## Axis Armies Suffer Major Reverses On Two Big War Fronts

### Turning-Point May Be Reached as British Smash Enemy Lines In Libya

### Complete African Victory Claimed

### Reds Say Italians And Nazis Fight Among Each Other

A great and perhaps decisive turning-point marked Europe's war on two fronts today as Britain announced officially the Axis front in north Africa has been completely shattered and Russia declared Adolf Hitler's invasion armies were fleeing in chaos.

A Soviet broadcast reported bitter fighting was flaring among the Axis forces, asserting Russian captured in the Donets Basin had captured retreating German, Italian and Rumanian troops when they fell fighting one another. In Libya the British reported "every front has everywhere been broken."

The Russians asserted, "We can't keep up with the Germans, they are running so fast."

Germany's counter-attack drove from Russia at the rate of 500 to 600 miles a day, but still has not broken through the Red Army's main defenses.

Germany reported Wednesday from the field.

League said he had been traveling with the Red Army in the wake of the Germans in a war which apparently had not changed greatly since Napoleon's retreat from Moscow in 1812.

"Winter prevents the German use of wide tanks for maneuver," he said, "and the weather is a great handicap for tanks and trucks" so the fighting now is on foot.

"Therefore, just as in 1812, the bulk of the army plays along on foot, through snow, sleet and rain, carrying ammunition and food dragged on sleds by teams of horses."

Besides burning the wooden houses they find still intact, he said, the Germans were mining and blowing bridges.

Red army troops were reported officially early today to have driven the Germans back almost 100 miles beyond this capital in their 18-day winter offensive to hit the slopes of Leningrad in the north and Sevastopol in the south.

Cairo reported British desert troops hammering the enemy back toward the General Von Rommel's tank racing sandstorms were more than 100 miles inside Libya tonight and still advancing.

The main battle area still were the Alamein, 50 miles south-west of Benghazi and at El Alamein about the same distance west of the British rapidly outfitted and retrained units.

General Rommel was a third battle area because Axis units were driven back to the second line, but the battle apparently is to be fought in the same area.

### Army Generals, Navy Head In Hawaii Removed

### New Military Heads Will Go to Hawaii In Drastic Change

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18. (AP)—Rear Admiral H. E. Kimmel, commander-in-chief of the U. S. fleet, and two Army generals who were in charge of American forces in Hawaii were relieved of their commands last night in one of the most drastic shakeups in the history of the U. S. Naval and military branches.

The generals are: Lieut. Gen. Walter C. Short, commander of the Hawaiian department and Maj. Gen. Frederick L. Martin, commander of the Army air corps at Hawaii.

Kimmel was replaced by Rear Admiral Chester V. Nimitz, chief of the bureau of navigation. Kimmel was ordered to report for "temporary duty" in the fourteenth (Hawaiian) Naval district.

Short was relieved by Lieut. Gen. Delos C. Emmons of the air corps.

Martin was replaced by Brig. Gen. C. L. Tinker of the air corps, who left Tampa this morning for his new post.

Secretary of War Stimson said today that the Army changes "are made in view of the preliminary report of the Secretary of the Navy, with whose views as to the unpreparedness of the situation of Dec. 7, the secretary was in concurrence, and to expedite the reorganization of the Hawaiian Islands."

A regulation of the State board was amended to read, in effect, that "any high school student called into service or who enlists during the school semester in which he would be graduated, may be granted a diploma at the time he normally would have graduated. This may be done provided that his work prior to that time would justify this special consideration."

The regulation also stated, "The State Board of Education believes that high school students can serve their country best by continuing in high school until graduation unless prior to that time they are called into military service."

### Conspiracy Charge Is Made On Attempts To Control Prices

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 18. (AP)—Fruit exchanges of California and Florida, together with 10 auction houses and numerous individuals, were indicted by a Federal grand jury yesterday on charges of violating the Sherman Anti-Trust Act.

Defendants include the California Fruit Growers Exchange, the Florida Citrus Exchange, the Florida Citrus Exchange, five corporations controlled by Joseph DiGiorgio of Kern County, Calif., 10 auction firms and one auction association.

They are charged with conspiring to control the method of sales as well as prices of citrus and deciduous fruits grown in California and Florida and marketed throughout the nation through a series of auction firms located in Baltimore, Boston, Chicago, Cincinnati, Cleveland, Detroit, New York, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh and St. Louis.

