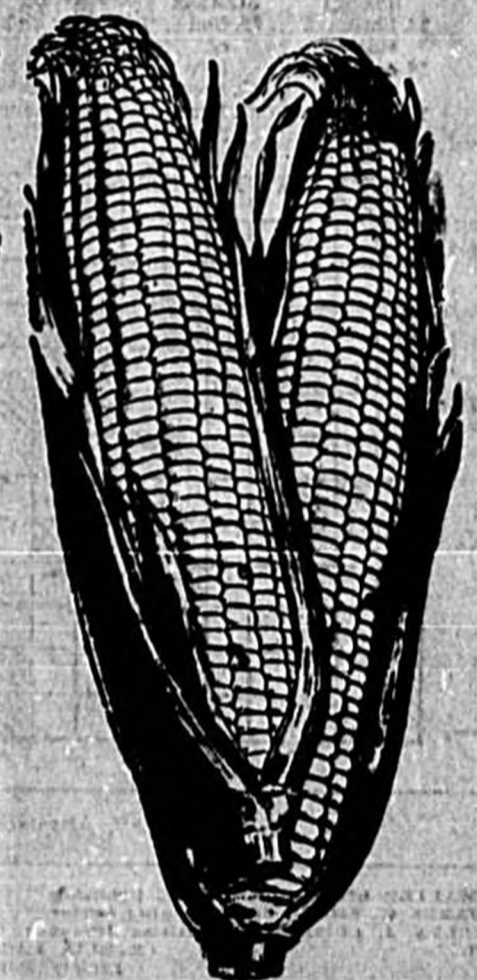

Public Has Chance To Speak On Taxes

County commissioners have asked the public to step into the continuing argument over reapportionment of county seats in an effort to speed up attempts to get a 1960 tax bill.

Chairman John Krider proposed an open forum in the main chamber with the public joining a panel of three persons selected by the Douglas-On commission figures and those selected by the Assessor Mary Bern Walker, based on her list of taxpayers.

The panel would have five Douglas-Strommen as members for discussion of a group of property appraisals selected by Mrs. Walker, Robert Douglas and the commission. They hope to explain how appraised figures are arrived at for the purpose of setting a tax level by the assessor. They will bring a public recommendation of whether to use Douglas figures as a basis for a roll or others.

"We're running out of time to get a tax roll," Krider said. "A decision must be made and the commissioners want to have a final basis on which equal and just taxation can be levied."

The commissioners indicated that they will abide by public opinion on the matter in order to get on with the job of setting a millage rate and getting some money in the till to operate county facilities and schools for another year.

Such an open forum might turn out to be a long, drawn-out affair, with supporters of Mrs. Walker's ideas and others opposing the commissioners' indicating in some unnecessary manner.

On the other hand, it could turn out to be a real chance for citizens to show an interest in equalization of taxation and to have their feelings counted in the final analysis of the problem.

