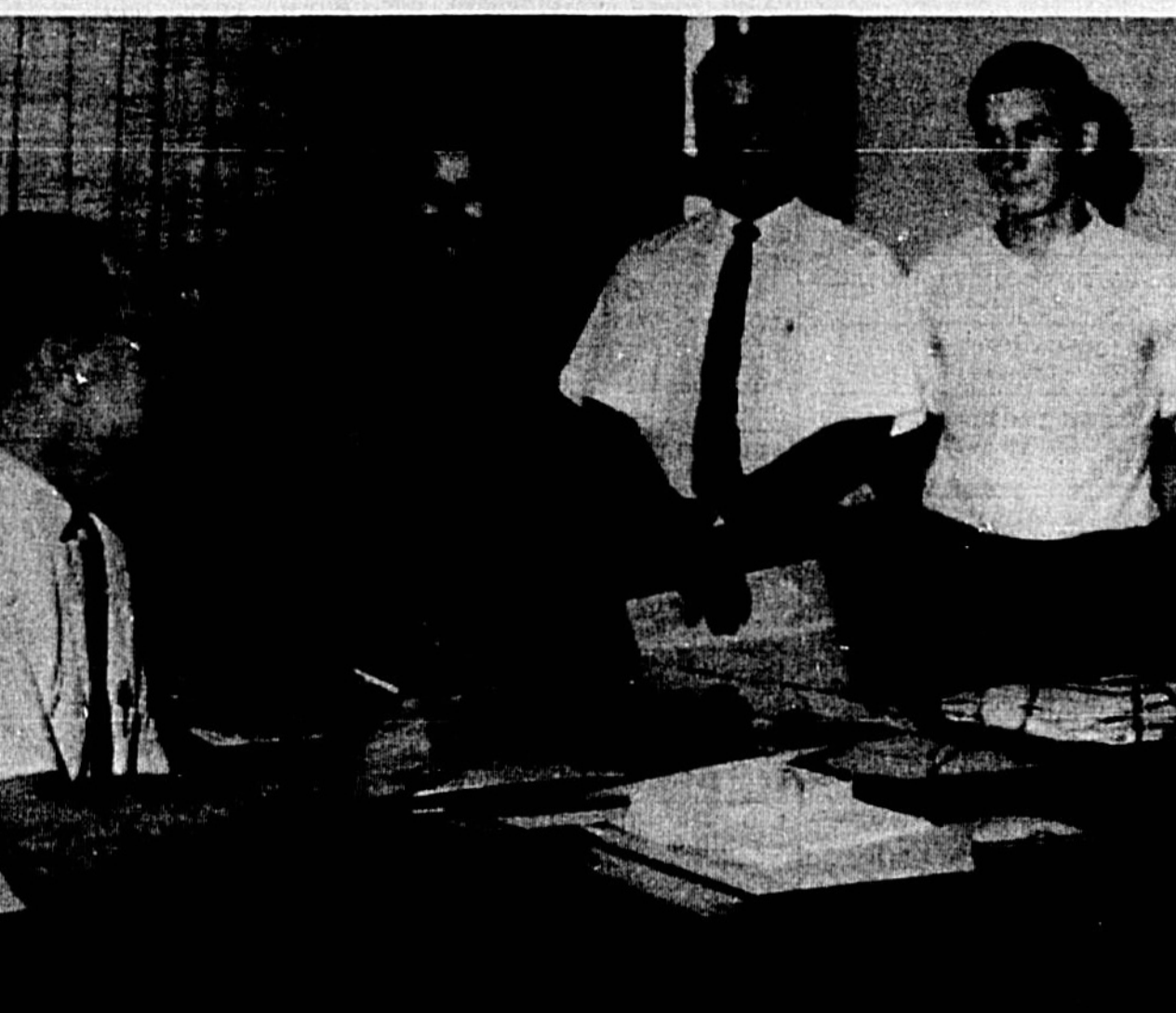
Teen Allowances - Is Yours Fair?

Specialists in the youth field say that the question parents ask them most is—"What kind of an allowance should I give?" See what you think of this advice from the experts—Start younger teenagers off with a reasonable sum, about \$3 to \$4 a week, and increase this with their needs and how responsibly they handle it.

