## Woman dies following crash

Soraida Tewari, 39, of Altamonte Springs died early Tuesday morning when her minivan was struck by a speeding car in Maitland.

Tewari was traveling south on Maitland Avenue when her Chevy Astro minivan was struck by a silver Mitsubishi traveling westbound on Maitland Boulevard. The Mitsubishi, which was speeding away from a routine traffic stop in Seminole County, ran the stop light at the intersection of Maitland Avenue and Maitland Boulevard.

Tewari's husband and two children were following her van and witnessed the crash.

"It's really sad, she lived right down the street," said Lt. Barry Smith of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

Tewari was a newspaper carrier for the Orlando Sentinel since 1999, and was traveling to the company's east Orange County distribution center to pick up her papers for delivery when she was hit.

According to officials, she died at the scene.

According to police reports, two occupants in the Mitsubishi fled the accident scene on foot and are still at large. Three other occupants were transported to Orlando Regional Medical Center. At press time, their identities had not been released.

Seconds before the accident, a Seminole County sheriff's deputy had attempted to stop the Mitsubishi for a routine traffic stop while driving on U.S. Highway 17-92, but the car and its five occupants fled onto the Maitland Boulevard ramp. The deputy decided not to pursue the car, but witnessed the accident from the ramp.

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# Million dollar drug ring busted

## Yearlong investigation ends with 14 arrests, including one firefighter

SANFORD — A multi-million dollar Central Florida drug ring was shut down in Sanford Sunday during one of Seminole County's largest drug busts.

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office City/County Investigative Bureau (CCIB), along with several other drug agencies, arrested 14 people and confiscated 220 pounds of marijuana and 4.5 kilograms of cocaine. The combined street value of

the substances is approximately \$670,000. Several weapons and more than \$200,000 in cash were also found.

Throughout the investigation, officers discovered the drug ring was trafficking 36 to 40 kilograms of cocaine and 750 pounds of marijuana each month in Seminole County, more than a \$2 million business.

"They were a major player in the

Seminole County drug trade," said Lt. Barry Smith of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office. "I would classify this as being in the top 25 percent of the big cases in Seminole County that we have been able to bring down. Some of the drugs were even going outside of the county."

The arrests came after a nearly year-long investigation, which involved

CCIB, the U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency, the Florida Department of Law Enforcement and the Sanford Police Department.

"This marks the end of a lot of work," said Smith. "This was a major case. It should have a major impact on the drug sales in Seminole County."

According to Smith, the investigation is ongoing. The officers' first goal was to stop drugs from entering Seminole County. With the successful completion of this goal, investigators

## Zoo's king vulture meets his queen

The Central Florida Zoo is going to the birds — and a few other animals — this Fourth of July. The zoo's king vulture will officially meet his queen — the female king vulture — during Red, White and Zoo, the park's Fourth of July celebration planned for 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Friday. The 13-year-old male and 5-year-old female have been on display at the zoo since 1999 in side-by-side exhibits. Now that the female has reached maturity, she is ready to meet her mate.

"We've been waiting for the female to catch up with the male," said the zoo's General Curator and Director of Operations Fred Antonio. "They are at the end of their breeding cycle this year, but we hope next year they will begin reproducing."

Native to tropical forest areas of Central and South America, king vultures, like other vultures, lay a single egg during a breeding cycle. After a two-month incubation period, the young bird is fledged in about four months and may remain with its parents for up to two years.

According to Antonio, currently there are only 99 king vultures in captivity at U.S. zoos. There is no precise

information on the numbers in the wild, but they seem to be common in a restricted range. It is believed they have suffered from deforestation, along with many other animals.

The zoo's two king vultures have actually been together in their new, \$30,000 habitat since last Tuesday when construction on the enclosure was completed. Zoo officials wanted to make sure the two birds were ready for

## Pete Knowles, former city manager, dies

Warren "Pete" Knowles, who served the city of Sanford for more than three decades and had one of the longest tenures as city manager in the state of Florida, died Sunday evening. He was 80.

Knowles joined the Sanford staff April 20, 1953, as city engineer and nine months later, on Feb. 1, 1954, became city manager, a position he held until he retired, April 30, 1985.