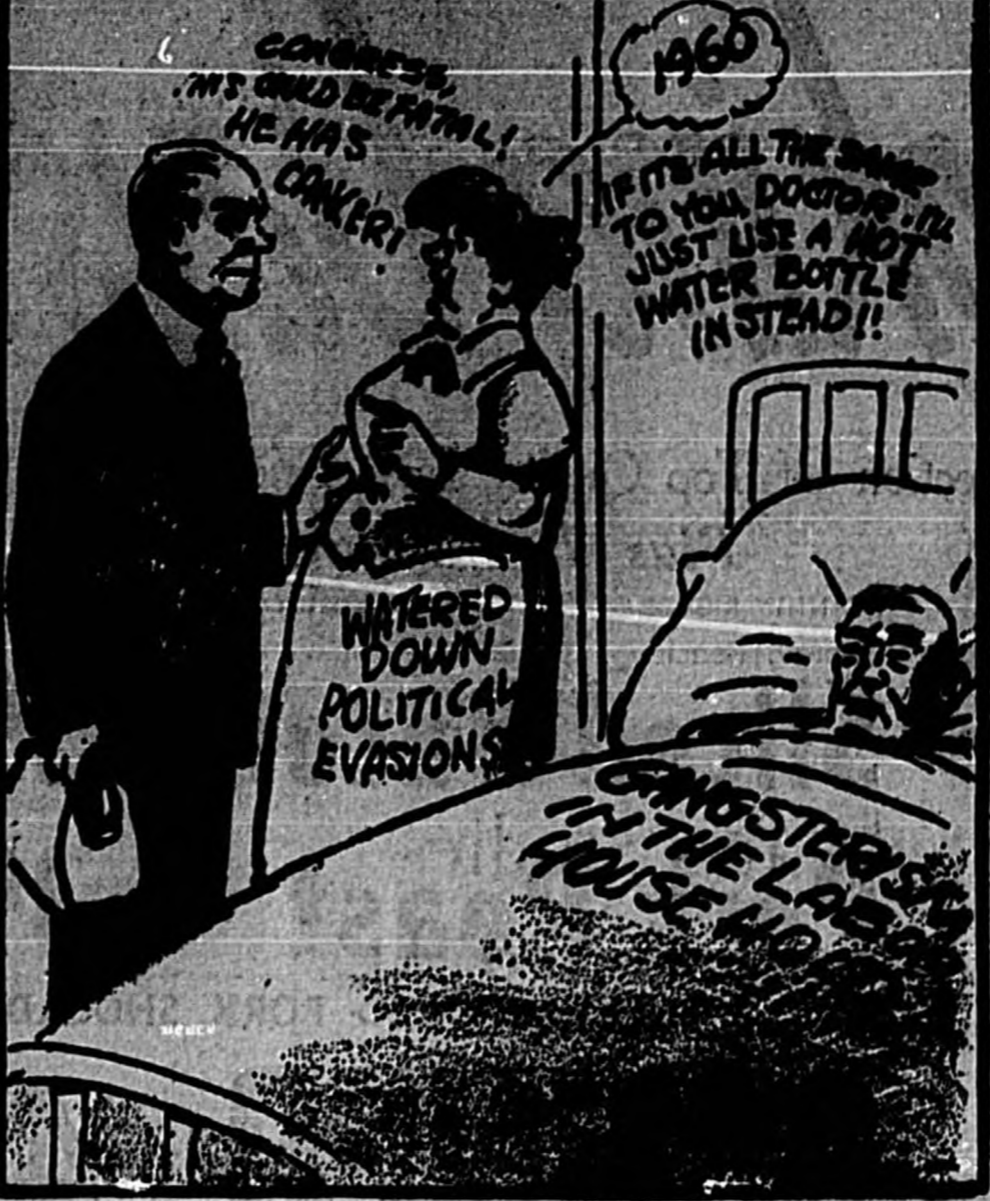

WASHINGTON — Now that dust has fallen on the jobs about the new Senate Office Building, I decided to go over to watch the fresh dirt fly in the hole that will remain for our lawmakers' new office housing gift to themselves.

This is the new, new House Office Building, a project three times as ambitious as the misnamed senatorial marble palace.

And this, naturally, three times as costly.

The tab will come to about \$200 million in taxpayer dollars before it's completed in about three years. The 3,200-room structure of classic architecture will among other things house 170 Congressmen and their staffs in three-room suites.

I'll hold fire on any jobs about the new, new House Building (not to be confused with the old House Building or the old, new House Building). Because, at \$200 million for extra space — which one Congressman said he needed like a hole in the head — those jobs might come a bit expensive.

There is another oddity about this upcoming building. It reaches farther underground than it will above ground—five stories below and 6½ stories above. The one-half story on top is a marble penthouse—but not for sunbathing like they have at the new senatorial top-deck. This one will be for mechanical equipment.

Instead of a sundeck, the lawmakers of the lower house will have a spacious gymnasium. They'll need the exercise because the new building is designed for easy livin'. For the first time in history, House members will be able to ride to work across the street.

U. S. Speeds Up Medical Work

CHICAGO (UPI)—The federal government has taken a "significant" lead in a speed-up of medical research, Arthur S. Flemming said Monday.

The secretary of health, education and welfare said about half of the \$275 million spent on medical research during fiscal 1959 was contributed by the federal government.

Flemming said the speedup approached a crash program, but warned that "you just can't go out and buy a breakthrough."

"The limiting factors in what we term a crash program are manpower and facilities," Flemming told newsmen before he dedicated his department's new regional headquarters here.

Flemming said there would be "sufficient funds available" to begin any approved projects in cancer research during 1960.

The National Cancer Institute will have about \$100 million at its disposal during 1960, he said, compared with \$75 to \$78 million available during 1959.

