Commission tables Lynx funding proposal

SANFORD — Fallout from a taxpayer financed trip to Las Vegas continues to damage Lynx, Central Florida's regional transportation agency.

Monday night, Sanford City Commissioners tabled an agenda item to give Lynx \$180,000 for the current fiscal year. The commission wants to see the results of an investigation by Orange County regarding the trip.

A local television station, WKMG

Channel 6, followed nearly two dozen Lynx employees and board members to Las Vegas last month. Agency officials purportedly made the trip to attend a national transit conference, however, WKMG reporters filmed several Lynx officials gambling and drinking at the same time they were supposed to attend scheduled seminars.

The agency has drawn criticism for that footage. In addition, Lynx has been criticized for sending more people to the conference than Miami, Tampa, Jacksonville combined.

The funding proposal was part of Sanford's consent agenda, a portion of the meeting that deals with routine matters that require commissioners' approval and

usually generates little comment.

Mayor Brady Lessard pulled the item from the consent agenda and asked commissioners to table the matter.

"I think all of the Lynx funding partners need to get a grasp on what's going on with the agency," Lessard said. "Sanford needs to be convinced that Lynx is using our taxpayers' dollars in a wise manner."

Lessard wouldn't not speculate about whether the city would withhold part or **See Lynx, Page 7A**

County approves drainage project

With a unanimous decision, the Seminole County Commission Tuesday approved going forward with a drainage project at Lockhart-Smith Canal.

The canal is located in north-west Seminole County, north of SR-46 off Oregon Avenue. The primary canal system, originally constructed in 1930, provides drainage of more than 12 square miles of the northwestern part of the county.

The city staff stressed the importance of making improvements, as the canal has not been maintained in approximately 50 years. Since it was dug, new growth has forced additional drainage in the canal - namely the Seminole Towne Center mall, nearby businesses and residential areas.

Photographs of the present area presented to the commissioners revealed a number of trees, killed by occasional high water, having fallen into the canal, along with debris, further restricting the flow of water.

Proposed work is to reconstruct the channel, stabilize the banks and reduce the potential for flooding. Also, in the past, because of privately owned property, the county has not had access for regular maintenance.

The total length of the property to be improved is nearly 10 miles. According to plans of the canal, at the present time, it is supposed to be approximately 50 feet wide. With all of the debris and dead trees however, it is generally much smaller.

Mark Flomerfelt, manager of Road Operations and Stormwater for the County explained that the proposal calls for widening the present canal after debris has been removed, to as much as 100 feet. This would be a 60 foot wide canal with 20 feet low run-off areas on each side. The widening would also require a number of present trees to be removed or relocated.

"We're going to need to obtain easements from the property owners," he observed. "Property owners apparently aren't going to give us any land but they are willing to sell it to the county." According to the estimated

Residents encouraged to 'light up' for contest

Sanford Historic Trust wants residents to start getting into the holiday spirit.

The organization is once again sponsoring the Holiday Home Lighting Contest. From Dec. 2 through Dec. 5, judges will be roaming the streets of Sanford looking for the best holiday decorations.

"The Trust has sponsored the contest for the past several years," said Trust board member Mike "Gordy" Knipfer. "We try to get people to decorate their homes before the beginning of the annual Holiday Tour of Homes."

The contest is open to all Sanford residents, Knipfer said. To participate in the contest, however, people need to fill out an entry form before Monday, Dec. 2, so the judges know where to go.

There will be five categories in this year's contest, including Best Overall Display, Traditional Display, Unusual Display, Number of Lights and Best Block. Prizes will be awarded to the winners in each category.

There is no entry fee for the contest, Knipfer said. A property may only win once in a three-year period in order to allow others the opportunity to be recognized for their efforts. You may be a "block" winner one year and "resident" winner a different year.

"The contest really helps people get into the holiday spirit," Knipfer said. "And, it shows everybody, especially visitors to the area, what a nice community Sanford is."

The contest is being held in conjunction with Sanford's 14th annual Holiday Tour of Homes, which is scheduled for Dec. 6 through Dec. 8. The event is a walking tour of 14 structures centered on Magnolia and Park avenues. This year, the event will also celebrate the 125th birthday of Sanford.

