NEW FRUIT MARKETING COMPANY ORGANIZED

Announcement has been made of the organization of the Ruby Lake Grove Fruit Company for the marketing of citrus fruit, under the management of Forrest B. Stone. All fruit handled by this company will be specially selected choice fruit and will be shipped direct to the consumer. The business will be conducted by mail order, circulars being sent to a selected list of customers.

A special feature of this business is the sending of gift boxes, which will receive particular care in order that they may prove acceptable gifts. The local people are specially invited to use this means of sending their friends in the North a gift which will be characteristic of Florida.

This business is an outgrowth and enlargement of the shipping business which Mr. Stone has carried on so successfully for several years. Two years ago his business grew to such proportions that he had to enlarge his packing house and install new and modern equipment. Last season his output was several thousand boxes.

Associated with Mr. Stone in the Ruby Lake Grove Fruit Co. are Anna B. Treat, J. H. Hill and S. B. Hill, Jr. Miss Treat, who for several years carried on a successful marmalade and fruit business and is familiar with the detail of a mail order business, is secretary-treasurer, and will take charge of the office work. J. H. Hill and S. B. Hill, Jr., are citrus growers and understand groves and fruit.

It is the intention of the company to develop this business until it has become one of the chief enterprises of Maitland.

NEW TOWN MAP BEING COMPILED

A new town map giving accurate location of all lakes and roads, including those in the new subdivision which have never been shown on any map, is being drawn up by the Town Engineer. The engineer already has on hand all data on section lines except that on the southern boundary of the town, and this will be of great assistance in expediting the completion of the map and reducing the expense.

Another factor which is of incalculable value from the standpoint of both accuracy and economy is the airplane map which was made for the town last spring. By the use of this map it is possible to obtain the accurate outlines of lakes which have never been correctly surveyed and which could other wise be surveyed only in a laborious and expensive manner. By the use of this map it is also possible to locate swamps, land under cultivation, groves, and other topographical and agricultural features.

The taking of airplane maps is developing into a distinct art. The pioneer work along this line was done by the army and navy as it was too expensive for commercial experiment, but it has now reached the point where it can be profitably carried on as a business proposition, and is being used extensively. In a recent number of the Geographic there is a



These airplane maps are taken under the same principle as that used in motion pictures, and the scale is worked out by a combination of the height of the plane and the size of the lens used. The land is divided by control points, the planes flying back and forth between these points. The pictures overlap sufficiently so that most points are covered twice. After they are completed they are cut up and assembled like a jig saw puzzle and when the picture is complete it is re-photographed. The overlaps and controls render any possibility of error practically nil.

FINAL ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE HALLOWE'EN FROLIC


