Evidently these implements had been used to batter the lock, the handle of which was driven through the door against the inner lining making it impossible to open the safe.

WATCH TANGERINE AND YOUNG TREES FOR APHIDS

The citrus aphid has not yet recovered from the setback received during the freezes of January, but it is increasing rapidly and is to be found generally distributed on young growth, says J. R. Watson, entomo-logist of the Florida Experiment Station. The first flush on most Station. The first flush on most orange trees is now out of danger. But indications are that many tangerines are going to suffer damage unless control measures are taken. Aphids are now producing winged ones in large numbers, which means that they are going to fly around a great deal, so that growers who have had no aphids up to the present time are liable to find trees infested from surrounding groves. Tangerines on which the growth has not yet hard-ened are liable to receive damage as the aphids will fly to them from hardening oranges.

Young trees severely damaged by the cold also should be carefully protected from aphids. Such trees probably will have no resting period in the spring, but there will be more or less young growth on some trees or less young grown on some cross at all times. If the small amount of growth which they may be able to put out since the freeze should be allowed to be stunted by the aphids, the resulting shock would be hard on the trees. It may result in the death of many of them

No form of publicity costs so little in proportion to service performed as newspaper advertising.

The weekly newspaper is entitled to a higher rate per thousand than the daily occause its life is seven days instead of one, and because of the intimate character of its circula-

These are two points made by C. Olmstead, city editor of the Aledo (Ill.) Times Record, who is con-vinced that the weekly home newspaper has outstanding advantages as an advertising medium.

"To reach as many readers by any other method costs more for postage or delivery alone than the entire cost of newspaper advertis-ing," says Mr. Olmstead.

Mr. Olnistead does not believe the value of advertising in a weekly newspaper should be assayed on the

basis of circulation alone. He says: "Advertising in a weekly newspa-per is part of an interesting news per is part of an interesting new-carrier that talks about familiar peo-ple, tells of local doings in the coun-ty, and retains its vitality and pull-ing power for seven days—until the next issue replaces it in the public

"The advertiser buys good will as vell as inches. Space plus prestige of the newspaper means greater value to the advertiser. Space without prestige means a handbill.

"Successful advertisers study advertising values. They know that the local weekly newspaper—if it is a real one in the test of community service—is read with confidence and interest in the home. Its readers know that they can depend on it for correct news service, entertaining features, and advertising information that relates to their needs.

Of the \$720,000,000 worth of advirtising carried by newspapers in 1925, it is significant, Mr. Olmstead points out, that two-thirds of this, a half billion dollars, went into local newspapers as against one-third spent in national publications.

"Statistics of newspaper produc tion show an average daily circula-tion of about 34 millions, and an average weekly circulation of approximately 44 millions. The total circulation of weekly newspapers in one week, is therefore, greater than the total daily circulation in any one concludes Mr. Olmstead.