New lights allow Paw Park to stay open longer

SANFORD — Things are just a little bit brighter at Paw Park.

Through a collaboration between the city and Friends of Our Paw Park, lights were recently installed at the dog park. As a result, the facility will now close at 8 p.m. nightly, giving visitors and their canine friends additional time to spend at the park.

"The lights have been very well accepted," said Mike "Gordy" Knipfer, chairman of Friends of Our Paw Park. "Not only do people have more time to spend at the park, the lights also make it safer for

them. "We keep a dog log at the park where people can make comments and requests," he said. "Installing lights was one of the biggest requests made by visitors."

The \$25,000 lighting project was financed mostly through the city, Knipfer said. However, a small portion was paid through donations raised by Friends of Our Paw Park, a group of Sanford residents who worked with the city to co-found the park.

Friends of Our Paw Park formed the concept of an off-leash dog park in May 2000. With the support and approval of City Commission, which budgeted

\$15,000 of the \$25,000 needed to complete the initial stage of the park, the canine exercise area officially opened on May 5, 2001. The park is currently maintained by the city of Sanford Parks Department.

The area was a city park long before becoming a favorite hang out for dogs. In 1886, Jaycee Park was built in the location that borders Sanford's historic downtown district. The park, however, slowly deteriorated through the years and became the hot spot for vagrants, prostitutes and drug dealers and was littered with broken glass, trash and other debris.