Allowances usually should cover daily expenses like bus fares, supplies for school, lunch—but parents should agree that the extra money left over should be spent as a teen-ager boy or girl chooses.

If there's foolish spending, allowances should be kept small rather than large. And parents shouldn't give an advance against allowances ahead, except in a real emergency.

The experts acknowledge that grownups don't always handle money too well. So they point out the big aim of an allowance should be to encourage those receiving it—right up through college age—to train themselves to handle money well.

Defector Mum MOSCOW (AP) — American defector Harold M. Koch has refused to speak with anyone from the U.S. Embassy in Moscow. Koch, a former Roman Catholic priest in the Chicago archdiocese, appeared on Moscow television Tuesday night to say that he had defected to the Soviet Union in protest against the war in Viet Nam.

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The justice department asked a federal judge today to compel Plaquemine Parish School officials to provide teachers at Woodlawn High School, which was deserted by its white teachers and when Negroes registered. In a motion filed with U.S. Dist. Judge Herbert W. Christenberry, the department also asked that the school be ordered to show cause why it should not take steps to employ bus drivers and cafeteria personnel at each of its schools.

MINNAPOLIS (AP) — A little, Wellesley housewife won the Republican nomination today in Massachusetts' 10th congressional district, defeating former house speaker Joseph W. Martin, 51, who has served 42 years in Congress. Margaret M. Heckler, 55, ran an aggressive campaign to "get a heckler in congress" and topped Martin — for years "Mr. Republican" to voters in the district and to many national GOP figures.

MINNESOTA Gov. Karl F. Rolvaag, rejected for renomination by his own Democratic - Farmer-Labor party, won the chance on his own Tuesday to seek a second term in the Nov. 8 general election.

LONDON (AP) — Canadian Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson was striving today to avert a breakup of the 22-nation Commonwealth conference over the Rhodesian crisis. He and his aides worked through the night on a compromise formula to reconcile the widely divergent views on how best to end the 10-month-old rebellion by Rhodesian Prime Minister Ian Smith's white minority government.

SARASOTA, Fla. (AP) — Dr. Carl Coppolino, scheduled for trial Nov. 7 in the death of his first wife, was in a quarrelsome mood today after collapsing in court. Hospital officials said Coppolino's attorney had instructed that they withhold word on his condition but added he wasn't believed to be in great danger. The 34-year-old author-doctor was rushed to the hospital after collapsing in Circuit Court Tuesday during a preliminary hearing to determine whether he should stand trial. Gasping and clutching his chest, he was carried to an ambulance. His second wife, Mary, was at his side.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former President Harry S. Truman had this advice for skillful politicians: "If you can't stand the heat, get out of the kitchen." Senate Republican leader Everett M. Dirksen, however, obviously didn't mind the heat from the White House on the civil rights controversy. And he isn't trying to escape the kitchen. "I don't know where they get the idea I am on issues of this kind," Dirksen mused. The Senate votes today on cloture — the means of shutting off debate and bringing the civil rights bill up for action. Without Dirksen's support the measure virtually has no chance the administration could get the two-thirds vote needed for cloture.

GRENADA, Miss. (AP) — More than 300 state officers in full riot gear and with orders to crack down hard on trouble-makers, sealed off newly-segregated schools here today and 63 Negro pupils marched to class without challenge. A two-block area around the two formerly all-white public schools was ringed with helmeted highway patrolmen and game and fish wardens. Only pupils, their parents and teachers were permitted through police lines.

CLEVELAND (UPI) — Dr. Samuel W. Sheppard, scheduled to stand trial here Oct. 18 in the 1954 slaying of his first wife, was to appear for a change of venue today on grounds a "fair and impartial trial could not be had" in Cuyahoga County. Common Pleas Judge Roy F. McMahon, who will rule on the motion, said he would contact attorneys for the state and defense to determine a date for a hearing on the request.

LAJOLLA, Calif. (UPI) — Dozens of nationalist youths were wounded Tuesday night when they burned four police stations and clashed with police and foreign legionnaires. The governor of French Somaliland, the last French possession in Africa, ordered a 7 p.m. curfew and sent security forces to ring off the native sections of the capital city to prevent a recurrence of riots. However, Gov. Louis Saget indicated that France was willing to offer some form of independence in the near future to French Somaliland.