No single public servant — either elected or appointed — can match the impact Knowles made in shaping the Sanford residents recognize today. During his tenure, Knowles oversaw numerous public works projects that changed the nature of city. Among them were the construction of the Civic Center, the Marina Island, moving the Sanford Zoo to its present location and relocating City Hall on the site of the old zoo.

Knowles also played an integral role in convincing the

U.S. Navy to transfer its airfield to the city of Sanford.

"He played a bigger part in the acquisition of the airport than many people realize," said former mayor Lee P. Moore.

Moore recalled that he and his predecessor, Vince Roberts, had been working with Minnesota Senator Hubert H. Humphrey, the Democratic nominee for president in 1968, in lobbying the federal government to transfer the base.

"With the Republican in office (after the 1968 election), we didn't get very far with Humphrey's name," Moore said.

Edward I. Gurney of Winter Park was one of the state's two U.S. senators and a Republican. Moore had been the president of the Winter Park Chamber of Commerce and knew Gurney through that organization.

"Ed said he could put us in the right places with the right people, but he needed some-

## City's new manager to earn \$125,000 a year

SANFORD — It's official. Al Grieshaber, city attorney of Albany, Ga., is Sanford's next city manager.

Sanford Commission unanimously approved Grieshaber's employment contract Monday afternoon, after negotiating the terms for a little more than a week. Grieshaber was chosen as the city's manager late last month from a total of 89 candidates, including finalists, James F. Coleman of Lady Lake, Danny Crew of Gastonia, N.C., and James Ross O'Connor of St. Charles, Mo.

"We're just so excited," said Grieshaber, a retired U.S. Marine Corps lieutenant colonel. "I enjoy the confidence they [the mayor and city commissioners] have expressed in me."

Grieshaber, who will acquire the responsibilities of city manager on Aug. 4, replaces Tony VanDerworp, who resigned in February. Andrew Van Gaale will remain interim city manager until that time.

Grieshaber and his wife, Debbie, and 12-year-old daughter, Liz, will be in town this week to begin making arrangements for the family's move. The Grieshabers also plan to attend the Festival on the Fourth celebration in Fort Mellon Park.

According to Grieshaber, the family has committed to buying a home in the Mayfair area, at the corner of East Second Street and North Summerlin Avenue.

"I promised everyone I wouldn't disclose the location so that the reputation of the neighborhood will not go down," Grieshaber said, laughing.

Although it is undecided when the family will officially move to town, Grieshaber said he had his eye on the Mayfair home since he was in town for his interviews with the mayor and commissioners in late June.

Although commissioners voted unanimously to accept the terms of Grieshaber's two-year con-

Many women retain their husband's name after a divorce for the exact reason she is doing so. If you marry this man, your name will be "Mrs. John Smith." His former wife is now "Mrs. Linda Smith." You'll all be happier if you just get over it.

**DEAR ABBY:** I was raised in a small rural community. When I was 8 or 9 years old, I was molested and sodomized. I am now a 61-year-old single man, and I have never been able to have an intimate relationship with anyone.

I was not molested by a priest, preacher, teacher, coach or any adult. I was molested by another child — a boy of 12 or 13. I knew of three boys in my seventh grade class who were also molested by another boy. By the time I was a senior in high school, I had learned of two more.

The boys who victimized us are now married and have children. At least three of their victims never married. I have no doubt that these abuses continue today. This is NOT an issue of homosexuality or pedophilia. The issue is the dominant, aggressive nature of male sexuality.

Parents must realize that their child is potentially both a victim and an abuser. All boys should be alerted to the possibility that even some of their best friends may have dangerous curiosities — and no one has more influence over a child than a friend.

Boys must be taught self-respect and respect for the privacy of others. Because of the complexities of our society, we cannot leave the development and socialization of a child's sexuality to chance or to nature.

**DEAR ALONE:** Your letter is troubling as well as thought-provoking. All children should be taught how to say no — whether verbally or through self-defense — if they are asked to do something that doesn't feel right and is against their better judgment.

It is imperative that parents also teach children the importance of treating one another with respect. This is a valuable lesson that will benefit them for the rest of their lives.

one to do the leg work," Moore said. "I told him the city manager would be more than happy to handle that job. We sent Pete up there the next day, and he met with them and reported back to us. It was shortly thereafter that the Navy agreed to transfer the base to the city."

