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# McLain, West clash over questionnaire

## Christian Coalition form created by challenger, sent to incumbent

SANFORD — Bob West, a Republican candidate for the District 5 seat on the Seminole County Commission, said Friday he had "taken a leave of absence" from the interim field director's position for the Christian Coalition of Florida.

"I did this last month on qualifying day," West said. The Coalition is a non-profit Christian group which provides a voter information guide that does not endorse a candidate but strongly hints

which it considers the good or bad forces.

West distributed a 49-question form to more than 400 candidates running this year for office in the state. One candidate — Daryl McLain, the Republican incumbent District 5 Commissioner in

Seminole County — says West "wasn't fair and equitable" about the questions.

"He published the results of the questionnaire on the web, but under my answers he wrote 'unclear,'" McLain said. "It was pure misinformation."

West said Friday that McLain was the

only candidate who did not answer the questions as stated. "He put a little commentary on each question but that was all. I published his commentary."

Two years ago when West challenged Randy Morris for the District 2 county commission seat, he helped author the same questionnaire that was used this year. Morris refused to answer, protesting his opponent's part in the survey.

West assumed the interim director's role of the Coalition about a year ago

# Schools back in session Monday

## Bus drivers making calls to inform parents

Come Monday morning the sound of school bells will signal the start of classes for students throughout Seminole County. And Jean Johnson, director of transportation, says the great yellow fleet of nearly 400 school buses is ready to hit the road.

Although the buses and the 388 bus drivers are ready to go, the problem, Johnson said, is informing students and their parents of the bus route schedules.

Johnson said her office has been swamped with last minute calls from parents wanting to know arrival and drop-off times, in addition to bus stop locations.

"We sent out 28,000 postcards to parents with bus route information," Johnson said.

This was the first year, she explained, for mailing the postcards. Since Wednesday, bus drivers have been phoning families on their routes informing them of pickup and drop-off times. Each driver will be making more than 150 phone calls.

According to Johnson, the phone calling started in 1994 as one way of getting the information to the public.

In addition to the postcards and telephone calling, route information will be handed out at Wal-Mart's in Sanford, Altamonte Springs, and the Oviedo Market Place this weekend from noon to 5 p.m.

# 'Arm & Hammer' robber escapes from bank heist

Seminole County Sheriff's Office investigators are seeking the suspect in a bank robbery at Hunt Club Corners (SR 436 and Hunt Club Blvd) on Thursday, Aug. 3rd at the First Union Bank just past noon.

The suspect arrived at the bank under the guise of opening a commercial account. After sitting down in the office of a clerk who opens new accounts, the suspect lifted his shirt and showed the bank employee a large handgun that was tucked into his belt.

He also showed the employee an Arm & Hammer Baking Soda box that had wires running out of the top. The box was in a leather bag the suspect carried into the bank. He told the employee he was prepared to kill her and everyone else, and asked her to take him to the safe.

The suspect took money and made the tellers lie on the floor of the safe while he escaped.

# Bike shows newest isn't always the best

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've been riding my new bicycle for a few weeks now. I love it!

DEAR READER: I'm glad to hear that you're enjoying your new bicycle. It's a great investment.

I like to ride. I've owned a few bikes in the past, but this one is different. It's got a lot of features that make it special.

Rather than a sunny day, I merely climb on my 12-speed and take off on a 20-mile jaunt just to enjoy the exercise and the pleasant weather.

You can imagine my exhilaration, therefore, when my friend Sam insisted that I try his racing bike. The day was perfect: clear, cool and windless when I started. The luscious countryside was a velvety soft green. Moreover, I was off duty so I wasn't restricted by the telephone, an invidious invention to which all practitioners owe allegiance.

Sam's bicycle was a work of art, all alloy, as light as a bird, with toe clips with Nike biking shoes, a god-hill red Cannondale with pencil-thin tires, a slightly oval sprocket, special gears, and a hand-rest device allowing the rider to ride with arms thrust forward in a resting position that reduces wind resistance. When I saw the bike, I knew that for a few fun and glorious hours, I would be the old-age Lance Armstrong of New England.

I kept falling in Sam's driveway — about 8 or 10 times — until I learned how to extricate myself from the toe-clips. Evidently, I was to be married to this machine — and, like any marriage, it was for better or for worse.

Eventually, I got the hang of it and could, with difficulty, free my feet from the pedals by kicking my heels sideways, thereby relieving the sensation that my shoes were adhered to gargantuan gobs of super glue. I had other problems, too. The gear levers were in an unfamiliar position, and there was only one set.

Nonetheless, despite my unfamiliarity with the bicycle, I tentatively left the driveway, climbed a short incline, and was soon burning up the road. The hills melted away as I headed east. This novel level of

excitement was a new experience. I was riding under a blue sky with a few wispy clouds.

My excitement was short-lived, however. I was riding on a road that was not as smooth as I had hoped. The bumps and potholes were a real pain.

With the wind in my face, the return journey was more what I would describe as a "bumpy ride." I was riding on a road that was not as smooth as I had hoped.

Finally, I arrived at Sam's, tired and grateful for the loan of his bicycle, and strangely chastened by the experience. I searched for a metaphor, a character flaw of most writers.

High-tech modern medicine — with its reliance on computers, machines and gizmos of one kind or another — is replacing fast, flashy and exciting things. It is the racing bike — the innovative experience, the however dangerous for patients — and for doctors — when things go wrong. Once a physician is attached to it, like shoes in pedal clips, there is, I admit, a unique feeling of oneness. However, there is also less stability, more vulnerability and increased uncertainty. Yeah, I can travel the same distance and reach similar goals with my 12-speed. I just do it slower. With tamability comes confidence. Technique and stamina replace alloy and leather.

As I said, I'm not a racer. Never have been — and, at my stage in life, never will be. I must accept where I am. The hills may seem a little longer on the way up, and a lot shorter on the way down. However, I'll get there eventually. And I'll do it in my own way, in my own time, without special gears and sprockets. Knowing I can raise my feet off the pedals and actually enjoy the wind in my face makes the ride that much more special.

I hope to ride with Sam one day, and watch him easily out-distance me. That's OK. In later on, because of my age, I have to use a tricycle. I can accept that. For now, I'm going to stick to my touring bike and leave the high performance to others.

