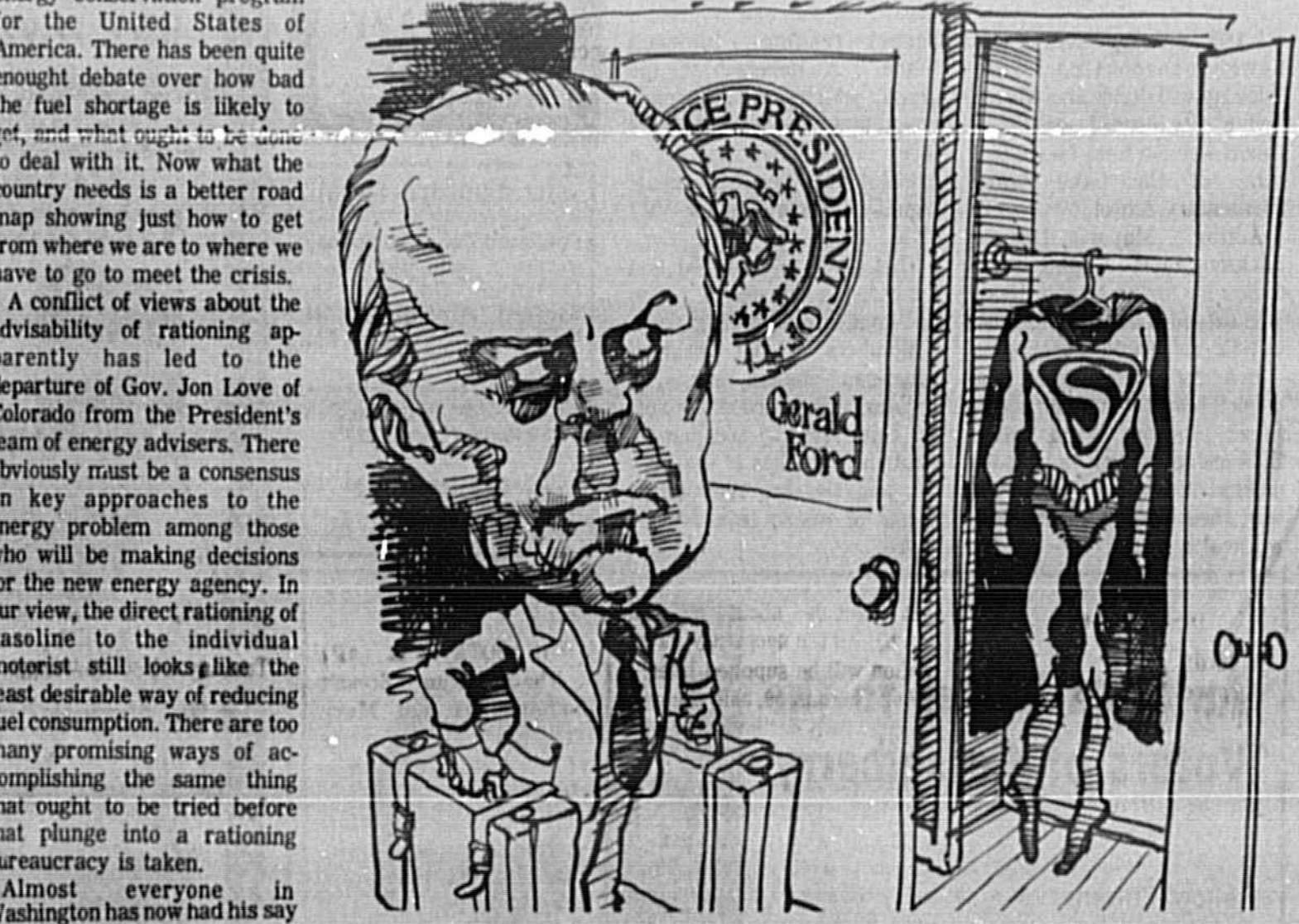

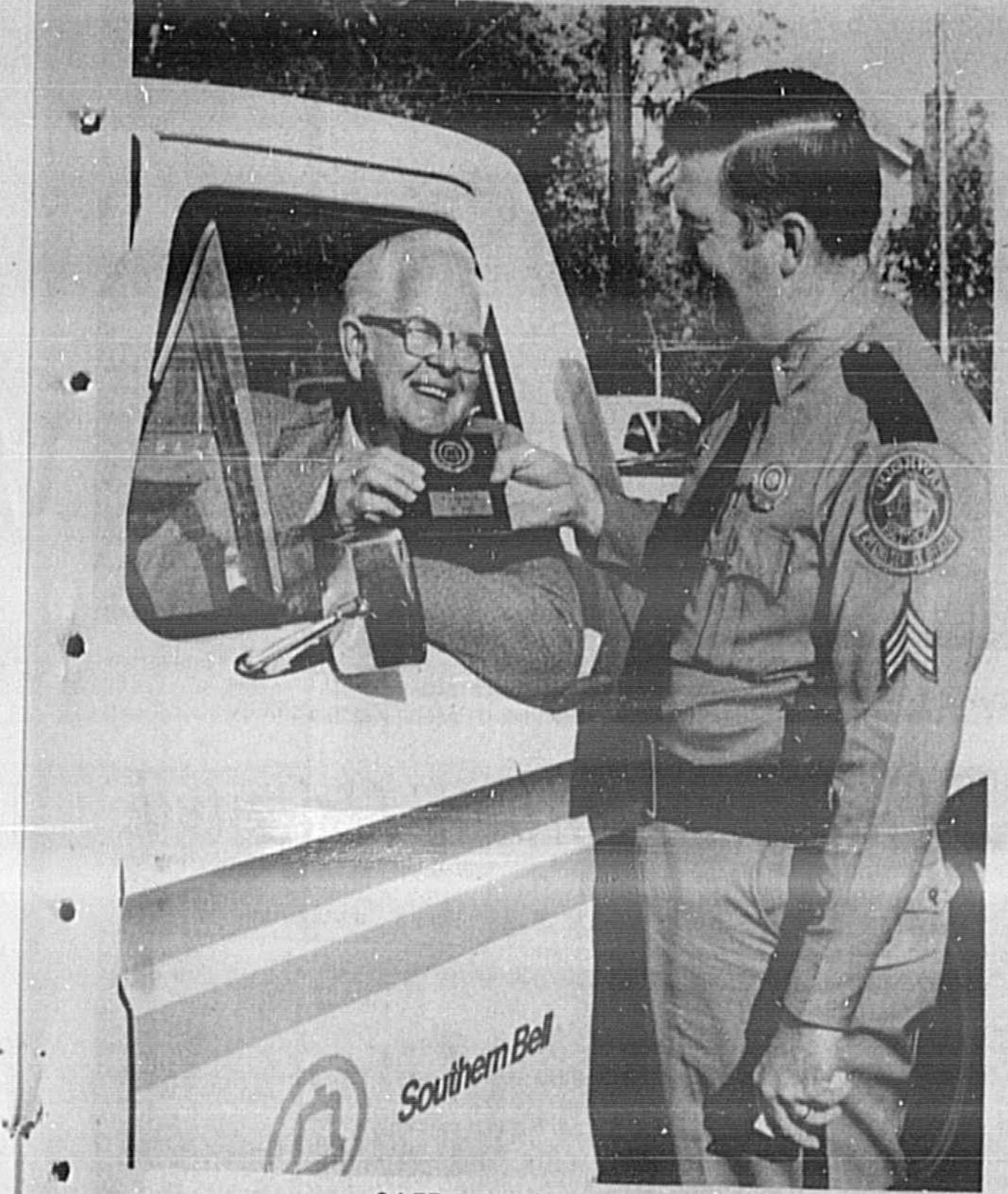

### Family Lib On book burning and parents' rights

Before the citizens of Drake, North Dakota are forever branded as evil, narrow-minded book burners, it might be well to examine the role of the parent as censor. Some of the citizens of that small community believed that fifteen-year old students shouldn't be required to read "Slaughterhouse Five" by Kurt Vonnegut and "Deliverance" by James Dickey because of profanity and sexual references in both books. The assigned copies of the Vonnegut book were subsequently burned in the school furnace.

