From Candy Or Roses To Bible Verses

It stands for "To Improve Service."

It is supposed to indicate the extra money given someone who has assisted you in some way—perhaps by waiting on your table, carrying your bags, or cleaning your motel room. But in Sanford it can mean anything from a box of candy to a printed paper saying "The Lord will provide," according to local

Helen Bland, a waitress for more than 20 years, works at the Sanford Inn. She says she sees a lot of the little tracts filled with Bible verses and things like "The Lord will provide." "Those things just do not pay the rent," says Mrs. Bland. Like many waitresses she gains much of her income from tips rather than

"I've also been invited out for a drink and a night on the town, but if someone can afford that, he can afford to leave a tip," she

Missing Parents Their Target

Flowers and boxes of candy also have been given to her as tips, Mrs. Bland says. "I've received carnations several times, and once there was a man who left her one red rose. "Then there are the people who want to hold your hand instead of giving you a tip," says the Sanford resident.

Barbara Moulton also works at the Sanford Inn, and has been a waitress more than four years.

She, too, has had some tips that "just don't pay the rent." One couple came in and left me a nice shiny shell and said it was so I could 'forever hear the ocean'," she remembers. "And there are a lot of those little tracts with messages from the Bible. The best tip I ever got was from a table of seven Sanford

sessmen who left me \$14," Miss Moulton recalls. "I have received candy as a gift from customers, but not as a tip," Miss Moulton reports, "and then there are the people who leave no tip at all, because they figure it just is not their obligation to pay someone who works for someone else," she says with a distinctily frustrated tone in her voice.

Dorien Armentrout works now at Favata's Bella Cucina, in south Sanford. She used to work in Lake Buena Vista, the Walt Disney World shopping area.

"One man offered to fly me home to South America," she recalls. "I didn't go, but I still have his business card." Unforunately, she doesn't know what the card says. It, along with the name and address the man added to it, is in Spanish.

one unusual tip that she can recall: "I waited on a group one time and after they finished dinner, they bought me a piece of pie," she

Vicky Robb is not a waitress. She is a bartender at the Club Sabia, south of Sanford, but feels many of her problems - and tips - are similar to those of waitresses.

She once received a dollar bill, placed neatly on the bar, with a quarter on each corner of it, and a necklace in the middle. "It was given to me after I beat the guy four games of pool," she laughs. "Then there is one guy who comes in and never drinks anything but wine. He buys it one glass at a time, and each glass costs about 75 cents," says Miss Robb. "He pays for each glass separately, always with a two dollar bill - and I get to keep the hange," she said. "Now that's weird!"

Some of the tips are not bad, but the way they get from customer to waitress is "strange" she says, "like the guys who throw quarters across the bar." The quarters fall through the slotted floor, Miss Robb says, "so

I make them pick it up and move it so I can get the change." The floor is heavy, she explains, and people seldom throw their tips

I get some who take all the tobacco out of a cigarette, roll the bill up tight and stuff it in the cigarette paper," she said. "And there are also some people who tie a dollar bill up in knots. It is difficult to untie the darned things," she laughs.

Miss Woodard and her co-worker, Jackie Ainsley, both called attention to the fact that there are also customers who leave a tip in change - and at the bottom of a water glass. But neither one has received any of the little paper tracts.

Miss Ainsley says that there have also some time when she was told she would get no tip until she told some jokes. She made the swap - a story for a tip, and she and the customer were both

Both women agree that "big parties are the worst tippers" and pointed out that sometimes one man will go around to everyone in a large group and collect each share of the bill, then pay for the meal and pocket the difference instead of leaving it as a tip

Tear Gas Helps Nab

Paris Plane Hijacker

PARIS (UPI) — French police hurling tear gas grenades stormed a hijacked jet with 107 people aboard and captured its hijacker Friday. But the tall, blond hijacker exploded a hand grenade that killed one person and wounded four others to end the nine-hour

But in the attack five persons were wounded seriously enough to be hospitalized and one of them, a male passenger, died an hour later. A sixth person, stewardess Annick Guillemot, 30, was shot in the elbow when she tried to stop the hijacker from entering the cockpit soon after taking off from Orly Air-

S6 Million Ransom Ready

DACCA, Bangladesh (UPI) — A Japanese airliner carrying \$6 million and six freed prisoners arrived in Dacca today to meet the demands of terrorists threatening to kill 141 hostages held aboard a hijacked jet.

The five Japanese Red Army hijackers say they will release 53 of the hostages once the money and their freed comrades are delivered. But they apparently intend to use the remaining captives to bargain their way out of Bangladesh to an undisclosed

Women As Priests? Not Any More Than Fathers, Husbands?'