"The effect of the conspiracy," the Justice Department in Washington said, was to control, restrict limit and restrain the channel through which such fruits are distributed and marketed; to exclude persons, firms, associations and corporations from engaging in the production, distribution and marketing of such fruits; and to fix, maintain and stabilize prices."

### Americans Sink Five Enemy Subs

### British In Hongkong Are Being Shelled From Land And Air

MANILA, Dec. 18. (A. P.)—Japanese invaders have been shored back many miles in the Vigan area of northwestern Luzon, the United States Eastern command announced today. It added: "Enemy activity today has been confined to the air."

The U. S. Army headquarters in Manila said that Filipino troops clashed with Japanese invaders in the Vigan area, 200 miles northwest of Manila, and threw them back many miles before darkness halted the fighting.

In Tokyo, the Japanese admitted five "special type" submarines, apparently midsize Japanese submarines, failed to return from the Dec. 7 attack on Pearl Harbor. The Japanese claims, however, that five U. S. battleships were sunk according to aerial observation, and two heavy cruisers, an oil tanker and 400 planes were destroyed. A Manila dispatch timed Thursday afternoon, Manila time, said Japanese aerial squadrons renewed their raids on Nichols and Zambales Fields, but little damage was reported.

British and Indian troops were acknowledged to have withdrawn below the southern border of Kedah, apparently yielding the 115-mile-long Malaysian state to the Japanese. London quarters said the withdrawal from Kuala meant the loss of Penang the second city in importance in Malaya.

The Japanese are reported to be heavily shelling Hongkong from the land and air as the British defenders flatly rejected the second Japanese demand for surrender. Dutch and Australian forces occupied the Portuguese island of Timor, a potential Japanese submarine base.

American fliers led by Lieut. Floyd M. Wagner of Johnston, Pa., No. 1 hero of the Philippines, blasted out a nest of 26 Japanese airplanes at Vigan, 200 miles northwest of Manila.

The air attack wiped out one of the main threats to this Philippine capital, which now has some 48 hours without an air raid alarm. Credit was given mainly to Lieutenant Wagner, a 25-year-old squadron commander who already had been cited for heroism and who became the first American ace of the war, by shooting down five Japanese planes in combat and destroying others on the ground.

The air raid on Vigan was a crushing blow to one of the three Japanese beachheads on Luzon Island, on which Manila is located. The Americans shot down one Japanese plane there are destroyed at least 25 on the ground, then set fire to Japanese fuel dumps. These planes were believed to have been doing much of the bombing of military and naval posts in the Manila area. The Japanese attacks already had lost much of their sting, meanwhile, a Japanese expeditionary force has invaded the rich Miri oil country of Sarawak. **Pearl Harbor Suspects**  
One of the most dramatic chapters in the military and naval history of the United States has resulted from the surprise Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor and Admiral Kimmel, Lieut. Gen. Short and Maj. Gen. Martin have been relieved of their respective commands as heads of the Navy, Army and air forces in Hawaii.  
It is well to keep in mind that these removals are made before the special investigating committee appointed yesterday by the President has even begun its tasks and, as Secretary Stimson says: "This action avoids a situation where the officials charged with the responsibility for the future security of this vital naval base would otherwise at this critical hour also be involved in the searching investigation ordered yesterday by the President."  
It may be that the investigation will show that Admiral Kimmel had been reading the Chicago Tribune or listening to too many speeches by Senator Wheeler and Col. Lindbergh to the effect that the Japs would not dare to attack the United States at least until after the Germans had completed their conquest and were in a position to help. It may be that he had been going to sleep by Senator Nye, Senator Tamm, Senator Clark and others who all from that part of the country least exposed to enemy bombing raids.  
As a matter of fact, how many of us were "on the alert" that Sunday morning and were fully prepared for the news which came over the radio shortly after noon? Had we not been lulled by the news that the Japs were not coming? And if we had been in charge of the Pearl Harbor base, how many of us would have denied leaves to our boys in the Army and Navy that Sunday morning and kept every minute of our morning machine guns just in case, thus risking the downright condemnation of our Senators back home for being so inconsiderate of our soldiers and sailors?  
This investigation should be a splendid thing for the morale of the whole country. It may show that even as the news came in over the radio, Senator Nye was telling an audience in Pittsburgh that all this war talk was a political trick on the part of the President to get a fourth term.