Just about everybody, including now the folks in Drake, understands that burning the books was a mistake. Burning books have the stench of the Inquisition and Hitler, and I know of no one who wants that kind of smell in the air again. Left unresolved in Drake, and in the rest of the country, is the basic question of parental authority versus academic freedom.

Why shouldn't a parent exercise some control over the material his or her child reads? When parents agree to send their children to school, does it automatically mean that parents relinquish all semblance of authority? Do teachers and school administrators become super-parents with veto powers over parental preferences? Frankly, there are many school books that are personally offensive to me. In most cases, the book offenses because it does not contain enough information.

From the moment I began reading American history, I was taught that only wealthy white, English-speaking men made this nation work. Betty Boss sawed tags, George Washington Carver grew peanuts, and Pocahontas was pretty. So much for women, blacks and American Indians.

The Irish, Chinese, Jewish, Italian and Russian people were rarely visible, except as offensive stereotypes. If Lisa and Rachel and Josh were assigned such history books, you better believe I would do some protesting.

Or, if the children are given books like "Little Black Sambo" or later required to read "The Protocols of the Elders of Zion," I'll do some hollering. Hollering — not burning. We have hundreds of books in our house. Many I won't let the children read now, and a few particularly raw accounts I'd prefer they read only after they are adults. If some teacher happens to make a book required reading which I, as a parent, don't believe my children are ready for, well, I'm going to make my opinion known.

As a writer, I disagree with the intellectual values of the folks in Drake. As a parent I believe I should have the right to exercise some control over what my children are taught... or not taught.

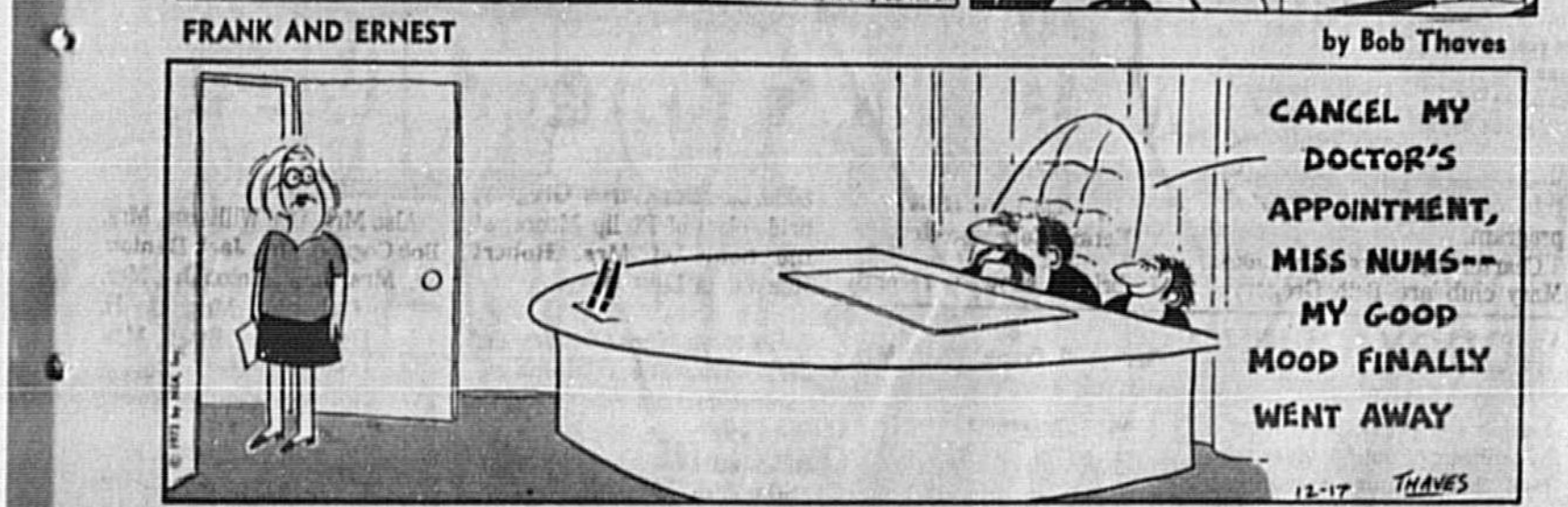

# Congress Rushes To Clear Work Calendar

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress is entering a clean-up, get-away week, hoping to clear a heavy work calendar and recess until Jan. 21.