Moore called Knowles and "outstanding" city manager "known statewide for his reputation and ethics."

"You have to remember, too, that he was in a job where the average tenure was three to five years," Moore said. "The fact that he was there for more than three decades is remarkable."

Knowles' 31 years as Sanford's city manager is thought to be the longest tenure for any city manager in the state.

"I don't know of anyone

who served longer," said former mayor Bettye Smith. Smith was mayor only a few months when Knowles retired, but knew him for years before she became an elected official.

"Pete was one of a kind, and I mean that in a good way," Smith said. "It was his dedication. He really cared about what happened in Sanford."

Smith recalled an incident in downtown where a thief had committed a "smash-and-grab" type robbery. Knowles was in the area when it occurred.

"Pete was able to catch the guy and hold him until the police arrived," Smith said. "His response, if I remember correctly, was 'What else are you going to do if you are a good citizen.'"

Smith said the thing that she most remembers about

Knowles is the job he did when the Navy closed its base in Sanford. The Navy not only provided a huge economic engine for the city, Navy people and functions were an important part of Sanford life.

"His ability to keep the city together when the Navy left was important," Smith said. "The civic organizations, the churches, everything that was part of who we are, I would say, was greatly enriched if not dependent upon Navy people."

"Pete had to take some unpopular steps, pinch pennies," Smith said. "But he did what was best for the city."

Former city commissioner and mayor M.L. "Sonny" Raborn said Knowles was "a good friend of mine." However, he recalled that Knowles was not always the most popular person in

town.

"He rubbed some people the wrong way, but I always felt like Pete was fair," Raborn said. "He was a big gun for the city when we needed it."

Sanford's current mayor, Brady Lessard, noted that Knowles legacy lives on today.

"There's not a week that goes by that someone doesn't mention his name to me at least once," Lessard said.

Former mayor Moore said he is grateful for Knowles' service to the city and the assistance he provided during his tenure as mayor.

"Some people have been kind enough to say that I was a good mayor. If I was a good mayor, it was because Pete Knowles was a great city manager," Moore said.

Knowles was born March 27, 1923 in Gloucester, Mass. He was honorably discharged from the U.S. Army

after serving in the Pacific Theater. He earned two degrees from the University of Maine in 1948, one in public administration and one in civil engineering.

He was hired as the first town manager of Berwick, Maine in April 1949 and set up the council-manager form of government in that city. He left in 1952 to become the city manager of Derry, N.H., before coming to Sanford in 1953 as the city's engineer.

During his career, Knowles served on numerous state and national boards for public administrators and was an adjunct instructor of public administration at the University of Central Florida's College of Social Science.

Knowles was earned numerous awards for his service, including the President's Award for Florida City and County Management Association,

the Distinguished Service Award by the Florida Sheriff's Association and the Topper Award for Service to the Community by the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce. In 1985, the city of Sanford established the W.E. "Pete" Knowles Award, which is still given annually for outstanding community service.

A memorial service for Knowles has been planned for 10 a.m. Monday, July 7, at First Methodist Church, located at 419 S. Park Ave. in Sanford.

Knowles is survived by his wife, Ava Melissa Padgett of Wauchula, Fla.; two daughters and sons-in-law, Sinda and Gordon Schrank of Bowling Green, Fla., and Tracey and Timothy Sullivan of Winter Park; two grandchildren, Kayla White and Kyle Schrank of Bowling Green; and a sister, Carolyn Robertson of Massachusetts.

tract, there was some concern regarding his salary of \$125,000. Commissioners Randy Jones and Art Woodruff expressed concern that this was fairly high for Grieshaber, who doesn't have official city manager experience and is currently making \$92,000. This news comes after the city commission eliminated 17 jobs in order to balance the city's 2003-2004 budget.

"It's a \$33,000 jump in pay [for him] walking in the door with technically no city manager experience," said Jones. "We're starting him out at what was almost the top of our range. I would rather bring him in and give him a raise after he proves himself."

According to Mayor Brady Lessard, Grieshaber requested \$136,000, even though the pay scale for the position was advertised as \$100,000 to \$130,000.