NEWARK, N. J. (UPI)—James M. O'Brien apparently thought he had insufficient credentials as an Irishman. He legally changed his middle name Monday from Mortimer to Patrick.

Chinese Reds Opposed Again

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The House has put itself on record for the 12th time as opposing the admission of Communist China to the United Nations.

The vote was a lopsided 368-2. The two dissenting votes were cast by Reps. William Meyer (D-Vt.) and Thomas L. Ashley (D-Ohio). Meyer, a member of the House Foreign Relations Committee, told the House the resolution was "unnecessary and undesirable."

However, House Democratic Leader John W. McCormack (Mass.) argued that the resolution was timely "particularly prior to the visit of Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev to the United States."

Sick Passenger Just Needed Sitting Room

ATLANTA (UPI)—An air line flight was en route from Chicago to Atlanta.

The stewardess came to the pilot's cabin and announced that a passenger was sick with strong symptoms of an appendicitis attack. The pilot sent an immediate radio request to Atlanta and a doctor met the flight at the airport.

After a 25-minute delay because of the emergency, the flight took off again for Miami and the physician filed his report.

The medical diagnosis: The woman's glands was too tight.

Washington Calling

WASHINGTON — The speculation over the new course President Eisenhower is pursuing and whether this signifies a "new line" or the resumption of the "old line" has stirred the capital as has nothing in a very long time.

That it is a new approach to the Presidency there can be no doubt. The President is moving his administration in a way that he had previously ruled out as contrary to his concept of the office.

Again and again in the past six and a half years he declined to comment on measures pending before Congress, insisting that it be improved. Yet he has now taken the initiative on his own. Yet in the days ever labor return he went to the country with a vigorous appeal for the tough Landon-Godkin bill, the product of a coalition of Republicans and Southern Democrats which was bitterly opposed by the unions. The President can take a little credit for the stunning victory for the bill in the House.

Last week for the first time he held a press conference outside Washington, talking to reporters at Gettysburg where he had set up a temporary office during a brief vacation at his Pennsylvania estate. The President has held a series of unprecedented back-ground sessions with Washington reporters, approaching his views on a wide range of subjects with rather more frankness than in his regular press conferences.

But most important of all he has initiated a series of personal diplomatic exchanges that have startled the world. As late as June 17 the President said at a press conference that it was false to believe "diplomatic procedure" would be revamped by personal meetings at the summit. To . . .

try to solve the problems of his day." This, at the speculation goes, was the nature of the prod.

What is far more interesting than the "why" of the change is the consequence. It may have set the President alone but for history and all mankind. Here you can find the sharply opposed views.

The first is widely and hopefully held. It is that, as the President himself said at Gettysburg, the talks will be held and if not a settlement then a truce in the cold war will bring the beginning of the end of the threat of nuclear annihilation.

The President is by nature an optimistic man. Premier Khrushchev could secretly want a personal meeting unless he had something to offer. A summit conference might occur before the President's return visit to the Soviet Union.

The opposite — and unpopular — view is held by such stern critics of the Administration's foreign-defense policies as former Secretary of State Dean Acheson. The talks can only give the enemy a friendly guarantee to not proceed to atomic war. In the outpouring of goodwill the measures necessary to strengthen

American's defenses will be forgotten.

The result of the Eisenhower-Khrushchev exchange may well be a summit conference in the spring. But it will mean merely another postponement. That, in the long view, is the real objective of the President's resumption — to cut him through in the end of his term. His lack in phenomenal and it may hold until January, 1961. But a new President will confront problems accentuated rather than solved by delay and this will include a greatly weakened Berlin.

The gloomy prescription of Acheson can hardly compete with what promises to be a sad and exciting chapter in the Eisenhower personal drama. The American public, long conditioned to personal dramas, has followed every phase of the here's saga with fascinated attention. If he saw fit more or less to withdraw for a time he is now doubly welcome as he strikes onto the stage in the role once again of the man of simple American goodwill.

