#### CUTTING LIFE INSURANCE COSTS

Most life-insurance companies have had a hidden rate increase recently. Although annual lump sum premiums have remained stable, the charge for other modes of paying your premiums has been increased. If you pay for your life insurance in more than one payment per year, the insurance company adds carrying charges that are the equivalent of 6 per cent to 18 per cent increase in premium.

Paying premiums on an installment basis means the insurance company has to wait longer to get your money to invest, and it means increased record-keeping, clerical overhead, and postage expense. It seems reasonable that these additional costs be passed on the the consumer, but watch out! My experience is that many companies that sell a large percentage of their business on a monthly basis increase the premium a disproportionate

In other words, the company makes more money on monthly premiums than it does on annual premiums because of the added charges. The effect of lending money to policyholders at 18 per cent (the extra charge for montly premiums) is better return for the life insurance company than it could otherwise get. What is income for the insurance company is not deductible interest for the policyholder. The extra premium is merely 18 per cent more premium and not interest.

The way to beat this system and cut your life insurance premiums without changing your policies is to pay annual premiums only. Paying annual premiums saves you up to 18 per cent of your life insurance expense

Either borrow from your saving account or your insurance policy the money for the annual premium. Repay savings or the insurance company on a monthly basis, and you have interest working for you rather than against you.

If you get the annual premium from a savings account, your monthly premiums to your savings will accumulate interest. If you get the annual premium from your insurance policy's cash value, then interest (not to exceed 6 per cent in Florida) is deductible for income tax purposes. Use either method and you are money ahead.

Q. We talked to a broker about selling our home, and he said he

wanted an exclusive. What is an exclusive? Should we do this? A. There are three commonly used listing agreements by which an owner and a broker may reach a meeting of the minds as to the terms and conditions of the broker's and owner's responsibilities. One is an open listing. The open listing is a listing that gives the broker authority to either procure a purchaser or effect a sale, but in which the owner reserves the right to deal directly with buyers and through other brokers. The broker here is competing with the owner and with other brokers.

Another listing is an exclusive agency. This agreement reserves to the owner the right to deal directly with buyers, but restricts the owner to dealing only with the broker with whom he has agreed to list the property. He may only sell himself, dealing directly with the buyer, or through his exclusive broker. The owner is in competition with the broker.

The third type of listing agreement, often referred to as an "exclusive listing," is the exclusive right to sell. The owner agrees that whether he sells the property or any other person sells the property, the agent will be paid his commission

There are proponents of the various types of agreements, but I personally favor the third., The broker knows he has a chance to promote the property with the assurance that he can help attract a buyer at the seller's door through his signs or ads, or he can entice another broker to bring in a buyer by dividing the commission with the other broker.

He would seem to me more likely to put his best efforts into the sale of the property working on this basis than he would be if he knew that some other person could sell the property in spite of all his efforts and he then would not be paid.

Will Commission Ax Tree-Chopper's Bid?

The classic confrontation between environmentalist and businessman is scheduled Tuesday when a Casselberry realtor asks the county commission's permission to cut down 80 per cent of the trees located in the heart of lush Spring Hammock.

"That's awful," Sierra Club spokesman Alex Dickison said of A.L. Seligman's request to chop out about 80 per cent of the greenery on 25 acres Seligman owns near J.C. Hutchison Parkway.

Dickison said he will attend the meeting to protest the tree-chopping request. "Hopefully, the commission will not allow that; I just don't think that's very legitimate at all.'

Seligman, of Cross Country Realty in Casselberry, doesn't see it that way.

"I own the property. I pay taxes on the property. How can they tell me what to door not do - with property I own?" Seligman

"Why shouldn't I be permitted to chop the trees out? What's America coming to?" Seligman added.

Last Tuesday Seligman asked commissioners to allow him to clear the land. He said he wanted to raise horses and plant vegetable gardens.

