O. P. A. Freezes 300,000 Stores At Day's Prices

Clothing, Textiles, Furniture Affected In Broad O.P.A. Order

WASHINGTON, Mar. 23. (Special)—The Office of Price Administration announced this week a sweeping new retail pricing order which will replace the general maximum price regulation in determining ceilings for clothing, textiles, furniture and home furnishings. The order freezes retail markups as of today for 300,000 retail stores.

One of the most important purposes of the order is to force retailers to pass on to consumers their savings under the low-cost clothing program sponsored jointly by the O.P.A. and War Production Board. This will be accomplished by making retailers the retail ceiling prices directly to invoice costs.

Other major features of the plan, which Chester Bowles, O.P.A. Administrator, hailed as "one of the most important events in retail price control" since the general maximum price regulation was issued in May 1942, include:

1. Although it will not automatically cut present price levels or recapture price increases, the order will reduce some prices by freezing markups and compelling retailers to pass on any reductions in their own cost. Such lower prices will be felt by apparel shoppers as soon as the

low cost clothing program becomes effective at the manufacturing level.

2. The order will fix a single day, March 19, 1945, as the base day for prices of goods covered instead of the base period of one month provided under G. M. P. R. 3. Retailers will have to prepare and file with O. P. A. pricing charts showing both their retail prices and invoice costs for which goods were offered for sale today rather than actually sold.

The order covers virtually all clothing, textiles and home furnishings, including such items as shoes, hats, gloves, handbags, yard goods, sheets, towels, curtains, floor coverings, lamps, bedding and furniture. The O.P.A. has been studying and discussing with the trade for more than a year the changes involved.

Mr. Bowles declared that the new order, by substituting more precise pricing methods for the

looser controls under G. M. P. R. and other previous regulations, would benefit retailers and consumers alike.

The order exempts only very small retailers having an annual dollar volume of less than \$2,500. These merchants may continue present pricing methods.

Every retailer covered by the order is required to prepare a pricing chart listing the net invoice costs and retail prices for all merchandise he offered for sale today. Costs and prices must be listed separately for each category of goods.

For different articles having the same cost but more than one price, the retailer must calculate his average markup in the category. He then adds this markup to the cost and selects the actual price nearest the price thus calculated. This becomes the maximum price for the line.

Two copies of the pricing chart must be filed with O. P. A.

by April 20. After April 30 the retailer is required to list his selling price on the invoice received from his supplier. The price is determined by adding the markup taken on March 19 to the cost. The O. P. A. will accept this as the maximum price.

The new regulation replaces four orders in addition to G. M. P. R. The others are maximum price regulations 142, 175, 239 and 332, dealing, respectively, with summer seasonal commodities, men's and boys' tailored clothing, fall and winter seasonal commodities, and men's and boys' shirts and pajamas.

The categories established in the order are men's and boys' apparel, women's and girls' apparel, infants' apparel, masculine and feminine apparel, costumes, athletic clothing, etc., footwear, household furniture, bedding, floor coverings, lamps and shades. A few items such as work

clothing, boys' wash clothing, women's knitted outerwear and women's hosiery remain subject to special pricing procedures now in effect.

