# Residents Petition To Bar Shopping Center

Residents around a 10-acre lot across from Sanford Middle School have mounted a petition drive to try to stop it from being turned into another shopping center.

The residents don't want to see the grassy lot. which serves as a play area for youngsters and adults alike, turned into a concrete haven for truants and traffic, according to the petition.

The land, across from Sanford Middle School. was sold by the Seminole County School Board to Don Huber of Ruber Construction in Orlando for \$600,000 in February. But the sale was made on the condition that the land be rezoned for

commercial use. The frontage of the property along French Avenue is zoned commercial but the remaining part is zoned single-family residen-

The Sanford Planning and Zoning Commission is scheduled to decide on the rezoning request at its Thursday meeting at 7 p.m. at city hall. The P & Z board will send its recommendation to the Sanford City Commission which will make a final decision on the matter later this month.

Huber wants to build a 110,000-square-foot center which would include a grocery store, a department store and smaller retail shops.

If the rezoning request is denied Huber will find another use for the property or return it to the school board and the deal will be off, according to Benny Arnold assistant superintendent for facilities and transportation.

Arnold said he would hate to see the school board lose \$600,000, most of which would go toward flxing up Sanford Middle School.

This is money the taxpayers don't have to put

up to support their schools. Arnold said. But Jalaine Lee, of 423 W. 18th St., who is heading the petition drive, said money for the school can be raised without sacrificing one of the

What about the money the taxpayers coughed up to pay for that field in the first place? I think we can find ways to raise money for the school without giving up an area that has historically been zoned a residential district." she said. "If the school needs money. I'll be the first to go out collecting with a cup

Ms. Lee said about 100 people have signed the petition and about 15 people are daily combing the streets around the lot collecting more

### Lakefront Plaza Plan Study Set

A proposal for a \$1 million plaza of shops and a restaurant near apartments under construction along the Sanford lakefront will get Planning and Zoning Commissioners' scrutiny Thursday

Called Pierpointe Plaza, the collection of shops would be adjacent to the Pterpointe apartments on the southwest corner of Seminole Boulevard and Myrtle Avenue, according to Steve Hoydesven, of Coldwell Banker, Orlando, the company handling the plaza leasing

The Commission is scheduled to meet at 7 p in in commission. chambers city hall

Pierpointe is being developed by Bland Development Corp. of Houston, Texas.

The restaurant would be a 5.000-square-foot full-service, sit-down establishment. Hovdesven said. The 19 shops would be housed in two one-story buildings next to the restaurant on Myrtle Avenue. One would be about 11,000 square feet and the other about 9,000, he said. Coldwell is trying to attract high profile retail stores into the plaza, but so far there have not been any takers, he said.

We're at the point where we'll take any good tenant," Hoydesven said, adding that some of the space may be leased to offices.



Herald Staff Writer Several proposals for attendance boundary changes for Sterling Park and Woodlands elementary schools are being mulled over by the Seminole County School Board. The changes are needed to relieve 'erisis' overcrowding, said schools spokesman Karen Coleman.

At its April 10 meeting, the board wants to act to reduce the number of students at Sterling Park in Casselberry and Woodlands in Longwood in an attempt to bring the total enrollment for both schools down below the state recommended capacity.

Sterling Park has a state recommended capacity of 801 students, but principal Mike Townsley said Tuesday he has 929 students enrolled Woodlands' state recommended capacity is 796, but close to 800 attend.

Under the proposed boundary changes. some students from Sterling Park would be shipped off to Casselberry, Lake Orienta and English Estates elementary schools. Some of Woodlands' pupils would switch to

Longwood and Altamonte Springs elementary schools if the boundary changes are approved.

The new boundaries would take effect this fall for the 1985-86 school year if adopted by the school board. Mrs. Coleman said the overcrowding

problem at Sterling Park and Woodlands is at a "crisis" level. She said the board's consideration of the

proposals will end a long process which has involved committees of parents, school officials and homeowners associations. Mrs. Coleman said the groups worked and were able to formulate several proposals for boundary changes.