"He (Seligman) has no more interest in farming than a man in the moon," Dickison said. A physics professor at Seminole Community College (SCC), Dickison said the hammock is a natural filtering system for water and as such shouldn't be disburbed. Meanwhile, Seminole County Atty. Joe Mount said he is researching the issue to

Van Meter: 'I Finally Got The Light On ....' The people and his colleagues finally understood last

Monday night - "the light turned on" - that he wasn't trying to block a referendum, only trying to come up with a solution to a problem, says Casselberry City Council Chairman Natham Van Meter. "I finally got the light on and the people could see that I

wasn't trying to stop anything," Van Meter said of his part that week in voting for a special election June 3. "Several weeks ago I said that if we were going to have

this referendum it needed to be tied to something to give us a solution to a problem rather than compounding it," he

Going through a chronology of events which led to his voting for a resolution granting Mayor Gerald Christensen full time status and a \$17,800 annual salary, Van Meter first pointed to the defeat at the polls last December of a new charter which would have strengthened the powers of a city manager. The charter also would have made the mayor a voting

member of the city council and chairman of the board. The main issue involved with the charter, Van Meter said, was whether or not the people wanted a city manager. He interprets the defeat of the proposed new charter as a vote against city manager form of government and a vote for a full-time mayor.

"At the first work session of the new council in January, I brought up the need to get to work on a new charter so that we could get it before the people. I couldn't get enough agreement from council on what that charter referendum meant.

"So we made Mary Hawthorne acting city manager, but she didn't want the job. Someone had to be on the job fulltime, someone clearly in charge of a day-to-day basis.

"Gerry (Mayor Christensen) was operating full time anyway and his business had suffered accordingly," Van Meter said. "I felt we needed to take action to enumerate his powers so he could be responsible for council directives being followed and for things being done that should be done.

"The salary I had in mind was originally somewhere

### 800 Demonstrators Arrested At Nuclear Plant Sit-In

SEABROOK, N.H. (AP) - At least 800 demonstrators, most of them in their 20s, were being held in jails and armories in this seacoast area today after they were arrested for refusing to end a peaceful sit-in at a nuclear power plant. Most of those who were taken into custody in arrests that began Sunday and stretched into early today at the site of the \$2 billion Seabrook nuclear plant were booked for investigation of criminal trespass.

### **Jobs Bill Ready For Carter**

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter will get to sign the first piece of his economic legislation this week when Congress sends him a \$4-billion jobs bill for his approval. The Senate passed the compromise bill on Friday, and the House is expected to vote its approval on Tuesday. Carter then is nearly certain to sign the measure, which backers say could create from 150,000 to 400,000 jobs. The Senate scheduled discussion of an appropriations bill today. The measure will pay for the jobs package and other projects.

#### **Reform Plan To Be Unveiled**

WASHINGTON (AP) - One day after his original deadline for announcing a program to overhaul the nation's welfare system, President Carter is unveiling the outline of a still uncompleted reform plan. The President's usual Monday meeting with his Cabinet was expanded today to include congressional leaders who were invited to the State Dining Room for a special budget meeting with Thomas B. Lance, the director of the Office of Management and Budget.

### Food Prices Up Again: Survey

NEW YORK (AP) - Supermarket shoppers found familiar, but unpleasant news at the grocery store last month. An Associated Press marketbasket survey shows prices went up again during April, rising slightly more than they did during the previous month. The marketbasket bill increased during April at the checklist store in eight cities and decreased in five. The average rise was 3 per cent and the average drop was 1.1 per cent, for an overall increase of 1.4 per cent.

#### **Revamped Laws Considered**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Possession of small amounts of marijuana would not be a federal offense and innocent victims of violent crimes could be eligible for compensation up to \$50,000 under a proposed comprehensive restructuring of federal criminal laws. In addition, the far-reaching revision in federal law would provide for federal prosecution of Watergate-type dirty tricks and would make it less traumatic for women to testify in court against rapists.

We need decisions made by people in politics and if enough of the people believe their elected officials have goofed, they can get rid of them in the next election. If enough people are mad at me, they can get rid of me," Van Meter said. "Several weeks ago I said if we were going to have this

referendum we needed to tie it to something to give us a solution to the problem. By having a referendum simply repealing the resolution, we would be back where we were with no one clearly in charge.

"The city has suffered through this before. It's not healthy nor cost-effective. Someone ends up on a full-time basis without being paid for it. Mayors in the past like Bill Grier and Curtis Blow saw their duty and did it, but they were not paid," Van Meter said.