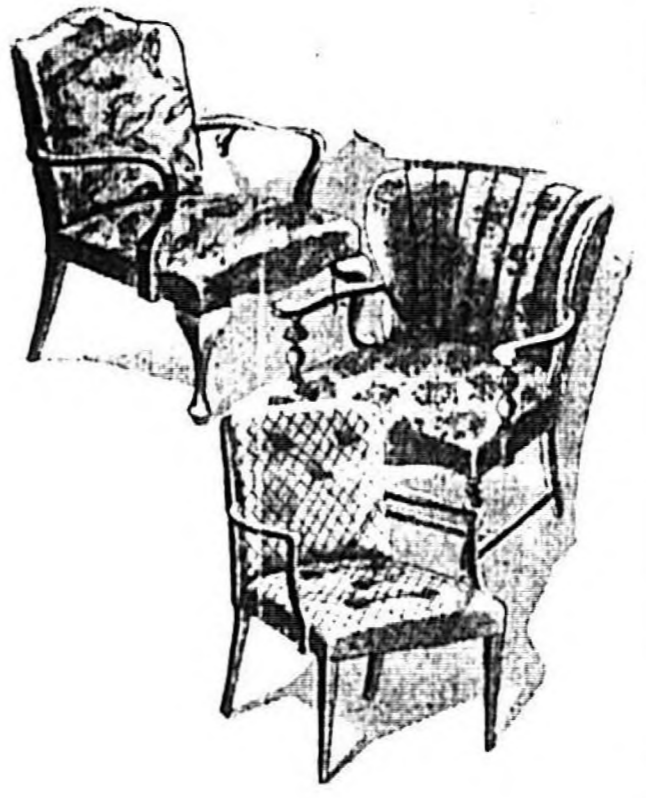

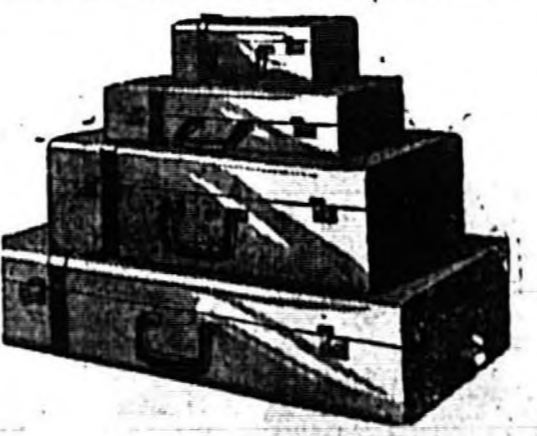

Japanese Report U. S. Attempts To Invade Ryukyus

Air And Sea Attacks Get 25 Nip Ships, Cripple Industry In Japan, Formosa

Unconfirmed Japanese broadcasts today reported American amphibious forces were attempting to invade two of the Ryukyu Islands in the center area where air and naval attacks knocked out 25 Japanese ships and crippled war industries in Japan and Formosa.

Tokyo said Yanks struck at Toka and Aka islands as springboards for the assault on Japan. 350 miles to the northeast, U. S. battleships and carrier based planes raided the Ryukyus Friday and Saturday, destroying an eight-ship convoy while three were damaged also off Ryukyus.

Fourteen vessels were destroyed or damaged off the China Coast by Philippines based bombers. Superfortresses raided Nanyoa and destroyed much of the Mitsubishi Aircraft Engine Plant.

The persistent sea and air attacks on the Kurile islands, which guard the back door to Japan, appear to be more than mere diversionary or nuisance raids, military experts said tonight.

The Navy is not ready to talk about the campaign, but observers said it may be that the air and naval bombardments of the enemy's northern bases since Jan. 1 are softening up preparations for eventual invasion.

The Kuriles, which stretch for more than a thousand miles north of the enemy's home islands, would fit admirably with the avowed American strategy of ring Japan with bases from which land-based aircraft can harass the homeland as a daily routine.

If Soviet Russia were to join in the war against Japan, the Kuriles would be a strategic link in air communications between the United States and Siberia.

Rains Bring On Slight Impetus To Spring Crops

Central And Lake Regions Need More Rain Immediately

JACKSONVILLE, March 26 (Special)—Light rains last week gave slight impetus to the Spring vegetable crop now getting underway in the Lake Okechobee and Central Florida areas, but unless more rain falls immediately, the volume will be considerably below normal.

William L. Wilson, director of State Farmers Markets reported in his crop and market review yesterday.

"Sanford reports that section here had no rain of any consequence. Much celery would not have been cut until the middle of next month has been cut or will be cut within the next week on account of hot weather.

Some black hearts are showing in Pascal and the price tendency is up. Considerable celery has already been shipped and lettuce prices are expected to rise with the coming of the spring crop. Plenty of citrus fruits and vegetables will be available there this week.

Bean volume at Pahokee is picking up quantity, but quality is poor. Beans of top quality of most varieties selling at ceiling prices. Some of the poorer quality is going to canners at from \$1.50 to \$1.65. The spring harvest in large volume will start this week.

"Cabbage shipments at Pahokee are light, with a large amount of the surplus going to brat makers. Celery volume has dropped considerably. Demand is very slow and market is dull with prices ranging from \$2.50 to \$3.00.

"Vegetable movement at Dunno is showing a sharp decline due to hot and dry weather. Bean shipments are practically finished. Peppers, eggplant and other crops not under irrigation are rapidly passing out of the picture. Prices remain satisfactory.

"Fort Pierce Market is showing increasing activity with Spring crops coming in. Tomatoes are of good quality and prices average \$3.00. Market is low and straight neck squash are being shipped. The spring crop of cucumbers is bringing ceiling prices. Weather has been good and windy. Although two showers fell last week, more rain is still badly needed.

