Boost Seen In Non-Resident Construction

New Housing Policy Given By Truman; Republicans Plan New Labor Bills

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16. (AP)—The Administration is preparing to boost non-residential construction by perhaps 40 percent in one of several moves expected as a result of the new housing policy enunciated by President Truman. In addition, a floor-space limit of perhaps 1500 square feet is to be placed on new homes, and a private enterprise is to be given a much bigger say in solving the housing crisis.

These moves follow Mr. Truman's announcement of the abandonment of most of the previous housing regulations. His statement has drawn a rebuke from some of former Housing Expediter Wilson Wyatt and brouhaha from the building industry generally.

Meanwhile Republican leaders generally said that a management bill was expected to go easy in revamping present labor legislation has been passed by the House and is to be given a much bigger say in solving the housing crisis.

The statement objects to compulsory arbitration, but Republicans said that the bill would not be passed by the new Congress.

Power Company Begins Work On New Generator

Capacity of Present Plant Will Be Tripled By Addition

Construction crews of the Florida Power & Light Company have begun work around the Sanford Steam Electric Station preliminary to installing a new 24,000 horsepower generator to supplement its present 15,000 horsepower, thereby nearly tripling the plant's capacity, it was announced today by Manager H. H. Coleman.

The new unit is expected to be placed in operation sometime during the fall of 1947. Verne Clawson, who was construction superintendent of this new job and is assisted by R. L. Johnson.

The Sanford enlargement is an important part of the F. P. & L. Co.'s \$24,000,000 expansion program, recently announced by McGeorge Smith, president of the company. Mr. Coleman said a new generating station at Sarasota has already been placed in operation, and a second plant of 42,000 KW capacity has just been put in operation at Riviera near West Palm Beach. The Sanford project is the third major phase of this program, and another new plant is to be built on the lower east coast.

Originally constructed in 1926 the Sanford plant, as one of the "base load" stations which supply most of the power to the state, has been the keystone of the company's Northern Division. J. A. Young is plant superintendent and has served in this capacity since the plant was placed in operation over 20 years ago. Studies made over a year ago indicated the increasing use of electricity in this area. Mr. Coleman said, indicated that an additional capacity will be required to supply the demands of the Sanford plant. The plans for the expansion was planned accordingly.

Orders for the turbo-generator, condenser, boiler and auxiliary equipment were placed during the early part of the present year. Company officials expressed the hope that delays caused by material shortages and production difficulties will not prevent getting the new generator into operation on schedule.

The generator, which must be installed upon a base supported from the start of the plant, to minimize vibration, will generate 42,000 horsepower at 6000 RPM. It was disclosed that one new boiler

Speaking for himself, and not the party, Taft said he expects the next session to pass what he termed "a comprehensive anti-lynching bill." He said he declined to detail the legislation, but declared the bill certainly would include most of the points of the case bill.

"I would prefer to go along with it," Taft said.

Taft predicted a tie in the past, that the new Congress will enact a general 20 percent increase in income taxes, he declined to elaborate.

Secretary of State Byrnes also was back in the capital today and he had something to say about Vandenberg. Byrnes said he hoped that both Vandenberg and Senator Tom Connally would stick by him in future diplomatic negotiations.

Byrnes added he hoped they both would accompany him to Moscow for the next foreign ministers meeting. Byrnes was trimming with praise for the work done by the council and the United Nations Assembly. But he warned soberly that there still are difficulties ahead.

Government Troops Clash With Rebel Forces In Thrace

ATHENS, Dec. 17, (AP)—Press dispatches reaching Athens today told of more fighting between guerrilla bands and government forces.

Eight guerrillas were said to have been killed and ten wounded in a clash with government troops near a village in western Thrace. The government forces say they captured 31 weapons from the partisans.

In another battle two members of a force of insurgents have been killed and ten wounded.