President Nixon nominated Saxe for the Cabinet post after Elliot L. Richardson resigned rather than carry out an order to fire Archibald Cox as special Watergate prosecutor.

The Senate also was starting off the week with action on a \$3.8 billion foreign aid appropriation bill passed by the House.

The measured includes \$2.2 billion requested by Nixon to help Israel replace weapons lost in its October war with Egypt and Syria.

The legislative ramrod for Congress in its adjournment drive also ranges from defense funds to emergency fuel conservation and home rule for the District of Columbia.

And still in dispute between the two branches of Congress are different versions of legislation providing a two-stage, 11 per cent boost in Social Security benefits.

Another trouble spot is an energy bill that would confer sweeping authority on the President to ration gasoline and take other steps to conserve scarce fuels.

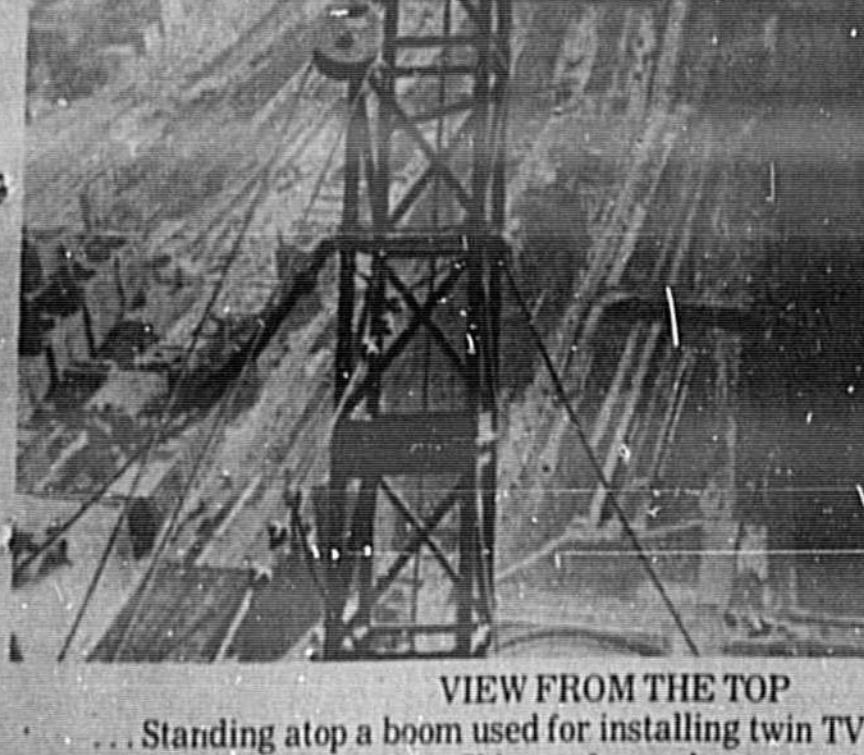

Mrs. Meir said before Kissinger's arrival that Israel would not deal with Syria at the Geneva conference unless Syria handed over a list of the prisoners of war and allowed Red Cross representatives to visit them. She added that this would not prevent Israel's dealing with Egypt and Jordan at the parity.

Informed sources in Damascus said Kissinger was unable to obtain the POW list from President Hafez Assad during his visit to the Syrian capital Saturday. But Israel's refusal to deal with Syria should have no effect on the first stages of the Geneva conference since the first order of business is to be negotiations for the withdrawal of Israeli and Egyptian troops along the Suez Canal.

