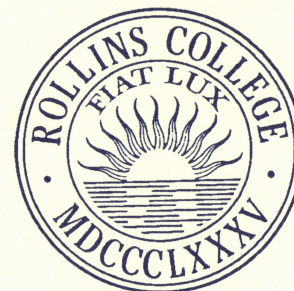

The Orlando Gay Chorus is a member of GALA Choruses, an international alliance of men's, women's and mixed choruses dedicated to providing leadership and inspiration to the lesbian and gay choral movement through excellence in the choral arts. GALA produces a choral festival every three years; OGC is already in rehearsal for the one to be held in Denver, Colorado in July 1992!

OGC was founded in January 1990 with David Schuler as the founding President and Charles Callahan as founding music director. Incorporated as a non-profit, cultural and educational organization, OGC is also licensed by ASCAP (the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers).

The Chorus wishes to express its deepest appreciation to the College community for its encouragement and support in the use of rehearsal facilities. The Knowles Memorial Chapel, the gift of Mrs. Frances Knowles Warren of Boston, was designed by the noted architect, Ralph Adams Cram and dedicated in 1932. The organ was built by the AEolian-Skinner Organ Company of Boston and contains five divisions, sixty-eight ranks of pipes and numbering over four thousand pipes in all.
