Citrus Coolers Fun to Fix



Summer refreshment should leave the broiler cool, too, and not entail much preparation. Thanks to Florida, which produces more than half its huge vitamin C-rich orange and grapefruit crops, this is possible. Convenient canned Florida orange, grapefruit, and blended orange and grapefruit juices are available now at new low prices. Stock up, and when guests drop in, take the economical cans of juice, an ice bucket and tall frosted glasses to the porch. Let everyone fix his own citrus cooler, adding garnishes, soda water or gingerale to taste.

To treat the glasses, dip in unseasoned egg white, and then in granulated sugar. Here are two coolers suggestions: Grapefruit Whitecaps: 2 1/2 cups canned Florida grapefruit juice, 1 egg white, 2 tablespoons sugar, Nutmeg. Four chilled juices into tall glasses. Beat egg white until stiff, beat in sugar gradually. Put spoonful in each glass; sprinkle with nutmeg. YIELD: 4 servings. Citrus Sodas: For each soda, combine 1/2 cup chilled Florida orange, or blended orange and grapefruit juice with 1/4 cup chilled gingerale in a tall glass. Add a large scoop of vanilla ice cream.

Sheriff Says Will Enforce State's Speed Laws Rigidly

I am going to enforce the state speed laws in Seminole County rigidly, said Sheriff J. L. Hobby this morning as Gov. LeRoy Collins called on the highway patrol and law enforcement officers to "diligently enforce Florida's new 65-mile-an-hour maximum speed law."

"The entire Seminole County Sheriff's Department will be patrolling the county highways to see that motorists comply with the new speed regulations," said Hobby.

"We know from experience," the governor said, "that speed is our greatest cause of serious accidents and our greatest killer, and we are determined to save lives by a rigid enforcement of the new law."

Collins said the law, passed by the recent Legislature, "gives to our enforcement officials and to our drivers a specific rule of law which must be obeyed under all circumstances. Any driver who is proceeding at a rate in excess of these limits is violating the law and is subject to arrest and conviction for unlawful speeding."

Oviedo Scouts Preparing For Trip To Philmont Ranch

Four Oviedo Boy Scouts are getting ready to take off tomorrow for the "old west" and a 21-day tour that will take them to one of the famous camp sites in New Mexico.

Jerry Ulrey and Wes Evans, Life Scouts and Benjie Wainright and Eric Pearson, Star Scouts, all members of Troop 243 of Oviedo, leave tomorrow for the famous Philmont Scout Ranch at Cimarron, N. M.

"We are interested in our waterways," John Krider, Manager of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, told the Coffee Club this morning as they met at Mrs. Appleby's Restaurant in the Valdez Hotel.

"We think that our waterways are the answer for the movement of cargo that will develop Central Florida," he said and he described one area that was developed from wasteland into the present day investment of \$1,000,000 a day.

"We are not opposing the railroads," Krider commented as he spoke to more than 50 Chamber of Commerce members and their guests. "Water and railroads work hand in hand," he said, "for when water cargo comes in railroads increase in some instances as high as 50 per cent."

This 100 year dream means that less than 30 miles will be opened to the Atlantic, Krider told the Coffee Club group.

Hearing On School Budget Postponed Until Saturday

The Seminole County Board of Education's public hearing on the 1957-58 budget has been postponed until Saturday morning at 10 o'clock, said H. T. Milvere, Superintendent of Public Instruction this morning.

The public hearing was originally scheduled for Friday morning but due to the absence from the city of two members of the board who are on vacation and one member on an emergency, "we found it necessary to postpone the hearing until the following morning," said Milvere.

Program To Protect FBI Files Proposed

Prompt Action Sought

LONDON — A special committee of the American Bar Assn. today assailed recent Supreme Court decision pertaining to communism and called for prompt congressional action "to overcome their effect."

The committee, headed by ex-Sen. Herbert R. O'Connor of Maryland, proposed a legislative program to protect the confidential files of the FBI and tighten up the Smith anti-subversive act.

"It is traditional and right that our courts are zealous in protecting individual rights," the O'Connor report said.

"It is equally necessary that the executive and legislative branches take effective action to guide our country in defense against communist infiltration and aggression.

"If the courts lean too far backwards in the maintenance of theoretical individual rights, it may be that we have tied the hands of our country and have rendered it incapable of carrying out the first law of mankind—the law of self-preservation."