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## Cooperative Group Will Have Meeting

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—(Special)—Recent developments in the cooperative purchasing of farm supplies by co-operators organized primarily to market farm products will be described at conferences on cooperative purchasing at the 17th session of the American Institute of Cooperation, January 12-16, in Atlanta, Georgia.

Sponsored by the University of Georgia and Georgia Cooperative Council, the January meeting of the institute will be its first southern session since 1933, when it met in North Carolina. This year the institute devotes from its usual policy of meeting on a college campus, as for the first time its session is being held during the school year. All meetings will be in downtown Atlanta hotels, the Wesley Memorial Church, and the Atlanta Chamber of Commerce Building. WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 18.—(AP)—The American Federation of Labor offered Tuesday to make peace with the C.I.O. asserting in a declaration of war labor policy that there was no place in the present emergency for rival labor disputes.

The declaration was adopted at a meeting of A.F.L. officers. It said: "We regret sincerely and are deeply concerned with the destructive rivalry and organization that has beset the American labor field for the past few years. We hold all such rivalries and jurisdictional conflicts have no place in an emergency such as faces America and the world today. We therefore, renew our offer for unity in the labor movement and for the common defense of our nation against mortal danger. We hope our call to this end may act as a balm."

The declaration also went on record in favor of a no-strike policy for the duration of the war.

(By Associated Press) The fall of Britain's great Far East stronghold of Hongkong appeared imminent today as Tokyo reported Japanese troops in a violent night assault had captured half of the 32-square-mile island.

London sources acknowledged the Japanese are landing in considerable force and said "heavy fighting is going on and the position is serious." Only a comparatively small garrison is reported defending the 100-year-old British colony.

Singapore reported the Japanese drive in northern Malaya has been halted for a moment but that the Nippon drive in the "White Rajah" Kingdom of Sarawak in north Borneo.

Imperial Japanese headquarters announced at 8:55 A. M. today (4:55 P. M. Thursday, E.S.T.) that the Japanese army and navy had succeeded in landing on the British island of Hongkong, which has been under siege and cannonade for more than a week.

The British defending their naval base at the head of the Victoria harbor met up a fierce resistance by the Japanese, a communique said.

The Japanese nevertheless were said to be "rapidly carrying out further operations."

The official account said the Japanese captured their assault with an intensive pounding all yesterday and last night in which Japanese planes and the army's artillery bombed and shelled steadily.

Chinese troops were reported to have captured Japanese outposts along the Canton-Kowloon railway in their effort to relieve Japanese pressure on the British advance army of Hongkong.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Emphasizing effects of the Pacific war on imports from the Far East, the government yesterday took control over all tin supplies in the United States, including shipments already on route to this country.

Donald W. Nelson, OPM priorities director, issued a four-point "freezing" order providing that:

1. All supplies of tin shall be subject to OPM allocation and subject to designation as to their use.
2. No tin may be sold or delivered without Nelson's specific permission.
3. Future tin imports may be sold only to the RFC Metals Reserve Company or other governmental agencies.
4. No new effort may not be made without Nelson's special permission.

The order, however, permits a distributor to deliver to regular customers in less than five-ton lots, subject to priority regulations.

"The Navy Department appreciates your great anxiety and will furnish you further information promptly when received. To prevent possible aid to our enemies, please do not divulge the name of his ship or station, Rear Admiral C. N. Nimitz, chief of the bureau of navigation."

Chief Roy Williams said today police are investigating several leads in regard to the theft of two rings Wednesday afternoon from the McLain jewelry store in which a black-fingered negro concealed two rings, one with an estimated value of \$300, while looking over the stock, apparently with the intention of making a purchase, and then walked out of the store.

The loss was discovered shortly after the negro left the store and was reported to the police. When he left, the negro said he would return in an hour and buy one of the rings. Police leads were not revealed, but Chief Williams declared a program is being made on the case.

### Reds Force Germans To Leave Finns

### Nazis Abandon Allies As Russians Gain; Also Retreat From British In Africa

(By Associated Press) Hitler's battered armies, reeling in retreat in Russia and Libya, were reported to have abandoned their Finnish Allies today as the Soviets announced huge new gains in their country offensive on the central front. The British radio quoted reports from Helsinki this morning that "all German troops were withdrawn from Finland in a great hurry." The broadcast said Finnish lines were shattered between Lake Onega and Ladoga by the Russian drive in the vicinity of the Leningrad-Murmansk railroad.