Still, that racing bike was a humdinger.

# Historical Society meets at theater

Approximately 50 members of the Sanford Historical Society gathered at the historic theater as the Stairs Theatre on July 27 for their meeting and program.

Presenters Helen Stairs, the club's board member and president of Edgewater Elementary School, used slides to present an informative program on the history of the building, the renovation process and a preview of its future use.

The theater was designed by Elton Moughton and the contractor was K.V. Callespie of Jacksonville.

The grand opening of the Milane Theater was held on Aug. 2, 1923 with all 84 seats filled. Because of various grades and such, the seating of the restored building had to be rearranged.

During the 1930s, admission costs were 45 cents for adults, 30 cents for children and 25 cents for balcony seats. The 1932 Miss Seminole County Pageant was held at the Milane, at which time Dorothy Haines was crowned. She received an expense paid trip to Clearwater. The 2001 pageant is scheduled to be held at the Stairs Theatre.

In 1933, the building was sold to Frank Evans who changed its name to the Ritz Theatre. The Evans family continued to own it until the 1980s.

During the 1920s it was used for both movies and live performances. By the late 1940s, it had exclusively become a movie theater. Larger, more modern theaters began to take away the patrons and the theater was closed in about 1970. Several attempts at renovation have been made, but the present board, with Helen Stairs as its president, has persevered and created a beautiful and useful theatre.

Slides were presented that showed the renovation process from a dilapidated building to

what it has become.

The original grant of \$50,000 was a nonprofit by extensive need reports. Other grants have been received from the government and fundraisers held. There are still seats one can purchase and other ongoing fund raising projects.

The theater was renamed the Helen Stairs Theatre in 1989 and the grand opening was held in May.

Mr. Scott asked for help from the Society in planning a program for third graders which would be held annually in the theater. Suggestions he made included a slide presentation, live entertainment and a downtown walking tour. Several Society members volunteered to help.

During the business meeting presided over by Grace Marie Stinecifer, several announcements and committee reports

were made.

The calendar committee reported that the committee would be working on the theater soon. The publication committee has two booklets that should be ready by the end of the year. One is a reprint of Betty Smith's history of Sanford's Jewish community, and the other is a history of Monroe Station.

Members were asked to volunteer to help at a show at the Florida Auditorium. Celebrations to be held Oct. 1 in Jaynes. The Society has several publications that can be sold there.

The next meeting of the Society will be held Sept. 28 with Bill Beckett, author of

Queen of Lovers, as the speaker. Or New Year's another noted author, Patricia Smith, will be the speaker with the meeting to be held at the Chamber of

Commerce building. It will be held at 10:00 a.m. on the 28th.

It is hoped that the committee will be able to complete the booklets by the end of the year. Mr. Scott will be the guest speaker at the show.

### Labels, chasms and a little history

A teen-age girl sat on the floor of Barnes and Noble in Berkeley listening to stories she had never heard, absorbing a history she had never seen in her school books. Gloria Steinem was speaking that night to promote Ms. magazine. The girl's head swiveled between Steinem in front of her and the rows of women behind her, taking in their comments with a vaguely quizzical look.

She wasn't yet born when Ms. hit the newsstands in 1972 with its cover of an exhausted eight-armed woman holding a frying pan, clock, feather duster, typewriter, steering wheel, iron, telephone and mirror. "Now it'd be a cell phone, a computer mouse, some different things," Steinem joked.

But not all different things. The frying pan, clock, steering wheel and mirror haven't gone anywhere. Neither has the passion among feminists of a certain age, the ones who announce upcoming rallies, and who also voice their frustration and disappointment in today's young women — a common theme.

Younger women seem to have little or no interest in feminism, the older women say. They reject the very word "feminist." Many subscribe to the traditional lifestyles that previous generations of feminists had rejected, and they go for clothing that reinforces the notion of women as sex symbols.

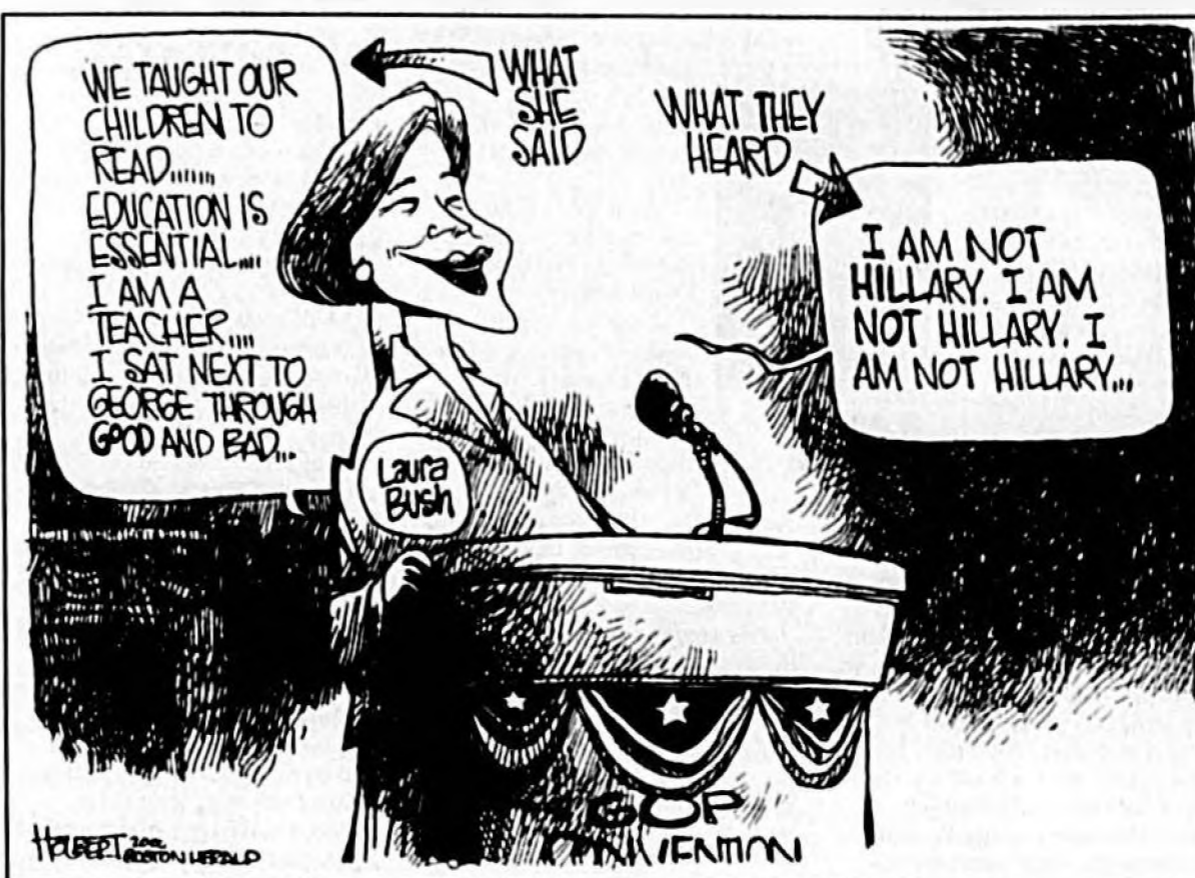
Just beneath the surface, though left unsaid, one could detect mild accusations of ungratefulness.

