### Funeral Services To Be Tomorrow In Washington

(Continued From Page One)

The procession also passed the Warm Springs Foundation Administration building where patients sat and stood to watch the benefactor pass for the last time.

**WARM SPRINGS, Ga., Apr. 12, (AP)—**President Roosevelt died suddenly at 3:35 P. M., Central War Time (4:35 EWT), yesterday of a massive cerebral hemorrhage.

Comdr. Howard Bruenn, naval physician, made this announcement to reporters shortly after White House Secretary William D. Hassett called a hurried news conference to announce the death of the nation's only fourth-term President.

Roosevelt died in the Little White House on top of Pine mountain where he had come for a three-week rest. He was 63 years old.

Dr. Bruenn said he saw the President yesterday morning and he was in excellent spirits at 9:30 A. M.

"At 1 o'clock," Bruenn added, "he was sitting in a chair while sketches were being made of him by an architect. He suddenly complained of a very severe occipital headache (back of the head)."

"Within a very few minutes he lost consciousness. He was seen by me at 1:30 P. M., 15 minutes after the episode had started."

"He did not regain consciousness and he died at 3:35 P. M."

Others present in the cottage were Comdr. George Fox, White House pharmacist and long attendant of the President; Hassett, Miss Grace Tully, confidential secretary; and two cousins, Miss Laura Delano and Miss Margaret Suckley.

Dr. Bruenn said he called Vice Adm. McIntyre, navy surgeon general and White House physician, in Washington and that McIntyre in turn called Dr. James Paulin, an internal medicine specialist and honorary consultant to the navy surgeon general.

Paulin was present when Bruenn and a few minutes later representatives of the Associated Press, United Press and International News Service were taken to the cottage on the "Confidential Grounds" for some news.

The announcement was dictated to reporters in a white cottage across a half-day road from the administration building of the foundation where Hassett and four other White House attaches were making their home here.

This was Mr. Roosevelt's second stay here in four months. The President spent 19 days here only last November-December.

Reporters who attended his new conference a week ago today noted his gray pallor. This had been noted, however, for many months and had caused considerable comment among White House correspondents.

## U. S. Ninth Army Is Now Reported 48 Miles From Berlin

### Absence Of Luftwaffe From Skies Indicates Revolt Of German Air Force

(By Associated Press) The American Ninth Army is only 48 miles from Berlin after a 60 mile armored dash to Tangermunde, outflanking Denmark, Hamburg, Luebeck. The Third Army is within 18 miles of Leipzig, driving to bisect Germany, join the Russians and seal off the Bavarian Alps.

## U. S. Pilots Find Targets Getting Scarce In Reich

### Fluidity Of Lines Make Pin-Pointing Vital

LONDON, Apr. 11. (AP)—Despite the diminishing number of targets for strategic bombing, the United States 8th Air Force sent out 1,200 heavy bombers, escorted by 750 fighters, and attacked eleven military installations within the Reich today.

### Conference Is Held As Chiefs Of State Meet At White House With New Leader

PARIS, Apr. 13. (AP)—Gen. Eisenhower, expressing grief and shock over the death of President Roosevelt, pledged to his successor today "unremitting efforts for the achievement of final victory."

WASHINGTON, Apr. 13. (AP)—Harry S. Truman selected immediately on the grim problems of winning the war and securing the peace today as he shouldered the responsibilities of the Presidency.

Leaving his modest Connecticut Avenue apartment early for the White House, the new President 1. Held an emergency war council with his top military commanders.

2. Reviewed world political problems in a 20-minute conference with Secretary of State Stettinius.

3. Issued a proclamation setting aside tomorrow as a National day of mourning for Franklin D. Roosevelt.

4. Conferred with a close law-lawyer friend, Hugh Fulton, who has been mentioned for a post of any cabinet changes are made.

5. Made an immediate and probably unprecedented trip to Capitol Hill where he lunched with congressional leaders.

6. Announced he will attend funeral services at Hyde Park Sunday for Mr. Roosevelt, whose body will enroute to Washington.

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

### Entire World Mourns Death Of President

Franklin Delano Roosevelt, the first President of the United States to be elected for four terms, was born Jan. 30, 1882, at Hyde Park, N.Y., the son of James and Sara (Delano) Roosevelt. He was a direct descendant of the fifth generation of the Roosevelt family.

His mother was the daughter of Warren Delano, banker and far East trader. She was married to the president's father, a lawyer and financier, when he was a fourth cousin of Theodore Roosevelt.

