Women's Club in Sanford decided ⁱⁿ 1921 ^{that} this
school should have a lunchroom. It was
the first one in Seminole County. School
Bd didnt have money enough to build one
so the ladies in W.C. had some money
making projects - lake sales + a street
dance. They raised \$1,500⁰⁰. They built the
building, bought pots + pans + things to go in it.
So in 1921 we had a school lunch room
at Grammar School. (56 yrs.) Some pots are
still in the County. D didnt have glass in the
windows. They had wire screen over
the windows they had one coob. The
rest of the people ~~It was~~ who helped
came in were volunteers + worked for
free. When it got cold they couldnt
heat the building. They didnt have a stove
except the coob stove. They wore as many
clothes as they could + ran as fast as they
could to keep warm. They sold lunches
for 10¢ - Beans, slaw + a piece of
bread. (Found money)

Grammar used to satellite lunches to South Side. The cooks carried the food in the pots they cooked them in a Model T. food to Southside & served lunch. Then SS got a kitchen & the building on Palmetto (now the Textbook Bldg.) After SS got a kitchen, students from Sanford High School walked to Grammar for lunch. They had an hour. That didn't work too well. High S. students slipped off downtown to drug store to get a cherry coke & dill pickle. So they started transporting the food from Grammar to Sanford High School. After a yr. or 2 they got a kitchen. Grammar then satellite food to Westside. (Got kitchen) For many years each prepared own food. In 1969 closed down West side kitchen & Grammar School started satelliting West side again. Satellite goes back to 1922. First production center was Sanford Grammar. Most schools had an hour for lunch & some went home. After lunch children had time to play.