All that changed when Paw Park was

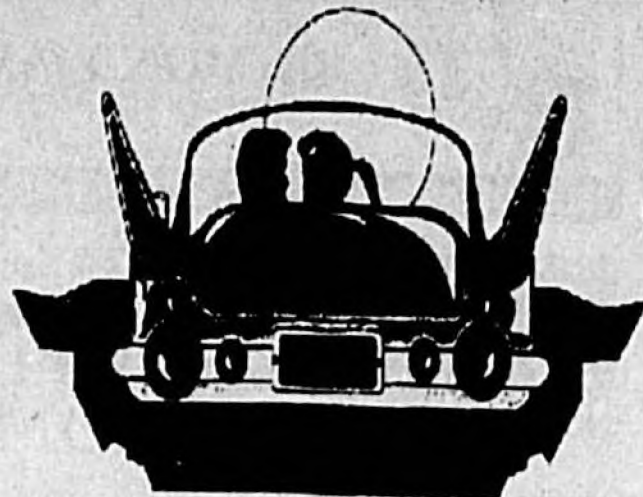

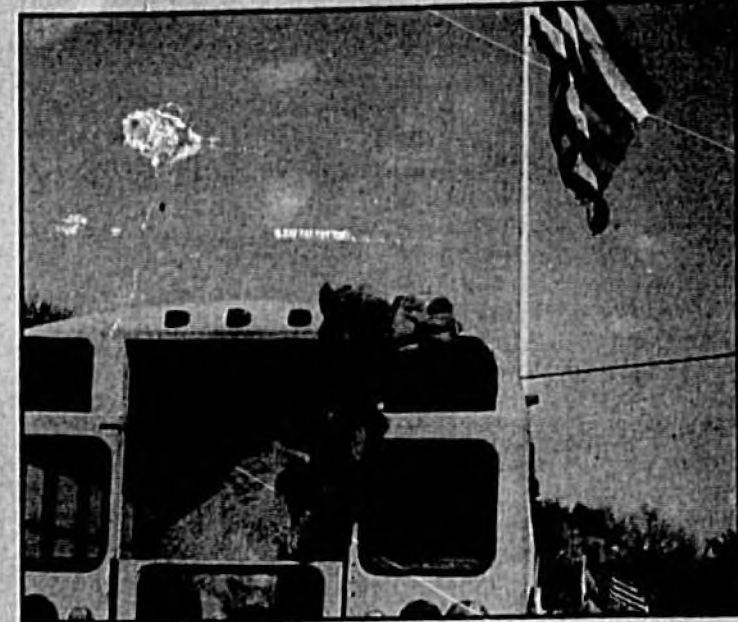

created. Today, the site is the home of ornamental fencing, self watering bowls, doggie showers, racks for pooper scooper supplies, fire hydrants, double entrance safety gates, a community bulletin board and a special fenced section for toy and small breeds. Kripfer said the city and park volunteers worked with contractors to make sure the lights fit into the historic aspect of the downtown area.
"We wanted something that would work with downtown," he said. "The lights really add elegance to the park and surrounding area."
Now that Phase II is complete, attention is turning toward additional amenities, Kripfer said. Future plans for the facility include the construction of restrooms for park visitors.
"Paw Park is definitely growing and increasingly becoming more popular," he said. "I've even had people from other cities that are planning to build parks of their own call me to ask about our park. It's amazing."

project cost listing, easement acquisition of approximately 7.7 acres might cost the county between \$450,000 and \$900,000. The memorandum of understanding includes a clause that convey about 1 acre of city-

owned land to Suncor for the project. Once on the tax rolls, the property would generate about \$110,000 in annual property tax.
If Suncor fails to develop the property, the land would revert back to city ownership.
"I'm glad to see this coming," said Commissioner Randy Jones. "Hopefully this will kick off very many private dollars coming to Sanford for investment."
• Ratified the selection of

Larry Strickler as chairman of the Sanford Downtown Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) and Bob Parsell as vice chairman. Strickler and Parsell were chosen by the five-member board to lead the CRA.
Commissioners also authorized the CRA to spend \$39,740 for a marina permitting work order, which will provide the board with all the necessary research and an action plan to expand the city's marina.



Officers charge St. Augustine man with violations

OCALA — Officers of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) charged a St. Augustine man early Tuesday with two commercial fisheries violations in Flagler County.

Officer Tim Matthews charged Joseph H. Bush, (DOB 4-14-62), of St. Augustine, with transporting clams at night, and possession of untagged clams, both misdemeanor violations which each carry a penalty of up to a \$500 fine and/or up to 60 days in jail.

Officers seized approximately 350 pounds of clams from Bush's commercial fishing boat at about 5:30 a.m., Tuesday at Bing's Landing. Commercial clambers are required to tag the clams they harvest with information on where the clams were harvested. This information helps to ensure quality control since the wholesalers purchasing the clams will know that they were harvested from open sites, and not areas closed to harvest.

The charges resulted from a special enforcement detail FWC officers worked in response to numerous complaints reported in the area.

Anyone who sees someone violating any fish or wildlife law should report it to the FWC through its toll-free, 24-hour, Wildlife Alert Hotline at 1-888-404-FWCC. Callers can remain anonymous and may be eligible for a reward if their information leads to an arrest.

The Wildlife Alert program began in 1979 under the former Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission (GFC). Since then, the program has paid out more than \$300,000 in rewards and resulted in 20,000 arrests. Wildlife Alert rewards are paid through additional fines that are imposed by judges on those who have been convicted of violating fish and wildlife laws.

FORT MCCOY MAN FACING ILLEGAL FISH CHARGES

Officer Ben Eason stopped to check out a man and woman who were arguing in a vehicle parked at Highway 19 and Rodman Road in Putnam County Tuesday, and found more in the truck than two people engaged in animated conversation.

Eason, a law enforcement officer with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC), asked the two what was going on, and decided they were having nothing more than a verbal argument. However, during the course of the stop, Eason noticed three coolers in the back of the man's truck. The man told him they contained fish and he was free to take a look.

What Eason discovered was a number of saltwater fish, many of which were illegal to possess. With the assistance of Officer Chad Albritton and Sgt. Ben Allen, also of the FWC, Eason examined all of the fish in the coolers and wrote the man citations for several violations.