His boyhood was sheltered. He had private tutors and privileges that only wealthy parents could provide. His schooling followed the family tradition, preparing for college at Groton, a private school in Massachusetts, where he later was to send his own sons, then Harvard, where he took an A.B. degree in 1904. A three-year law course at Columbia followed.

He saw much of the White House 27 years before he became President. In 1905 he was in and out of the Executive Mansion paying court to a distant cousin, Anna Eleanor Roosevelt, favorite niece of Theodore Roosevelt, then president, and orphaned daughter of the president's brother, Elliot, and Anna Hall Roosevelt.

In 1920 he was nominated for the vice presidency on the Democratic ticket headed by James M. Cox. The Democrats had endorsed the unpopular Wilsonian program for League of Nations membership and Versailles peace treaty ratification and the Cox-Roosevelt ticket was overwhelmed by Harding and Coolidge, 404 to 127 in the electoral college.

**STRICKEN**  
The Roosevelt family maintained three homes besides their Hudson Valley estate at Hyde Park. One of these was at Campobello, New Brunswick. The others were a town house in New York City and a cottage atop The Mountain, Wafn Springs, Ga.

**BREAKS WITH SMITH**  
The Smith-Roosevelt friendship dated back to the days when both were members of the State legislature. Roosevelt seconded Smith's nomination for the presidency in 1920 at San Francisco, gave him the famous "Happy Warrior" label in nominating him at New York in 1924, and was for a new deal for the "forgotten man."

**FIRST TERM**  
In his first inaugural, he foresaw the need for drastic measures to deal with a drastic situation America was at the depth of a

**GOVERNOR**  
It was at term Springs that he received a telephone call in 1928 from Gov. Alfred E. Smith of New York urging him to run for Governor.

Roosevelt pleaded his health would not permit, but finally consented. He won by only 25,000 plurality, while Smith lost the state to Hoover by 103,000. Two years later he was re-elected by 150,000.

**FIRST ELECTION**  
It was not long after his re-election as governor that "Roosevelt for President" clubs were set up strategy groups in various sections and James A. Farley took organizing command in the field. He entered the 1932 Chicago convention, securing only 106 pledged votes. The two-thirds rule was in effect then and 770 was required for nomination.

**RECORD ELECTION**  
He rode rough-shod over intra-party opposition in winning unanimous re-nomination at the Philadelphia convention in 1936. He was elected in a landslide, receiving 60% of the popular vote and 89% of the electoral college.

**DEPRESSION**  
The nation's banks were closed for action on "first things first."

**NEW PRESIDENT, Harry Truman, Takes His Oath**

Secretary of State Stettinius, Fleet Admiral Leahy, Navy Chief Admiral King, Army Chief General Marshall, Secretary of War Stimson, and Secretary of the Navy Forrestal held a grave conference with President Truman. No comment was made afterwards.

**WASHINGTON, Apr. 13, (AP)—** Harry S. Truman was sworn in as President of the United States at 7:08 P.M. last night, succeeding Franklin Delano Roosevelt whose war and domestic policies he vowed to carry on.

"The death of President Roosevelt is a tragic loss," said County Clerk O. P. Herndon, "and for the second time in American history it can be truly stated he was first in war, first in peace and first in the hearts of his countrymen."

"Most people that I have talked with, feel the loss of the President as a personal loss—just like losing a relative," said Grady Duncan, city sanitary inspector.

"The world has lost the greatest humanitarian in history," declared James H. Lee, chairman of the County Democratic Executive Committee. "The little nations as well as the larger ones have lost their greatest friend. President Roosevelt was the greatest peace and war time President who ever will be known, and was one of the most far-sighted presidents the United States ever had or will hope to have."

"In taking the leadership in international affairs he took the greatest burden ever cast upon human shoulders—a burden he very proudly carried," concluded Mr. Lee.

Therefore, reluctantly, but as a good soldier... I will accept and serve in this office, if I am so ordered by the commander-in-chief of us all—the sovereign people of the United States."

His Republican opponent was Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York.

A tremendous figure of a man, despite legs left withered and useless by infantile paralysis in 1921, Mr. Roosevelt shouldered burdens as heavy as any chief executive ever carried. While he stood up under a job which had wrecked the health of his predecessor, the years naturally left their mark on him.

Forced to Take Rest

Influenza, sinusitis and bronchitis weakened him in the winter of 1943-44 and rumors spread about his health. In April, 1944, he bundled up his old clothes and took a month off to convalesce in a plantation house on the South Carolina coast. When he returned to Washington, his physician said he was in as good shape as any man of 62 could hope to be and that his condition offered no bar to another four years in the White House.