"You get what you pay for, though," said Lessard. "I feel like this guy is worth this [\$125,000]."

Kevin Hipes agrees, stating, "I'd rather give him a few more bucks and be able to expect more."

According to Grieshaber, he feels this is a fair deal. He hopes the community will look at the confidence the city has in him, his experience and his background in respect to his salary.

The city will also be responsible for the family's

moving expenses, worth an estimated \$7,200, and Grieshaber will receive \$1,889 per month for temporary housing until his home in Georgia is sold or for nine months, whichever is sooner.

According to Lessard, the city granted him the monthly expense because they want his focus to be on his work not his finances and attempting to sell the house.

Grieshaber will be provided a city vehicle, as well as a cell phone, lap top computer and printer for business and incidental personal use.

Other contract specifics include:

- Grieshaber's employment will be automatically extended for two years in August 2005 unless commission votes otherwise.
- In order for Grieshaber to resign as city manager, he must give city officials three months advance notice.
- He will receive 15 days of vacation time.
- Sick leave will be accrued at the same rate as other city employees, but 100 hours will be given in advance.
- An annual physical exam will be paid for by the city.
- An amount equal to 6.6 percent of Grieshaber's salary will be placed in a retirement account. This is 4 percent lower than the usual amount for a Sanford city manager.

the merger before Friday's celebration.

"They have been great together," Antonio said. "Since they have been living next to each other for several years, they were familiar with each other. It seems to be working out."

Beth Viernieu, the zoo's birdkeeper who has been working with the two vultures, confirmed there have been no major "tiffs" between the king and his queen. However, they are still becoming accustomed to each other and often remain separated within their habitat.

"The female, she's pretty assertive; and, he tends to want to be friendly," Viernieu said. "And, while she tends to be very curious,

he usually stays up in the tree and watches her."

"But, it's definitely possible that they will breed," she added. "They have an entire year to get used to each other."

The birds' new habitat — sponsored by the state of Florida Cultural Facilities Program, the Lake Monroe Inn Bar Out Back and the zoo's staff — is one of three animal habitats in a new compound at the zoo. As part of the zoo's on-going expansion, a cougar and a samang habitat are scheduled for completion within the next few months. Individuals, businesses and other groups can still sign up to sponsor the new exhibits, Antonio added.

"The zoo's staff was really great with the new vulture habitat," Antonio said. "They donated their own money to enable us to build it."

"It's a great exhibit," he added. "It gives the zoo's visitors a chance to see the king vultures up close. And, they are such beautiful birds to see."

While the vultures may take center stage Friday, the American bald eagle will also be celebrated during the Fourth of July event. The Seminole County Harley Owners Group will present a big donation to adopt the zoo's pair of American bald eagles at 11:30 a.m. For the past 11 years, the group of

eagle fans has supported this once endangered bird and contributed more than \$37,000 to create the eagle exhibit and participate in the Adopt an Animal program.

Plus, zoo visitors may see two new faces at the zoo, a prehensile-tailed porcupine born May 28 and a cotton-top tamarin born June 3. Other holiday programs include the elephant demonstration at 2 p.m., snapping turtle demonstration at 11:20 a.m. and 2:20 p.m., hippo demonstration at 11:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m., bird training demonstration at 2:40 p.m., feline feeding program at 3:00 p.m. and primate feeding program at 3:30 p.m.

Red, White and Zoo will also feature live music by Crazy Joe, face painting, and games like pin the tail on the elephant and animal bean bag toss. Kids can color the zoo's wild world by painting animals on a 6-by-20 foot animal mural. A watermelon eating contest at 11 a.m. will pit child verses elephant to see who is the fastest consumer of this tasty, summertime treat.

plan to focus on distributors and other branches of the drug ring.

According to Smith, other arrests are expected.

During Sunday's raid, warrants were served at four Seminole County homes, one Orlando home and one Deltona home. According to police reports, while agents were executing the arrest warrant and search warrant at the home of Jesus Espinoza, 48, of 2430 Narcissus Ave., in Sanford, David Rizo Flores, 40, of Sullivan City, Texas, arrived at the home.

After speaking with Flores, agents determined that a vehicle containing a large amount of a controlled substance, which was to be delivered to Espinoza, was in the immediate area.