The council chairman said he cannot foresee anything happening to stop the June 3 referendum. He said if the people repeal the resolution and want a full-time mayor beginning in January the council will enact the necessary legislation to provide that the mayor's office be a full-time position and set a salary for the post at budget time.

"If they chose to continue with a part-time mayor and a city manager, then we would proceed to hire a city manager," he said.

## Funeral Industry Probe Set, Chairman Charges 'Bilking'

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - A special House panel today began its probe of the state's funeral industry, but the major action slated in the lower chamber this week is work on the appropriations bill.

The Senate, meanwhile, took the morning off, but had an afternoon session planned for action on a bill wiping out 70 pages of statutes regulating public schools.

The measure would grant vast home rule powers to school boards, but it has been opposed by senators who contend it takes a "meat-ax" approach and abolishes needed laws.

The House Select Subcommittee on Funeral Industries is investigating what Chairman Dick Batchelor, D-Orlando, says is evidence that the burial industry is bilking the public.

### Free Rent Bill Vote Due

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - The Board of Regents was expected to vote today on a proposal asking the legislature to allow the presidents of Florida and Florida State universities to live in their official on campus houses free of charge.

The regents' facilities committee approved a motion Sunday by Regent Jim Smith that legislators write the cost of housing for the two university presidents into this year's appropriations bill and charge the presidents nothing themselves for use of the homes. The other seven state schools do not have official residences for presidents on campus.

At present, FSU president Bernard Sliger and Florida president Robert Marston pay some rent and utilities charge.

### Panel To Study Gun Bill

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - A Senate committee this week will look at the only gun control measure given any hope of being passed this year - a bill calling for a 72-hour waiting period before a purchased weapon can be picked up.

The measure, sponsored by Sen. Sherman Winn, D-Miami, faces opposition by the National Rifle Association.

However, Winn must fight more than the opposition of the NRA. Commerce Committee Chairman William D. Childers, D-Pensacola, strongly opposes the bill and predicts with certainty that he has the votes to kill it when it comes up in committee Thursday.

#### Judge Innocent Of Murder

FORT MYERS (AP) - "My God. man, you can't imagine how nice it is to be back among the land of the living," says Circuit Judge James Adams, found innocent of a charge he conspired in a murder plot.

But Adams, cleared by a jury in just 29 minutes of deliberation on Friday, says, "I haven't decided yet if I will return to the bench. I don't know yet." Adam voluntarily removed himself from the post when he was indicted by a grand jury on the conspiracy charge in January. He had been appointed to the Lee County bench in 1972 by Gov. Reubin Askew.

"I'm ready to put Judge Adams back on the bench right now, but we'll probably have to await word from the (Judicial Qualifications) Commission," said Circuit Judge Thomas Shands, chief judge for the Southwest Florida Judicial Circuit.

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## **Carter Picks Right Targets**

Inflation is such a complex affair that the government can easily make it worse by trying to bring it under control. Former President Nixon's resort to price and wage controls in 1971 was followed by inflation of a much higher rate than that which had gone before.

So the most heartening aspect of President Carter's anti-inflation program is his disavowal of "coercive and self-defeating controls" and his statement that there is a limit to what the government can do.

Mr. Carter's decision to drop the \$50 "tax rebate" as an economic stimulus was made, he says because that kind of stimulus is no longer needed in the light of today's economic outlook. What went unsaid was that adding another \$11 billion to the federal deficit to pour the rebates into the economy could have aggravated inflation and derailed the economic growth now so evident.

The President's goal of cutting the inflation rate to 4 per cent by 1979 is realistic - with a host of "ifs" in the equation. Not the least of them is whether he will get the cooperation of Congress in reducing federal deficits toward his goal of a balanced budget in 1981. He also may have difficulty in ridding business and industry of rgulations which force prices up - or keep them from coming down through competition. He also faces the inflationary effect of his own energy program, and the uncertainty of price decisions by the international oil cartel.

Mr. Carter has much the same perception of the inflation problem as former President Ford, who wrestled with Congress over budget deficits, proposed extensive deregulation and set up a voluntary labor-management group to work on wage and price stability like the one Mr. Carter is now organizing. The difference is that the new President says he will not accept current unemployment rates as bitter medicine that has to be swallowed for the sake of defusing inflation.