O'Connor told newsmen that experts are already drafting a bill for Congress which would revoke the Supreme Court's interpretation of immunity before congressional committees.

The report was presented to the ABA's policy-making House of delegates at the association's London convention today.

It said the committee believes that legislation to overcome the effects of the recent Supreme Court decisions—ordering new trials for convicted Communists—would "be in the public interest."

Earlier today, General Counsel Elisha Hanson of the American Newspaper Publishers' Assn. had appealed to the ABA to help newsmen give "proper" coverage to court trials.

New Radio Tower At County Jail Nears Completion

The radio tower under construction at the Seminole County Jail is nearing completion with only ten more feet to add to the steel structure.

The tower, 150 feet tall, will also have an antenna measuring about 10 feet.

Already new radio equipment is arriving daily to be installed in offices at the Seminole County Jail, Sheriff J. L. Hobby stated.

"We expect that the new radio system will be in full operation within about 10 days," the Sheriff said this morning.

Yesterday, Sheriff's Department deputies were familiarizing themselves with the new "backmaster" portable transmitters and receivers which will be used for deputy-to-car and deputy to station contact.

The transmitter is expected to arrive immediately along with 10 mobile units to be placed in deputies cars and in patrol cars of outlying communities as well as that of the constable.

Portable units, costing \$432 each, will be paid for by the constable and the communities using them.

"Some of the equipment we are using in our present radio system is out of date," the Sheriff said. As a matter of fact, he said, some of the equipment is the original purchased and put into use.

Sheriff Hobby explained that repairs and upkeep of the old equipment is expensive.

The Civil Defense Administration will pay for 50 per cent of the bid price of the equipment being installed and the old equipment being taken out has been sold to Radio Corporation of America as a trade-in on the new system.

At the most, the Seminole County Sheriff said, the cost to Seminole County will be between \$1,500 and \$2,000.

Sheriff Reports Quiet 24 Hours

The Seminole County Sheriff's Department experienced a quiet 24 hours, reported Sheriff Luther Hobby this morning.


One complaint about an alligator on the loose in the south end of the county was investigated but none was found.

GARDEN CLUB OF SANFORD

August is the hottest month of the year and next to the wettest. It will be hard to keep the grass cut and the weeds down. There may be a hurricane but it has been over fifty years since Florida experienced one during August. If you can plan your work carefully and find energy for a few extra things your garden will pay you dividends for your trouble this month. Be careful with your powermower—observing the rules of safety. Although your mangoes have been given their summer fertilization, there are still some things to watch out for. There are some vegetables which you can start from seed. With September in the offing, Fall vegetable gardeners can plant field peas (Southern peas), snap beans, cucumbers, okra, summer squash, mustard and tomatoes during late August.

There are the annuals that can be planted from now until October. Alyssum, baby's breath, blue-eyed onion, nasturtium, ornamental lettuce, scabiosa, celosia, calliopsis, cape-caryoid, carnation, Chinese forget-me-not, corn flower, Florida pansy, painted tongue, pansy phlox, pink snapdragon, statice, sock and veronica.

The subject of *Zinnias* and marigolds gets a little tiresome, but there is still time to put in some seeds or nursery plants for fall blooming. Hoping gardeners have planted many "Man in the Moon" marigolds which are the nearest to being white. August chores will keep the jungle within bounds. Clippers are handy tools to snip off spent flower heads, unless seeds are saved. Ordinary shrubbery needs clipping to keep it from taking over paths. Wisteria needs clipping to keep it from wrapping around everything in reach. But it is too late to clip azaleas, and of course, camellias, for the buds have formed.

A cutting box should always be ready for use. While the usual flat box of foil, a deeper box is practical if squirrels are curious, for a window screen over it will give protection. Hibiscus, azaleas, camellias and other cuttings will take now. Vermiculite for the medium is gaining favor.

Some plants rest in summer. Many rose growers allow July and August for the dormant period, but one of the most successful rose growers in Jacksonville maintains that roses care nothing about resting—just as long as they have food and water they keep going.

Before going away on your vacation, the gardens should be cleaned as near time of departure as possible, and unless there is a promising season of showers, the whole place should be thoroughly watered, and mulched as needed. House plants, if set under the shade of trees, will get enough fresh air and humidity to get along a few weeks.

Operator Will Answer Questions About New Service

A special operator has been engaged by the Winter Park Telephone Company to answer any subscribers' questions about the Metropolitan Telephone Service due to take effect in September.

