Lee was one of the really great men of his time and like Lincoln and Washington and Wilson and other great Americans he had none of the hate and rancor in his heart toward any who had differed with him. A Virginian by birth, Robert E. Lee carried through life those traditions handed down by the people of that great state and he followed the axioms of the cavaliers who settled Virginia and upheld those high ideals that governed the life of the early settlers of that state.

Great in war, General Lee was even greater in peace when broken in spirit and fortune he accepted the presidency of the Washington and Lee University there to preach the gospel of real citizenship and loyalty to the government of the United States and he adhered to this principle until his death ever ready to help his old comrades in distress and to minister to the needy and the afflicted.

Senator Benjamin Hill said of Lee: "When the future historian comes to survey the character of General Robert E. Lee, he will find it rising like a huge mountain above the undulating plain of humanity and he will have to lift his eyes toward heaven to catch its summit."

"He was a foe without hate, A friend without reproach, A Christian without hypocrisy, A man without guile. He was a Caesar without his ambition, A Frederick without his tyranny, A Napoleon without his selfishness, A Washington without his reward."

"He was as obedient to authority as a servant and royal in authority as a king."

"He was as gentle as a woman in his life, modest and pure as a virgin in thought, watchful as a Roman vestal in duty, and grand in battle as Achilles."

RAILROADS ARE PREPARING TO DO THEIR PART

Whenever the railroad systems of the country are prosperous, it may be taken for granted that prosperity is a general condition. Indications point to an enormous expenditure for extensions and improvements during this new year. It is estimated, according to a summary prepared by the Railway Age, that more than \$700,000,000 will be the outlay before next December 31st, for enlargements and additions to plant equipment. Every body who travels these days knows how hard put many of the roads are in keeping up the necessary facilities for handling both freight and passenger traffic. It was generally supposed that with the steady increase in the mileage of permanent highways freight business would show a slump but it seems that as more highways are built more business comes to the railroads. The answer to this is that the highways open up new country new country means new settlers and new settlers have to eat and clothe themselves.

Taken into largely a railroad context, those employed in railroad work to say nothing of the business men and women who are keenly watching the trend of trade, will be interested in anything and everything pertaining to the welfare of the great railroad industry. Therefore it is worth noting that twenty-seven railway systems with an aggregate mileage of approximately 95,000 miles will spend more than \$500,000,000 for improvements to roadway and structures and for new equipment during 1923.

If it may be assumed that an equal amount will be spent by the remaining two thirds of the mileage of the railways of the United States and Canada, the total expenditure will, as stated above, exceed \$700,000,000 this present year. The significance of this is indicated by the fact that in only one year, the year 1917, during the past ten, have the records of the Interstate Commerce Commission shown an increase in investment in road and equipment of this amount, while the average annual investment during this ten-year period has been less than \$500,000,000.

It is readily seen that the turning into manufacturing and trade channels of such a stupendous amount of money, must result in greatly increased trade and travel.—Lakeland Star Telegram.

Florida Pays Out \$1,250,000 In State Pensions

IN THE PAST IT HAS EXCEEDED THAT AMOUNT BUT OLD SOLDIERS ARE PASSING

(By The Associated Press) TALLAHASSEE, Jan. 19.—Florida pays out approximately \$1,250,000 annually to those Sons of the South who followed Lee in 1861-65, and their widows, according to figures made public in the state comptroller's office. In the past it has far exceeded this figure, for the ranks of the Blue and Gray are rapidly thinning out, but the decrease in the pension disbursement has not kept pace with the decrease in the men and women of the Confederacy. Nearly every session of the legislature relaxes in some way the qualification necessary to receive a pension and the large gap that shows up yearly in the ranks of the survivors is filled in some degree by those veterans or widows whom the legislature has brought within the benefits of the original pension law. As no written on the books Florida's provisions for the care of veterans and widows, are described by state officials as the most generous in the South. A flat sum of \$25 monthly is paid to every pensioner, regardless of the extent of his ability.

In 1922 there were 4,928 widows and veterans carried on the pension rolls. This compared with 4,157 the previous year. This shows a decrease of 129 and shows the full extent of the casualties among the survivors: ranks during the year, that is, that part of them which enjoyed assistance from the state.

The present comptroller, Ernest Amos, is credited with many innovations in the pension division of his department which have brought the system of payments from an intricate quarterly operation to a smooth

running monthly disbursement. The warrants are now so mailed from the comptroller's office that they reach the pensioner by the first of each month. All proofs required by law are provided for on the back of the warrant, and the recipient by appearing before a local officer, may cash his paper with a little trouble as a bank check. Before legislation made this possible it was necessary for the pensioner to make out his voucher upon its receipt about the first of the month and then return it to the comptroller's office. Thence his warrant would be mailed and finally made available to the pensioner on about the middle of the month.

Neither are the veterans and widows overlooked in the matter of Christmas money. By a special act of the 1921 legislature authority was provided for the issuing of December warrants in time to reach their destinations by December 20.

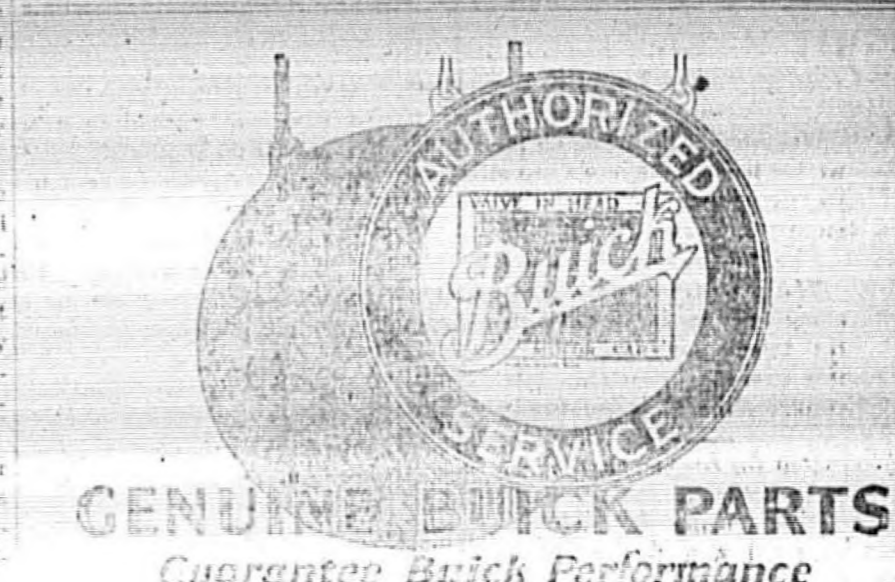

Jack Dabbert, Cincinnati Red infielder, has officially announced himself as ready to enter the coal business if he can't get \$14,000 a year, and George Mogridge, Washington pitcher, is looking for other business.

Dutch Reuther, accused by Squire Ebbets of being the prime mover in the baseball players' union, is holding out for \$12,000 and Zach Wheat and several others on the Brooklyn Robins are not content with what they have been drawing. Ebbets probably will have a whole of a time before he gets through.

John McGraw seldom has trouble with his players. The Giants are generous and the boys are all satisfied with their places. The Yanks are the most liberal spenders in baseball, but the Yankee owners are going to reduce salaries this year. Colonels Ruppert and Huston are not hard up but they are going to take a crack that way against several of the fancy players who looked like ten cents a dozen last season and during the world's series.