The problem for the Carter administration is to square its commitment to expensive job-making programs and other social initiatives with its commitment to reduce federal deficits. This may wind up as an exercise in trying to have one's cake and eating it, too.

Inflation is now moving through our economic bloodstream at an annual rate of about 6 per cent. Reducing it by one-third may be as much a problem in psychology as in the exercise of government policy. Some kind of "jawboning" over wage and price increases appears to be a critical element in the administration's plans for restraint, which is all to the good. But this is a process of convincing labor, management and the financial community that the fear and anticipation of inflation is as pernicious as inflation itself.

President Carter's announcements helped clear the air in speculation about his approach to inflation. The problem, however, remains as complex as ever, and the most pertinent words spoken by the Fresident may have been these: "No one should look to government for easy answers because there are none."

## Bye Bye, Rebate

President Carter has been rebuffed by the U.S. Senate on his \$50 tax rebate plan. It was held hostage by certain senators who demanded that he give up his review of their favorite water projects as the price for their favorable vote on the rebate. The President refused to deal, and we're glad ... Dropping the \$11.5 billion for the rebate from the budget will reduce the

federal deficit. Dropping some unsound water projects may save an even larger sum of money and make it easier for Mr. Carter to balance the budget by 1981, as he has promised to do. The President says the economy doesn't need the stimulus of the \$50 rebate or the tax breaks for business that were part of the

stimulus package. Well, yes and no. Seven million are still out of work in a society strongly based on the work ethic. But it is true that economic signals have become more

favorable recently. We hope the economy recovers in a healthy manner without the rebate and without a return to disastrous inflation

Firestone's remarks were directed at the School Board Powers or "home rule" bill which has been given approval by the Senate Education Com-

Similar to measures which granted home rule powers to counties and cities, the bill would repeal sections of the Florida statutes defining courses of study and administration of school systems.

Seminole County Supt. of Schools William P. "Bud" Layer has said though the concept of home rule is "appealing," he doesn't want the legislature to create 67 unrelated school divisions. Florida Education Association-United lobbyists term the

proposal a grave threat to teachers. The bill calls for massive repealers of provisions in the state school code which teachers and other education supporters have steadfastly worked for years to enact. Teacher tenure, teacher leave, driver education, remedial reading and health education programs are part of the items included.

Supporters of the measure contend there are undesirable parts of the 73-page state school code that could be eliminated by repealing the entire code and choosing which ones to put back in. Tenure and other benefits, they say, should become items for negotiations at the local level.

Even so, as Sen. Guy Spicola (D-Tampa) said, legislation should not be written with "a meat axe." Each issue should be approached reasonably and

WASHINGTON- Confidential material from the files of federal law enforcement agencies indicates that the trade of illicit narcotics for contraband arms and munitions has become a thriving criminal activity throughout the Westerm Hemisphere.

There has been limited public disclosure about the arms-for-drugs trade between Mexico and the four states which border on that nation-California, Texas, Arizona and New Mexico-but we have the scope of the problem to be far wider than previously reported.

Typical of the burgeoning trade between Southwestern United States and Mexico is a government report of two Mexican smugglers carrying 400 automatic weapons from the Rio Hondo, Tex. area to Tampico, Mexico, where the arms were traded for heroin.

In another case, a major narcotics trafficker linked to a heroin laboratory operating in Mexico is reported by federal officials to be using Nogales, Ariz. as the border point for the smuggling of weapons into Mexico and drugs into the United States.

The United States-Mexico traffic was the subject of a one-day congressional hearing early this year. In addition, Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, recently warned that "decisive action is JOHN CUNNIFF needed" to stem the arms-for.drugs trade because it poses a serious threat to both nations. Not previously disclosed, however, is the involvement of other nations in virtually identical illicit deals. In one instance, a known smuggler of marijuana and cocaine was reported to be training Mexicans to fly by a plane loaded with weapons to Colombia, where they were to be exchanged for drugs.

## DON OAKLEY **Ms.-Takes** Plague **ERA Effort**

Back in the early years of the century, a suffragette was defined as "one who has ceased to be lady and has not yet become a gentleman." Women did eventually achieve "gentleman" status in 1920 by virtue of the 19th Amendment, which accorded them full voting equality with men. Today, it is the heirs of the suffragettes, the women's "libbers," who are having a hard time winning respectability.