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — Shouting "We're on top of the world!" the Gemini 11 astronauts today soared higher and faster than man has ever flown, and then, amazingly, both crashed on a star photography assignment.

Gordon was standing in his seat, his head poked through an open hatch waiting for a nighttime pass so he could see the stars, when command pilot Charles Conrad Jr. reported: "We both took a pit nap — dozed off for a few minutes."

Mission control center in Houston, Tex., commented: "That's a space first — sleeping in a vacuum."

The astronauts had started the day by using the power of an Agena rocket to rise to a record altitude of 860 miles. "I tell you, you can't believe it!" Conrad exclaimed as they first reached the high outpost above eastern Australia. "Utterly fantastic. The world is round."

Charge County Board With Road Politics

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Atty. Gen. Earl Faircloth said today a probe into organized crime in Florida has grown to such size that it threatens the balance of power in some cities. He said he would call a committee to investigate organized crime. The attorney general called on Ellis Rubin, his Republican opponent in the general election, to "put up or shut up" about an alleged list of syndicate crime leaders.

Faircloth said his committee would be primarily concerned with the activities of organized crime "which exists to a dangerous extent in the state." U. S. Assigns Advisers To Dominican Army Unit

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP) — The U.S. Army is assigning bilingual advisers to the Dominican army for a training program similar to the one begun in South Vietnam in 1965. The program is being carried out by the U.S. Military Aid and Assistance Group (MAAG) in Santo Domingo. D. U.S. Army advisers will arrive later this month. MAAG handles training programs in a number of countries, but on a more superficial basis. Military men believe that only in Viet Nam have training advisers been assigned down to the 200-man company level.

Children's Home Top UF Agency

One of the United Fund agencies that has been increasingly popular is the Children's Home Society. This is particularly true in Seminole County as more and more residents have become acquainted with the humanitarian services it affords. Many "pioneers" Floridians have come acquainted with this "city of concern and care" at the turn of the century. It state-wide reputation and popularity grew under the guidance of Marcus (Daddy) Parg, who served so long as its dedicated director. At that time the entire service force worked out of Jacksonville. However, as its arm of loving concern spread more extensively over the state, it was imperative that district offices be opened.

Now there are ten such service centers — and on the first of next year there will be an eleventh. The one for this area is the Central Florida District with headquarters at 135 Avenida Plaza, Orlando. It is under the supervision of Mrs. Ruth Lantz, executive director. An idea of the expanding helpfulness of Children's Home Society may be gained by a quick look at some statistics for this organization whose conservation is to help young mothers and to the legal adoption of their infants by childless families, eager to have these youngsters and emotionally and financially able to care for them.

In 1964 in Florida CHS placed 718 children. This was exceeded by only one other private agency in the nation. In the January to December 1965 period of next year there will be an increase to 855. A similar advance in the service to Seminole County is just as amazing. In 1965 twenty-two Florida division served just 15 adoptive applications and counseled and cared for four unwed mothers for Seminole County. In the year just closed these services reached 15 adoptive homes and seven unwed mothers. For the first six months of 1966 these data are nine and five, respectively.

This supports the theory that as more and more people become acquainted with the warm-hearted hand of help that the society extends, the outreach in service will be broadened to expand. The ability to do this is limited to the funds that are available to CHS. This in turn is dependent on the generous support of people in this area for their United Fund campaign.

As an example, the search of unwed mothers for an understanding, sympathetic and helpful hand in Central Florida has brought more and more of them to CHS, and now it is necessary to add another case worker to the Orlando office staff. An official comment is that not that there are so many unwed mothers there were several years ago, but that these distraught girls and their mothers and fathers have come to know through United Fund and the CHS office information sources that here is the haven they seek. Here is the anonymity that in their anxiety seems no where available to these girls. And in CHS there

