# No Bargaining . . . Hutchison

County Commission Chairman J. C. Hutchison refused today to bargain with three representatives of the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission in a session at the general's office to discuss the fate of the erstwhile bird sanctuary east of the city.

The men from the Commission, J. W. Bickerstaff, Don Southwell and Jim Reed, met in the office of the county chairman and presented their pleas in behalf of the hunters of Central Florida and pointed out that the safety and well being of the residents of the

area was not their primary concern, but the conservation of the wild life was, and they could not see their way clear to closing the disputed area unless there was a question of conservation of wildlife.

The only concession Hutchison would make was the elimination of the Naval Air Station from the area, and the wildlife men agreed to that because of the lack of jurisdiction over the station by the state.

It was pointed out by Bickerstaff that there had been an about face on the issue

since the commission made its survey in May, and they closed the area in September when it was evident that the people in the area wanted it closed. However, the sportsmen pointed out the lack of a matter of conservation, and the area was reopened.

Now the question is: The discussion became hung up on the matter of whether or not a property owner could hunt on his own land. And the suggestion was made, as a bargaining feeler, that the game commission close the area to all except those property owners that wanted to hunt on their own land.

The general said that as the spokesman for the County Commission he could make no such concessions, and that the commissioners wanted the area closed to all hunting.

Reed, of the game commission, said there was now a case in the courts to decide whether or not a landowner could hunt on his own land, and he doubted if the commission could prevent it.

It was suggested, as another bargaining point, that perhaps the County Commission could rule that there be no shooting of firearms in the area. This could be done, said Southwell, but the county would have to be responsible for the enforcement of the edict and do its own posting. Hutchison indicated he would bring that up before the commission.

The final word on the matter came from the commissioners when the statement was made that the final decision couldn't be made by the Game Commission until their meeting Nov. 6, but they would reach a decision at that meeting.

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## It's Castro Move Now On Release Of 1,113

MIAMI (UPI) — New York attorney James B. Donovan waited today for word from Fidel Castro on the next step in negotiations for release of 1,113 Cuban invasion prisoners.

Donovan said when he arrived here on a commercial flight from Havana Thursday that he hoped the Cuban regime would contact him within 48 hours. He said the next move is up to Castro.

The ruddy-faced Donovan, looking weary from eight days in Havana and two hours-long sessions with the Cuban pre-

mier, said he was hopeful Castro would accept the offer of the Cuban Families Committee of medicine, drugs, medical supplies and baby food as ransom for the captives of the abortive April 17, 1961, Bay of Pigs invasion.

The stocky New Yorker, who negotiated the trade last February of Russian spy Rudolf Abel for American U2 pilot Francis Gary Powers and is the Democratic nominee opposing Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N. Y., made it clear to newsmen here that he did not consider the prisoner talks

finished.

"The prisoner negotiations have not broken down. There are simply some points that have not been resolved," Donovan said.

He said the families committee, which he represents, had made "a definite concrete proposal to Dr. Castro. His government is considering it. It represents what we believe is the maximum we can offer."

Donovan declined to say flatly the prisoners would be released. "This would be very foolish on my part . . . it

might raise false hopes," he said.

But he added: "I am always optimistic about everything I engage in until I abandon it, and I am not ready to abandon this."

Donovan would not go into what he termed "new questions on specifics" holding up a final agreement. But he said the offer does not involve money, and that the U. S. government has no part in the negotiations.

"My work does not involve one dollar in cash," said Donovan.

## 'Mightiest' War Rocket Launched

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) — The U. S. Air Force today launched its mightiest war rocket, the Titan II, on a planned 5,000-mile test flight across the Atlantic Ocean.

The 103-foot rocket blasted from its launching pad at 11:25 a. m.

The Titan II, which will be able to hurl a giant nuclear warhead up to halfway around the world when it becomes operational, was seeking its fourth success in six tries.

The Federal Space Agency also was keenly interested in the results of the test. The Titan II has been tabbed as

the booster for the agency's two-man Gemini space capsules, scheduled to be launched into orbit around earth starting late next year.

The giant rocket, shaped somewhat like a sausage with fire at one end, thundered smoothly into the sky as its 430,000-pound-thrust first-stage engine—the most powerful ever built into a U. S. war rocket—roared into action.

Because of the chemical propellants it uses, the Titan II was difficult to see from a distance. In place of the characteristic fiery exhaust of most

rockets, it poured out an eerie stream of almost invisible heat.

The rocket climbed steeply into a clear blue sky. Its second stage ignited on schedule and sent a nose cone full of test instruments soaring on a huge arc into space.