When the proposed Equal Rights Amendment was passed by Congress on March 22, 1972, its ratification by the states seemed assured . Who in these modern times would be against something which stated simply that "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State of account of sex"?

Off to a fast and furious start, the ERA was approved by 35 states within the next five years, But there it became stuck - three states short of the 38 necessary to make it a part of the Constitution.

Sanford rancher Spencer Harden mounts a handsome three-year-old mare named GloQuina. "A good cutting horse can literally hypotize a cow," he says.

Twelve calves huddle at one end of a large circular pen. Harden, a national champion cutting horse rider, gallops toward the calves and one bolts from the herd, moving toward the center of the pen.

It is now the cutting horse's job to keep that calf from rejoining the others - without the assistance of Harden who holds the reins

loosley, not guiding the horse. The calf turns toward the herd, and GloQuina takes over. She is about 20 feet from the calf as the calf takes a few quick step forward

GloQuina crouches, her rear legs spread widely, lowers her head and stares intently at the calf. The calf backs off. Round one for GloQuina.

The calf cuts to the left. GloQuina gracefully dances laterally, heading off the calf, giving ground slightly. The calf backs up. Round two for GloQuina.

The mare turns sideways to the calf, feigning inattention. The calf breaks again for the herd. GloQuina turns abruptly, faces the calf and dances back and forth. It is obvious GloQuina is enjoying herself. It is equally obvious the calf isn't getting

who then lets the calf pass in safety. GloQuina continues this demonstration with two other calves, who are equally dazzled by the cutting horse's rapid-fire movements. Harden, who has trained GloQuina in the ancient art of the cutting horse, confirms the horse was having fun and reveals the secret

that has made him national champion cutting-horse trainer "You never try to force anything on a horse. You just try to slip it on a horse without the horse's knowing. You let the horse think it's coming up with the ideas. It becomes a habit with them. If you force things on a horse, you

can get hurt."

Harden has been Florida's top cutting horse rider the past several years. He has been among the leading riders in the National Juilling Horse Association (NCHA) since 19/5. And last year he won the NCHA Futurity in Fort Worth, Tex., on a mare named Jazzabel. The faturity, which featured 370 horses and \$125,000 in prize money last year, is the richest of the 2,000 contests sanctioned annually by the NCHA, which offers more than \$1.2 million in prize money. The cutting horse's skill is a vital part of Harden's cattle-ranching operation. He

## But Alice Doesn't Live Here Anymore

Alice Marabella took the telephone book to bed with her every night during her recent 10-day visit to Sanford. Back in the city for the first time in 40 years, she enjoyed hunting through the directory, looking for familiar names. There weren't too many left. So, she turned to the sights of the city. "Some places look the same, but many of them are guite different." was her reaction to the 1977 version of downtown Sanford. A graduate of Sanford High School, she lived here from 1924-1930, returning only once in 1937 to visit for several weeks. But last week, she was back again, delighting in her ramble down Memory Lane.

"I was in the first class to graduate from the new Sanford High School building (now Sanford Middle School on French Avenue) in 1927," recalls the former Alice Kesler, who has lived in Baltimore, Md., for the past 32 years.

She came to Florida as a young girl with her doctor father who bought a large piece of acreage during the Florida land boom. "I don't remember exactly how many acres there were in the original tract, but he split it up and sold a great deal of it," she

The house, which was built about 1870, still stands, although it has been both renovated and somewhat restored. Now owned by the DeWitt McGee Jr., family it stands on 11 acres of the land that Alice's father bought on Lake Onora.

"We raised watermelons once, and we raised peanuts one year. My dad used to bottle the water from the well in 20 gallon jugs and go sell it in downtown Sanford," she remembers.

Downtown Sanford, says Alice, has changed a good bit in the last 40 years. She once lived in an apartment in a building on First Street now owned by Manuel Jacobson, and is enthusiastic about the proposed restoration of Victorian-type architecture in the area. She has happy memories of Sanford, and others which are not

so pleasant. "One year there was a flood and the waters came almost all the way up to First Street. They were up past city hall," remembers Alice.

