Restricting Investments

The suggestion that may be compelled by law to spend three-fourths of their income, admittedly will work no hardship on the vast majority...

With few exceptions, exceptions which are usually characterized as "loopholes," everyone spends all, or nearly all, of his income...

Suppose, for instance, that the law should provide that a man must spend 75 percent of his income on his food, clothes, household furnishings and other ordinary living expenses...

We believe a certain Mr. Brewster demonstrated the difficulties involved in spending a million a year in a well known work of art known as "Brewster's Millions."

What they have spent their surplus incomes on in the past has been largely such intangibles as stocks, bonds, real estate and mortgages...

As we get it, this "proposed" law would prohibit the spending of income for such purposes as these, except in so far as they could be financed out of 25 percent of one's income...

It is difficult to imagine what the government would do for money if persons with larger incomes than they need were required by law not to invest them in government bonds but rather to spend them on themselves...

It seems to us it would be better to encourage people to spend more of their money on construction and development than to pass a law compelling them to spend 75 percent of their incomes on themselves.

Take That Vacation

There was at least one part of President Roosevelt's speech the other night which we feel sure will appeal particularly to the tired business man...

It is equally true that everyone who has been working hard during the past few years should try to get a little rest and relaxation in some convenient resort...

One should not neglect these vacations too long. A person who is working hard does not realize the extent to which his vitality is being sapped until he falls prey to some illness...

WHY A COMMUNITY NEWSPAPER PLANT CITY COURIER

Theodore Roosevelt was once asked, during a friendly discussion of relative value, to name three things which he would consider most essential to his welfare should he be marooned on an uninhabited island...

The fact that his home-town newspaper came second in importance to his family speaks volumes for that institution and it is not altogether strange that a person with Roosevelt's perception of values should make this choice...

The community newspaper is essentially a serial, history, and geography, newspaper, of the people who live in the territory which it covers...

By close adherence to a policy which is dictated by a philosophy peculiar to rural society, the community newspaper has come to be regarded as an indispensable part of the rural civic plan...

Price Fixing Is Modified By Roosevelt

The order has tremendous potentialities. It was issued only after the President had received reports from various government departments of the difficulty in obtaining materials because of uniform bids submitted by the various companies interested...

It was to torpedo this impulse that the President stepped boldly into the picture.

The effect of the order would be this: An automobile manufacturer who is a member of the NRA and subject to code authority prices, for example, may have been quoting the government \$660 for a small truck...

But he also must file the new prices with the code authority and the public can buy the same product at the lower price. The bidder can make another 15 percent cut under the lower price when he bids upon another public contract...

Officials predicted last night the order would have the effect of cutting sharply prices which have skyrocketed under the price-fixing system which has been so strongly condemned by the Consumers Advisory Board of the NRA and economists.

The reduced prices obviously would occur only in those products which the government, states and municipalities go into the market to purchase.

In making public his new order, the President said: "It will give the public the same advantage as enjoyed by the government."

Companies who feel that a competitor has reverted to unfair practices in order to reduce his bid prices may complain to NRA Administrator Hugh S. Johnson who will investigate the complaint and make a decision.

The rather striking recovery in England, where industrial production has topped 1929, is perhaps scarcely comparable with the record in the United States...

The depression struck later than in most other leading countries, and recovery thus far has been unimpressive. The Japanese situation is a special one, reflecting severe currency depreciation and the inflationary effects of her expensive military campaign in China.

World recovery generally appears to have set in during 1932. The banking crisis early the next year gave the United States a setback, which may account in part for the indication that 1928 industrial activity may not as yet have been so closely approached here.

Among the smaller countries Sweden has been enjoying a modest boom, with industrial production getting up to 105 percent of the 1928 level.
