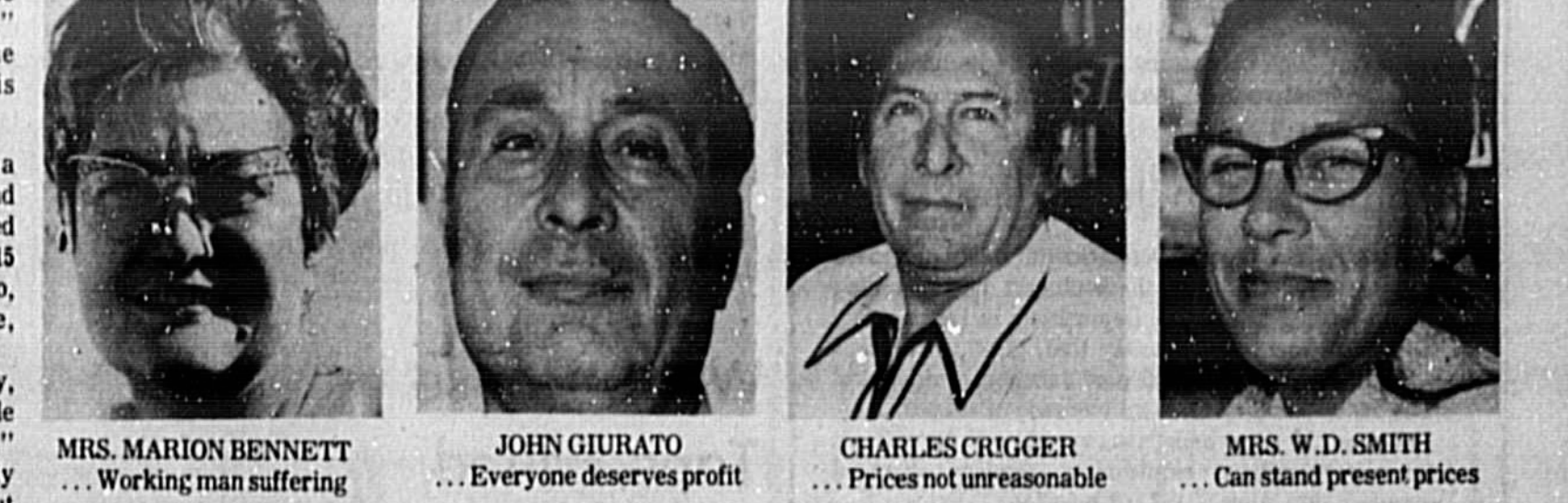

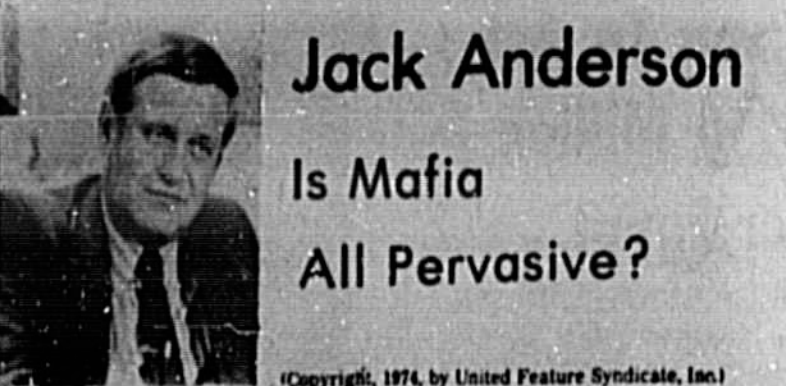

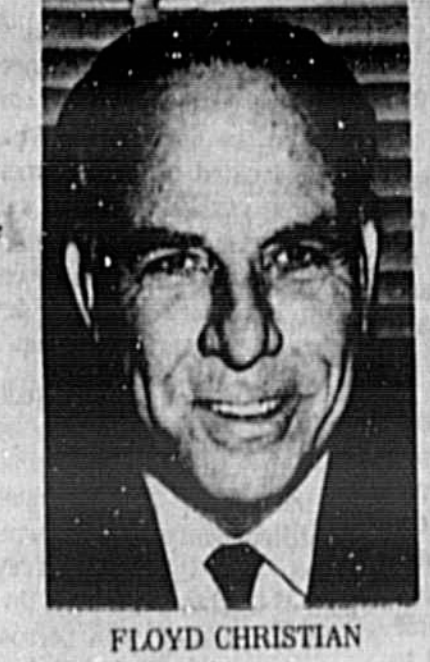

Christian Quits, Avoids Impeachment



TALLHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Florida Education Commissioner Floyd Christian, under court indictment and facing impeachment, resigned today. "It will be impossible to obtain a fair trial if the case is heard by the legislature and at the same time by the court," Christian said in a statement read to a House committee by his attorney Joseph Jacobs. Jacobs had handed the resignation to Gov. Reubin Askew a few minutes before informing the committee, which had assembled for its opening hearing on Christian's possible impeachment.