The operator, who can be reached at Winter Park 6-9788, will be available to answer any questions from 9 A.M. to 5 P.M. any day except Saturday and Sunday.

Although the Winter Park Company has embarked upon an educational program to tell the story of Metropolitan Service before civic clubs, in the Winter Park area and to similar clubs of subscribers living in Seminole County, it is expected that many who can not attend these meetings will have questions they would like to have answered.

Although all subscribers will have new telephone numbers including prefixes which will be either Midway, Temple or Valley in the Winter Park area, officials of the company do not expect that subscribers will have any difficulty in dialing the new numbers as soon as the subscribers realize that they will dial the first two letters of the name prefix and the following five numerals in the telephone number.

There will be no change in calling a long distance number except that the call should be made, after cut-over, to the "Operator" instead of calling 110.

With Metropolitan Service, it is announced, a new feature will be in effect for those calling a number on their own line. In calling a number with a Midway prefix, a recorded voice will inform the calling party that he is dialing someone on his own line and advise him as to the procedure to follow in completing the call.

For subscribers with Temple or Valley prefixes, most of whom will live in Longwood, Altamonte, Casselberry and Forest City, there will be no change in calling a party on the same line compared to the procedure they now follow.

The company has announced that it will be glad to give its presentation and demonstration regarding Metropolitan Service to any clubs or organizations especially in Seminole County, wanting for one of their forthcoming meetings. The presentation shows how to dial with the new prefixes, how to call a party on the same line, how to call long distance service, and how to use Metropolitan Service to make toll-free calls to any telephone both the Winter Park and Orlando exchange areas.

To arrange for a presentation, subscribers representing clubs are asked to call Winter Park 6-1441 for a definite engagement.

They had gone into our house to pull the windows down to save it from water damage, too.

For months I could not dispel that trembling and strange feeling of fear as we would approach Oviedo from that same direction. I will always feel as though we may have saved that house if we had stayed home. It started in the back and would have been in clear view from our bedroom window.

About ten years ago the town bought another Ford fire truck. It, like its predecessors, lived a life of usefulness—so to speak.

Drought Burning Up Crops In 11 Eastern States

By UNITED PRESS

One of the worst droughts to hit the eastern United States since 1900 is burning up fruit, vegetable and tobacco crops from Maine to Virginia, lowering water reserves to below-normal levels, and scorching woodlands tinder dry.

Unless soaking rains end the three-month dry spell that has brought 11 eastern states to the brink of agricultural disaster, losses to farmers, florists and home gardeners may reach the \$500 to 75 million dollar mark by the end of the month. Crops now being harvested are 40-80 per cent below normal and market prices are resultingly higher.

The next four days may spell relief or disaster for the area, but the U. S. Weather Bureau is holding out no hope or relief. The bureau is predicting little or no rainfall for the week end and no appreciable precipitation in the foreseeable future.

Rainfall has been about 60 per cent below normal in the Middle Atlantic and New England States since May 1. States affected by the drought are Maine, New Hampshire, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Delaware and Virginia. Only Vermont and sections of upstate New York have had sufficient rainfall.

Bow! Agreement Renewed

MIAMI — Officials of the Orange Bowl football game disclosed that pressure from television networks for more attractive games prompted them to drop their bowl tie-up with the Atlantic Coast Conference.

The Bowl Committee announced Monday it has renewed its bowl agreement with the Big Eight, the old Big Seven from 1950 through 1951, but a similar pact with the ACC will be dropped after the game next Jan. 1.

The committee also disclosed a clause in the new pact that might permit perennial power Oklahoma to appear in the bowl as often as three times in the next four years.

The committee had been under strong local pressure to end the "closed shop" selection of teams and open the door for local favorites Miami, Florida, and Florida State. But then the pressure came, too, from the television outlets.

OBC President Joe H. Adams and former chairman Vern Kususew said the networks were looking for a bigger audience.

"The television people wanted us to have a game with an international angle," Kususew explained. "With a Big Eight champion as the host team, we have a wide choice from the South, eastern and Atlantic Coast conferences, Army, Navy and an outstanding eastern team."

The Sooners are eligible to return next year under an old agreement.

In the new pact, the bowl got the Big Eight to agree to permit the conference champs to repeat again in 1959 because "it is the silver anniversary of the bowl."