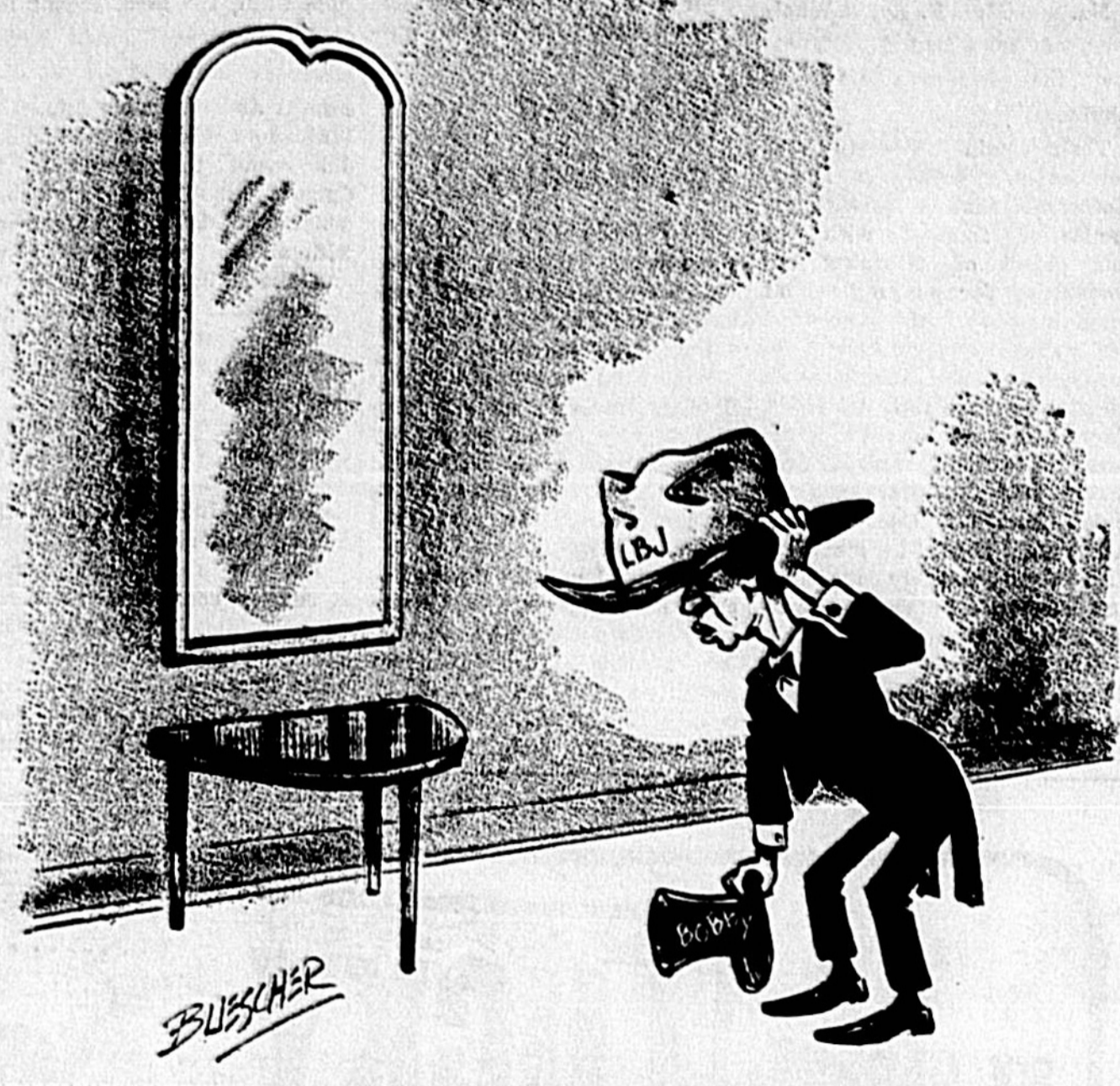

'Stop Bombing Us,' Cambodian Prince Tells U.S.

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP) — "If the Americans want to come back to Cambodia they must decide, once and for all, to stop bombing us," Prince Norodom Sihanouk says. Sihanouk added that his people would "sack the American Embassy, as they have already done, if there were no bombings on our frontier zones by the Americans."

Relations between the two countries broke down in early 1965 following incidents along Cambodia's border with South Viet Nam. American planes recently bombed the Cambodian village of Thlok Track and Washington said there was confusion about the exact line of the frontier.

Sihanouk expressed his views to West German author Klaus Mehnert during an interview Saturday.

Non-Red Sales Hurting U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department says the United States — and not Communist countries — are hurt by American exporting the sale in this country of goods imported from the Communist nations of Eastern Europe.

