C. of C. Dues Should Be Paid

MAITLAND CHAMBER OF COM-MERCE SEEKS INCREASED MEMBERSHIP

Chamber of Commerce fiscal years generally run with the calendar year January is the time when dues should be paid and new memberships taken out. The secretary of the Maitland Chamber of Commerce is asking every old member to renew his mem-bership and those who have not been members to come in to the organiza-tion at the beginning of this year.

This action is in line with that re-cently taken by both Orlando and Winter Park. Orlando is undertaking a drive for 4000 members with a mema drive for 4000 members with a mem-bership fee of \$25.00, which will bring in \$100,000.00. Winter Park last week organized to obtain 500 members with a fee of \$15.00 each, a total of \$7,500.00, and Winter Park usually gets what it starts out for.

Maitland has not yet set a goal, but the fees are only \$10.00 for men and \$5.00 for women, so that a hundred members, equally divided, would bring in \$750.00. This would go far toward paying up the bills incurred for pamphlets and the building, both of which belong to the coming year's budget as they were completed only at the end of the past year, and for running expenses during this year. Those intending to join are asked if possible to do so before the annual meeting so that the new officers can start with a clean slate and devote their energies to constructive work, not their energies to constructive work, not to raising money to pay up back debts.

This thing will be discovered by any careful investigator: That Florida has wide awake merchants; they know how to buy and they know how to sell. They are stocked up heavily and they are making low prices to move the goods. They make a small profit on individual sales but the large turnover takes care of that situation.

The one item in which there was found room for complaint was fuel; it was thought that the price charged for wood was greatly out of propor-tion to other household essentials. And this is true, even though the city surrounded by wood and most of that offered in the market is from waste timber of the forests.

Food for Thought

In citrus growing, the cost of plowing, cultivating, spraying, pruning, and incidentals are not subject to much variation from year to year, when computed on a per acre basis. The average cost per box. however, varies greatly with the size of the crop. A large crop means a cheap crop per box; a small crop shows a high cost of production per box. If you double the cost and the work done in any of the above cultural operations, you will not greatly increase your crop per acre, nor will you decrease your cost per box. Fertilizer is the only factor, on well drained groves, which will greatly increase your crop and materially reduce your cost of production per box. It costs practically no more for labor to apply fertilizer heavily; other costs per acre remain about the same when the fertilizer is increased. Under heavy fertilization, the big difference shows up in the low cost per box, and the big volume of business done at a maximum profit per box.