Lake Mary, Oviedo at home for first round

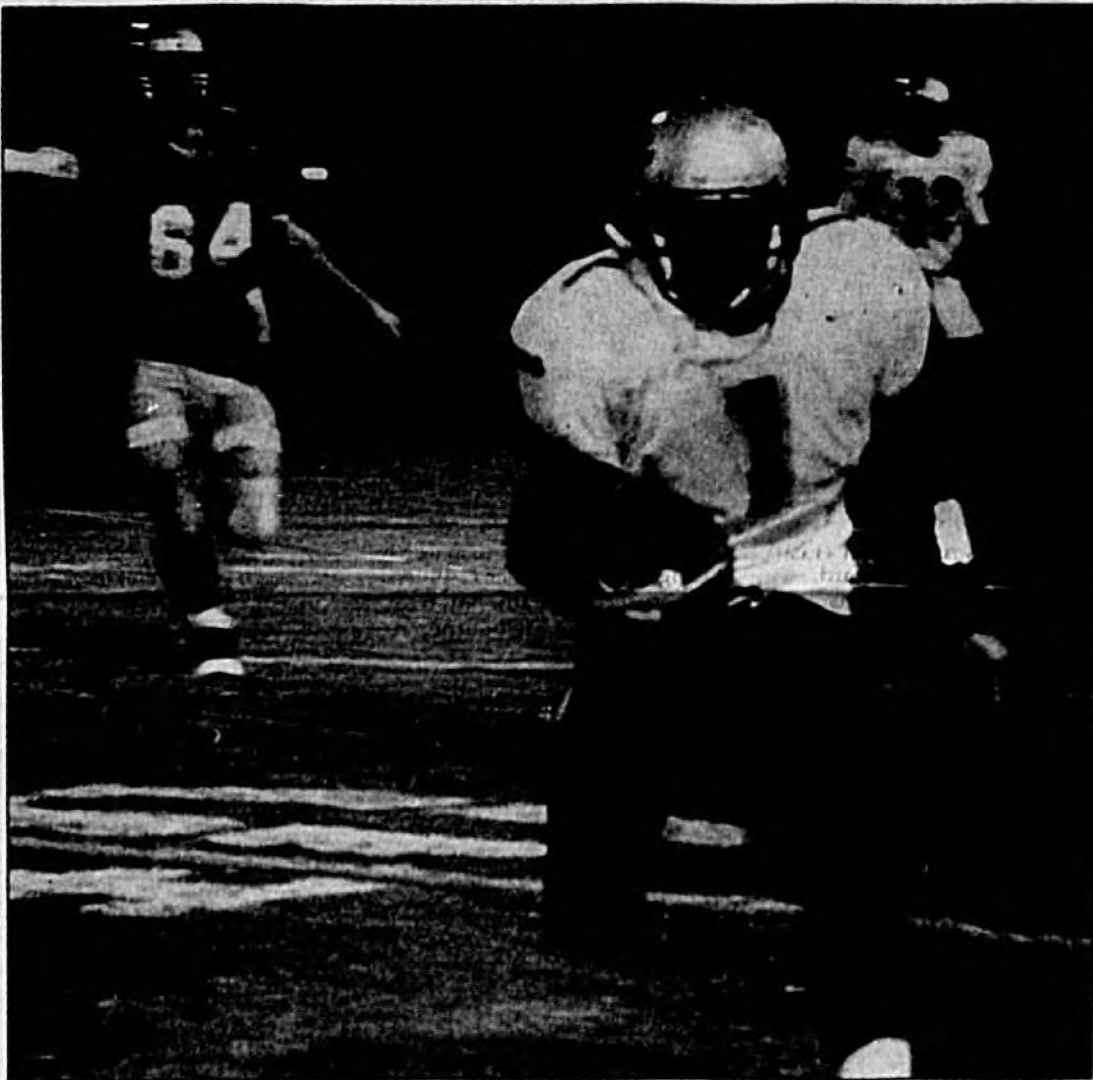

Preliminaries are at 9 a.m. with diving at 10 a.m. and the finals are at 5 p.m.

