

Crisis Grows In Rhodesia

In a symbolic attempt at compromise last August, the black and white leaders of Rhodesia held a dramatic meeting in a railway car on the Victoria Falls Bridge, exactly on the border between black-ruled Zambia and white-ruled Rhodesia. It was the fourth such attempt since Rhodesia declared its independence from Britain 10 years ago to write a constitution that would be based on black majority rule in Rhodesia.

The Victoria Falls Bridge meeting was strongly supported by the leaders of South Africa which also is facing great pressure from the tide of black nationalism sweeping Africa. South African Premier John Vorster believes that the alternative to compromise between blacks and whites in Africa could be an all-out racial conflict.

The Communist takeover of Angola prompted the United States and Britain to bring matters to a head with Rhodesia. Militarily, Rhodesia's whites are a fragile reed before the thousands of black Marxist guerrillas surrounding the landlocked nation — guerrillas trained and armed by the Soviet Union and Communist China. And the 12,000 or so Cuban mercenaries who conquered Angola for the Communists still are poised there, ready to strike into Southwest Africa, or Namibia, South Africa and Rhodesia.

That isn't enough trouble, Rhodesia faces an equally grave problem on the east with the declaration by Mozambique that it is cutting off Mr. Smith's economic lifeline to the sea and all but openly declaring war on Rhodesia.

Leniency Hampering Enforcement

Life imitates art, they say, and that caper dubbed "The Sting" pulled off the other day by a group of crooks, estimated to be worth more than \$24 million, included television sets, kitchen appliances, automobiles, credit cards, government checks and equipment and even an electrocardiogram machine stolen piece by piece from Prince George's County Hospital.

To celebrate the enterprise's success and to show their appreciation, the phony fences threw a party to which they invited all their friends. Then came "the sting" — the arrest of 108 persons and issuing of warrants for 75 more. It was the biggest such roundup in FBI and District of Columbia history.

Of the 106 arrested at the party, 70 had previously been arrested and charged with similar crimes — some of them repeatedly, and 21 were out on parole following convictions. One man had been arrested at least six times for burglary, forgery and other crimes, and in each instance had been released without bond.

Meeting Slated To Hire Planner

WINTER SPRINGS — A special meeting of the city council for the purpose of hiring a city planner has been called for 4 p.m. Thursday at City Hall by Mayor Troy Palmer.

A variance request by Jon Zabel to allow construction in the Ranchlands of homes with less square footage than called for in the ordinance was referred to the Planning and Zoning Commission Monday night after raising several questions.

At the meeting, the commission was told that the variance was requested because of the economic situation. Massey said he thought it would be better to apply for the zoning law which should be corrected, because it says in

one place a variance request should be made to the council and in another it states the request should be made to the P&Z Board.

The property in question, zoned Residential (R-1A), is bounded on the south side by Saltfish Road. Zabel said his firm was interested in building well constructed houses with a minimum of 850 square feet. Some would be two-bedroom, but the majority would be three or four-bedroom, with lots averaging one-third acre.

A Ranchlands resident Sam Musgrove commented the square footage was secondary, but to downgrade zoning would be to defeat the original purpose of the zoning. He said with a possibility of creating a new slum area.

Another resident, Robert Anderson, said, "He needs a change of zoning not a variance. He wants R-1 instead of R-1A."

Zabel said he felt zoning is not in the best interest of the area.

Altamonte Grants Taxi Cab Permits

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — The city commission Tuesday night granted permits to the taxi cab Co. to operate 12 taxis in the community and began the procedures necessary to issue permits for taxi-cabs.

The action took place after a hearing in which attorney David Cunningham, representing Safety Cab Co. owner, J. T. Ellis, said that in the first 21 days of March, the firm had received 705 requests for service from the Altamonte area.

Ellis also presented a petition signed on behalf of Safety Cab by 31 apartment complexes and business houses in the community urging the commissioners to approve the permit request.

The commission agreed to amend its current ordinance to reduce annual permit renewal fees from \$300 to \$100 for the first four cabs in operation with a \$10 fee for each cab thereafter.

County Park, Zoo To Get Workers

The Central Florida Zoo and Red Bug Park got an unexpected boost with Seminole County Commission approval Tuesday of a plan to use \$50,000 in federal funds to hire workers at both sites.

The financially-strapped zoo would get 20 workers to help on construction projects through June 30, and the park would receive an additional 20 employees to help out there.

Leasing Ordinance Suggested

LAKE MARY — An ordinance establishing a new zoning classification to permit a mixture of leased and privately-owned lots in mobile home parks was recommended for adoption by the city's planning and zoning commission Tuesday night.

The 20 workers slated for the zoo would be utilized to help meet a June deadline for completion of construction projects designated in a \$100,000 state grant, including a boardwalk through the cypress swamp surrounding the zoo.

County Park, Zoo To Get Workers

The city's only other mobile home zoning ordinance (RM2) permits only leased lots.

The 20 additional helpers at Red Bug Park would speed up the construction process, enabling the first phase of the park to open sometime this summer.