Steinem glanced at the young woman sitting on the floor, and to several other young women who had come to the bookstore.

"It doesn't work to try to radicalize people through guilt," Steinem said. "You get radicalized by your own concerns and the injustices you see."

Which are different today from 30 years ago. The challenge of bringing about change, as early feminists have done so well, is that things change. The battleground shifts. The combatants arrive with their own histories, their own ways of doing things, even their own language. And the old guard inevitably bristles. "I think sometimes we fail to recognize (today's)

### Begley wonders if Dale does believe in accountability

To the editor:

I read with some interest Mayor Larry Dale's views on accountability in Sunday's *Seminole Herald*. As a long-time supporter of both Mayor Dale and City Manager Tony VanDerworp, I, too, believe that accountability for the actions of the city rest squarely on the shoulders of these two gentlemen.

I have, however, begun to question exactly how strongly they themselves believe this. It was Mayor Dale and Mr. VanDerworp that I, in fact, turned to when faced with a problem caused by the city that I could not solve alone.

Almost two weeks ago a 40 foot branch from a live oak in Touhy Park came crashing down upon my family car. It was the middle of the night. There was no wind, no rain, no reason I could see for this unfortunate accident. The crash was loud enough to bring out my neighbors, the branch large enough to stretch completely across the street and engulf the vehicle.

Shortly before 1 a.m. a public works crew arrived with a bulldozer to clear the road. According to my neighbors, the crews didn't seem to notice that there was a car beneath the branch as they attacked it with the bulldozer. Once the sound of wood on metal and the sound of breaking glass subsided, the crew realized their mistake and decided to take another approach (chainsaws).

By morning, little evidence remained save a demolished 1991 Celica and the skidmarks indicating that the car had been moved backwards almost a foot and 6 inches toward the curb. No one ever so much as knocked on the door to mention this little "mishap." It was left to my neighbors to tell me.

The city didn't tell me. Nor did they tell their insurers. The Florida League of Cities. Robert Beall of the Department of Public Works

did tell me that I should file a claim with the city and provided the phone number. Within 10 minutes of filing the claim, I received a call indicating that Howard Jeffries, the city's landscape architect, was outside my home and had determined that because the tree was "healthy" the city had no liability in the matter. I was shocked. I wondered exactly how Mr. Jeffries had made this determination, since by the time he arrived the branch itself was mulch and the section of the tree from which it had fallen had been "cleaned" with a chainsaw.

I eventually obtained an e-mail address for Tony and sent him a blow-by-blow description of the events as they happened.

The following Monday shortly after 9 a.m. I received a phone call from Larry Dale. I explained the situation to Mayor Dale in detail. His initial response was a curious one. "Mr. Begley, do you read the papers?" I had to admit that, in truth, I don't read the *Herald* as carefully as I should. It seems Mayor Dale had been accused of "micro-managing" the city. However, the mayor asserted that the city would "make it right." Micro-management be damned! The mayor was on my side!

It appears he simply forgot to mention this to anyone else. I received the same assertion from the City Manager's office. I would be contacted. Someone would call. There would be an insurance claim assigned.

On Saturday, July 30th, 10 days after the incident, I received a form letter from the Florida League of Cities' claims adjuster. It read, "We have completed our investigation into this matter and find no negligence/liability on the part of the City of Sanford for your damages." Case closed.

My family is in serious difficulty. You see, my wife and I bought our little home on Elm Street with our life-savings. We have no insurance that covers a bulldozer moving our car.

Mayor Dale is absolutely correct in asserting that accountability is the precursor to effective policy. He is absolutely correct in asserting

that the buck stops at the office of the mayor and city manager. That is why I hold them accountable, not for the random accident of nature but for the promises they make to serve the people.

Because the information didn't make it past their offices, I must spend a hard-won \$94 to file a suit against the city, take the time off from work to pursue the lawsuit, and wonder if, in the end, we would have done better to take the \$94 and invest it in insurance against the future negligence of the town we've come to love. We could do a lot worse than Larry Dale and Tony VanDerworp. I'm no longer convinced that we couldn't do better.

activism when we see it because it looks different from what we did," Steinem said. She pointed to the Lilith Fair concerts, which had feminist lyrics, booths of women's books, voter registration tables.

"The symbols that we rebelled against" — such as high heels, push-up bras, taking a man's name after marriage, quitting work to raise children — now are freely chosen, or the context has changed. Young women feel different about these things because they're choosing them freely, and, in fact, they're a form of rebellion in themselves.

"The core question is: Is this our choice?"

Precisely. Feminism never demanded that women walk in lockstep, and it doesn't today. So what if young women don't call themselves feminists? They still embrace the goals of feminism. They still expect equality and freedom of choice. In other words, they

are the confident, ambitious, independent women that feminism set out to create.

As the evening came to a close, the young woman sitting on the floor up front raised her hand. She seemed surprised that the future she took for granted — her place in the boardroom, the bedroom, the gym — had been shaped by so much struggle in the past. "I came here because I'm getting extra credit in my high-school

English class," the girl said to Steinem. "Before tonight, I'd never heard of Ms. magazine and I'd never heard of you."

