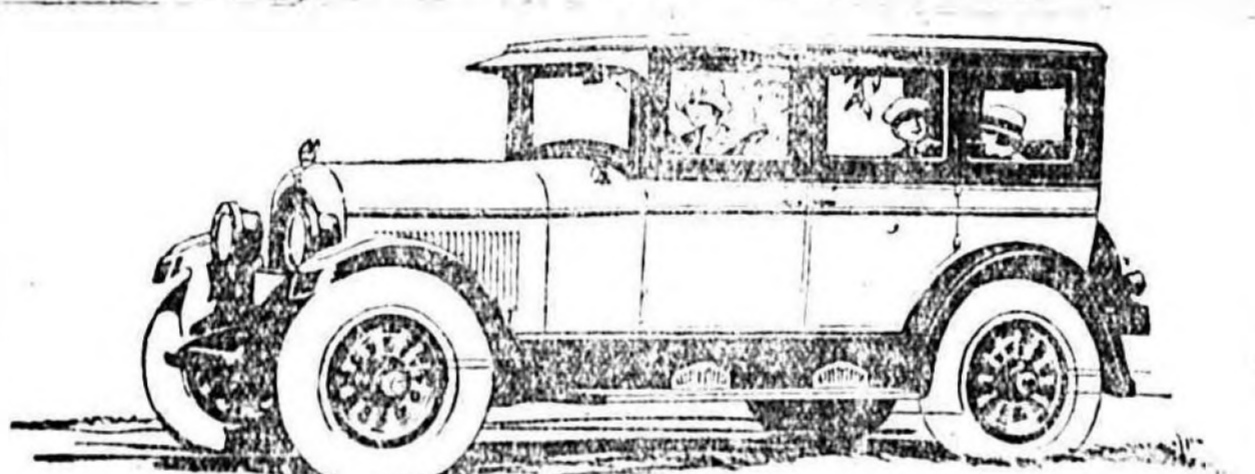

Warner, Mr. Boulder, and General Adelbert Ames. I thought Mr. Rockefeller's game remarkable. He wore, by the way, a gray cap and suit, with a sweater under the coat, and white cloth gloves. Mr. Rockefeller was the last to drive off at the first tee. He sent the ball straight down the fairway for 150 yards. His second shot hit the green, but the ball rolled on across. The Reputee Starts. "You can take the shot over if you wish," said the General. "I don't have to. It's already over," chuckled Mr. Rockefeller. The General missed a putt, and insisted the hole was in the wrong place. He laughed heartily, and thought it a good joke on the General. Mr. Rockefeller didn't play the full nine holes. After the third, he led his friends over to the sixth. I asked him why he didn't play right on through, as the fourth hole was straight and level. "Well, we always go this way," he replied. Mr. Rockefeller took off his coat, and handed it to one of the caddies. The caddies were all dumbly silent. They were awed by the presence of such a notable, I guess. Anyway, none of them said a word during the entire game.