American Third Is But 250 Miles From Reds, Southeast Of Berlin

As Russians Launch Fourth Offensive, Nazis Are Moving To Defend Vienna

The Fourth Russian offensive has been launched toward Germany's southern mountain region, Berlin today announced, as Moscow said the Nazis shifted their divisions from Italy and the Balkans to defend Vienna.

A new advance was reported to have sprung north of the Danube in Slovakia as other Red units continued to grind through the Moravian Mountains in North Vienna. An all-out offensive gained a bridgehead over Iron, 50 miles northwest of Budapest.

Red army tank spearheads raced within 10 miles of Austria and 75 miles southeast of Vienna yesterday as a second mighty Soviet army joined Russia's Vienna-bound offensive that was sweeping unobstructed across untried western Hungary on a 90-mile front.

While Marshal Eisdor I. Tolbukhin's Third Army pushed forward to the Danube, the Second Army under Marshal Ivan Y. Malinovsky kept up the battle and gained the city of Bratislava, 100 miles south of Vienna.

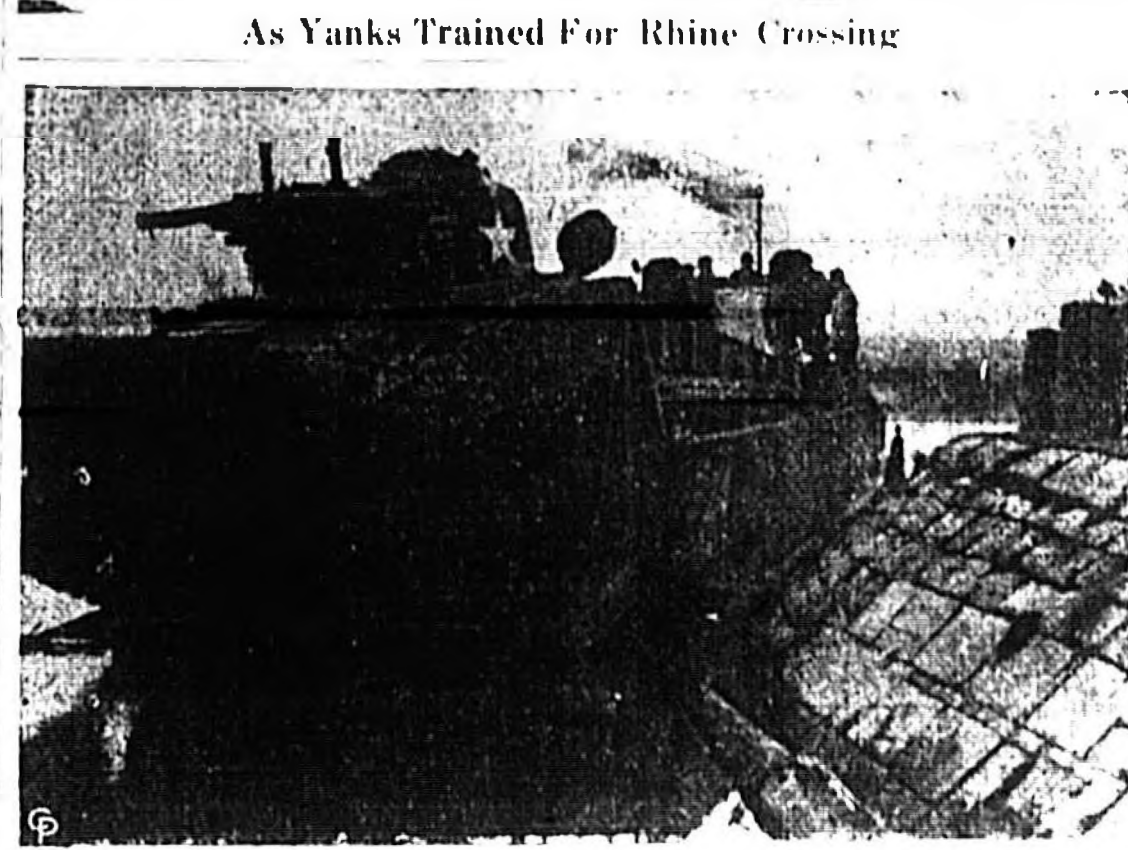
The two Red armies were still 200 miles south of the Danube, Danube river key to Vienna and Bratislava had outflanked the great salient city of Lof and were bottling through Nazi defenses in the south.