## New 'Oust' Move In North Orlando

A new move is underway by a group of North Orlando citizens to effect the ouster of City Treasurer and Councilman Woodrow Anderson and Councilman Robert Stephenson, it was reliably reported.

According to Mayor Frank Faulstich the possible reason for the new try ousting the councilmen is the financial crisis facing the city.

It was reported at the last council meeting a balance of \$19 in the town treasury and debts amounting to several thousand dollars facing the town.

The mayor said he has been expecting Anderson, who is also town treasurer, to call a meeting of the finance committee to discuss ways and means that could be used by the town to raise funds to meet the crisis.

Anderson had failed to call the meeting for an undisclosed reason. The mayor says, "I know that if we got our heads together and talked about the problem in a calm manner a solution could be reached. I have no doubt about it at all. But it is the responsibility, delegated at the last meeting, of Anderson to call the get-together and he hasn't done so."

The Mayor refused to speculate on the possible success of the petition now being circulated.

## Canal Funds Back To House For OK

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Funds for the much bunched-around cross-Florida barge canal, pushed hard by Sen. Spessard Holland, (D-Fla.) cleared the Senate Thursday and were sent back to the House.

Holland was scheduled to take the \$205,000 recommendation in the Senate catch-all money bill before a Senate-House conference today.

If the conference report gives the go-ahead on the money, chances are good that the House would vote yes since conferees are rarely overturned.

Rep. Robert Sikes, (D-Fla.) who worked with Holland on the plan, says he is confident the measure will pass the House.

If the measure is approved by the conference and the House, the Atlantic to Gulf trench, which Florida officials say will bring millions of dollars to the state and save millions for the nation, would almost be a reality.

If the conference report is bad, a House floor fight would then follow with Rep. Clarence Cannon, (D-Mo.) chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, leading the opposition.

### Plane Crashes; 28 Aboard

SEVILLE, Spain (UPI) — An Iberia Airlines plane crashed near here today with 28 persons aboard, an airline spokesman said.

The Spanish news agency Mencheta said the plane appeared to catch fire in the air near Carmona in the province of Seville, then plunged into the ground. The site of the crash was estimated to be about 20 miles from Seville.

### Court Suspends Fla. Lawmaker

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The Florida Supreme Court suspended former Legislator John M. Hathaway of Punta Gorda from the practice of law for two years today.

The Florida Bar, which recommended Hathaway be disbarred, said the attorney received funds belonging to the Charlotte Shell Corporation and failed to promptly account for the monies and converted them to his own use.

and harbors bill. Smith wants them out, Kerr wants them in.

ly that "I wouldn't bet on it."

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# VAH-7 Back Home Again

Heavy Attack Squadron Seven "Peacemakers of the Fleet" led by Cdr. Louis "B" Hoop Jr., Commanding Officer, landed at the Naval Air Station, Sanford, Thursday after successfully completing the first ASJ "Vigilante" deployment to the Mediterranean aboard the nuclear powered carrier USS Enterprise.

Prominent dignitaries, friends and relatives of the "Peacemakers" were saluted by the sleek "Vigilantes" as they thundered overhead in precision formation.

The "Peacemakers" departed NAS Sanford in August 1962.

Join Carrier Air Group Six aboard the USS Enterprise at Norfolk. The Enterprise departed Norfolk with other fleet units that same month to rendezvous with British and French Naval Forces near the southeastern European coast.

Here, the Navy's first ASJ squadron successfully participated in the NATO exercise Riptide III during which U. S. Naval Forces, as well as NATO Allies, saw the ASJ-1 "Vigilantes" weapons system in action for the first time launching long range simulated atomic strikes.

The Enterprise then passed

through the Straits of Gibraltar into the blue Mediterranean for additional air operations before anchoring off the French Riviera near the fabulous city of Cannes. Many of the "Peacemakers" took full advantage of the numerous sight seeing tours available throughout France. The beautiful weather and scenery afforded many "shutter bugs" the opportunity to capture on film such picturesque places as Paris, Monaco, the French Alps, and numerous quaint and historical French towns. While at Cannes, the Enterprise was visited by many people, including celebrities

Bing and Kathy Crosby, who were vacationing at the famous resort area.

At sea again during the first week of September the ASJ "Vigilantes" participated with notable success with the Sixth Fleet in the combined United States and French exercise "Lafayette" and the NATO exercise "Indian Summer." Mid-September found the famed Enterprise anchored in the bay of Naples within sight of the mighty Mt. Vesuvius. The "Peacemakers" were afforded the opportunity to see, many for the first time, the magnificent city of Rome and the nearby Vatican, low-

ering Mt. Vesuvius, the ancient ruins of Pompeii, and the fascinating Isle of Capri.