Hockey League Trades Made

DETROIT — All-Stars Ted Lindsay and Glenn Hall of the Detroit Red Wings were traded to the Chicago Black Hawks of the National Hockey League in the latest switch made by the hockey counterparts of the New York Yankees and Kansas City Athletics.

The Wings received 22-year-old center Forbes Kennedy in exchange for the 22-year-old Lindsay and Hall as well as former Red Wing John Wilson and two lesser players goalie Henry Haseen and a junior player whose last name is Preston. The principal didn't recall his first name.

The trade broke up one of the greatest line of all times—the famed "Production Line" whose stars were Lindsay and Gordie Howe. The pair were one-two in NHL scoring last season with Howe netting 44 goals and 43 assists for 87 points and Lindsay just four points behind. They were the scoring heart of the Wings who won the regular season title.

It was doubtful that Lindsay would go through with the trade, however. The 19-year Detroit veteran, who holds nearly every left wing scoring record, has said many times that he will not play for any other team than Detroit.

But Lindsay could not be reached for comment.

The team chosen by the coaches will be distributed as an exclusive feature of the United Press.

General Mills succeeds Collier's magazine in the sponsoring role. Collier's discontinued publication last January.

"When the American Football Coaches Association took over the selection of the All-American football team for Collier's in 1946, we felt that we were the logical heirs of Walter Camp," George Latty James, Cornell University football coach, said at a Minneapolis Chamber of Commerce luncheon where the announcement was made.

"It is a pleasure to be associated with General Mills and the United Press as we plan together this great American tradition," he added.

Rod Wilkinson of Oklahoma, vice president of the coaches association, and Tuse McLaughry of Dartmouth, executive secretary, also spoke.

One sporting goods dealer said yesterday "there is a decided reaction on the part of boat owners."

Don Smith said that the main item the United States Coast Guard inspectors were checking for were life preserver cushions or life preservers. According to regulations that are enforced, and from Coast Guard pamphlet CG-290, motorboats of Class "A" (Less than 18 feet in length) must have one Coast Guard approved life preserver, buoyant vest, ring buoy, or buoyant cushion of good and serviceable condition for each person on board.

Smith said yesterday that those buying these safety devices should be careful to examine them to be sure that a Coast Guard approved tag is attached.

"Many of the boat owners are buying extra cushions and putting them in their boats under the bow. This practice makes it impossible to get to the cushions in case of an emergency under the bow is the hardest place to get to if the boat capsizes, is hit, or is damaged."

For extra passengers, over and above the number of cushions used in the boat, life preservers, buoyant vests or ring buoys are best for they can be placed conveniently in the boat where they can be available quickly to passengers.

"No one seems to complain about the surprise inspections conducted in the Sanford area," Smith said yesterday. "Everyone seems to agree that it is a good idea."

"Every sporting goods store and jobber seems to be out of cushions at the present," Smith commented as he spoke of the sudden rush for the safety regulation equipment. However, he explained, that jobbers will be ready to supply us in the very near future.

It is expected that the Coast will have boarding teams in the Sanford area on a regular basis, according to information received by telephone from the Miami office of the 7th Coast Guard District.

In a telephone interview with the Boatman's Mate who took part in the Sanford area inspection, a Jacksonville office is being set up to handle this area on a regular basis.

"We haven't inspected the inland waterways as closely as we should in the past," was the comment from Miami.

The Coast Guard Auxiliary, with Flotilla 4-11 located in Sanford, under the command of William B. Cavanaugh, it is reported, will continue its inspections here on weekends. Such inspections, when successful, result in the boat owner receiving a decal to attach to the boat.

28 Million Americans Crowding Waterways

NEW YORK — Americans, 28 million of them according to one estimate, this summer are fleeing from weekend highway jams to crowd the nation's waterways.

Yacht clubs, power squadrons, Coast Guardsmen and boat builders report the number of boats has nearly tripled since World War II.

A spokesman for the National Association of Engine and Boat Manufacturers estimated that there are 6 1/2 million pleasure boats in the United States today. Only 2 1/2 million were estimated to have been in operation in 1947. Congressional committee on recreational boating safely said estimates of the number of Americans who annually go down to the sea or lake in small boats reach 28 million. But the NAEBM man said he would put the figure at around 17 million.

Mostly Outboard — The NAEBM spokesman said the fact that 4 1/2 million outboard motors have been produced since 1945 is indicative of the multiplying number of boats — mostly small boats.