At the same time, Premier Stalin announced the fall of Herzogen, last line enemy strong hold in east Prussia southwest of Koenigsberg. The Baltic ports of Danzig and Gdynia, held and bombed by Russian aircraft and planes faced capture as the Russians took a suburb of Danzig and pushed closer to the port.

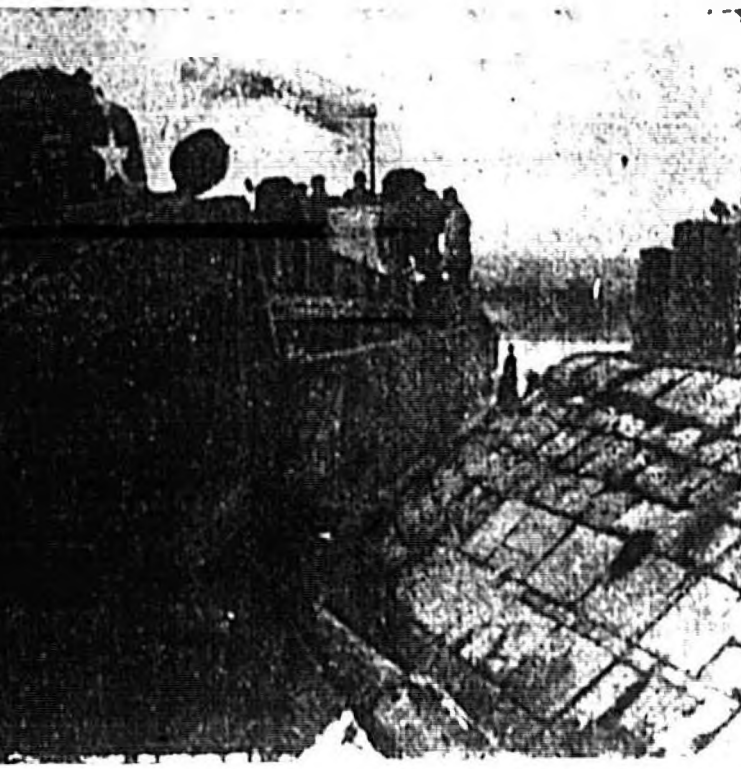

 mandy. On the northern flank, the ninth army gained at least ten miles past the Rhine. The British advanced ten miles and hopped the Isel River and battled onto the Westphalian Plain on the northern approach to Berlin.

Three U. S. armies surged toward Berlin in breakthrough yesterday, with Third Army tanks setting the pace in a 21-mile sweep that carried 40 miles beyond the Rhine and across a captured bridge over the river. The U. S. First Army burst the bonds of its Remagen-Erpel bridgehead between these two fronts in a general assault on a 35-mile front that ground nine miles east in a massive attack on the road to Berlin and was roaring on unchecked.

The Third Army sprang at least two new crossings of the Rhine, and a massive attack bearing a junction with the First Army forces beyond the river. They last were reported only 11 miles apart.

The U. S. Ninth Army broke out into the open through the eastern Rhine line, crashed eight miles or more beyond the Rhine, was within reaching distance of a Berlin superhighway, and was but 10 miles from Essen, industrial heart of the Reich.

6,000 At Tule Lake Would Renounce U.S. Citizenship

WASHINGTON, Mar. 26, (AP)—Approximately 6,000 of the 7,000 Japanese-American, over 17 years old in the Tule Lake, Calif., re-

gregation center have asked for citizenship renunciation petitions. Representative Clair Engle, Democrat of California, said recently the Californians had the right to figure from Attorney General Francis Biddle who also told him that 150 Japanese-Americans in other relocation camps or concentration centers have renounced the same way to renounce their American citizenship. "We should not have to face around with any of these Japs who have acknowledged they are disloyal, or with their families," Mr. Engle said. "So long as they remain in this country they are a source of danger, for their children will become American cit-

izens by reason of birth. Such citizens, growing up in the homes of parents who have renounced their own citizenship do not promise to behave assets to this nation." He quoted a letter from Mr. Biddle which said: "The Japanese have been renouncing their citizenship in numbers to those persons who wish to renounce their citizenship for political reasons, a considerable number of persons seem to be motivated in large part by the desire to obtain a release until a termination of hostilities with Japan and the belief that they will be required to leave the segregation center and find places to live and work unless they renounce their citizenship and are interned."