The ASJ "Vigilantes" and other Air Group Six aircraft were put on display for a visit by President Antonio Segni of Italy and the many friendly and curious visitors who ventured out to the ship on the Enterprise motor launches.

Within a week the formidable Enterprise was cruising by the active volcanic Isle of Stromboli, through the Straits of Messina, and across the Eastern Mediterranean to participate in the NATO exercise "Fall Trap" involving Turk-

ish and Greek Forces in the Aegean Sea.

In September Hatron Seven's Mediterranean Cruise was culminated at Soudha Bay Crete, when the USS Enterprise rendezvoused with the USS Franklin D. Roosevelt and Hatron Eleven "Checkertails" relieved Hatron Seven during appropriate "Turn-over" ceremonies.

During 16 operating days in September the squadron flew a new monthly high of 533 hours in 208 sorties. This flight time figure is claimed as a record for any carrier squadron introducing a new airplane to the fleet.

It is gratifying to note the reality with which the principals of the five youth and elementary schools joined in the contest, as it were, and have moved ahead to secure a concert for the youngsters of grades 4 through 6, by the Florida Symphony Orchestra.

This is no small undertaking. The question of financing is the big obstacle. The principals are reluctant to ask their parent associations for the money and have decided to try to raise the money by public appeal to civic groups, service clubs, individuals and merchant associations.

They are confident there are enough people involved in these activities, that care enough about the cultural education of our youngsters to participate in the effort.

If you are interested, we would suggest you let Principal Christie Harp, at South Seminole Elementary School, Casselberry, know of your interest.

We believe this could grow into a regular feature of each school year for the whole county school system, if this virgin effort is successful. We urge your serious consideration and your assistance if possible.

## Sluggish Senate Scene

From the standpoint of voter interest, one of the unlucky aspects of the 1962 election campaigns is the lack of steam in most of the U. S. Senate races across the country.

There are nearly 40 of those seats at stake this time. But aside from the celebrated Massachusetts fight between the President's brother, Edward M. (Ted) Kennedy, and George Cabot Lodge, citizens in most states would be hard pressed even to name both candidates in their Senate contests.

This does not mean that important, well known men are not involved or that none of the races is seen as close. Quite the contrary.

The Republican leader of the Senate, Everett Dirksen of Illinois, is under challenge from Rep. Sidney Yates in an affair that will draw President Kennedy's personal attention this month.

Former HEW secretary Abraham Ribicoff has plunged back into politics in Connecticut and is bucking Representative Seely-Brown.

Sen. Joseph Clark, Pennsylvania Democrat, contends against veteran GOP Rep. James Van Zandt. Clark in one term made himself a leader of his party's liberal wing.

In California, the Republicans' Senate Whip, Thomas Kuchel, has a stiff bid from state Sen. Richard Richards, who challenged him successfully once before.

Kentucky offers perhaps the only race that even remotely contends for the national limelight outside Massachusetts. There, the incumbent Sen. Thurston Morton, former GOP national chairman is trying to fight off Wilson Wyatt, Democratic lieutenant governor.

Old timer Sen. Alexander Wiley

of Wisconsin has an attractive opponent in Gov. Gaylord Nelson. But at last writing the veteran Wiley was said to be facing him down.

For the first time since Reconstruction days, Republicans contest seriously for a Senate seat in South Carolina, as William D. Workman takes on Sen. Olin D. Johnston, long a fixture on the Democratic scene.

Yet, with the principal exception noted, these races are not stirring the fires. In some states, particularly where major governorship races exist, the Senate competition is hardly ever mentioned. Does this suggest the American voter is in 1962 downgrading the office of U. S. senator, that he has lost interest in this obviously important post?

Hardly that. The general view of observers in many places is that it reflects a condition of relative quiet in voters' breasts at this moment.

Some, to be sure, are greatly aroused over Cuba, over spending and taxes, over failure to gain a medicare bill in congress this year, over farm issues and stubbornly clinging unemployment.

But, evidently, these are not adding up to a broadly aroused electorate, either within states or across the nation. With all the unsolved problems, the main mood seems to be one of at least muted satisfaction.

Couple this with the unfortunate fact that in all too many Senate matches one or both contenders are fairly colorless entries, and you probably have all you need to explain why these contestants find it so hard to break into print.

Their day surely will come again. But the 1962 campaigns offer little comfort for those among them who are nourished on the bright gleam of the national spotlight.

## Political Notebook

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — One section of the new tax reform bill as it emerged from Senate-House conference is being looked at critically in the belief that it may create more new problems for the government than it will solve old ones.

This is the part that deals with Treasury department's effort to close foreign tax havens. The villain here — the horrible example cited most frequently to win support for the administration bill — is the Hollywood movie star who hides abroad to avoid United States taxes.