SHORT SPEECH

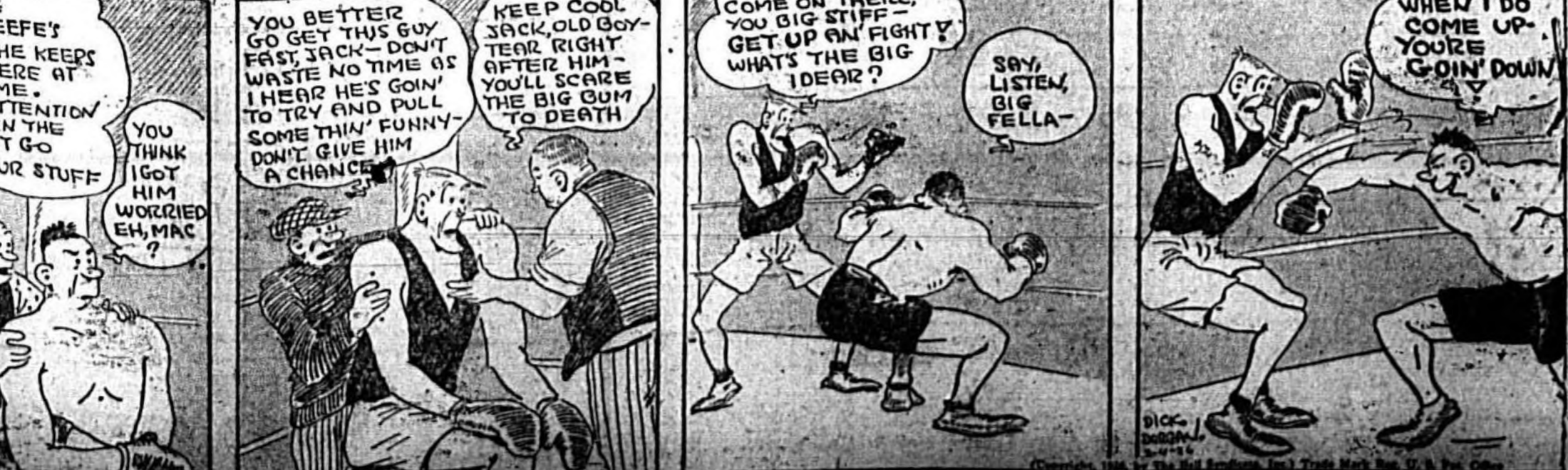

The score was 58 to 59 for five holes. "Bravo, bravo," said Mr. Rockefeller to Mrs. Warner. "We are doing splendidly." And he struck up a lively whistle. I asked Mr. Rockefeller then if I might take some pictures. He nodded his permission. He sank an excellent putt on the eighth green, and then walked out to meet the foursome which was following. He shook hands with Mrs. Johnston and two other young ladies in the party. Then his chauffeur came and whisked him home.

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Communication System Of Coast Guard Able To Disperse Rum Runners

NEW YORK, Mar. 2.—(AP)—The exchange of intelligence, once used extensively by liquor smugglers to make safe their violations of the law, is now used by the Coast Guard to disperse Rum Runners.

Because of the government's highly developed system of communication, it is now almost impossible for a rum ship to enter the 100,000 square mile area between Virginia and Maine without discovery.

If a "rummie" succeeds in getting by the three destroyers which patrol the outer edge of this one-of-a-kind area, it is likely to be picked up by the Coast Guard hydro airplane which operates from a base on an island near Gloucester, Mass.

Once it is discovered, a remarkable chain of modern communication is placed in operation. The destroyer or airplane immediately gets in touch with its base or other Coast Guard vessels through radio or the wireless telephone. The location and course of the rum ship is then broadcast in code. Daily thereafter its position is plotted on the secret charts of the Coast Guard until it is either caught violating the laws and taken in custody, or leaves the vicinity of the United States.

Watch Dogs

As the "rummie" gets closer to shore, it is met by a Coast Guard "watch dog." These "watch dogs" are 100-foot boats which act as a further shield to the smaller patrol boats. When the rum ship anchors outside the twelve mile limit, one of them immediately anchors alongside. Its patrol boats then start cruising around the rum ship to intercept any speed boat from ashore that attempts to make contact.

As a result of this system of "bottling up" the illicit liquor at its source, only two rum ships recently were on Rum Row as compared with about ninety last year.

Time was when the bootleggers' information organizations were of considerable scope and aided them materially in evading the Coast Guard vessels. One smuggler maintained a fleet of three airplanes near Buzzards' Bay which he used for locating the Coast Guard ships and delivering orders from his New York liquor syndicate to incoming rum ships.

These airplanes would "spot" the Coast Guard boats and then warn the rum ship. Later they would fly back and drop metal cylinders containing all sorts of information. The rum ship captain often knew as much about the Coast Guard ships as the service did itself.

Now the Coast Guard ships can use a telephone receiver and talk to other ships through the air. Through a system of storage batteries, even the smallest patrol boat can take advantage of this system of communication. And the code prevents their messages from being understood by the smugglers.

Recently the Cutter Seminole picked up a rum boat off the coast of Jersey coast. When the vessel refused to stop, the Seminole opened fire. At the same time it got into communication with the Seminole Hawk base and other patrol boats in the vicinity. The chase lasted for twenty miles and the rum boat would have escaped but for the circle of Coast Guard boats that was closing around it. Soon it ran into the range of a patrol boat from Station Island. When the patrol boat put a tracer bullet near its machine gun, the rum boat put up the white flag.

