

### Congresswoman Sets Old South Pattern

 ATLANTA—The part of the lavender-and-old-lace South that gave birth to "Gone With the Wind" has sent to Congress a woman politician who came up the hard way—at no sacrifice either of feminine charm or domestic life.

She is tall, distinguished-looking Helen Douglas Mankin, a tough campaigner. If there ever was one who represents the South's most populous congressional district, Atlanta and its environs.

For 20 years a lawyer, she be-

lieves there is a need in politics for more progressive women and that a woman, politically and professionally, should rise by "ability and hard work." She has practiced what she preached.

She says she has but two interests, her home and her office, which is in the same suite as that of her mechanical engineer husband in a downtown office building. "Office," of course, includes politics.

"Most people can't believe it," she says, "but I'm a good cook and a good housekeeper. I also can and preserve a lot of food in the summer months."

Mrs. Mankin first entered politics over a decade ago because, she said, "I thought I could

serve." The people of Fulton (Atlanta) County elected her to the state legislature. It became almost a habit. They reelected her four more successive terms.

Speaks Up  
 In a legislative hall the new congresswoman is accustomed to making herself heard. She has sponsored much legislation in Georgia benefiting women and children.

She has been, in general, a staunch supporter of young Gov. Ellis Arnall and his administration, which brought sweeping reforms in Georgia's state government. She's been in the thick of many a legislative battle.

Fulton County is by far the largest of the three counties in

the Fifth Georgia congressional district, for so many years the lawliwick of Rep. Robert Ramspeck, the Georgian who brought federal employes under civil service.

When Ramspeck candidly announced that a congressman's \$10,000 a year stipend wasn't enough and he was taking a more profitable job in the aviation industry, Mrs. Mankin set her heart on the vacant job.

So did 19 other constituents, who didn't consider \$10,000 a year an amount to be sneezed at. It soon became apparent, however, the race was between Mrs. Mankin and Tom Camp, who was Ramspeck's secretary the many years he was in Washington.

Mrs. Mankin won in a photo-finish.

No Promises  
 It was one of the hardest and most strenuous political campaigns Georgia had seen in a long time. After the two months grind, Mrs. Mankin told reporters, "I don't think there was ever a candidate elected to Congress before who didn't make a single pledge to anybody."

She said she financed four-fifths of her campaign herself and that the other fifth came in dribble contributions from individuals.

Washington social life? Mrs. Mankin isn't interested. "My husband is also my best pal," she says, "and we are perfectly satisfied when we are together."

She Gets Around  
 A native of Atlanta, the 49-year-old congresswoman was educated at Rockford College, Illinois. In the first World War she drove a Red Cross ambulance in France.

Later, with a sister, she went on a transcontinental automobile junket—roads then weren't what they are now—and wrote a magazine article about it. Thirteen Thousand Miles is the title.

Her husband's work has often taken him out of the United States. The Mankins—who have a son, Guy, Jr., now on a maritime service tanker—have lived in Cuba, Brazil, and Argentina.

Engineering Mankin travels a lot because of his work. It will be as convenient for him to spend his weekends in Washington as Atlanta.

Georgia furnished one of the first women in the national Congress—Mrs. Rebecca Latimer Felton—soon after women were enfranchised. But she served only a day, and it was a gesture.

Later, another woman was elected to fill the unexpired term caused by her husband's death. But Mrs. Mankin is the first woman Georgia has sent to Congress on her own merits, with no quarter asked nor given.

## Truman Pledges Full Resources To Feed Millions

President Applauds UNRRA Work At 4th Annual Convention In Atlantic City

ATLANTIC CITY, Mar. 15 (AP)—President Truman pledged today that the full resources of the United States would be used to feed starving millions of areas freed from war—but not from dire hunger. Mr. Truman sent a message to the fourth annual convention of the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Agency, meeting in Atlantic City.

The chief executive hailed the work of UNRRA as evidence that cooperation for peaceful ends is possible among nations. Delegates from 47 Allied nations are meeting to discuss the urgent task of feeding an estimated 500,000 persons facing starvation overseas. Said Mr. Truman:

"In this country, our efforts are now fully directed in an emergency program intended to release as large as possible a proportion of our food supplies for export to the starving peoples of the world."

The president declared he was taking every possible means to make certain the United States does not fall behind other supplying nations in providing hungry peoples with sufficient food to tide the starving abroad.

Speaking of the work of UNRRA, Mr. Truman declared in conclusion:

"I trust that the high achievements of UNRRA will encourage the united nations to regard UNRRA and the other international organizations as an integral part of the machinery of the peace which we are striving to ensure for the world."