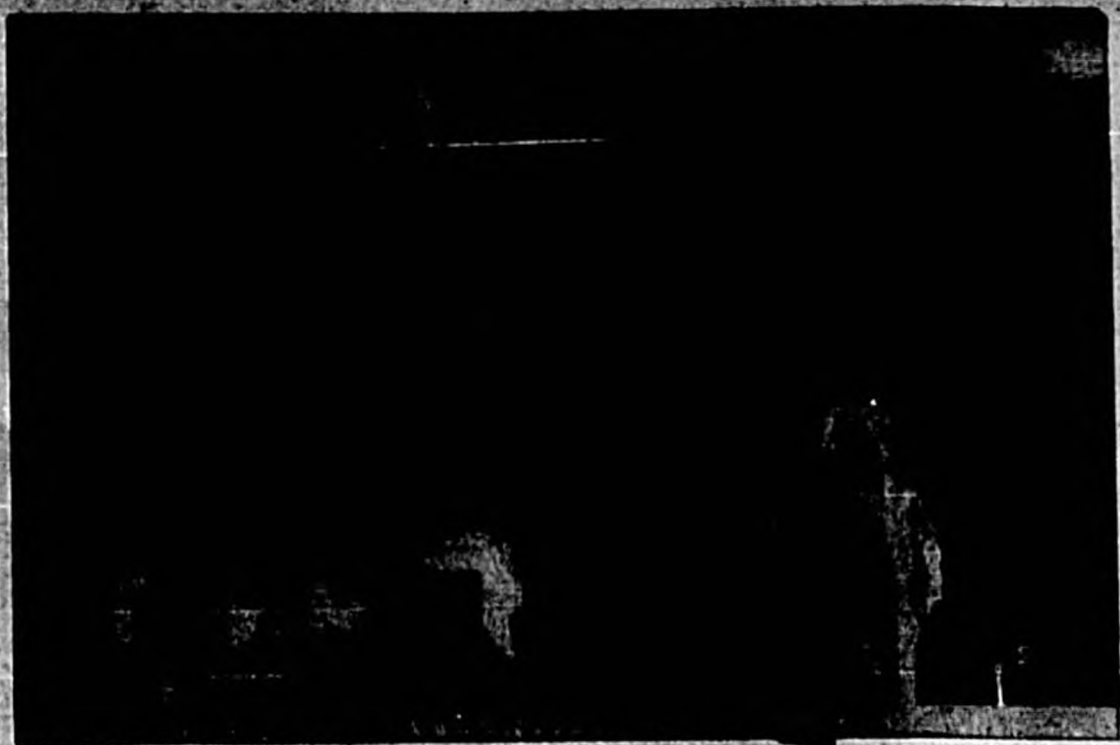

Two Killed As Fire Damages Aircraft Carrier Wasp

QUONSET POINT, R. I. (UPI) — The fire-scared aircraft carrier Wasp headed for port here today bearing two dead and a number of injured from a below-deck hangar blaze started by an exploding helicopter engine.

The stubborn fire, which flamed out of control twice, was touched off Tuesday in hangar bay No. 1 in the forward part of the ship while the Wasp was in the Atlantic 250 miles east of Norfolk, Va., on an anti-submarine exercise.

One man was killed in the fire and another died later of injuries. Their names were not made public pending notification of their relatives. Another 30 men were injured, mostly with burns.

The Navy did not announce immediately how many planes were destroyed or how extensively the Wasp was damaged.

Rear Adm. Robert J. Stroh, commander of Carrier Division 14, who makes the Wasp his flag ship, commended the ship's personnel for preventing the fire from turning into "a major catastrophe."

The blaze started about 4 p.m. in the hangar bay just below the flight deck when a helicopter engine, undergoing a routine test, ran wild and exploded.

Easy Living Is Killing Off Americans

BURLINGTON, Vt. (UPI) — Easy living is killing many Americans, according to Dr. Wilhelm Raab, a professor of experimental medicine at the University of Vermont. He urged the establishment of nationwide re-education health centers because, he said, "the lack of muscular exercise is contributing substantially to the enormous death rate from heart disease."

Raab, who spent three years studying the nervous mechanisms which chemically injure the heart metabolism in physically inactive persons, said "the ultimate answer lies in a nationwide program of expanded physical exercise."

"Working with nearly 200 healthy appearing men, Raab subjected them to an elaborate test designed to reveal the state of balance between the mutually opposed nervous systems, the sympathetic and the vagus, which govern the metabolism and function of the heart."

The vagus nerve, he well-qualified scientist, courts favorable influences on the metabolism of the heart by saving on oxygen. This results in high energetic efficiency.

Unless balanced by the sympathetic nervous system, the sympathetic system wastes oxygen and causes, ultimately, degenerative changes in the heart muscle.