The department referred in a pamphlet issued Monday to "an unrealistic simple view" of U.S.-Communist relations held by those who use black lists, boycotts, threats or picketing to halt such sales. The pamphlet noted that Communist countries are expanding their trade with nations in Western Europe and said U.S. failure to trade with the Eastern European nations means a loss of jobs and income to U.S. workers, businessmen and farmers.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Gen. Omar N. Bradley and his new bride fly to New York today for their honeymoon.

Bradley, 70, and Esther Dora Butler, 44, a twice-divorced screenwriter, were married Monday in a five-minute ceremony at the San Diego, Calif., courthouse.

\$1 Billion OK'd For Construction

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson has signed into law the \$1,003,842,000 military construction bill.

But he said he would seek revision of a provision requiring the administration to notify Congress before closing a military base "if future circumstances prove it to be minimal to the national interest."

The President vetoed one construction bill last year because of a reporting requirement, but finally accepted a less strict version Monday requiring that congressional armed services committees be notified 30 days in advance of any base closing.

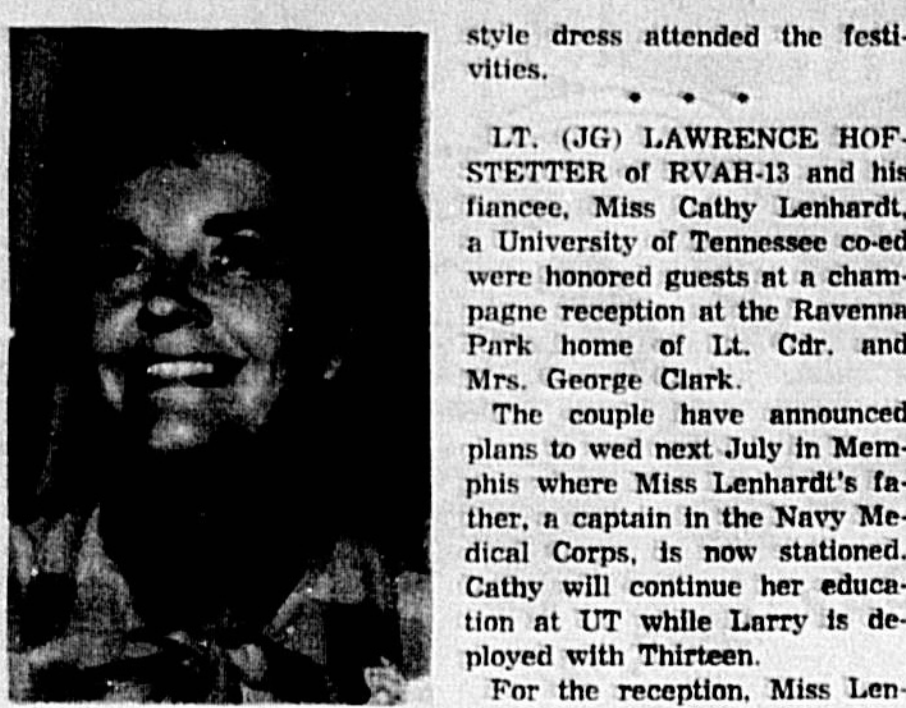
The new bill changes the advance notice requirement to 90 congressional sessions, says Johnson said this is in effect a flat bar against otherwise desirable base closings.

Nonagenarian Recalls Early Days In Sanford

Senior Citizen George Bagley has been in Midway longer than anyone. Born Sept. 17, 1873, he came here from Ocala in 1912. This reporter got a big kick out of talking with the man as he talked of the Midway-Cannan area in its earliest existence. "When I first came to Sanford, I lived between Sanford and Palmetto Avenues. As a matter of fact, nothing but colored people lived in that area. Sanford Avenue did not run any farther than approximately 200 yards south of First Street," he said.

One of the first persons to see elderly gentleman met when he came to Sanford was a fellow whose last name was Boyd. "He was the barber and everyone called him Pop Boy, said the elderly gentleman displaying a wide grin.

Midway was established by F. F. Dudden and R. C. Maxwell. The reason it was named such because it was located midway between Sanford and Cameron City.

"Negroes owned a vast amount of land on First Street, and as far wide as the Sanford Naval Academy," he chuckled. Reflecting back on some of the earlier public officials, "The first sheriff of Seminole County was Charlie Hand, who was appointed by Gov. Sidney J. Kate. First superintendent of public instruction was D. L. Thrasher. Cannon City was established by H. C. Debose."