British troops in Libya are officially reported to have captured the Beria airport, 100 miles northwest of Tobruk, and allied forces are said to be advancing in "all directions." The thrust to Beria represents an allied drive of 195 miles from the Egyptian border since the opening of the campaign.

### U.S. And French Reach Accord On Martinique Issue

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19.—(AP)—American and French authorities in Martinique have reached an accord, it was learned authoritatively last night, under which the neutral status of French possessions and naval vessels in the western hemisphere will remain unchanged.

Under the agreement, it was learned, the United States will continue to permit trade with French possessions in the Caribbean, in return for pledges that French vessels and nationals there will take no action detrimental to the United States and American interests.

An obvious interpretation of the agreement, it was said, would be that—despite Nazi efforts to secure closer Franco-German collaboration—French possessions vessels and troops in France-American territories will not be taken over by the Axis.

The friendly agreement will also, it was said, make it unnecessary for the United States to take any military action to insure that French territory or warships on this side of the Atlantic will not be used in any way against any of the American republics.

### Cuba Officials Jail 18 Jap "Fishermen"

HAVANA, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Eighteen Japanese who had posed as fishermen were jailed Thursday in the Caribbean Sea village of Batabano, 40 miles south of Havana, and police said some of them were believed to be officers of the Japanese navy.

The 18, some of whom had lived in hotels in Batabano, were charged with espionage and plotting sabotage.

Ten motor and fishing boats were seized. A submarine telegraph cable runs near Batabano.

Police said they were seeking hidden radio stations from which they believed the Japanese transmitted military information destined for Tokyo.

The arrests followed a police announcement that two men, one identified as a German Gestapo agent, had been arrested and charged with plotting to install on a Cuban mountain range a radio station capable of signaling ships and planes at sea.

### Washington Declares Enemy Actions In Philippines Are Being Increased

Two new air attacks upon Wake Island were reported today. The U. S. Navy Department said one was "comparatively light" and the other "in greater force," adding that "Wake Island continues to be a full general." President Roosevelt announced that consultations have been under way for weeks among the allies when asked about reports that there would be a meeting of anti-Axis Powers to coordinate all their strength against aggressors.

### Nippon Bombers Fly Over Manila

Japan's sea-borne invasion armies are reported to have unleashed a heavy new offensive against Luzon Island in the Philippines with Washington declaring there's a "marked increase in enemy air and ground activities."

"There was heavy bombing over Manila and over the city of Iloilo in the island of Panay, south of Luzon. There is nothing to report from other areas." Japanese bombers twice today roared over Manila and bombed the Naval base at Cavite and also bombed Tarlac, 70 miles north of Manila on the chief highway from Manila to Lingayen and Vigan where invaders hold the beachhead.

American submarines, moving with deadly effect into the battle of the Far East, have sunk a Japanese transport, and probably a destroyer as well, while more than 30 Japanese planes bombed the southern part of Panay in their first attack in that region. U. S. Army headquarters at Manila announced today.

"Civilian casualties and property damage have been reported," said a communique.

The communique issued by the headquarters of Lieut. Gen. Douglas MacArthur, U. S. commander in the Philippines, shortly after 8 A. M. today.

"Iloilo city (on Panay island) was bombed about 10 P. M. Thursday. More than 30 Japanese planes participated. Civilian casualties and property damage have been reported."

Press reports said the attack lasted for about 30 minutes. Iloilo is about 310 miles south and slightly east of Manila, a stop on an airline running south to Davao, southern Philippine port. It is an important port having a large trade with Manila and other island ports as well as with foreign ports. Many industries also are centered there. Chief exports are sugar, tobacco, rice, coffee, hides and hemp.

Iloilo is the capital of the province of the same name, and has a population of 10,000.

The announcement followed in deduction of the entire Army of the Philippines into the United States Army of the Far East, and other moves consolidating and strengthening the American forces.

The Navy sparsely added the details of a transport sunk and a destroyer probably at the bottom, but following its usual course made no mention of specific casualties or the identities of the ships involved.

The development was widely taken to mean that an effective beginning had been made at establishing a blockade about Japan, intended to snuff the supply lines to her distant expeditionary forces, and cut off support of raw materials and food.