Local Men Taking Vocational School Prepared To Take More Students

Local men taking vocational school prepared to take more students. Business firms in Seminole county are calling for many more workers trained in stenography and business subjects than can be supplied, it was announced today by Mrs. H. C. Maxwell, principal of the Sanford Vocational School on Commercial Avenue, which under direction of the county school system gives free business training. There is room there for enrollment of a number of new pupils, she said. Commercial subjects taught at the school include bookkeeping, first and second year, shorthand, first and second year. These subjects are completed in a year or less, depending upon the time students give to study. Mrs. Maxwell said. Other subjects are commercial English, with special attention given to letter writing, spelling and vocabulary, typing, office practice and training of adding machines, calculator, Mimeograph, etc. New courses in modern filing and a filing certificate issued by the American Institute of Filing, and four courses are offered: 20 and 40 period, complete course and visible filing. New classes in filing will be organized this week and next. A knowledge of typing and filing is a good qualification for an office worker, Mrs. Maxwell said. The Vocational School can place a student in a job as soon as he or she qualifies. Typing classes are being taught by Mrs. J. P. Hall who has been trained in the newest and most modern method of teaching the important subject. An average student, after completing course under her methods has a sheet of 50 words a minute when they go out on jobs, Mrs. Maxwell stated. Each student has the opportunity of practicing two or more hours a day.

Local Men Taking Part In Serchio Valley

Local men taking part in Serchio Valley. The 387th has harvested millions of dollars worth of crops on inundated plantations in the United States, served in North Africa, repaired railway equipment in Naples, went ashore at Anzio on D Day, aided in construction of an airport at Nettuno, helped build up the supply base, Anzio, rescued sailors from a sinking ship, helped port the ports of Civitavecchia, Orbetello and Piombino into operation and rescued many timber bridges and the Anzio River by opening a dike when the river flooded. After being put ashore at Oran, Northern Algeria, in April, 1943, the battalion laid out pipes, built a quartermaster depot and filled fuel oil barges to be used at gasoline dumps. The engineers landed in Italy Oct. 10, 1943 and spent three months opening a rail line and filling craters in the Naples area. Working in on D Day, the men of the 387th spent the entire four months of the existence of the Anzio beachhead unloading infantry and tank landing craft and building up the huge reservoirs of supplies that enabled the Fifth Army to go on to capture Rome without any of the breakout from the beachhead. They saw Anzio developed almost overnight from an obscure resort village to the eighth ranking military discharge port of the world handling greater traffic than the port of London. When a German bomb hit an incoming infantry landing craft, the engineers came to the rescue, beat over a portable footbridge and evacuated wounded sailors and cargo, while enemy artillery fire and bombs fell in the area. To enable themselves to maintain communications with the front, the men improvised a steamroller, the business end of which made four wheels taken from a bus, a tractor and a mill. They built a bridge at Civitavecchia and helped to operate bridge dumps at Piombino and Orbetello, repaired French and American engineer units. As the front advanced, they moved this equipment forward to Foggiatone, to the Anzio River near Florence and to Fiesolano. It was at the main bridge dump along the Anzio River that the flood inundated their supply stocks, and the men paddled a raft in support boats getting whatever was needed to fill.