Some of the things that Alice loved as a teenager became her life-long interests. Music was a very special part of her life. She studied the plano for two years, and remembers fondly the many times she sat on the old pier and listened to band concerts. "Now I collect records. I've got five hundred of them. There are

some country, a lot of hymns -" she hesitates briefly, shrugs a little and adds, "but no rock and roll." Alice worked for the Social Security department for 26 and a half years, but retired five and a half years ago.

"I do a little travelling now," she says. "I keep thinking I will join some of the senior citizens groups, but I just haven't gotten around to it."

## **Cutting Horses Cut Capers**

(Continued from Page 1-C) do it is with cutting horses," says Harden. Harden first saw cutting horses at a

Kissimmee rodeo in 1959. "We were working some cattle, and needed some horses. I saw some cutting horses and figured it would save me some

time to have some of my own." He purchased a cutting horse and soon began training his own. Now he has more than 20, and many of them are in other parts of the country for breeding purposes.

"Cattle is our business," says Harden. "Cutting horses started out as a fun thing and grew from there."

It may be fun, but it also means money. Last year one of Harden's cutting horses won \$19,000 in prize money at competitions. And Harden sells some of the cutting horses he trains. He can sell a good one for \$10,000

and more. What makes a good cutting horse? Harden says you start with a quarter horse. "Ninetyfive per cent of cutting horses are quarter horses," he explains.

A good cutting horse must "be able to think for itself. It has to have strong hips and hind legs because hind legs are the fulcrum for the horse's movement. When they start bending down and looking at that calf a certain way,

you know you've got a good one." To win in competition, a cutting horse must

have what Harden cal's "an explosive style." The cutting horse has to give the calf the impression it has a chance to scoot past the horse and return to the herd. Then the horse cuts in front of the calf, dancing from side to side, forcing the calf to

back off. "That's what catches a judge's eye and wins the money," Harden says. Competing in cutting-horse championship can be a grueling experience. "The big shows are west of the Mississippi River," Harden explains. "It takes us a day to get out of Florida and another day to get to Texas."

The horses can only be transported by trailer, and the process is time-consuming. Harden would like to participate in more competitions, but the travel time involved makes it tough. Cutting horse riding runs in Harden's

family. Mark, Harden's 14-year-old son, was reserve champion youth rider in the NCHA in 1976, and Roy, Harden's other son, placed third in the nation in 1975.

When he's not raising cattle, training or competing on his cutting horses, Harden serves as a judge. He has judged such large contests as the Houston Livestock Show and the \$30,000 NCHA Maturity. Harden considers the work of a cutting horse and rider a "ballet on horseback." And he's developed some of the best ballerinas in

**Joel Field Remembers**

dedicated the bronze plaque in front of the stadium in the name of the Campbell-Lossing American Legion Post 53, It reads: "Dedicated to the Men and Women Of Seminole County

Who Served In All Wars." The plaque was mounted on a solid concrete wall donated by the city of Sanford. The ceremony was held outside for the convenience of those who wanted to attend the dedication of the plaque, and not the dedication of the stadium and opening game which took place inside

It cost 60 cents to get into the stadium. Dr. W. P. Brooks, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Sanford for 36 years, gave the dedication speech. Dr. Brooks and his wife now reside in the Baptist Retirement Village in Waycross, Ga.

"Money for the plaque," says Field, "was raised by WWI vets by collecting scrap iron for the WWII effort. Every dime was saved for the memorial plaque. We collected more scrap than any legion post in the United States, and we were recognized by Kate Smith on her national radio program."

Field went on to say, "Sanford was always a baseball town, that's why the stadium was built. It was the finest Class D baseball stadium in the country and was designed and built through the efforts of John Krider, executive secretary of the Sanford Area Chamber of Commerce for approximately 20 years, and others."

Simultaneously, Joel Field was Sanford's postmaster. He can remember when first class mail could go anywhere in the U.S. for only three cents. He acquired the postmaster position out of the 14 applications taken in 1944, and retired from the Post Office in

Before that, Field had a trucking business, beginning in 1924 in Sanford. He had 15 trucks and 10 four-wheel trailers which hauled celery.

