



President Roosevelt

The entire nation and all freedom-loving people throughout the world today mourn the loss of our great President who at the very pinnacle of his power and prestige, at the zenith of his career as commander-in-chief of the greatest armies and navies the world has even known, has been struck down, a casualty of this war as surely as any front line soldier who ever suffered the shafts of bat-

There may have been some premonition in President Roosevelt's words when he said last summer: "All that is within me cries out to go back to my home on the Hudson River, to avoid public responsibilities, and to avoid also the publicity which in our democracy follows every step of the nation's chief executive. Such would be my choice. But we of this generation chance to live in a day and hour when our nation has been attacked, and when its future existence and the future existence of our chosen method of government are at stake",

Whatever may have been his personal predilections in the matter, he accepted the call of the Democratic party, and later of the people of the United States, to the heavy burdens and responsibilities of a fourth term in office with the nation still at war and with the even more trying task of perfecting a just and lasting peace still before him. "Therefore, reluctantly, but as a good soldier", he said, "! will accept and serve in this office, if I am so ordered by the commander-in-chief of us all, the sovereign people of the United States".

The untimely passing of President Roosevelt at this critical hour, only three months after the beginning of his fourth term, bears tragic consequences for us all. If he could have been spared for but one more year until the peace conferences had been held and the framework of the organization to prevent future wars had been more clearly defined, if he could have but lived until the agonies of post-war reconversion had been allayed, hope for the will man, preserve me from the future peace and happiness of the world would be improved. see