Little more than a million outboard engines were built in the 20 years prior to 1941, he said. Few were made during the war. But the theory that for every motor there has to be a boat is not exactly true, the spokesman said. Some small cabin cruisers and powerful outboard speedboats now are being constructed to mount two big outboard engines.

A new factor compounds the number of small boats sailing favored waters and adds to the number of "inlanders" able to join in the sport, according to the NAEBM.

Weekend Sailors — "In the past three years 750,000 boat trailers have been sold," the spokesman said. "There were only a handful in use before that time."

"Folks just keep their boats in the back yard till Friday. They trail her to the shore, launch her and off they go."

Boating is no longer restricted to the seaboard, major lakes and rivers.

In his report to the House Committee on Merchant Marine and Fisheries, Rep. Herbert C. Bonner, D-N.Y., referred to hundreds of new reservoirs.

He said that they are providing an "immense" recreational potential "in regions which have been in the past virtual water deserts."

Bonner concluded that boating in the United States had become a "booming activity." Some yachtsmen are already calling it "the new national pastime."

Visible Results Told From Jaycee Drive To Remove Shrubbery

Momentum in the citywide 30-day period of voluntary removal of shrubbery increased today as letters from the Seminole County Junior Chamber of Commerce are being readied for mailing to all property holders Monday.

The letter, signed by M. L. Raborn Jr., president of the Jaycee organization will be folded, sealed, and then addressed by the city's addressograph machine.

Removal of shrubbery from the city's parkways is noticed in some sections of the city as both the Jaycees and the Board of Sanford City Commissioners appeal to citizens and property owners to clear the area adjacent to streets and avenues to eliminate all hazardous conditions to both motorists and pedestrians.

The Board of Sanford City Commissioners revealed at the last meeting of the board that it is unlawful to plant shrubbery, trees and flowers in the parkways without the express permission of the commission after plans for the planting are submitted.

City Manager Warren E. Knowles revealed today that it has been necessary to put two additional crews and trucks to work picking up shrubbery and limbs pulled out or trimmed.

Knowles said that at the present he isn't able to pin point any particular section of the city in which the shrubbery removal is the heaviest. However, he did say that the abundance of trash being picked up has thrown the trash pickup schedule behind.

Reports from the Sanford Police Department are continuing to pour into the City Manager's office. City Manager Knowles said that a list is being made from the reports and as shrubbery and low hanging limbs are removed names are eliminated. At the end of the 30-day voluntary period in which property owners cooperate those names which are still on the list will be notified that it will be necessary to comply with the city ordinance.

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3,000 Feared Dead In Japanese Floods



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TOKYO — A deluge of 27 inches of rain in less than 24 hours hit Kyushu Island with catastrophic force today, causing floods and landslides. The known dead and missing were in the hundreds.

Official police figures said there were 157 persons confirmed dead and 249 missing. The figures were expected to rise when communications are restored.

Japanese news reports from the scene said the death toll may run as high as 3,000.

Police listed 67,906 persons belonging to 9,482 families as "affected" by the floods — their homes washed away or wrecked. Police reported 1,031 houses damaged, 286 washed away and 29,117 flooded.

The worst hit were the cities of Isehaya, with a population of 60,000, and Omura, a city of half that size, on Omura Bay on the west coast of Kyushu and some 10 miles from atom-bombed Nagasaki. Kyushu is Japan's southernmost main island.

The Mainichi newspaper correspondent at Nagasaki called Isehaya a "city of the dead" and said police estimated 2,000 to 3,000 killed there. The newspaper Yomiuri said 3,000 were drowned in the two cities.

The Kyodo News Service reported from Isehaya today that "large numbers of persons" were still clinging to rooftops clamoring for help and that Japanese ground troops sent on rescue missions could only look on helplessly across the swirling waters.

Dozens of landslides were reported in the mountainous area around Nagasaki and the U. S. Navy said 100 persons were missing in a landslide between Nagasaki and Sasebo and that 1,500 persons were "cut off." A landslide in Tensui buried 50 more persons and these too were feared dead.

U. S. military installations apparently were in no danger.

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Navy Men Describe Air Navigation To Girl Scouts

Two Bombarrier-Navigators from Heavy Attack Squadron Eleven (VAH-11) described air navigation last night to members of Girl Scout Troops 212 and 264 at the Presbyterian Youth Hall in Sanford.