The new bill may stop this practice, all right. But it may also put curbs on American companies now operating subsidiaries abroad, and discourage new ones.

If this is the outcome, the government may be sabotaging another of its major objectives — encouragement of private United States investment abroad to ease the foreign aid burden and contribute to development of new nations.

The old law — passed in 1918, amended in 1918 — provides that American companies with foreign income do not pay United States taxes on it until it is brought home. Under this practice, American companies operating abroad plow much of their foreign earnings into expanding overseas operations.

Under the new bill, foreign income of American individuals and corporations becomes taxable when earned. An exemption is granted to an American company that manufactures and sells in one foreign country. But if it manufactures in one country, sells in others, income is taxable in the United States.

One reason given for Treasury's promotion of the new tax policy is that all taxable income should be treated alike, wherever earned.

Another reason is the desire to keep capital at home — to create more jobs, and production for export, instead of allowing American companies to manufacture under cheaper labor abroad and sell at lower prices.

A third reason given is the Treasury's major concern with improving United States balance-of-payments position.

These are commendable principles, but if carrying them out curbs overseas investment or places American manufacturers at a disadvantage in competing for foreign markets, they may defeat

their own purposes. This example is cited:

The United States corporate tax rate is 52 per cent. In Belgium it is 40 per cent; in the Netherlands, 47 per cent. But income earned by a Belgian company in overseas operations is taxed at only 12 per cent, and a Dutch company's foreign income is tax-free.

Representatives of 64 American companies formed a Committee for Export Expansion Through Subsidiaries Abroad — CEETSA — to defend or modify these provisions of the tax bill after it passed the House. They registered as lobbyists. They paid no attention to the drive of other business groups for a general tax reduction. They concentrated on maintaining their competitive position overseas.

They didn't get to first base. In fact, they took a terrible beating.

The 64 companies included some of the best known names in United States foreign trade — Abbott Laboratories, Clark Equipment, Dow Chemical, Dresser Industries, International Milling, General Electric, Minnesota Mining, Gulf Oil and Jersey Standard.

Incidentally, American oil companies with overseas operations won't be hit by the new taxes on foreign-earned income. They include all income in a consolidated return filed under United States corporate income tax law.

Thus they get the 27.5 per cent depletion allowance tax reduction. If by some miracle the government should try to take that away, the oil companies would be in the same boat as the manufacturers. And they'd all be back to fight a new battle when another tax bill comes up next year.

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## Leone Cites Tips For Parents

In a follow-up to the recent bulletin from the State Health Department concerning the so-called "Rosary Bead," berries which grow here in Central Florida and south, Dr. Frank Leone, County Health Director had a few tips for parents today.

Dr. Leone says the plant grows along the ground and will climb poles and trees. It has small "very beautiful" light blue flowers, which form pods. Inside the pods are the attractive red and black berry which is deadly poison if chewed.

The bead has a tough outer layer and if put into the mouth and swallowed will pass into the intestinal track without being damaged by the digestive acids.

The danger, says the Doctor, lies in the fact that children will chew anything they put in their mouths. Once the hard outer layer of the bead is broken the poison is released and death can follow within 12 hours if action is not forthcoming.

The first symptom to watch for, says Dr. Leone, is nau-

sea and prolonged vomiting, then a deep feeling of apprehension on the part of the victim. Usually in this period the child will reveal what he ate. But while the vomiting is in progress, Dr. Leone stresses calling a doctor.

If none is available take the child at once to the Poison Center at the Orange County Health Department, 312 West Central, Orlando.

**NEW YORK (UPI)** — Attorney James Donovan said today that the release of the Bay of Pigs invasion prisoners by Cuban Premier Fidel Castro would be a "first step toward something that would prevent a general holocaust."

The Brooklyn attorney, back in New York to do some campaigning in behalf of his candidacy for the U. S. Senate on the Democratic ticket, made his remarks in a television interview (Newsweek-CBS).

Donovan, who still is waiting to hear from Castro on the latter's ransom demands said he believed relations between Cuba and the United States would improve markedly once the 1,113 prisoners are freed. He blamed the present im-

passé between the two countries partly on "many mistakes" by the United States during previous administrations but did not elaborate. "The United States simply has not behaved very intelligently," Donovan said.

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet Union will test a new series of "multi-stage carrier rockets" in two regions of the central Pacific beginning Tuesday and extending through Nov. 30, the official Tass news agency said today.

Tass said the rockets will be types designed for "cosmic objectives." The test series would be the second the Soviets have carried out in the Pacific with long-range rockets.

In a test series last year, the Russians fired a number of long-range rockets from Russia into a target area in the Pacific southwest of Hawaii.