Steinem laughed along with the audience.

"The point is not that you know who I am," Steinem told her. "The point is that you know who you are."

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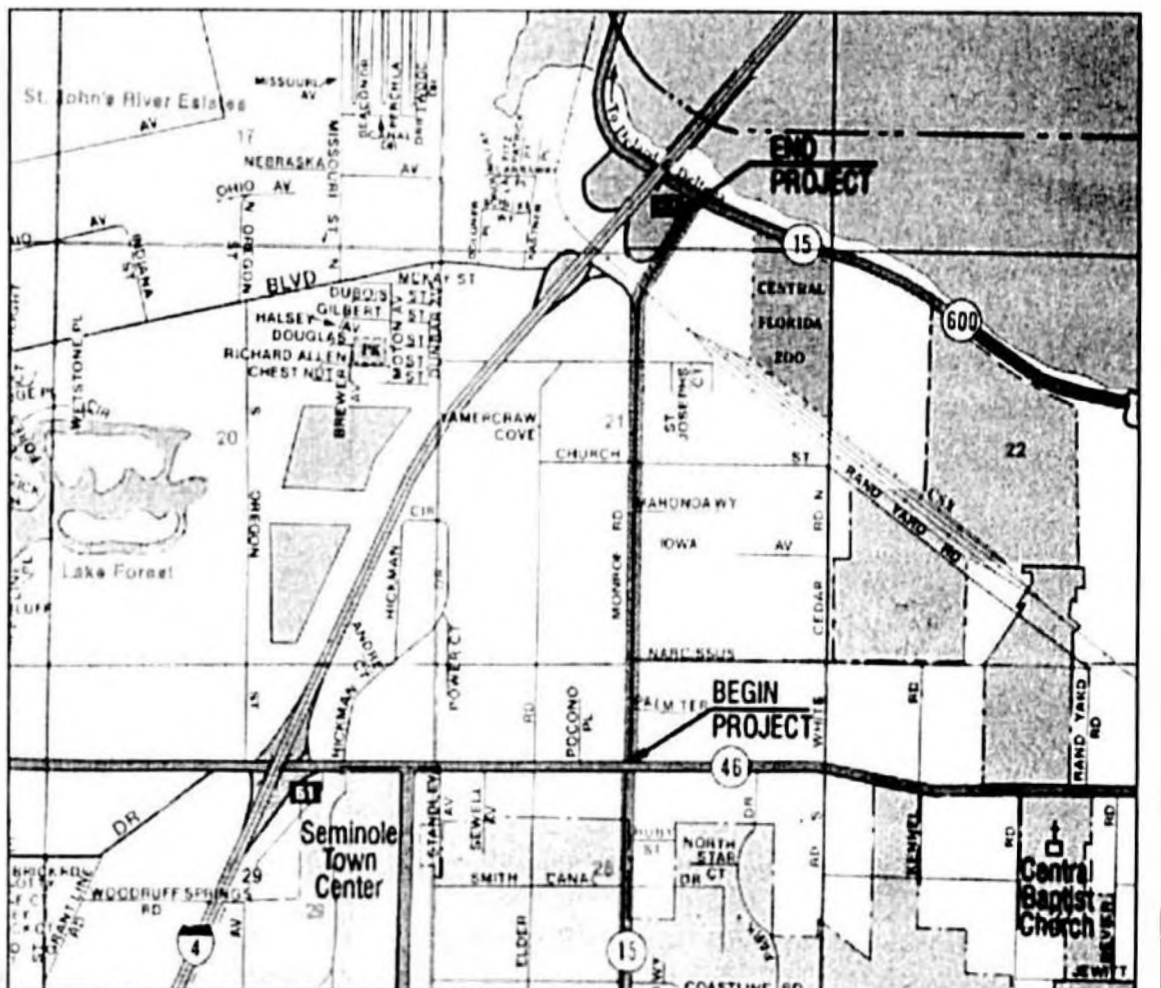

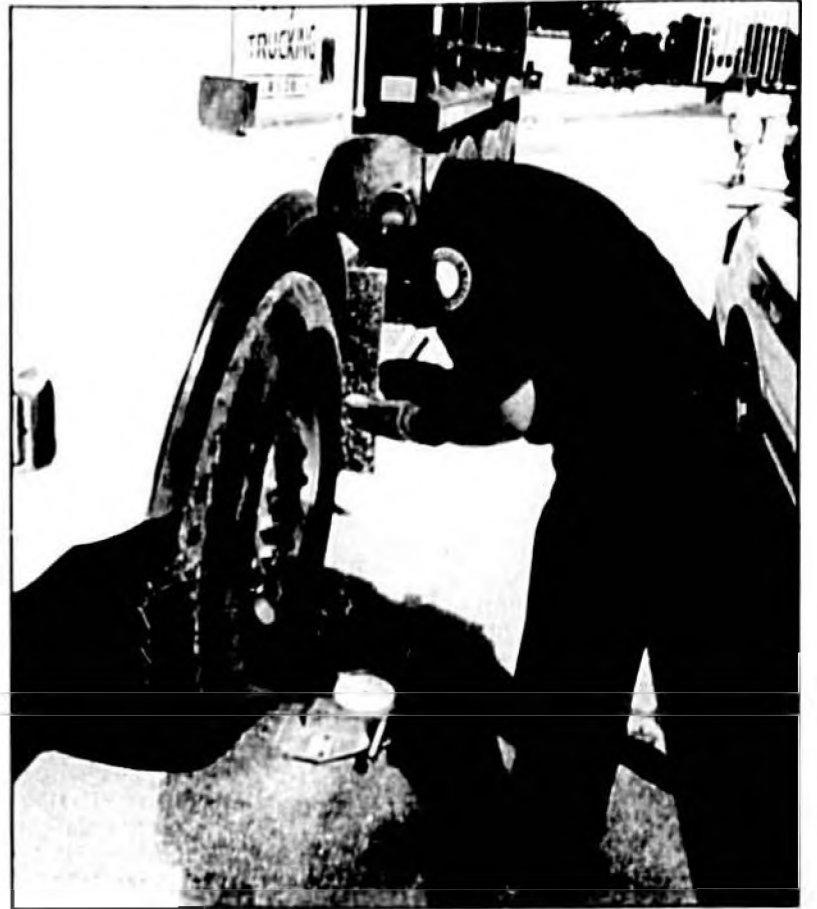

## Earnhardt ties Martin with fourth True Value IROC title

INDIANAPOLIS - With a second place finish, seventh-time NASCAR Winston Cup champion, Dale Earnhardt, driving the dark blue True Value IROC Pontiac Firebird earned enough points to take the 2000 True Value IROC Championship away from fellow champion from Daytona Beach's Mark Martin at Indianapolis Motor Speedway Friday.