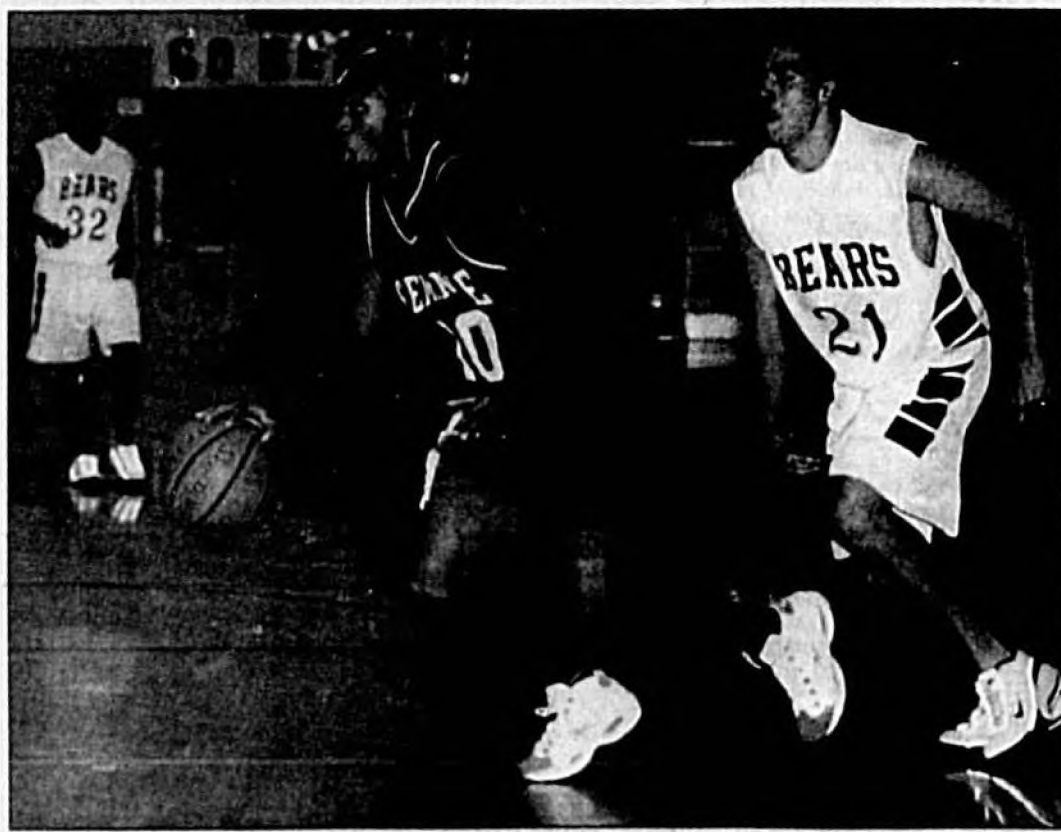

Knipfer said the city and park volunteers worked with contractors to make sure the lights fit into the historic aspect of the downtown area.
"We wanted something that would work with downtown," he said. "The lights really add elegance to the park and surrounding area."
Now that Phase II is complete, attention is turning toward additional amenities, Knipfer said. Future plans for the facility include the construction of restrooms for park visitors.
"Paw Park is definitely growing and increasingly becoming more popular," he said. "I've even had people from other cities that are planning to build parks of their own call me to ask about our park. It's amazing."

The memorandum of understanding includes a clause that convey about 1 acre of city-

owned land to Suncor for the project. Once on the tax rolls, the property would generate about \$110,000 in annual property tax.

If Suncor fails to develop the property, the land would revert back to city ownership.

"I'm glad to see this coming," said Commissioner Randy Jones. "Hopefully this will kick off very many private dollars coming to Sanford for investment."

• Ratified the selection of

Larry Strickler as chairman of the Sanford Downtown Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) and Bob Parsell as vice chairman. Strickler and Parsell were chosen by the five-member board to lead the CRA.

Commissioners also authorized the CRA to spend \$39,740 for a marina permitting work order, which will provide the board with all the necessary research and an action plan to expand the city's marina.



UCF stampedes the Bulls for Conference road win



Quarterback Ryan Schneider (No. 17) threw a career high five touchdown passes and ran for another as UCF was able to pull away from Buffalo and go on to a 45-21 victory at Buffalo Stadium Saturday afternoon.

