiocesan Choir School. While at Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia he studied under Alexander McCurdy. Following graduation from Curtis, Callahan was awarded a grant to study in Belgium with the famous composer and organist, Flor Peeters. Callahan taught at the Catholic University of America in Washington, DC where he earned his doctorate in 1978. He comes to Florida from Middlebury College in Vermont, where he was Composer in Residence and directed the Middlebury College Choir. Dr. Callahan has become one of the leading performers and composers of organ and choral music in America. His book, *The American Classic Organ*, was recently published by the Organ Historical Society. In Florida, Dr. Callahan is on the staff and is Composer in Residence at Rollins College in Winter Park. He is also organist and choir director of the Knowles Memorial Chapel at Rollins.

TERRY E. THOMAS, Accompanist

Terry was born in Little Rock, Arkansas, but grew up in Indiana and graduated with a Master's Degree in Music Education from Indiana State University. Since moving to Florida in February 1989, he has become active in the community theatre life in Orlando. He has played piano in the pit for such shows as *Oklahoma!*, *Music Man*, and *Kismet* while living in Indianapolis, and has appeared on stage as Tommy Djilas in *Music Man*, Jimmy in *The Gingerbread Lady*, and L.M. in *Pump Boys and Dinettes*.

PROGRAM NOTES

The Testament of Freedom was composed in honor of the two hundredth anniversay of the birth of Thomas Jefferson. The texts, from the writings of Mr. Jefferson, were chosen by the composer. Originally written for men's voices, the first performance was at Cabell Hall, University of Virginia, on Founder's Day, April 13, 1943. Dr. Stephen D. Tuttle conducted the University of Virginia Glee Club with the composer as accompanist. The performance was broadcast nation-wide and rebroadcast by the Office of War Information to the Armed Forces overseas. The orchestral version of the accompaniment was written shortly afterwards. Of the many performances that followed, the one that meant the most to the composer was that given by Serge Koussevitsky at Carnegie Hall in 1945. A Boston Symphony Orchestra performance has been scheduled, when news came of the death of President Roosevelt. Instead of calling off the concert, Koussevitsky insisted that the concert be given, but open to the public without charge. The program started with a moment of silence followed by the first movement of Shostakovich's Eight Symphony, the first two movements of Beethoven's Third Symphony, and The Testament of Freedom. Another moment of silence and The Star Spangled Banner completed the concert.

The first and last movements of *The Testament of Freedom* were performed by 1,400 singers as the grand finale of GALA Festival II held in Minneapolis in July, 1986. The concert was broadcast on Minnesota Public Radio.