No Liquor

During the last year the Coast Guard boarded more than 37,000

vessels, on one every fifteen minutes. Many of them were pleasure boats, because much of the smuggling was done in pleasure boats. No innocent person was injured.

In addition to the anti-smuggling activities of the Coast Guard its system of communication applies to the hundreds of miles of coast line from Norfolk to Maine in the matter of rescuing and helping distressed ships. The area mentioned is perhaps the hardest worked "front" of any section in the Coast Guard's jurisdiction.

In the last five years the Coast Guard has saved \$201,000,000 worth of ships while fighting the rum business. It has made 10,000 rescues and saved 15,000 lives, official records disclose.

Net Income Of Bell Telephone Firm Is 107 Millions In 1925

NEW YORK, Mar. 2.—Net income of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company for 1925 rose to \$107,405,046 from \$91,645,321 the year before, the annual report today reveals.

More than 818,000 telephones were added to the Bell system during 1925 and at the close of the year 16,720,000 telephones were in use in this country.

The system handles 50,000,000 toll and exchange connections daily. Total earnings of the company were \$188,458,012 compared with \$151,082,836 in 1924. This includes telephone operating revenues of \$86,530,622, dividends exceeding \$75,000,000 on stocks owned and interest exceeding \$18,000,000 on notes and advances on bonds owned, temporary cash investments and bank deposits.

A balance of \$26,360,620 remained after dividends at the rate of \$9 a share, out of which \$6,000,000 was appropriated for contingencies and \$20,360,620 was carried to surplus.

Capital stock of the company outstanding at the close of the year was \$2,507,500, an increase of \$27,119,300 for the year. There were more than 362,000 stockholders.