On his arrival at Lod International Airport Sunday, Kissinger was greeted by 250 demonstrators with placards reading, "Kissinger — Your peace will kill Israel," and open umbrellas recalling British Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain's sacrifice of Czechoslovakia in the 1938 Munich pact with Hitler.

## Viets Flee Mekong River

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP) — Khmer Rouge insurgents today drove government forces from a position 10 miles from here in the second day of attacks along the capital's southeastern defenses, the Cambodian command said.

A military source said many Cambodian soldiers were missing after government forces abandoned Kam Svay and fled 200 yards north to the Mekong River. Survivors were rescued from there by navy gunboats.

The command reported five other insurgent attacks within 20 miles of Phnom Penh along Highway 1, the Saigon-Phnom Penh highway that runs parallel to the Mekong. The government said the insurgents were probing for weaknesses in the capital's defenses.

Military sources said 30 government troops have been killed and 62 wounded, and a number of others have been reported missing in skirmishes along the road in the past week.

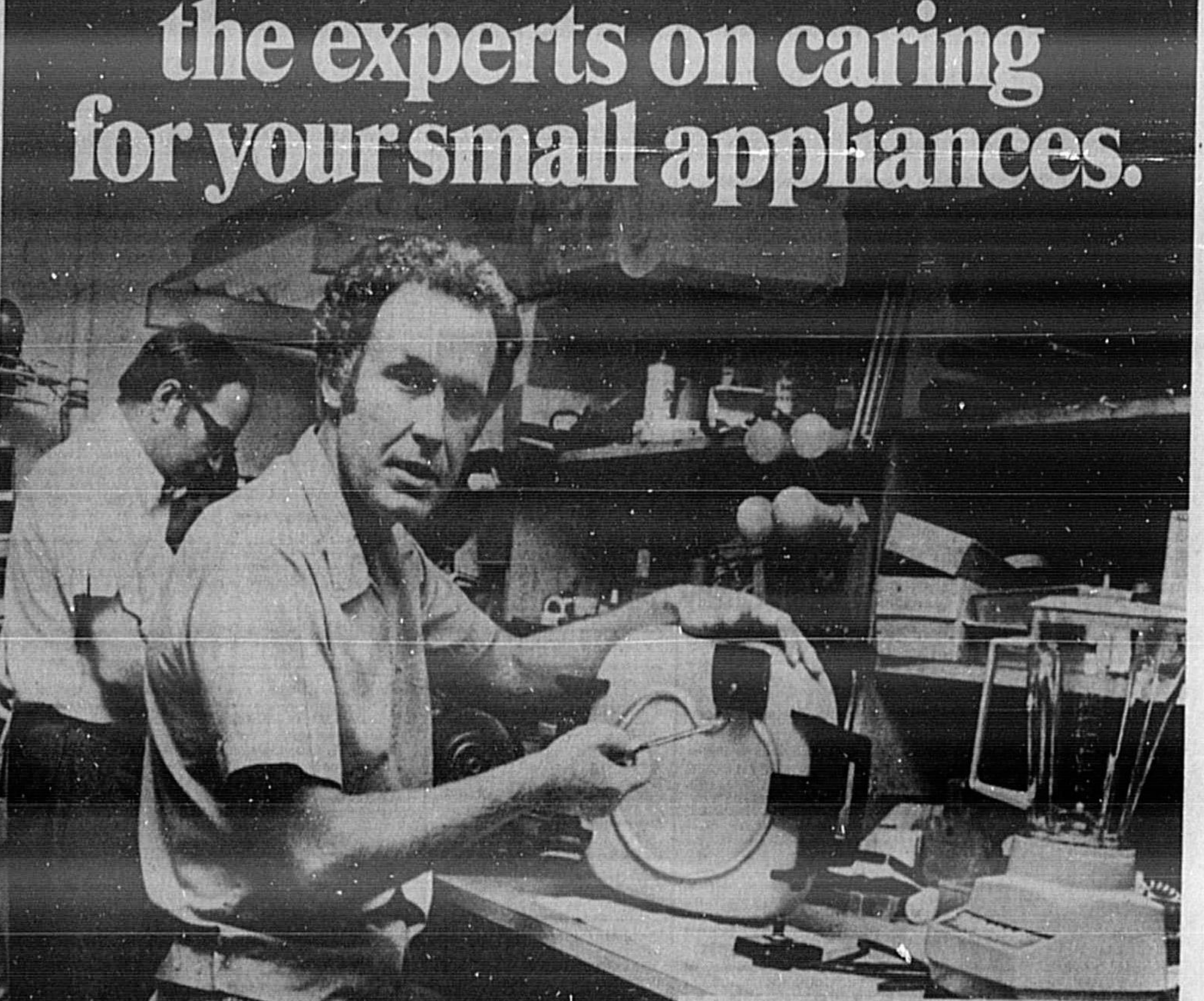
Observers say the fighting indicates insurgents are preparing for a dry-season offensive. They say the Khmer Rouge would like to drive all government forces from the highway so they could ambush shipping along the river without interference.