Christian was indicted last week by a Leon County grand jury on 19 counts of bribery, perjury and conspiracy. He was accused of accepting \$5,000 in bribes in connection with state Education Department contracts for a reading program and a migrant labor education program. Askew said he believed Christian "took the wisest course" in resigning. "It is with a deep sense of sadness that I accept his resignation, but it is also with a deep sense of gratitude for his service to the school children of Florida," Askew said in a statement.

Askew has not made a decision on a success but "Halph Turlington is under very serious consideration," said Askew's press secretary, Don Pride. Rep. Turlington, D-Gainesville, is a candidate for the Democratic nomination for education commissioner. Turlington said he discussed the possibility of his appointment with Askew several days ago. "The subject came up," he said. "There was nothing definitive... I think I am well qualified and suited to the office." Pride said Askew wanted to discuss with House leaders the effect removing Turlington from the House would have on legislation, including the closely fought financial disclosure bill on the House floor today. Turlington is chairman of the Finance and Taxation Committee, where Askew's major tax relief program is under consideration. Christian's statement said: "I am acting in what I know to be the best interests of the education system of Florida and because my attorney advised me that it will be impossible to obtain a fair trial if the case is heard by the legislature and at the same time by the court." Immediately after the statement, committee chairman James Redman, D-Plant City, dissolved the committee. "I want to commend the commissioner for his resignation," Redman said. "I believe he has done the proper thing for the people of Florida. I think the committee has been fair," he added. "We have done what we had to do under the Constitution of Florida." The impeachment committee was formed last Thursday, the day after the grand jury indicted Christian. At the organizational meeting Friday, the panel rejected Jacobs' plea that the hearings not be held because they would prejudice Christian's chances for a fair trial in court. Charts were assembled in the committee hearing room, apparently for a presentation of some of the evidence given to the grand jury. That evidence was presented by Mike Rose, legislative auditing committee staff director who investigated Christian.

Mom's Talk Results In Mistrial

A mother's impassioned plea for sympathy today ended in personal anguish for her and a mistrial for her son, an 18-year-old Seminole High School student charged with four counts of attempted murder in a Jan. 4 parking lot incident.

Mrs. David Floyd, whose son, Daniel Floyd, was about to start the third day of his trial, introduced herself to two women jurors in the lobby, commenting on the weather and telling them she knew "every blade of grass" outside on the courthouse lawn. The incident was reported by Floyd's defense attorney, Ned Julian, to Seminole Circuit Court Judge David Strawn, who immediately granted prosecutor Claude Van Hook's motion for a mistrial.

School Meeting Open; Closed Session Illegal?

The Seminole County School Board Wednesday voted—in the sunshine—to enter collective bargaining with teachers after canceling a closed-door session which its attorney said would violate the "Sunshine Law." The ruling means the board may have violated the law with a March 25 private session. Board Chairman Davis Sims called an executive session Wednesday to reassess the board's March 25 decision to wait for state guidelines on collective bargaining before negotiating with the Seminole Education Association (SEA). Board Atty. Douglas Stenstrom said Wednesday the scheduled Wednesday closed-door session would not comply with the law because the board could only meet privately with appointed negotiators. "The board had decided not to bargain until state guidelines were established; therefore, there are no negotiators," he explained.

Titusville Man Admits Killing Girl

A Titusville man today pleaded guilty to killing one of six young women whose decomposed bodies have been unearthed in Brevard County since November, then heard Circuit Court Judge Volie Williams say he could not morally sentence him to death. Bernard E. Giles, 21, with his wife Joanne and infant daughter in the crowded Seminole Court House courtroom near the family of the victim, Nancy Gerry, 18, also of Titusville, was declared a mentally disordered sex offender by Williams.

Airport Receives \$1.6 Million

Washington D.C.—U.S. Sen. Edward J. Gurney (R) and Rep. Bill Chappell (D) said today that major improvements to Sanford Airport are going to be made with \$1,688,914 in federal funds. A federal Aviation Administration airport development grant is on the way that will provide for lighting taxways and runways, installing visual approach slope indicators, putting in apron lighting, setting up security fencing and removing obstructions, including relocation of roadway.