BUFFALO, N.Y. — Ryan Schneider threw a career high five touchdown passes and ran for another, as UCF was able to pull away from Buffalo and go on to a 45-21 victory at Buffalo Stadium Saturday afternoon.

Schneider's three scoring passes in the second half was part of a 31-point outburst in the second stanza that finally allowed UCF some breathing room before putting the Bulls away.

After carrying a 14-7 lead into the half, the Golden Knights (4-5, 3-2) got off to a shaky start in the third quarter as Schneider was picked off on the opening drive by Kevin Conception who returned the ball 48 yards to the UCF three-yard line. The Bulls (1-9, 0-6) capitalized immediately as tailback Aaron Leeper scored his third touchdown of the game on their first play from scrimmage to draw Buffalo even at 14.

The Buffalo lead was short-lived however as the Golden Knights tied the game just 1:55 later as Schneider threw his third scoring strike of the game to Luther Huggins from eight yards out to again knot the score, this time at 21 all.

On the very next drive, the UCF defense stepped up as free safety Peter Sands picked off Buffalo quarterback Randall Secky and returned the ball 50 yards to the Bulls 12-yard line. Two plays later Schneider connected with tight end Michael Gaines on a 14-yard screen pass, giving the lead back to UCF, 28-21.

The Golden Knights got on the board again

with a Matt Prater 43-yard field goal, before Schneider hit receiver Doug Gabriel from 28 yards for his fifth and final scoring strike. Schneider capped off the UCF scoring with a one-yard plunge with 3:26 left in the game.

UCF opened the scoring on just their first drive when Schneider hit Jimmy Fryzel from 10 yards out. The drive was set up after the Golden Knights defense held the Bulls to a three-and-out on their first possession and after the punt got the ball back on the Buffalo 40-yard line. The first play of the UCF defensive series saw linebacker Chris Pilinko sack Secky, one of five on the day for UCF.

The Bulls closed out the scoring in the first quarter as they put together a 15-play, 80-yard drive that was capped off by a Leeper two-yard run.

Schneider's second scoring strike of the first half went to Sean Gaudion, who caught his second career TD pass from four yards out.

Schneider finished the day hitting 25 of 42 passes for 360 yards and two interceptions to go with his five TD's and on Monday was named the MAC's East Division Offensive Player of the Week, the third Golden Knight to be so honored this season. The five TD strikes give him 22 on the season, which is a new career high, with three games remaining. His 360 yards enabled him to become just the third UCF quarterback to reach 8,000 yards for a career. Coupled with his 440-yard performance against Syracuse two weeks

Venters finally ended the shutout and capped off his super senior season and excellent career with a one-yard touchdown run in the fourth period. The southpaw also added the two-point conversion on a run.

Oviedo, meanwhile, made its Homecoming a successful one, and knocked off a fellow playoff participant, with a 21-12 victory over Winter Park.

The Lions were protecting a 7-5 lead in the third quarter when Jason Raulerson, who plays wide receiver and defensive back when he's not returning kicks, took a punt from Bill Robertson at the Wildcats 49-yard line and returned it for a touchdown with 5:50 left in the period.

Then, after Matt Coley had sliced the lead to 14-12 for Winter Park (7-3) and the 6A-District 3 champions with a 31-yard touchdown run, Raulerson teamed with quarterback Lee Sloan on a game-clinching 41-yard touchdown pass play to open the fourth quarter.

Raulerson finished with four catches — the only four complete passes the Lions had all night — for 110 yards, one rushing attempt for 39 yards, and 73 return yards.

Will Harrison led the Lions with 79 yards rushing on 11 carries while Howard Lingard, who had two touchdowns called back on penalties, rushed for 62 yards on 14 attempts.

In other games: Chris Naresian capped his career with his best game since transferring to Winter Springs. The Bears wide receiver had his first touchdown catch of the season and the first touchdown pass of his career to lead the hosts to a 20-13 victory against his former school, neighborhood rival Lake Howell.