Martin, driving the red True Value IROC Pontiac Firebird earned his 10th career True Value IROC race by 1.327 seconds, but fell short of the championship by three points. NASCAR Winston Cup veteran, Tony Stewart took third place.

For the third consecutive year, the True Value IROC series finished its season at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway. The four race invitational series began at Daytona in February with Dale Earnhardt earning his 11th IROC victory, tying Al Unser, Jr. for all-time series race wins.

Race two resulted in Bobby Labonte's first series win in April at Talladega Superspeedway.

The surprise of the season took place in race three at Michigan Speedway when the 1998 Indy 500 winner, Orlando's Eddie Cheever Jr., relentlessly battled for the lead throughout and took home his first True Value IROC victory.

For the final race of the series, Martin started in 11th position but quickly moved to fifth position on lap 3 and up to third on lap 7.

"I got off to a good start," said Martin. "Before the lap 7 caution, I knew I was going to lead the race soon."

A single race incident occurred immediately following Martin's surge to the front, in the first turn of the 7 lap as Indy Racing League Champions Greg Ray and Mark Dismore tapped one another. The collision sent Dismore spinning into the wall.

"It's unfortunate," said Ray. "We had a good car. Mark (Dismore) and I got into it in Turn 1. Unfortunately, he caught the wall."

Dismore's car was towed, while Ray pulled out of the race in the 18th lap.

After the caution lap, Martin continued his torrid pace all the way to the checkered flag. His victory made him the first driver ever to win three consecutive events in any type of car at Indianapolis Motor Speedway since the track's first race in 1911.

"I got to the lead as quick as I could and then just tried to stretch it so he (Earnhardt) couldn't draft," said Martin. "When I got to the lead, I didn't think he'd get to second. I ran about one lap, and there he was. I thought, 'That's it.' I could probably race 10 more years here and never win another True Value IROC Race here. I've just been lucky."

With Martin gaining bonus points for leading most laps and winning the race, Earnhardt needed to finish second in order to secure another championship. Rising to the challenge, Earnhardt came in behind

## Suns advance to Final Four Weir blanks Senators 2-0 in Under-17 quarterfinals

PHOENIX - Relying mainly on its offense the Central Florida Suns had posted three solid victories and three blowouts in cruising undefeated through Pool Play in the AAU (Amateur Athletic Union) 17-and-Under National Tournament at Phoenix, Arizona.

object that will also add another page to the long-argued question....Who plays better baseball, California or Florida???