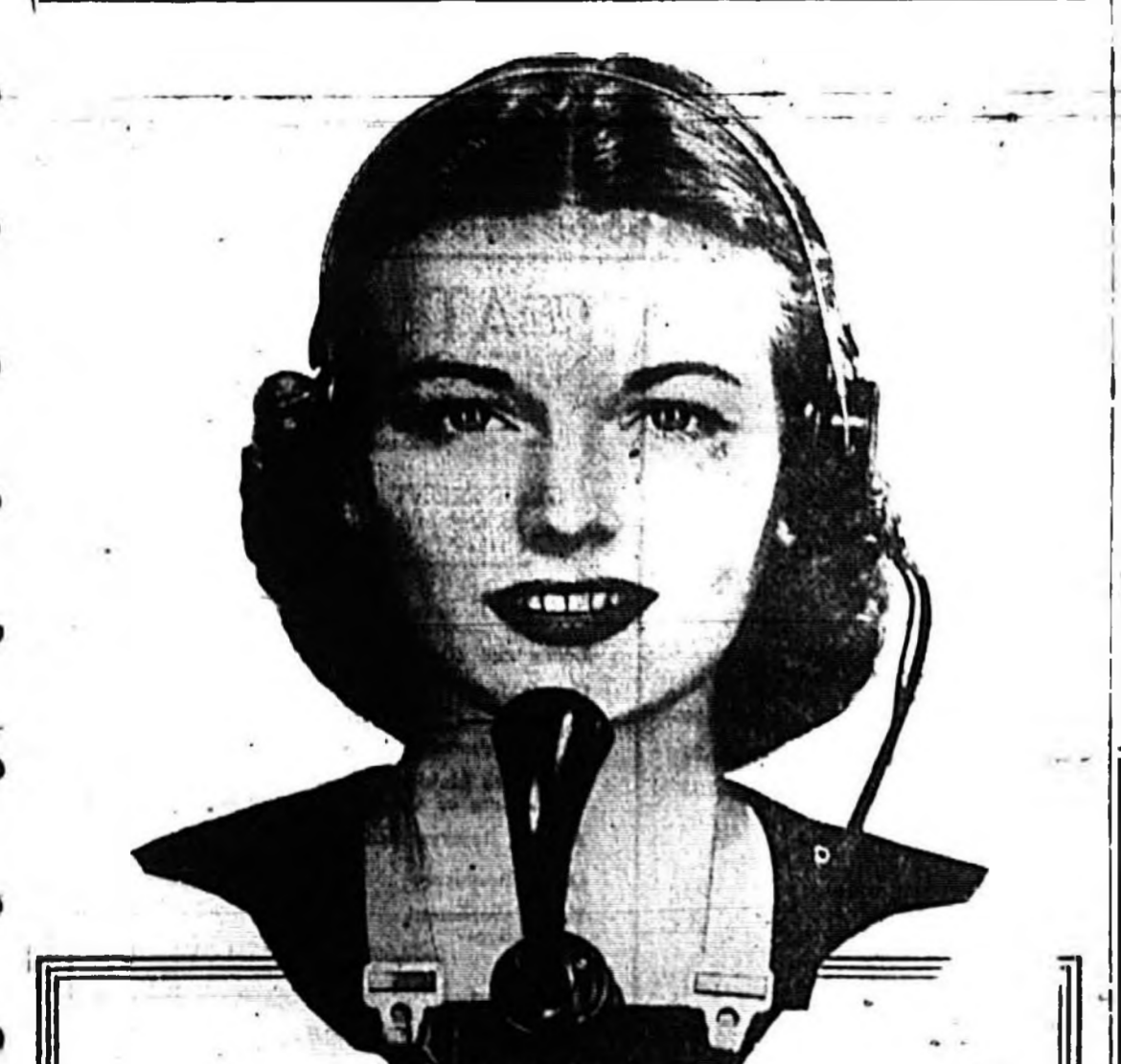

Submarines Are Not Negligible Factor In War

By POPE HALEY
WASHINGTON — While German submarines are no longer the "nightmare" problem they were in the dark days of the "Battle of the Atlantic" in 1942, they are by no means a negligible factor in the war.

German U-boat operations, and Allied countermeasures, still rank near the top of "top secret." Such information as is given the public comes only from the highest level, and is usually in the nature of a "leak" from the press or from a Minister Churchill.

Analysis of such disclosures as have been made recently, however, justifies the conclusion that German U-boats are more in evidence than they were a year ago.

In recent months, an undetermined but probably small number have managed to approach closer to American shores and convey considerable points. After 1942 and early in 1943, they were organized and strengthened, the coming "wolf packs" were driven back closer to their bases.

Increased activity of the raiders in a sea, confirmed by official disclosures, has been destroying more of them in February than in January. Further evidence is that Allied ship losses in January were officially described as "very small" and in February as "moderate."

While estimates of Germany's pre-war submarine fleet carried as widely as to mass nothing, and no figures have been released on the number sunk, official disclosures have described the still available force as "large."

Developments in the European war in the past year particularly since the invasion, have materially affected the submarine situation, both directly and indirectly. Some operations have been lost to the enemy, and others have been delayed materially.

Loss of the rich Italian oil resources has intensified the German fuel problem, and observations here indicate that it is a top priority for the Germans to secure supplies. The last-mentioned item would be likely to come out.

Tenth Airforce Landed For Work In China-Burma

More Self-Service Is Seen After War

WHAT'S it going to be like when you go to market after the war? Will some sort of magical electric eye enable you to pick up the telephone and see the cut of steak and the head of lettuce you wish to order while you sit comfortably having your breakfast in bed. Well, maybe, but currently that's dreaming and what we want here are specifics which we can see coming practically for certain.