According to police reports, Flores traveled with agents to the Amoco gas station, located at 4800 W. S.R. 46, in Sanford, where he identified the vehicle, a semi-tractor trailer, containing the controlled substances.

Agents contacted the occupants of the vehicle, Juan G. Gutierrez, 29, of Pharr, Texas, and Umberto Rene Perez, 36, of Madison, Texas, who gave verbal approval for officers to search the vehicle.

During the search, agents discovered marijuana hidden inside a pallet of fruit.

Flores, Gutierrez and Perez were charged with two counts of conspiracy to traffic marijuana and one count of marijuana trafficking. They were taken to the John E. Polk Correction Facility for booking.

David Roland Scott of Geneva, a 39-year-old Seminole County firefighter, was also among those arrested Sunday. Scott, who is based at Station 35 near Sanford, has worked with as a Seminole County firefighter for 10 years. Scott is charged with conspiracy to traffic cocaine.

"He's done a good job for us over the years," said Chief Terry Schenk of the Seminole County Fire Department. "This came as a surprise to us."

According to Schenk, the status of Scott's job is undecided. He hopes to speak with Scott regarding the matter by the end of the week.

Others arrested include, Lee March Steele, 56, of Winter Park; Sammy Rodriguez, 42, Marcelo Rodriguez, 36, James Madison Mike, 41, Anthony Tyrone Lewis, 33, Debra Ann Mike, 48, Claudia Rodriguez, all of Sanford; Baldemero Carlos Perez, 28, of Orlando; and Francisco Mercado, 55, of Deltona.

Bail for the individuals range from \$250,000 to no bail. At press time, no one had posted bail. However, Debra Mike was released Monday on her own recognizance.

According to Smith, it will take approximately one year to bring the individuals to trial.

"I'm sure they will be pretty good money and will be able to hire good attorneys," he added.

## July 4th busiest boating day of the year

Boat Owner's Association of the United States is urging all boaters to prepare and operate with care this July 4th, traditionally the busiest boating day of the year.

"Unlike last year's holiday which was spread out, this year's three-day weekend will experience a high volume of waterway traffic in fewer days," said Ruth Wood, president of the BoatU.S. Foundation for Boating Safety and Clean Water. "The highest concentration of traffic will occur on Friday, July 4th, so we urge caution, patience and courtesy, especially returning to the dock or launch ramp that night."

"It's one of the few times a year that many boaters will operate at night, so we urge everyone to refresh their memory by reviewing charts for navigation markers before they head out, post an extra lookout with a spotlight, travel at reasonable speed and have life jackets on. Rushing home is the worst thing you can do," adds Wood.

Jerry Cardarelli, vice president of towing services for BoatU.S. said, "We forecast upwards of 5,000 requests for on-the-water assistance for all towers over the holiday. To prevent becoming a statistic, boaters can prepare by first ensuring that all navigation lights operate, fuel is topped off and battery loads are monitored, as running accessories can leave them too weak to start engines."

"Keep an eye on your electrical usage when anchored," adds Cardarelli, "lots of folks will go out early and raft up all day long waiting for fireworks running fans, sound systems or other appliances. You don't want to become part of the 'morning after' crowd who end up inadvertently staying on the hook overnight because of a dead battery."

For trailer boaters, BoatU.S. also expects a surge in calls for trailering roadside assistance on Thursday, July 3rd as trailers head down the highway to their favorite vacation spot. "The two biggest causes for trailering breakdowns are damaged tires and bearings. See Outdoors, Page 7

A two-time, First Team All-Conference USA performer (2001-02, 2002-03), Gaines finished his career with the Cardinals as the school's fourth all-time leading scorer with 1,945 points and also ranked on Louisville's all-time list in three-point field goals (2nd, 225), assists (475, 5th) and steals (5th, 191).

After giving up a hit on his first pitch, the former Seminole High School standout completely shut down the Excelsior attack, striking out four and not allowing another hit or walk the final three innings.