With the score tied at 7-7 late in the first half, Garcia threw a lateral to Naresian, who then threw a 33-yard touchdown pass to a wide-open Matt Marshall and Winter Springs never gave up the lead again.

Naresian, who has committed orally to UCF, finished the game with four catches for 63 yards and the season with 25

catches for 433 yards. Senior Vernard Moore led Winter Springs (4-6) in rushing with 62 yards on 10 carries, and junior quarterback Jacob Garcia completed nine-of-15 passes for 122 yards.

Lake Howell (1-9) was led by senior running back Tyler Sommer, who had 58 yards on six carries, including a 48-yard touchdown run.

Lyman closed out what had could have been a good season riddled by injuries with a 28-20 victory over Olympia at the Carlton D. Henley Sports Complex.

Senior quarterback Victor Johnson suffered all season with an ankle injury suffered in the opening game of the season at Boone and the Greyhounds struggled to a 3-7 record. Olympia finished the season 1-9.

KREMER, DETWEILER BIG WINNERS AT 3RD ANNUAL LAKE TOHO

Kremer's total barely surpassed the 15.90 lbs. brought in by Glenn Browne of Ocala. Jacksonville's Peter Thilverous finished third in the competition with a total of 15.86 lbs.

Browne pocketed \$11,000, while Thilverous took home \$6,700 that included a bonus for the day's largest bass.

Only the top 20 fishermen from an original field of 68 competed in the finals of the three-day tournament.

Orlando's Mark Detweiler garnered top honors among the amateurs competing in the same boat with the pros. His haul of five fish topped the scales at 13.15 lbs, good enough to beat out Altamonte Springs' Kenneth Doyle, whose sack weighed in at 12.10 lbs.

For his efforts, Detweiler is \$10,000 richer; Doyle earned \$3,000 for runner-up. Third in the amateur competition was Ocala's Randy Busboom.

The Lake Toho Pro-Am is hosted annually by Kissimmee-St. Cloud professional Terry Segraves. The competition is one of the featured events of the Anglers Challenge and the AquaMania weekend festival celebrating the area's lakes and

natural resources. Some of the same competing pros will participate in the Angling Against Cancer Benefit dinner and tournament that wraps up tomorrow at the Kissimmee Lakefront.

WOMEN'S SOCCER TO BATTLE AUBURN FRIDAY IN THE NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS

The UCF women's soccer team (18-4-0) will face Auburn in the first round of the 2002 NCAA Women's Soccer Championships in Tallahassee Friday at 4:30 p.m. The Golden Knights are also in the same regional in Tallahassee with Ole Miss and Florida State. The Seminoles and Rebels meet Friday at 7 p.m.

UCF is a perfect 3-0 all-time vs. the Tigers. UCF will be making its eighth appearance in the NCAA Championships this weekend. The Golden Knights have made the Final Four twice in school history during the 1982 campaign and in 1987.

This season's NCAA Appearance is also the third in four years under current head coach Amanda Cromwell. In 2001, UCF lost in the first round to Florida 4-0 in Gainesville. In 1999, UCF defeated Furman 1-0 in the first round of the NCAA Championships before losing to No. 3 North Carolina 8-0 in the second round.

The match with the Tigers will also mark the first time that current Auburn coach Karen Richter faces her alma mater. Richter was a stand-out goalkeeper for UCF from 1987-90 and later was an assistant coach at UCF from 1991-92 and the head coach from 1993-98 before leaving to take the reigns at Auburn. In six seasons in Orlando as the head coach, Richter was 64-44-9 at the controls.

Auburn, which is receiving votes in the Soccerbuzz.com and NSCAA Coaches Top 25 polls, was the No. 1 seed entering the SEC Tournament before losing to the No. 8 seed LSU, 1-0.

UCF looks to continue its best season in school history Friday vs. the Tigers. The Golden Knights are 18-4-0 overall, the most wins in single-season history. The Golden Knights are fresh off their eighth A-Sun Championship after a 3-2 win over Jacksonville Saturday.

The winner of the UCF-Auburn match will face the Ole Miss/Florida State winner Sunday at 1 p.m. in Tallahassee.