It seems highly likely that the housewife will buy all the food for her household in one community store. The trend is in the direction of departmentalized super markets.

There is going to be even more self-service, too, but one thing we can be sure of—it's going to be made much easier for us when we go to the store. For instance, packaging. Much of our food will be "wrapped in cellophane"—or whatever the best transparent "packaging" may be. This will hold true for meat, for nuts. You will go to the cold unit holding quick-frozen steaks. It will be packed in transparent plastic so that you can judge how well it is stored with fat, and it will be marked "One sirloin steak, Grade A, 3 1/2 pounds."

No need to bother a butcher with questions and instructions. Out of all the variety that will be offered you will be able to choose precisely the food you wanted to buy. In the quality and quantity you demand.

Each of the food you buy after the war probably will be quick-frozen. On the other hand, too, fresh fruits and vegetables, when they are not in season, will be flown over-night from other parts of the country, and be in as beautiful condition as though they'd been raised in your own garden. As to how wide will be the buying of dehydrated foods, it seems to me foolish to prognosticate. Certainly, I believe we shall see more dehydrated foods than we used to, but I don't think very much that they will constitute a large portion of our food buying.

64 Per Cent Of All Receipts At Race Tracks For Taxes

MIAMI, Mar. 23, (Special)—Sixty-four and one-half cents of every dollar collected from horse racing in 1944 at Hialeah Race Course went for taxes, it is revealed by figures compiled for the new booklet, "Racing at Hialeah." The state took 52 1/2 cents, the federal government 10 1/2 cents, and the county and municipality 1 1/2 cents from every 100 cents spent at the track, statistics show.

The belief not infrequently expressed that Horse Race Tracks are getting rich is not in agreement with the facts, at least in Florida where the state's tax is greater than anywhere else in America, says the booklet.

Florida's pari-mutuel tax for share of the "take-out" is eight percent in contrast to six percent in New York; five percent in Arkansas, California and Washington; four and one-half percent in New Hampshire; four percent in Rhode Island, Louisiana, and New Jersey; three and one-half percent in Delaware and Massachusetts; three percent in Oregon; two percent in Illinois and Maryland, and one percent

in West Virginia, three percent in Kentucky, Nebraska, and Michigan—do not tax wagering. The "take-out" of 15 cents on every dollar bet in Florida is considered a major racing state. Two states have a 13 percent "take-out," one has a 12 1/2, one has an 11 1/2, and one has a 10 percent.

In addition to the eight cents from every dollar bet, the State of Florida also keeps the "take-outs," which amount to another three-quarters of a cent. The track gets seven cents—out of which must be paid all of the operating costs and maintenance. Purse and stakes are the largest item in operating a horse track, the booklet reveals. Twelve cents of every dollar spent goes for prizes for the horsemen, seven-and-one-half cents for salaries, four and one-half cents for miscellaneous operating costs, and two cents for charity.

In the years of legalized pari-mutuel racing at Hialeah, the state has received 11 million dollars in taxes while stockholders have been paid only seven-hundred-and-fifty-thousand dollars in dividends. Fourteen years, 1931-1944 were required to discharge all the indebtedness of rebuilding Hialeah. The payments to the common shareholders over this period average less than \$50,000 a year on an investment which couldn't be duplicated today for less than three million.

The shutdown of racing in 1943 cost Hialeah \$346,033.71, and the deficit for this year will be "equally substantial and probably larger."