PORT ST. LUCIE (AP) - The presiding bishop of the Episcopal Church has offered his resignation to protest the church's decision to allow ordination of women priests. The Rt. Rev. John M. Allin said in remarks prepared for delivery Friday night to the church's House of Bishops he does not believe "that women can be priests any more than they can become fathers or husbands."

The spiritual leader of the three-million member denomination said, "My mind holds no question or doubts as to the rights and abilities of women to be elders, rulers, executives, generals, presidents, judges or "I remain unconvinced that women can be

"If it is determined by prayerful authority that this limitation prevents one from serving as the presiding bishop of this church, I am willing to resign the office," Bishop Allin said. There was no formal response to his resignation offer.

More than 130 Episcopal bishops from around the world began an eight-day meeting with Friday's introductory session. They'll deal later with other church controversies including the furor caused by the ordination of an avowed lesbian and changing church attitudes toward divorce and

The House of Bishops and the House Deputies form the church's general conention, which has final authority in matters of policy and doctrine.

About 60 women have been ordained as

riests in the United States since the general convention of priests, bishops and lay persons voted to admit women to the priesthood last year, said church spokesman Walter Boyd. Bishop Allin's offer of resignation comes at a time when Episcopalians are in disarray about the direction of their church.

A coalition of 15 Episcopal organizations is disgruntled by the decision to ordain women and by changes in the centuries-old wording of the Book of Common Prayer. Dissident church leaders and members met St. Louis in September and decided to set up their own churches and break away from

Comprehensive Plan And The Future

Seminole County's Comprehensive Plan has

There never really was much doubt that it wouldn't be — in spite of the many questions, objections and criticisms that cropped up along the

way.

Many of these were aired before County Planner Bill Kercher and his staff as they ambitiously made the rounds of municipalities and groups within the county to explain, clarify and amplify the program.

These sessions, although not exercises we are sure Mr. Kercher and his colleagues would want to repeat soon, did prove helpful in airing the issue. These planners are to be commended for their

As a result of these sessions — plus the public hearings conducted by the Seminole County Commission - many objections were directly addressed, acted upon and, in some cases, ac-

cepted and incorporated into the final plan as adopted.

This is what representative government is all about. So additional plaudits should be directed toward Commission Chairman Dick Williams et al for their efforts in opening lines of communication with the public.

The comprehensive plan consists of three elements: a "development framework" spelling out basic policies of the county in regard to natural resources and conservation, economics, housing and general land use, and services and facilities: a short-range development plan, including land-use plans for unincorporated areas; and an intergovernmental statement

Acceptance of the plan lays the groundwork for eventual county commission adoption of detailed plans governing drainage, transportation and delivery of services and facilities.

It is the prospect of such detailed plans that has caused consternation among some municipalities and their leaders. Their greatest fear has been that the plan really means the gobbling up of their bailiwicks and-or services by the larger county

This fear can be translated into one word

As we have noted here before, some sort of consolidation is probably unavoidable, perhaps desirable, somewhere down the road as the county continues to grow and it becomes imperative that we do what we can to avoid duplication of services and taxes. It is a concept worth at least intelligent, unemotional thought.

Seminole County is continuing to grow. It is no longer the agricultural, sparsely populated county of 1960 and before when there were fewer than 55,000 residents. Population now is around 150,000 - and this mandates the need for official, wellthought-out, long-range planning as how best to serve the people in all areas of the county.


Chairman Williams himself has expressed the belief that consolidation of some kind probably will come and has suggested a study of the matter.

Now, as the comprehensive plan begins to take shape and evolves into concrete action, it is essential that the county and municipal governments continue their dialog so that any policy implementation is accomplished with the least amount of friction, dissension and distrust.

Attitudes like that of Commissioner Harry Kwiatkowski, the lone dissenter to the plan who labeled it "a real horror story in the making" are at best unrealistic; at worst, less than constructive

and productive to the future of the county.

Let us look ahead, not back, and give the ommission and staff the chance to move ahead with the plan so the county, too, can move ahead.



Congress' 8-Month Session

WASHINGTON - It is always a refreshing change to encounter a member of Congress who is both candid and conscientious, even when the combination may embarrass his colleagues. Take, for instance, Rep. Andy Jacobs, D-Ind. who has never been overly concerned about

goring sacred cows. Jacobs, to his credit, was one of 45 House members who recently signed a letter to Speaker Tip O'Neill urging that House leaders abandon plans to adjourn in October and hold Congress in session until Christmas.