The projects funded under the Older Americans Act keep us alive. Well, just about alive. There's money for housing and health. There's money for welfare, education, income. There's money for employment. In some areas there's money for sociability. Within these defined programmatic categories, directors and staff in offices of the agency do as good a job as they

Improving the quality of our lives is a different matter. There's no lagniappe in the categorical budgets. No money is specifically allotted to fund needed programs designed to make life more beautiful for the elderly. The directors of offices of the aging must therefore find the money for experimentation and for pilot programs that will enrich our lives.

This brings us back to the "money" book. The correct name of the book is, "A National Guide to Government and Foundation Funding Sources in the Field of Aging." The authors are Lilly Cohen, MA, of Adelphi University's Program on Aging, and Marie Oppedisano-Reich, PhD, of the Nassau County Department of Senior Citizen Affairs, both in New York.

The book covers data relative to federal and state grants as distributed under the Older Americans Act. Additionally, there are analyses of other federal programs whose purposes may be applicable to some funding for the aging. Then there is grant information about state programs, state agency activities, area agency planning and social services related to the aged.

There is also a breakdown by federal catalog number and program title of ongoing aging programs. The categories run from volunteerism through mental health; from education to supportive services; from behavioral research to veterans' programs to nursing homes - and more.

If there's a program for the aged working, this book will give readers a full financial story. The who, what, where, why of getting the money is covered. The "how much money" is listed. The "how to ask for the money" is explained. Eligibility requirements and where to apply are specified. The application procedure is defined. Any official senior citizen office anywhere in the United States can check its own programs and expenditures against the data in the "money" book.

What follows the breakdown of the federal and state availabilities in this funding guide is just as important. We get to Chapter IV. That's the listing by states of foundations interested in programs that support the aging. Their names are in this book for a reason. Between January, 1972, and August, 1976, the 126 foundations which are named made 500 grants of \$5,000, or more for projects benefiting the aged. Here again we get chapter and verse. This book tells readers how to apply for foundation money. The authors assume that the foundations listed awarded their grants to nonprofit institutions rather than to individuals. But it's

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## Seminole's Teen Pregnancies

## ... There Are More And More Of Them

By JANE CASSELBERRY Herald Staff Writer

Seminole County youngsters aren't officially !earning about sex in schools, but an alarming number of them are learning about it elsewhere - the hard way.

Venereal disease and teenage pregnancies are on the increase here, and those experiencing the problems are getting younger and younger, according to Marie Taylor, social worker for the Seminole County school system. During the 1975-76 school year there were 169 known

pregnancies among Seminole students with four of them in elementary schools. Mrs. Taylor says girls are maturing at a younger age than previously and one of the elementary students was only 11 while the other three were 12.

Although statistics for the current school year are not yet available, the number of pregnancies is expected to exceed last year's Mrs. Taylor says.

Teenagers are no longer required to drop out of school when pregnant, but are encouraged to attend as long as possible and return to classes as soon as possible after they have given birth (or had an abortion), Mrs. Taylor

By law, girls have the right to decide for themselves regardless of age, whether to carry their baby full term or have a legal abortion, she says. "We do not recommend abortion to them however Mrs.

Taylor adds. The youngsters often are quite knowledgeable about abortions and clinics where abortions are performed. If they opt to keep the child, parents or grandparents may raise the infant or give it out for adoption.

"If we feel the parents will be supportive and understanding, we may discuss the problem with them, otherwise they are not told," Mrs. Taylor says. A lot of girls go to the Florida Children's Home Society in Orlando when they want to put their child out for adoption. Girls may also be referred to the County Health Department in

Longwood or Sanford for pregnancy tests. Many girls are on birth control pills having found their way to the doctor themselves to obtain the contraceptive. Mrs. Taylor reports. If a girl has been promiscuous, she often does not even know who the father of her child is, Mrs. Taylor says.

Another problem brought on by the increased sexual activity has been the rise in the venereal disease rate. "When I was growing up it was considered almost an unforgiveable sin for a girl to get pregnant out of wedlock and she was branded for life, but it no longer carries this stigma and is becoming more accepted," Mrs. Taylor observes.

Added this school year to help the school social workers were three registered nurses who serve as health aides, who can keep closer check on health problems and offer followups. Two more have been requested.