Other fighting was reported 13 miles north of Phnom Penh on Highway 5, the road to the rice fields in northwest Cambodia, along Highway 4 to the sea, and at Kampong, on the coast 85 miles southwest of Phnom Penh.

In Saigon, the United States asked the International Commission of Control and Supervision to investigate a Communist attack Saturday on an armored helicopter in which an American officer and a South Vietnamese crew member were killed.

It was the first American protest to the four-nation commission since it was established by the January cease-fire.

ROME (AP) — The mother of 11 Paul Getty III says her son was kept blindfolded during most of his five-month captivity and never saw the faces of any of his kidnapers. Young Getty's mother, the former actress Gail Harris, spent all day Sunday with her son in the Rome clinic to which he was taken after he turned up early Saturday in southern Italy.

Police sources said the 17-year-old grandson of oil billionaire J. Paul Getty was under sedation at the clinic and was unable to give a coherent account of his long ordeal.

But two Rome newspapers said he told his mother he was conscious when his kidnapers were cutting off his right ear, which a Rome newspaper received on Nov. 10 as proof that the boy was being held.

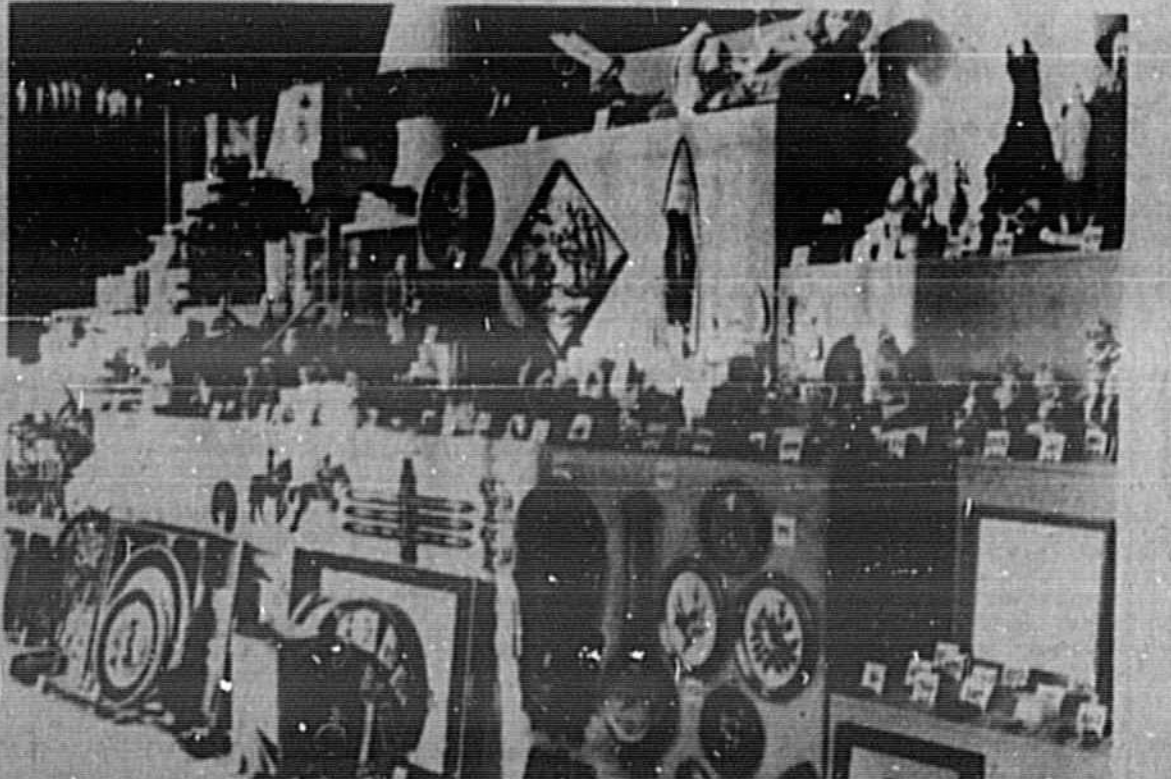

# Black September Killers Seek Haven In Mideast

BEIRUT (AP) — Arab terrorists who killed an estimated 36 persons at Rome and Athens airports searched for a haven in the Middle East today in their hijacked West German jet.

After a night of terror at the Athens airport, during which they were reported to have murdered five hostages, the gunmen took off with what the pilot of the commandeered Lufthansa Boeing 737 said were 12 hostages.

Behind them the terrorists left a wounded hostage and the body of one of their victims.

The hijackers were reported to have killed the five hostages one by one in the jet at Athens to back up demands for release of two Palestinian guerrillas held by the Greeks. But only one body was seen.

The Lebanese government refused to let them land in Beirut today and they put down in Damascus, the Syrian capital.

One of the hijackers was given an first aid at the Damascus airport's dispensary and the plane took off after a two-hour stop, during which it also picked up fuel and food.

The terrorists then flew to Kuwait, where they landed despite apparent attempts by authorities of the Persian Gulf sheikhdom to keep them out, a Lufthansa spokesman said in Frankfurt.