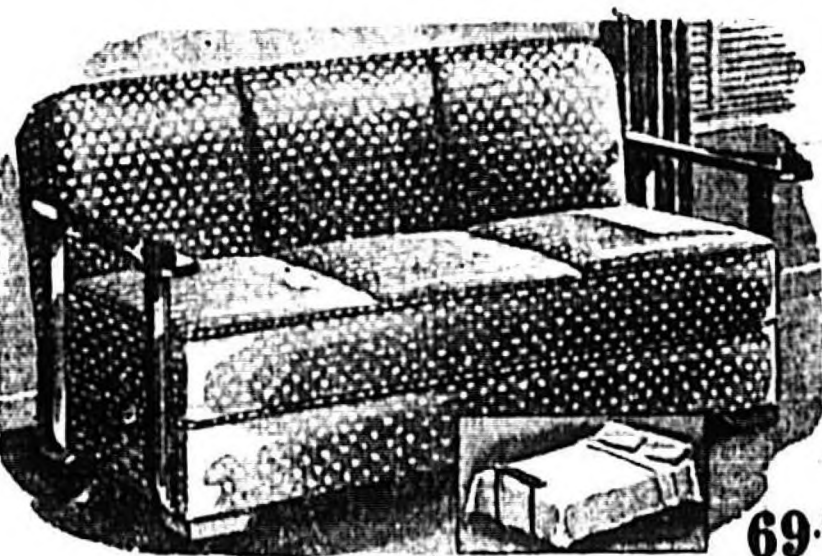

U. S. WarShips Join Attack On Ryukyu Island

Tokyo Radio Reports Expected Invasion Of Okinawa, 325 Miles From Japan

Increasing numbers of United States warships are joining the bombardment of the Ryukyu Islands, the Tokyo radio reported today, paving the way for the expected invasion of Okinawa, 325 miles southwest of Japan.

Twelve hundred miles to the south, Japanese incursions set fire to Cebu, the second largest city of the Philippines as the invading Yanks overran elaborate but poorly defended Japanese positions on Cebu Island, and drove to the outskirts of the city.

Tokyo reported Superforts struck again St. Kyushu Island, the second time within 12 hours. A Pacific fleet commander reported Navy fleet carrier USS Jima flew to within 150 miles of Tokyo. They hit three cargo ships near Hachijo Island, making a total of 11 Japanese cargo ships reported damaged by land based planes.

U. S. Navy planes, March 28, still denying the enemy any rest of his intentions. Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz today reported both carrier planes and fast naval ships of the U. S. Pacific Fleet continued their attack on the Ryukyus. He totally ignored repeated Japanese broadcasts that American troops had made amphibious landings on the island chain.

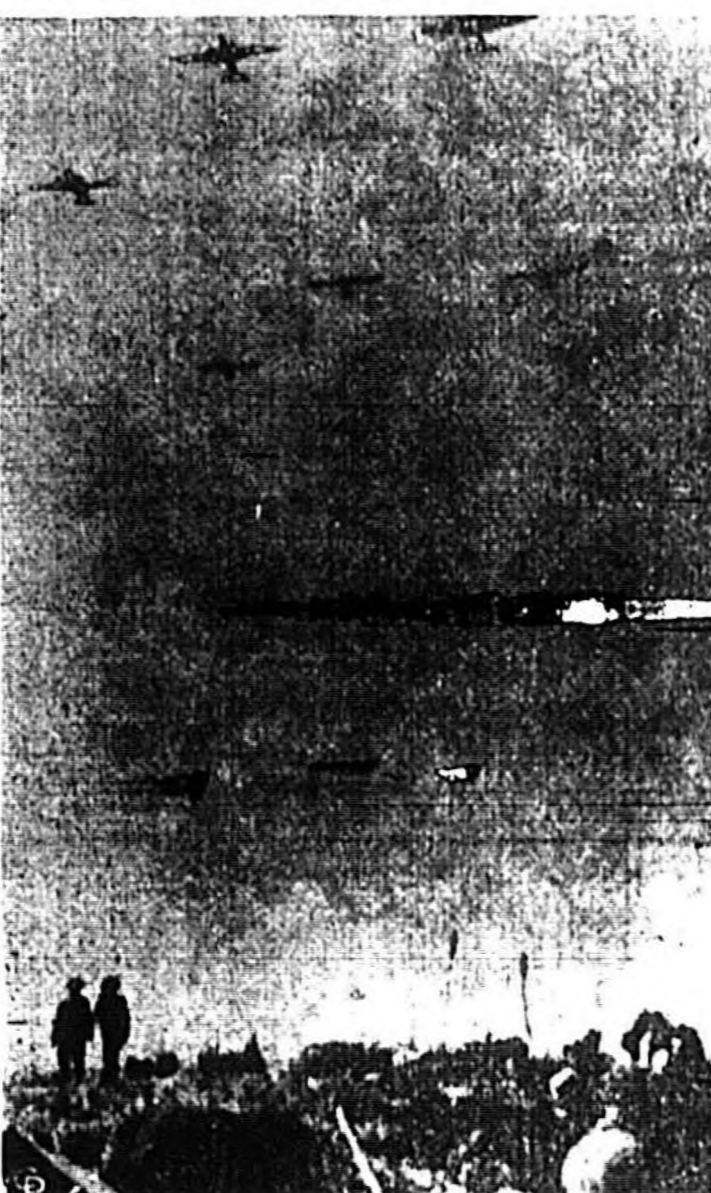