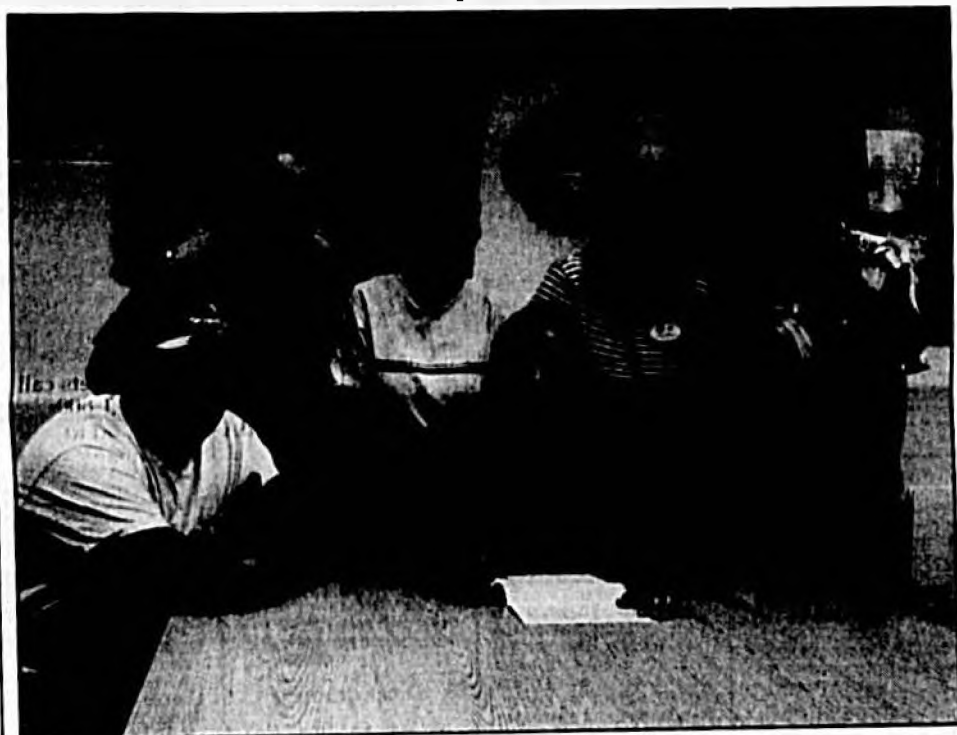
Offensively, Bryan Ward led a 12-hit attack, going 3-for-3, with a run scored and two RBIs.

But this season, especially this month, has seen the duo get off to a slow start.

Two days after he was moved from the leadoff spot to the nine-hole and one day after an Anaheim area newspaper columnist questioned the longevity of his career, Eckstein hit back, going 4-for-4 with a home run, a double and three RBI, pacing the Angels to an emotional 6-3 win over the division-rival Seattle Mariners last Wednesday.

Eckstein had been mired in an 8-for-55 (.145) month, including a 1-for-28 slide going into Wednesday, that had brought down his season batting average to .228 and left his on-base percentage languishing at .311. Both figures were the lowest of all Angels regulars.

He doubled in a run off Jamie Moyer in the second, singled off Moyer in the fourth, legged out an infield hit in the sixth and blasted a two-run homer off Matt White to seal the Angels' win in the bottom of the eighth.

To prove the night was not a fluke, Eckstein went out the next night and went 2-for-3 and then tripled against Los Angeles Dodgers ace Kevin Brown on Saturday to raise his average back into the high .240's.

Much of the work Varitek does for the Red Sox goes unnoticed because it is

Then there was his arm. Varitek cut down both of Detroit's attempted stolen bases, including a big one on Alex Sanchez in the eighth inning.

He had come into the game in a 2-for-27 slump, but Varitek ended those woes on a night he boosted his average back up to .279.

Varitek's bat remained hot against the Florida Marlins in an amazing weekend series, including a record-setting 14-run first inning on Friday, and he also launched his 13th home run of the season on Saturday.

ings," said Beth McCann, executive director of the BoatUS Trailing Club.

"We highly recommend that before you depart on Thursday that your tires are serviceable and at the correct pressure. It can also help if you have a complete spare tire - inflated on the rim - available."

For some trailer boaters, July 4th is the only time that they will use their trailers the entire year, says McCann. "Under-used trailers are often under-maintained. Trailers that sit a lot have the highest incidence of bearing failure, so ensure that this preventative maintenance item is taken care of before you go." And

McCann cautions to make time to stop along the way periodically to check your rig.