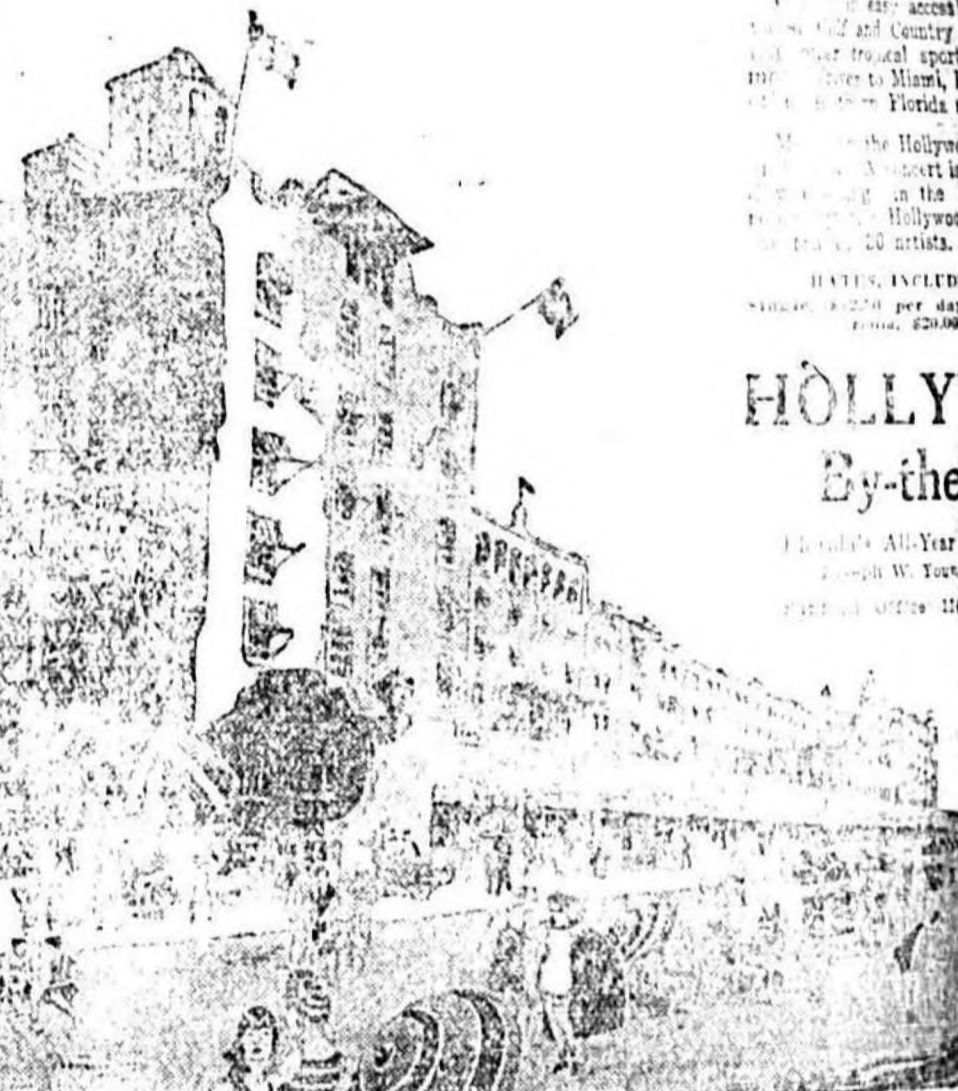

Then a storm of public indignation against the reckless monopoly of the road by selfish motorists arose. The prosecutor's office allowed him another trial and let the dead to go longer offense. He received a prison term in place of the death penalty.

The motorist isn't complete lord of the highways—not yet.

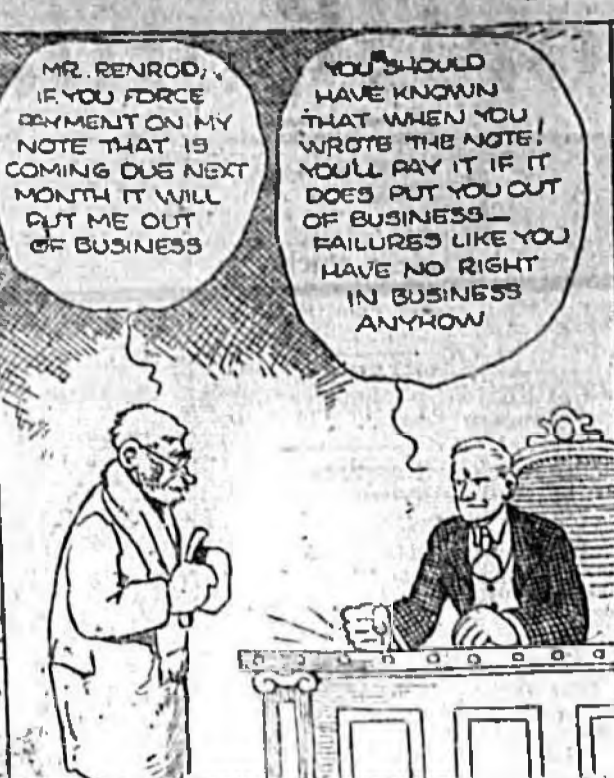

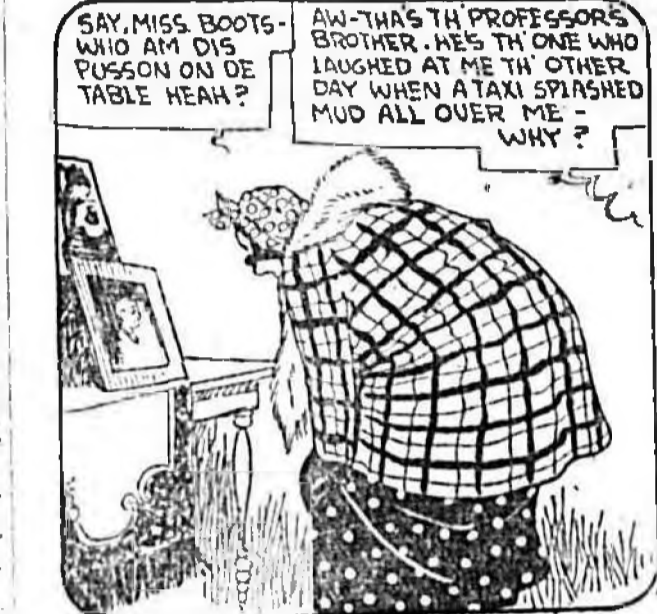