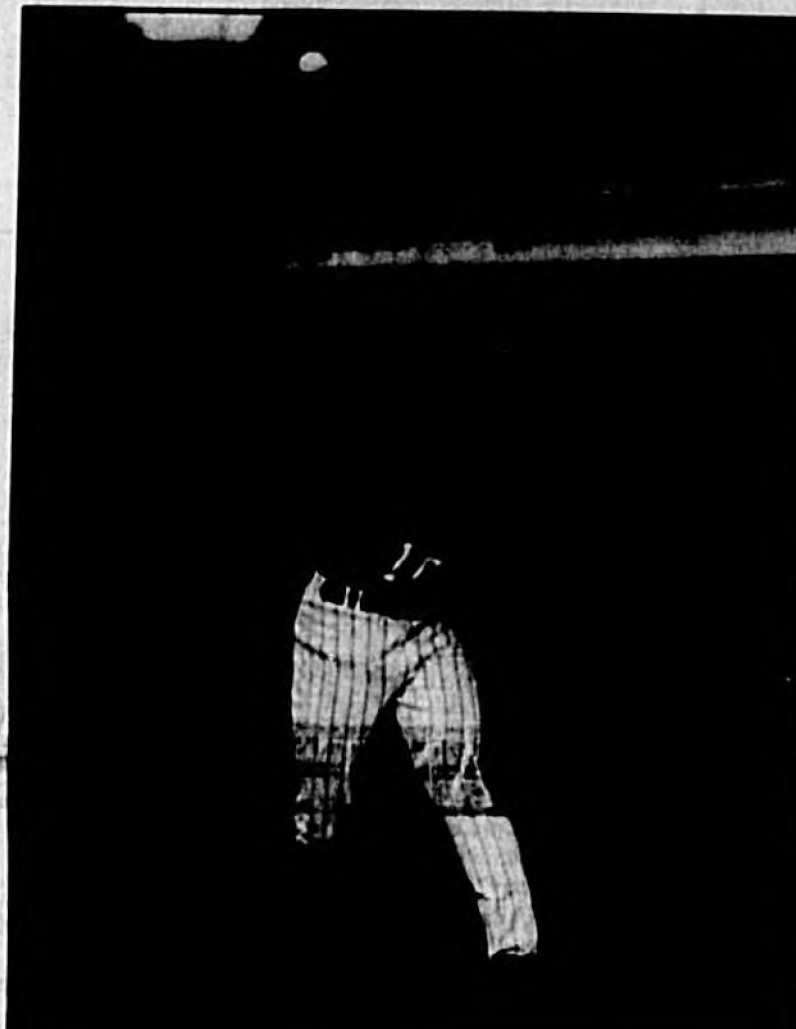

## Forwards returning to Magic

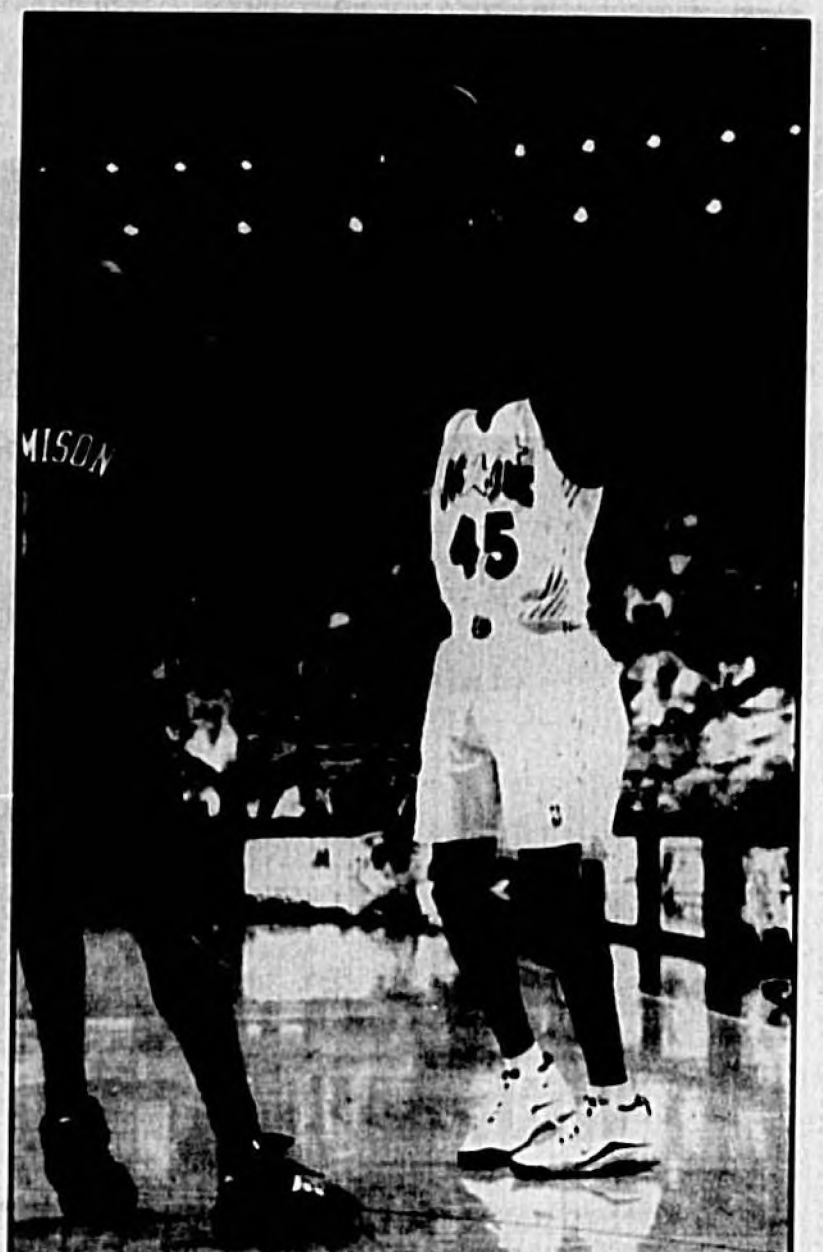
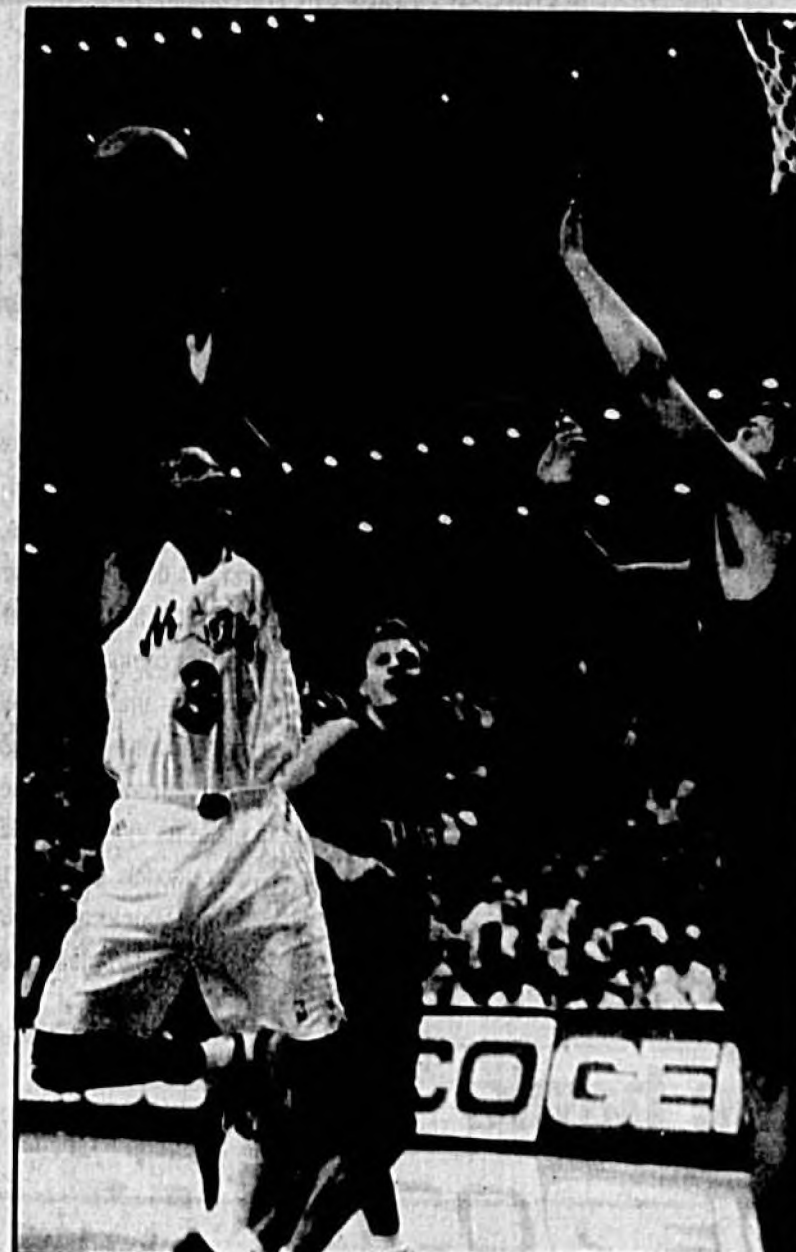
ORLANDO - The Orlando Magic have re-signed free agent forwards Charles "Bo" Outlaw and Monty Williams. General Manager John Gabriel announced Friday. Per team policy, terms of the deals were not disclosed.

