**Retired Pastor To Fill Pulpit**

Appointment of Dr. J. Ralph Neale, retired, as interim minister of First Presbyterian Church, was announced today by Dr. Charles L. Persons, chairman of the church's worship committee.

Dr. Neale, who resides with Mrs. Neale in Winter Park, will preach his first sermon in the Sanford church on Sunday, Nov. 7.

The resigning pastor, Rev. Mr. Grover C. Sewell Jr., will preach his final sermon Sunday, Oct. 31, prior to leaving to assume the pulpit of Highlands (N.C.) Presbyterian Church.

Dr. Neale will fill the pastoral duties of First Presbyterian Church, with approval of the St. John's Presbytery, until a permanent minister is appointed to succeed Mr. Sewell.

A native of Cambridge, Ohio, Dr. Neale is now the Pittsburg (Pa.) Seminary. His first church was at Piqua, Ohio, but he left there shortly thereafter for military duty during World War I.

He came to Florida as pastor of First Presbyterian Church at Palatka, remaining 8 1/2 years.

Dr. Neale retired in 1957 and he and Mrs. Neale moved to Winter Park, where they have four children, a school teacher, a minister, a science librarian and a son in the Armed Forces.

### Way To Success By Word Power-9

By The Reading Laboratory, Inc. Written for NEA Special Service. In compound nouns avoid plurals. Make plural what you want to stress.

You may have noticed that different mothers-in-law (or is it mother-in-laws?) speak differently about their son-in-law (or is it sons-in-law?) and daughters-in-law (daughters-in-laws?).

And most of us feel sorry for that poor repentant sinner—three solid months at sea—who came ashore and celebrated not wisely and too well. Tomorrow he faces separate courts-martial (or is it courts-martial?)

This question keeps coming up to annoy the members of the club, and there is no good reason for it at all. Our rhyme contains the full rule, and it is the simplest rule in the book:

In compound nouns avoid plurals. Make plural what you want to stress.

Now that sailor is certainly more concerned about court that he is about martial. "Make plural what you want to stress," tells him, therefore, that he has to face separate courts-martial. At those mothers-in-law—the important word here is mother, not law—should speak of their son-in-law and daughters-in-law. If you think these sound funny, it is simply because most people don't know this important rule: "Make plural what you want to stress." That is all there is to it.

Suppose, now, you have a situation in which one word is just as important as the other. Woman senator, for example, is to be made plural. The words are of equal importance. Which one should be pluralized? Both of them. "Make plural what you want to stress." So we say obviously, woman senators, not women senators. And we refer, by the same token, to men servants and women servants.

No less of a spelling nuisance to most people is "teaspoons full of sugar." "teaspoons of sugar," "teaspoonfuls of sugar." The question once more settles the question.

If you pour one teaspoon of sugar into Algermon's cup, then 1 pour my teaspoon full of sugar into his. My two teaspoons have been used and both have been full. Since we are talking about two separate teaspoons, we say two teaspoons full. Now, if you pour into Algermon's coffee an amount equal to what two teaspoons would hold, you have poured two teaspoonfuls into his coffee.

It is really odd that the two questions we have answered in this column bother the majority of people. With just a little common sense there would be no problems at all.

To be sure that you are clear about how to pluralize compound nouns and units of measure, underline the correct form within the parentheses in the following examples:

1. Our club has three vice-presidents. (presidents)

2. I saw them two weeks covering all their respective (coverages, coverage)

3. Two (able, ables, ables-do-ings) were awarded the award.

Choices in meats still go with broiler-fryers and turkeys. In some areas prices are edging upward, but they still remain the best buy for the money.

But check the best section for shopping buys in roasts and steaks.

Pork buys are chops and roasts, and ribs in lamb are chops and legs.

Vegetables which are plentiful and attractively priced are green beans, Brussels sprouts, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, celery, corn, cucumbers, lettuce, onions, potatoes, squash, sweet potatoes and tomatoes.

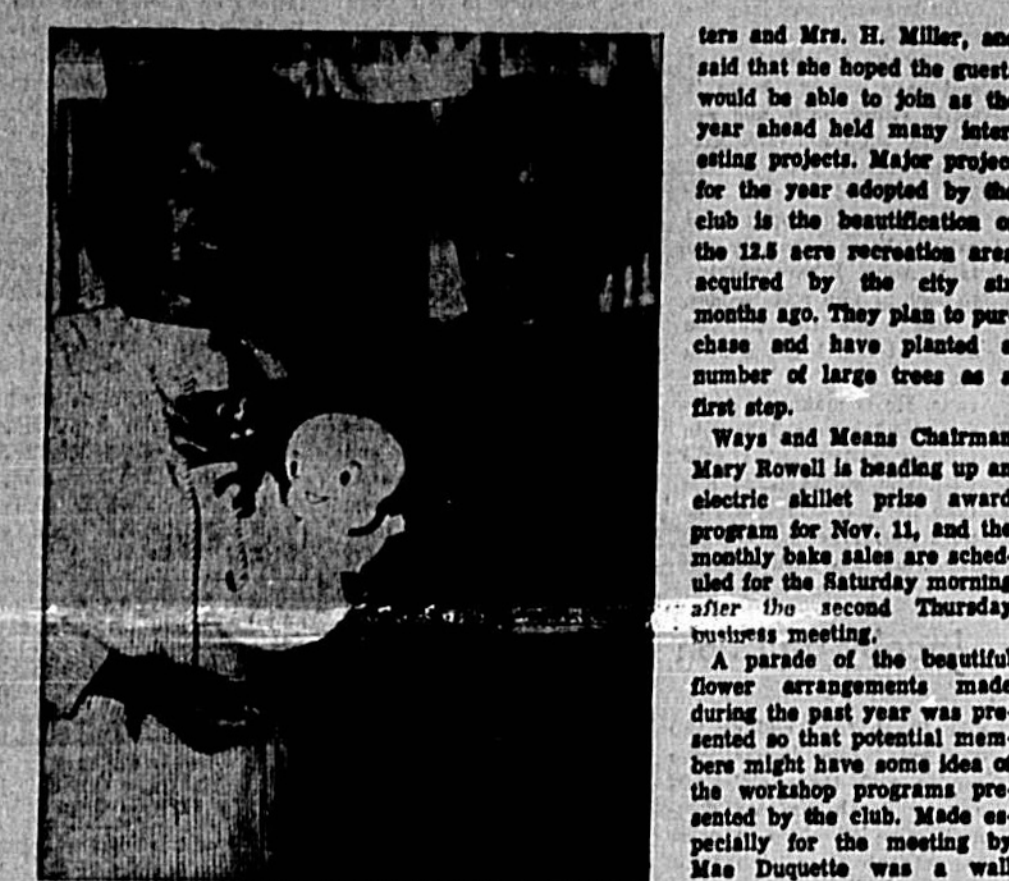