A dispatch from Salonika said that troops of the British Sixth Airborne Division have appeared on the streets of Kavalla, a heavily garrisoned seaport on the Aegean used as a tobacco shipping point. The dispatch quotes British authorities as saying the troops are advance units intended to replace Scottish troops slated for demobilization.

Nearly 400,000 Japs Hold Day Long Procession In Communist Demonstration

TOKYO, Dec. 17, (AP)—Communist leaders and Left wing factions of the Social Democratic Party staged their largest mass demonstration in Japan today. The demonstration took the form of a day long procession by an estimated 350 to 400,000 shabby dress-wearing, women and boys.

The ostensible purpose of the procession was to force the resignation of Premier Yoshida. But observers say the demonstration obviously was intended more to impress General MacArthur.

MacArthur drove through the surging mass of paraders at the height of the demonstration, and the marcher readily made room for his well-known black sedan. Today's demonstration was the first since MacArthur warned after a May Day gathering against what he termed a "growing tendency toward mass violence."

The parade was carried out in orderly fashion, with only one minor exception. It appeared that the Communists and Left wingers were showing their strength, but taking the precaution of avoiding trouble. There were no fights or injuries.

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Baruch Urges Speedy Okay Of Atom Plan

Russia Asks Time To Study U.S. Plan Of Atomic Controls; Made Public Dec. 5

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Dec. 17, (AP)—The United Nations Atomic Energy Commission failed to act on the American control plan today despite expressions of approval from a majority of the commission's membership. The commission adjourned until Friday after Soviet Russia asked for more time to study the proposals.

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Dec. 17, (AP)—Bernard Baruch today formally asked the United Nations Atomic Commission to accept the United States plan for atomic control. He said that the question of harnessing the atom had been debated long enough.

That now was the time for the American plan, strict international controls and inspections, was rejected flatly by the Soviet Union's Andrei Gromyko, but during the recent general Assembly sessions, Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov agreed to world inspections and controls which could function outside the veto but within the framework of the Security Council.

However, Soviet Russia asked for more time to study the American plan of atomic control. Russian delegate Gromyko said he had not had time to study the United States plan which was made public on Dec. 5.

Earlier, the United States, Britain, Canada and Australia asked the United Nations Atomic Energy Commission to approve the so-called Baruch plan.

By ASSOCIATED PRESS

The United Nations held its historic first session in San Francisco. The delegations from big and small powers are generally agreed that this has been a momentous occasion. They have gone so far as to say that the unanimously approved armistitions resolution alone would give the session an important place in history.

It was clear from the final statements of Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov and British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin, as they said for home Saturday, that they were split over the results. The same point of opinion was reflected in the conversation of other delegates, but some, like Alexander Parodi of France, cautioned that the Assembly's action on arms limitation is only a first step and that many obstacles may be encountered.

There is something to be said for this point of view. It wouldn't do at all for the world to be lulled into a false sense of security. Disarmament is a question of mood rather than purpose but given the right atmosphere of confidence and friendship, the whole business can be settled in little or no time. However, if the big powers continue to insist on another problem of disarmament will remain on the agenda of world councils, it will be treated like the unwanted child who is sent from one set of relatives to the other.

Leaving the issue of the arms limitations aside for a moment, the United Nations Assembly has finally approved the City of New York as its permanent capital. Whatever the merits of other possible sites, the mere fact that the question has been settled makes for more stability. Whether it is the United Nations or a couple about to settle down, the decision for a permanent home is a most important beginning.

In other major achievements, the peace organization admitted Sweden, Iceland and Afghanistan to membership, increasing the number of United Nations from 51 to 54. It set up a ten-member trusteeship council to safeguard the interests of non-self-governing peoples in former League of Nations mandates; the purpose being that they eventually achieve their independence. The Assembly adopted a resolution calling on the Big Five powers to use their veto privileges sparingly in the Security Council. It also called for a world conference on freedom of information to be held some time in 1947.

Perhaps the most controversial resolution is the one on Spain. It recommends that all member states should refrain from supplying arms to the Nationalist forces.