Mr. Roosevelt accepted the fourth term nomination by radio from a naval base at San Diego, Calif. Immediately, he boarded a cruiser for his first wartime trip into the Pacific and consultations in Hawaii—where a sneak punch brought America into the war on Dec. 7, 1941—with top commanders in the battle against Japan.

He long since had broken all—all a Herculean task, one that requires teamwork, tolerance and true Christianity.

His duties are guided by Almighty God. With Divine help we can succeed."

"As President of the Sanford Ministerial Association," said Rev. Joe A. Tolle, "I would like to suggest that the people of Sanford attend the Church of their choice on Sunday and in prayer and worship pay tribute to the ideal for which our President and our Nation stood and that they pray earnestly for our new President and the peoples of the world. Let us suggest that all of our churches dedicate a part or all of the morning service as a Memorial Service."

"All peoples are agreed," said Rev. Tolle, "that the world has suffered a great loss in the passing of our President, Franklin Delano Roosevelt. Stunned though we are we cannot lapse into a state of apathy. We must be filled with fear and run away from our share of responsibility. Rather, we should take courage and hear the words of the prophet Isaiah when he says, 'Fear thou not; for I am with thee; be not dismayed; for I am thy God; I will strengthen thee; yes, I will help thee; yes, I will uphold thee with the right hand of my righteousness.'"

"We stand on the past but we face into the future."

"Do you hear a deep voice calling—

Calling persistently? Like the sound of God's great waters?

Calling insistently? 'Tis the voice of our dead, our myriad dead,

Calling to you and me— 'Tis the call from your rifling With the petty things of life; We cry aloud for a new world vowed To a world-redeeming strife. ## Time After Time... Mr. Churchill dured the dangers of Atlantic crossings for epochal conferences which shifted the Allies from the defensive to the offensive and changed the course of combat around the world.

Standing out in sharp relief, in the light of events the next summer, were their meetings at Cairo and Teheran, Iran, at the close of 1943. In a series of farcical, they talked with Premier Joseph Stalin of Russia, Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek of China and President Ismet Inonu of neutral Turkey.

Italy already had been knocked out of the war. So at Cairo and Teheran, strategy was perfected for obliterating the military power of Germany and Japan.

It called for Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, who had welded British and American arms in the Mediterranean into a mighty and victorious force, to assume command of invasion forces poised in Britain for a knock-out blow at Germany from the west.

First, at a desert hotel in the shadow of a great pyramid, the American President, the British prime minister and the Chinese generalissimo agreed that Japan must be utterly destroyed by stripping away lands acquired in decades of conquest. Military measures necessary to fulfill these aims were considered.

Mr. Roosevelt flew back to Chungking. Roosevelt and Churchill flew to Teheran, where the adjoining Soviet and British ententes formed a single compound surrounded by grim Russian Tommy-gunner guards.

Stalin, who had left his country for the first time since the revolution, invited the American President to stay at the Soviet embassy during his participation in perhaps the most significant of all United Nations talks.

"In Complete Agreement"

Four days of deliberation produced, Roosevelt, Churchill and Stalin said, a determination that "our nations shall work together in the war and in the peace that will follow." They added they had concerted plans for the "destruction of the German forces."

Four days of complete agreement as to the scope and timing of operations which will be undertaken from the east, west and south.

From Teheran, Stalin went back to Moscow, Roosevelt and Churchill to Cairo to be joined by President Inonu. Three days of conference in Cairo brought forth another communique which reported that "the closest unity existed between the United States, America, Turkey and Great Britain in their attitude toward the world situation."

Enroute home, the President stopped at battle-scarred Tunisia, Malta and Sicily. The secret

## service had to restrain him from looking in on fighting in Italy.

Action Follows Conference

By mid-1944, the full significance of the Cairo-Teheran meetings had become apparent.

In fulfillment of the commitments, the invasion of France got under way from the west and south. Russia pounded hard on the eastern front and by fall Allied arms were on German soil. Victory in Europe was in sight. And in the Pacific, Allied forces won successes in Burma, flushed the Japanese from one island stronghold after another, dealt serious blows to the enemy's navy and sent bombers winging with increasing frequency over the heart of Nippon.

### Funeral Services To Be Tomorrow In Washington

(Continued From Page One)  
 The procession also passed the Warm Springs Foundation Administration building where polo patients sat and stood to watch the beneficiary pass for the last time.