Using their off-duty hours to help the Girl Scouts attain aviation badges were Gerald K. Smith, Aviation Electronics Technician First Class, USN, and Raymond M. Hite, Aviation Ordnance man First Class, USN.

The Girl Scouts were supervised by their leader Mrs. Ruby F. Jordan of 122 Laurel Drive.

Drawing upon their many hours of flight experience to enrich the lecture, Hite and Smith described various navigational instruments, methods of navigation, navigation by use of the stars and the effects of weather on navigation.

The highlight of the evening was the description of how the in-flight refueling was accomplished by VAH-11 when it refueled Maj. Glenn in his F4U-Crusader while on his record speed run across the United States recently. Smith was the bombardier aboard the VAH-11 AJ that accomplished the refueling.

Couple, Daughter Rescued Thursday From Mountainside

ASTENTVILLE, N. C. — An Ohio couple and their young daughter who spent nearly 24 hours on a rugged mountainside where their plane crashed were saved because "God gave us another chance," the father said today.

Joseph T. Wloszek and his family, from Cleveland, were not seriously injured in the crash of his light plane. Rescuers spotted them Thursday and brought them off the mile-high mountainside.

The three were being cared for in a hospital here mainly for shock and exposure.

Wloszek's plane crashed in a fog on Clingman's Peak Wednesday. The family was on route here from Cleveland to attend a convention.

Wloszek walked from the wreckage of the plane to a steep logging road after rescue carriers his wife and daughter out on stretchers. The little girl still held the teddy bear which she clutched all night.

2-Story Building Collapses On 200 Wedding Guests

CAIRO — A rickety two-story building collapsed on 200 wedding guests clapping and stamping out a beat for a belly dancer today, killing scores of men, women and children.

Police said 63 bodies had been recovered from the wreckage and the death toll may go higher.

At least 34 of the known dead were children between the ages of one and 14 years of age.

One police official said "as many as 77 may have been killed" when the walls of the house came crashing down. Another 15 persons were reported in serious condition at hospitals.

The bride, 19-year-old Fatma El Shimy, stood holding the hand of her husband, Mansour Abdel Hamid, when disaster struck shortly before 12. The merriment had reached its peak with the native music and belly dancing. The guests clapped and stamped in joy.

The bride, wearing her white wedding dress, was found in the debris. The bridegroom escaped with injuries.

J. Jones Seriously Injured As Tree Limb Falls On Head

An Oviedo boy was seriously injured near Gainesville yesterday about noon when a tree limb was sawing off fell on him striking his head.

Johnny Jones, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Jones of Oviedo, was working with the Alachua County Road Department when the accident occurred.

Hospital reports late yesterday stated Johnny Jones condition as "serious." He is in the Gainesville Hospital.

Mrs. Marian Jones, reporting the accident from Gainesville, where she had gone immediately to be with her son, said that Johnny was resting easy.

The young Oviedo man played basketball with the University of Florida freshman team last year and is slated to play again with the Uoff courtmen next basketball season.

Births Outnumber Deaths In County For 5-Month Period

Births in Seminole County outnumbered deaths by more than two and one-half to one during the period January through May of this year according to the monthly statistical report of the Florida State Board of Health.

According to the report there were 438 births in comparison to 168 deaths recorded in Seminole County.

The report also stated that there were 119 marriages during the five-month period which was offset by a total of 77 divorces or annulments.

It was also pointed out in the report that the leading killer continues to be heart disease with 55 deaths recorded from that cause.

Cancer is the second leading killer in Seminole County. During the five months from January through May there were 28 deaths from cancer.

Other causes of death are listed in the report as 21 deaths from cerebral vascular disease; 10 deaths from influenza and pneumonia; seven from motor vehicle accidents; seven from other forms of accidents; five from chronic nephritis; three from diabetes; and one from tuberculosis and other CVR diseases.

Moss Bluff Lock, Dam Water Levels Reported Improved

The District Engineer of the Corps of Engineers released information today to the effect that water levels at the Moss Bluff Lock and Dam have improved sufficiently to allow weekend discharges of water on Saturday and Sunday.

Col. Paul D. Troxler said that the lock will continue to be operated from 8 a.m. to 12 noon and 4 p.m. daily for such craft as are able to navigate the river.

However, he warned in his release that water levels in many areas are still below normal and snags are known to be present. Caution is advised of all persons attempting to navigate the river he said.