The commander of the Syrian air force had appealed repeatedly for release of the hostages in Damascus, but the hijackers refused.

Damascus state radio reported the hijackers "promised they will give the hostages the best possible treatment and said they will be released within a few hours."

The radio report quoted the hijackers as saying all the hostages were "safe."

An Italian government spokesman said the officials of his embassy in Athens believed "the report of five dead hostages is a bluff."

A Lufthansa official also said, "It is possible that the number is a bluff, though we would not like to claim it with certainty."

In Athens, the plane's Dutch pilot, Capt. Jo Kroese, had told airport authorities his copilot was dead. Later, Lufthansa said the copilot was alive and that a member of the ground crew in Damascus had spoken

**Citrus Fruit Escapes Ice Harm**

A quick check of area cold spots this morning by County Agricultural Agent Frank Jasa revealed no ice in oranges, but some new leaf burn to citrus trees.

The thermometer at the Agri-Center recorded a low of 25 degrees — two degrees below last week's low, Jasa said.

Jasa expects some leaf burn, but no permanent damage on hardy vegetable crops; but, more tender varieties have already been frozen.

A breeze predicted by the weather bureau did not materialize and heavy frost was the result. Jasa said full damage to ornamental shrubs will not be apparent for two or three days.

## State May Skip Blackouts

Unless present circumstances change sharply, we can expect to weather the winter in Central Florida without suffering from power blackouts, or brownouts, said spokesmen for Florida Power and Light Co. and Florida Power Corporation today.

FPL manager Scott Burris said at the moment FPL has fuel ordered through this spring, and if conditions continue as they are right now he can foresee no problems until then. "But there could be a change in circumstances which could alter the whole picture. There is no way of knowing what the state can do," he added.

Burris said it is too soon to know definitely whether voluntary reductions in power consumption by the public have been effective, but FPL is conducting a fairly extensive study to determine the effects of voluntary controls over the winter period.

He said the voluntary controls were called for in Central Florida at a time of mild weather when demands for heating or cooling were minimal; after the current cold spell it will be easier to tell if the cooperation of the public has been effective in reducing power consumption.