**WARM SPRINGS, Ga., Apr. 13.**—President Roosevelt died suddenly at 3:35 P. M., Central War Time (4:35 EWT), yesterday of a massive cerebral hemorrhage.  
 Comdr. Howard Bruenn, naval physician, made this announcement to reporters shortly after White House Secretary William D. Hassett called a hurried news conference to announce the death of the nation's only fourth-term President.  
 Roosevelt died in the Little White House on top of Pine Mountain where he had come for a three-week rest. He was 63 years old.  
 Dr. Bruenn said he saw the President yesterday morning and

was in excellent spirits at 9:30 A. M.  
 "At 1 o'clock," Bruenn added, "he was sitting in a chair while sketches were being made of him by an architect. He suddenly complained of a very severe occipital headache (back of the head).  
 "Within a very few minutes he lost consciousness. He was seen by me at 1:30 P. M., 15 minutes after the episode had started.  
 "He did not regain consciousness and he died at 3:35 P. M."

**Others Present**  
 Only others present in the cottage were Comdr. George Fox, White House pharmacist and long attendant of the President; Hassett, Miss Grace Tully, confidential secretary, and two cousins, Miss Laura Delano and Miss Margaret Suckley.  
 Bruenn said he called Vice Adm. McIntyre, navy surgeon general and White House physician in Washington and that McIntyre in turn called Dr. James E. Paulin, of Atlanta, an internal medicine practitioner and honorary consultant to the navy surgeon general.  
 Paulin was present when Bruenn gave the statement of the cause of death to reporters of the three national news services. Hassett gave newsmen the first announcement.

The President's death spread like wildfire around the foundation and atop an adjoining mountain where guests were gathered for a barbecue.

The President's late arrival for the barbecue caused some anxiety. A telephone call was cut through and a few minutes later representatives of the Associated Press, United Press and International News Service were told to rush immediately to the Warm Springs cottage on the foundation grounds for some news.

The announcement was detailed to reporters in a white cottage across a red clay road from the administration building of the foundation where Hassett and four other White House attaches were making their home here.  
 "This was Mr. Roosevelt's second stay here in four months. The President spent 19 days here only last November-December. Reporters who attended his news conference a week ago to day noted his gray pallor. This had been not only his worst for many months but had caused a considerable comment among White House circles here.  
 "Some weeks ago that he was seen in a car on the road and he reportedly had lost weight."

repeat their questions.  
 This was attributable, according to those close to him, to a sinus leakage into the throat which caused slight constrictions.  
 Hassett gave reporters the first word.  
 "It is my sad duty," he told the reporters, "to announce the death of the President."  
 Hassett urged the reporters to rush to their telephones immediately as a simultaneous announcement was being made at the White House in Washington.

In quivering voice, in the presence of other members of the White House staff who came here with Roosevelt March 30, for what was to be a three-week rest, Hassett said further details as to the cause of death would be given out later by Comdr. Bruenn in the absence of Vice Adm. McIntyre.

**Few Details**  
 So insistent was Secretary Hassett that the news be made public immediately that details were left for future announcement.

The President, the nation's first chief executive to break the two-term tradition, had planned to stay here another week, then he was to return to Washington and spend one day before taking a train to San Francisco to open the April 25 United Nations conference to which he had been invited.  
 Roosevelt died in the bedroom in his little white bungalow atop Pine Mountain, where he had been coming for 20 years to take the after-treatments for infantile paralysis with which he was stricken in 1921.  
 Long before his presidency, Roosevelt helped found the Warm Springs foundation for polio victims. In recent months he had taken a deep interest in expanding it for servicemen afflicted with this disease.  
 Only two persons were believed to be in the cottage at the time of his death. They were Miss Laura Delano and Miss Margaret Suckley. They frequently had kept house for him on many of his recent visits, including his 19-day stay here last November and December.  
 No Pain  
 In response to a question, Dr. Bruenn said the President died without pain.  
 News of the President's death spread quickly and caused many to assume the 125 infantile paralysis patients at the foundation were in a state of shock.  
 "The illness of Warm Springs patients," Dr. Bruenn said, "is not contagious. It is a disease of the nervous system which the President had about 70 years ago."

 Miss Louise Hackmeister, veteran White House chief telephone operator, could hardly talk in her excitement to report to those who had to be informed.  
 Tears and quivering voices accompanied the announcement of the President's death by Hassett, Miss Tully, Mrs. Alice Wininger, Hassett's secretary, and Mrs. Dorothy Brady, presidential stenographer, sat tense on a sofa as Hassett gave the news.

**Arrived March 30**  
 Roosevelt arrived at Warm Springs March 30. He had been underweight and his doctors wanted him to take it easy to see if he could not regain the poundage at which he felt comfortable.