Outlaw (6-foot-8, 210-pounds, birth date 4/3/71) played in all 82 games last season for the Magic, averaging 6.0 points per game, 6.4 rebounds per game, 3.0 assists per game, 1.80 blocks per game and 1.38 steals per game in 28.4 minutes per game.

He led Orlando in blocked shots and ranked second in both rebounding and steals. Outlaw finished 14th in the NBA in blocked shots and 32nd in steals.

Outlaw started in 55 games, shot a team-best .602 from the floor and recorded the Magic's only triple-double of the season with 10 points, 14 rebounds and a career-high-tying 10 assists on Mar. 28 vs. Boston. Outlaw led the team in rebounding 19 times, blocked two or more shots 44 times and recorded two or more steals in 36 outings.

A seven-year veteran, Outlaw has spent the last three seasons with Orlando. He has averaged 7.6 points per game, 6.8 rebounds per game, 2.7 assists per game, 1.91 blocks per game and 1.33 steals per game in 195 career regular season outings with the Magic. He has also been recognized for his work in the Central Florida community with the 1999 Rich and Helen DeVos Community Enrichment Award. Outlaw has played in 475 games

during his NBA career with the Los Angeles Clippers and Orlando.

Williams (6-foot-8, 225-pounds, birth date 10/8/71) played in a career-best 75 games last season for the Magic, averaging 8.7 points per game, 3.3 rebounds per game and 1.4 assists per game in 20 minutes

per game.

He started in 23 games, averaging 10 points per game in 23.3 minutes per game during that span. Williams scored in double figures 34 times, including a team-leading 19 points in 17 minutes on Mar. 14 vs. Washington. He led (or tied) the team in scoring twice.

Originally selected by New York

in the first round (24th overall) of the 1994 NBA Draft, Williams has appeared in 285 regular season games during his NBA career with New York, San Antonio, Denver and Orlando. He has averaged 6.7 points per game, 2.7 rebounds per game and 1.2 assists per game during his

career.

## Insurance official advises businesses to prepare for potential flood damage

Business owners eyeing stock market swings and fluctuating interest rates may be overlooking another, even greater threat to their economic well-being - potential losses from flooding during the 2000 hurricane season.

"Businesses can't afford to get caught off-guard by flood damage," said Senior Vice President Steve Murry of Bankers Insurance Group. "Flooding is the number one risk associated with the hurricane season but most commercial insurance policies don't cover flood damage or losses. So the first step in being prepared is to review business coverage and make sure you have adequate flood insurance in place."

Murry suggests the following approach, to be made now, rather than later when there is an impending threat.

• As soon as possible, com-

pile an itemized list of property including furnishings, electronic equipment and supplies. Have photos taken. This will help an insurance adjuster settle a claim more quickly and accurately.

• Develop a company disaster plan, providing employees with clear instructions regarding assigned tasks. The plan should be a working document, updated regularly especially if there is a high employee turnover.

• Make advance arrangements to move items to an alternate site should you be forced to evacuate.

• Determine alternate vendors for key services involving computers, office equipment and others, remembering that flooding may also affect them.

• Assemble disaster supplies at the business including a radio with battery back-up, heavy-gauge plastic, sandbags, pre-cut plywood for windows and doors, portable lights, generators and cell phones.

"Storm season is like taxes," Murry said. "We know it's coming every year and we know that flooding is the greatest threat it brings. It's just good business sense to be prepared."

Although there is a requirement for adequate retention ponds around business developments and residential areas, and there is generally sufficient drainage, over the past years the area seen the large amount of rainfall associated with hurricanes or tropical storms which could not be handled by the ponds and sewers at the rate the rain is falling.

While it is always hoped the danger of flooding does not pertain to a particular business or location, there is always the possibility.

The best way to cope with this is to be sure you have flood insurance, which is generally not contained in regular insurance, and undertake preparations now.

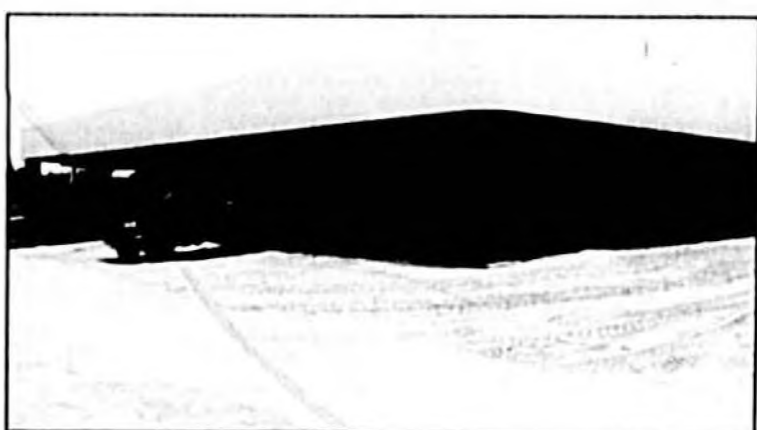

*'The Puppet Lady' brings imagination to life*

Nancy Kenton's world is full of magic. Most days, she surrounds herself with talking animals, medieval wizards and creatures indefinable to the unimaginative.

But, people with imagination understand "The Puppet Lady's" realm. Her audiences, which usually consist of wide-eyed children, eagerly interact with Kenton's creations — often ignoring the person who brings them to life.

"The children pay no attention to me," Kenton said. "They see the puppets, but they don't see me even though I am sitting right there in front of them."

Kenton recently presented her "World On A String" program at several libraries in Seminole County. Her entourage included The Great Haredini and Roody, a rather shy furry green alligator that barely fit on Kenton's lap.

Her puppet show was meant to amuse, but it was also educational. The program exposed children to various cultures through the likes of Mr. Gadzooks, the balloon carrying character from France and Thalien the Alien, the intergalactic air guitar player.

Seminole County was one of the last stops in Kenton's summer tour. After more than 50 shows in eight weeks, she will take a break during August.

"August is usually dead since the children are heading back to school," she said. "It gives me a little vacation — a time to recuperate and regenerate."

It also gives the puppet master time to create new characters and programs to add to her repertoire. She said it usually takes six months to produce a new show.