At this point, this writer asked what he did to do to make Midway a better place in which to live. His reply was, "I was responsible for getting the first school in Midway. My first teacher was S. E. Monroe, a man, and he was quite a fellow."

Following such events, Midway grew like wild fire. "I've never seen a place grow so fast. Persons came from Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina and Mississippi and settled here. The land was very cheap," he said. By the way, Georgetown was named after a place in South Carolina.

Commenting on our youth, he expounded in a serious and forceful tone. "Children have more education and less pride. They do not care about religion. They have evil, treasure evil, and grow up too fast. "Of course, parents do not set a good example for their children. They treasure too much evil, and allow their children too much freedom."

He said that his most pleasant times were spent attending school. "Wonderful times," he laughed. Bagley mentioned the attempt to incorporate Midway and Cannon into a separate township. "Cary Byrd, George Thomas, Calvin Moore Sr., Henry Oliver, Charles Williams and I worked the incorporation into the election. We were represented by Attorney E. F. Housholder and John Leonard. A petition was signed by the majority of persons. However, some evil of others defeated the purpose," he said.

It would please this man very much if the streets were improved. "I treasure Midway, it is not

MIAMI (AP)—Charlie Bell, 34, possibly was saved Tuesday—once by a murder trial jury, once by doctors.

The judge ruled the statement out because Bell was not advised that an attorney would be provided for him if he couldn't afford one.

Seminole Memorial Hospital is expected to be mailed from HEW's Washington headquarters today.

Robert Bessner, administrator, issued a statement to The Sanford Herald today that said: "We have just been notified by telephone by the Office of Equal Health Opportunity of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare that Seminole Memorial Hospital has been found to be in compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, retroactive to August 3, 1966."

Members of the federal Board of Trustees, as well as myself, are relieved and instructed the board attorney, Gordon Frederick to write a strongly worded letter to HEW officials to that effect.

All members of the medical staff were notified today.

The City Commission, meeting in special session last night reduced the debt service millage by one mill.

Quite a few of the adjustments were downward and each property owner will be notified of the new taxation of the property owner's particular request.

The motion to reduce the debt service millage was made by Commissioner Earl Higginbotham.

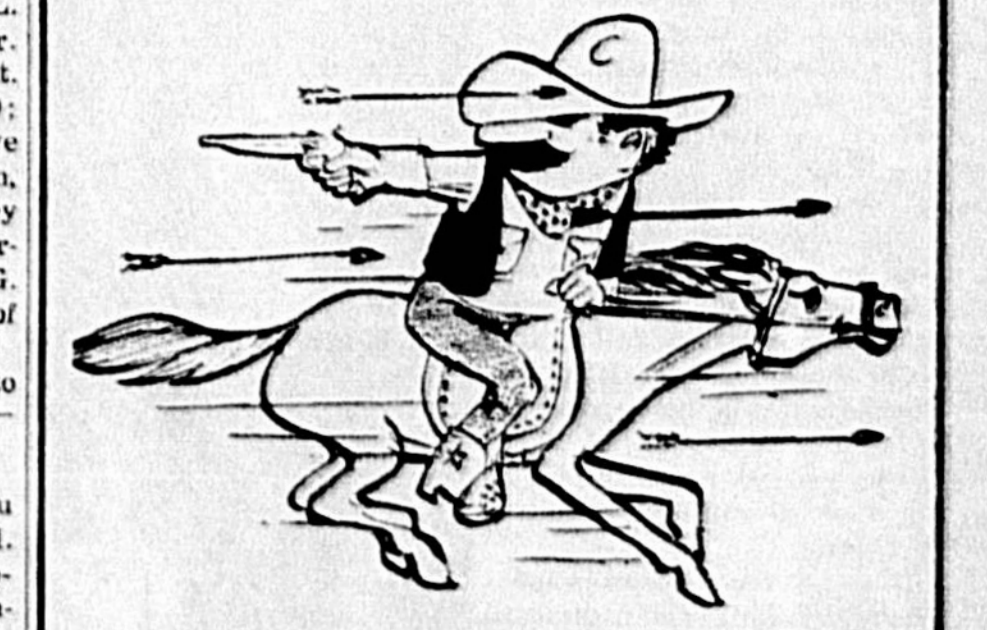