While it is true that larger warships and merchant tankers are unable to pass through the canal, it nonetheless remains an important defense asset. The terms and conditions which have been worked out in the new treaties will, according to our defense authorities,

not only preserve but enhance our national security interests. Under the new Panama Canal treaty, the United States will have primary responsibility for the defense of the canal until the year 2000. This will permit us to retain whatever bases and troops we may require for such defense. After the year 2000, a separate neutrality treaty, to take affect simultaneously with the new Panama Canal treaty,

will assure that the United States is able to take such action as we may deem necessary to preserve the canal's permanent neutrality against any threat or attack - and there is no limitation in the treaty on our ability to respond as we may think necessary. 

Currently, our contingency plans in the event of a crisis in NATO calls for the movement of 60 Pacific Fleet ships to the Atlantic. We must maintain control of the canal to guarantee priority passage for such ships. In the years ahead, the canal will become more rather than less important as the Navy builds smaller, faster ships. How important a function the canal provides was revealed

during the Cuban missile crisis when 115 naval ships and one Marine division moved east through the canal to face down a Soviet threat. A hostile Panamanian government may inhibit such transit in the future. As far as the U.S. economy is concerned, the important fact to bear in mind is that 70 per cent of all canal traffic has American ports as either the origin or destination. Moreover, other ships transiting the canal move goods for American

subsidiaries overseas. In the future, with the prospect of Alaska oil going to the Gulf and East Coast states, 60,000-ton tankers will probably carry this through the canal.

The U.S. Department of Commerce has estimated that if the canal should close, it would raise the price of American exports by \$932 million, probably closing off many of our agricultural markets in Asia, and raise the price of imports

The question of treaty guarantees of the security and neutrality of the canal gets to the core of the problem. The language cited to substantiate some claim to an American right of intervention after the year 2000 is so am-

Negotiations remained stalled, he said, "until the United States gave up the idea of its guaranteeing the canal's neutrality." Later on he flatly stated: "With the neutrality pact, we are not giving the United States the right of intervention."

Panama's leader, Gen. Omar Torrijos, has agreed with this interpretation. He said in a newspaper interview recently that after Dec. 31, 1999, "the duties and responsibilities will be assumed by our country solely and ex-



Contaminated Ex-Lax Held From Market

WASHINGTON - Large amounts of Ex-Lax, the popular laxative, have been secretly withheld from the market because they have been contaminated by the toxic chemical PBB. Federal investigators suspect that a number of other food and drug products also may have been The Food and Drug Administration has launched a confidential investigation into the contamination threat and some of the companies

More than that, Lombardi was an excellent handler of pitchers.

He had good instincts, an arm second only to Gabby Hartnett's in his time and a passion for work you don't always find in six-foot-

The only thing he couldn't do was run, and he never heard the

Ted Williams always was one of Lombardi's biggest boosters,

and still is. So is Harry Craft, who played with him six years with

"I always considered Ernie the best right-handed hitter I've seen in my lifetime," says Craft. "Williams was the best left-handed hitter and Lombardi the best right-handed hitter. I could

"Look at all the things he could do. He could hit with power, he could throw and he was an exceptionally fine receiver. I think one of the reasons he was overlooked for the Hall of Fame is because people had a tendency to say, 'He could hit, but that's all he could do.' That wasn't true at all.

"He was an outstanding catcher, and he helped all our young pitchers. I remember seeing Johnny Vander Meer so wild, he'd throw a ball two feet to the right of Ernie, and Ernie would just reach out and catch the ball bare-handed. Another thing about

him, he never complained much.

"Anytime he'd get hit with a foul tip, neither our manager, Bill
McKechnie, nor our trainer would ever go near him. Ernie simply

would reach down, get a handful of dirt, squat down again and give our pitcher the sign. If his finger was split or broken, he'd put his mitt under his arm, walk back to the dugout and not say a

Lombardi finished his career with Sacramento of the Pacific

Coast League in 1948 and then rather than ask for any handouts, he worked in the press box for the Giants at Candlestick Park and

Charles Swanson, deputy director of Seminole County Civil Defense makes the following suggestions for preparations which should be made if a hurricane or tornado is about to strike: HURRICANES

Until 16-24 hours ahead of the time it hits, we cannot predict exactly where a hurricane will strike, Swanson said. At that time preparations should be made in the

Close all windows. Take heavy tape and make a large "X" from one corner to the other on each window. This will help keep them from shattering if they should break. Do not go outside when the winds and rain first stop. This is the eye of the hurricane - it is only half over. Keep on hand enough canned goods to last for several

· Fill the bathtub and all available large containers with

days. Select items which can be safely eaten without

Buy at least one spare set of batteries for battery operated radio and flashlight. Two or three sets would be even better. Keep an emergency first aid kit on hand at all