Kenton doesn't go anywhere without a notebook. Pens and

**Q:** Do you teach?

**A:** Only on a local level. We get together

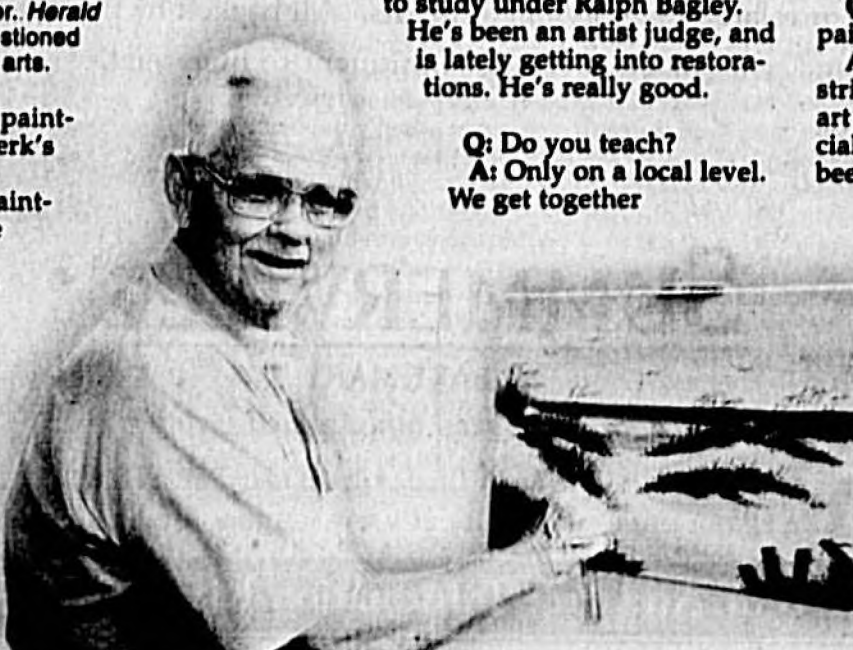
at my church (First Methodist Church) weekly on Monday mornings, from October through May of each year. Troy (Ray) actually started painting through this church group.

**Q:** Is there money to be made in oil or acrylic painting?

**A:** Not at my level. In fact, most people are in it strictly for pleasure. It's also fun to participate in art shows. I've entered a number of them, especially the St. Johns River Art Festival. But I've been at art shows in Stuart and as far away as Macon, Ga. It's purely for the fun of it.

**Q:** Can you relate anything you have found interesting in painting?

**A:** I once bought a "Highwayman" painting by Newton, for \$40. I enjoyed looking at it. After I had kept it for many years, I decided to get rid of it, and put it out in a yard sale, at \$40, just wanting to get my money. About that time, the "Highwayman" paintings suddenly became famous, and I pulled it from the sale at the last minute and ended up selling it through a Winter Park Art Gallery for \$500.

 paper are placed strategically in her house, in her purse and in her car so she can easily jot down an idea.  
 "I never know when I am going to think up something new," she said. "I might hear music or see a dress that gives me an idea for a puppet."  
 You can't schedule creativity, she said. "At least I can't."  
 Kenton makes all her puppets in her High Spring, Fla., studio.

One character can take as little as 24 hours or as much as three months to create, depending on its size and intricacies.  
 "There are times when I am almost finished with a puppet but I get another idea," she said. "So I tear it apart and start all over again."  
 Kenton also sews many of the outfits her puppets wear. And a puppet is not limited to just one suit of clothes.  
 "I think the Great Haredevil

has more outfits than I do," she said.  
 Kenton doesn't know the exact number of puppets she has made during her 25 years as a professional puppeteer.  
 "I know it's a lot."  
 She began her career when she was assigned a puppet project during her senior year at Hollins College in Roanoke, Va. She obtained a degree in theater arts and education and thought she would become a high school

drama teacher.  
 "But, they wanted me to teach more than just drama, and I didn't want to."  
 After finishing a graduate program in puppetry, Kenton got the opportunity to work with the internationally known Bob Brown Marionettes, where she learned some of the techniques she now uses in her own shows. She has performed at some of the nation's most recognizable venues, including the White House, the Kennedy Center and the Detroit Museum of Art. She currently tours throughout the world and performs more than 300 shows a

year.  
 Despite bouts with laryngitis, Kenton said doesn't have any

plans of slowing down.  
 "I love to perform," she said. "I've got the best seat in the house. I get to see everyone's faces and their reactions. It's spectacular."  
 As for advice to a budding puppeteer, Kenton said with hard work, some natural talent and a little business sense, most people can do it.  
 "What happens, as people get older, they lose interest," she said. "Puppetry lets you get your inner child out, which is hard for some adults."  
 "But, it's kept me young at heart," she said. "Sometimes, I am goofier than the kids."

# Military's SOS recipe still a favorite for creamed beef lovers

**DEAR ANNE AND NAN:** I have been looking for a recipe for creamed beef. The soldiers in the army call it SOS. It is a breakfast dish served over toast with two eggs. I remember it has a lot of black pepper and ground beef, but I don't know the rest of the ingredients. Maybe some old mess-sergeant is one of your readers and can give the recipe if you don't know it.

**DEAR RAMON:** We adore

creamed chipped beef, also known as SOS. We consider it the ultimate in comfort food. We've never made it with ground beef, but we have made it with chipped beef, which comes in a little glass jar that can be used as a juice glass. Here's a recipe from "The Joy of Cooking" (The Bobbs-Merrill Co., 1962).

**Creamed Chipped Beef**  
Do not over-salt — the beef is very salty.  
Pull apart 8 ounces chipped

beef. Melt 3 tablespoons butter.

Saute 3 tablespoons minced onion and 3 tablespoons minced green pepper until lightly browned. Sprinkle these with 3 tablespoons flour.

Slowly add 2 cups milk, stirring constantly.

Add the beef. Simmer these ingredients until they thicken. Remove from the heat and season with 1 tablespoon chopped parsley or chives, 1/4 teaspoon paprika and 2 table-

spoons dry sherry. Serve the beef on hot buttered toast or a baked potato.

**DEAR ANNE AND NAN:** Please print the mixture of Fels Naptha soap for black spots on roses.