Proposals for boundary changes at both schools were sent to school board members. by Director of Elementary Education Marion

Three plans were submitted for lowering the enrollment at Sterling Park. The one Ms. Giannini recommends calls for:

 Students living in Wyndam Woods subdivision, Lake Kathryn Mobile Homes,

Lake Kathryn Woods subdivision and its nearby area would attend Casselberry Elementary.

• Children residing in Forest Brook, Summit Village, The Hills, Branch Tree and Cedarwood subdivisions, as well as Plantation, Red Lion, Squire One and Sorrento. Sedgefield and San Jose apartments would attend English Estates Elementary.

As an addendum to the proposal, Ms. Giannini recommends children who attend English Estates Elementary and live east of Longwood Avenue to state Road 436 and west of U.S. Highway 17-92 should attend Lake Orienta. If approved, the proposal would give

Sterling Park a student body of 694, English Estates 650, Lake Orienta 740 and Casselberry Elementary 663. Five plans were studied to case

### Parents Shout 'Kill Him!' As School Gunman Surrenders

DETROIT (UPI) - An angry crowd gathered around the school where a gunman held three second-graders captive for four hours and called for immediate punishment of the suspect who suddenly freed his hostages and surrendered.

About 200 neighbors and parents Tuesday chanted, "Kill him! Kill him!" as the man was put in restraints and carried out of the Loving Elementary School on Detroit's north side

The Detroit Free Press identified the suspect as Alim Sanders, 19, of nearby Hamtramck, but a police spokesman refused to confirm the report. The man was being held on suspicion of felonious assault.

'We don't know why he did it," Police Commander Jerome Miller said after the suspect put down his small-caliber rifle and released his 8-year-old hostages.

School Superintendent Arthur Jefferson said the man walked into the school through an open door with a group of parents at about 11 a.m. and entered Room 174, where Evelyn Mitchell was teaching second grade.

The suspect selected three students as hostages, allowing the other children and Mitchell to leave, police said. The other 539 students in the building were evacuated.

### Con Makes Bloody Escape Try

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI) - Prison officials refused to reveal if they had details of how a heavily guarded convict planned to escape after he shot his way out of the county courthouse, killing one man and wounding another.

The shooting began Tuesday when a woman slipped a gun to Ronnie Lee Gardner, 24, in the basement of the courthouse when he arrived with Utah State Prison guards for a hearing on charges he killed a bartender.

It ended on the courthouse lawn when Gardner, still handcuffed, shackled at the waist and bleeding from a bullet wound in the shoulder, surrendered to encircling police officers by flipping his gun into the air.

Gov. Norm Bangerter promised an investigation into security measures for transporting state prison inmates and Utah prison officials insisted there were no security slip-ups that allowed Gardner to make the escape attempt.

### Kirkpatrick Switches To GOP

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Republican Party has captured a long-sought prize with the conversion of former U.N. Ambassador Jeane Kirkpatrick, a lifelong Democrat but a darling of conservatives.

Kirkpatrick will make her party switch official at a news conference today, followed by a gala reception where she will be honored by a Who's Who of the Reagan administration. Vice President George Bush reportedly will lead the celebration.

Republicans have enjoyed a number of significant Democratic converts in recent years including former Treasury Secretary John Connally and some House members, one of whom is now Sen. Phil Gramm of Texas.

Kirkpatrick, who stepped down from her U.N. post last week, insists it is the times and political parties that have changed, not what she believes.

### **Governor Pushes Impact Fees** So 'Growth Pays For Growth'

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - The overriding issue of the 1985 Florida legislative session - how an environmentally fragile state can cope with the nation's fastest growth rate. - was evident in virtually everything lawmakers did on opening day of the 60-day meeting.

In his annual State of the State address at a joint legislative session, Gov. Bob Graham focused on growth problems from start to finish. Graham called for lawmakers to study use of "impact fees" to make newcomers pay the cost of new government services, increased "user fees" on existing services and strengthening of the Local Government Comprehensive Planning Act to make cities and counties direct major construction projects to areas that can absorb them with intuinal environmental damage.

# County: Old Woman Can Stay

An appeal to let an ill, elderly woman live out her remaining days in a mobile home on a 5-acre tract off Chapman Road in southeast Seminole County has been granted by the county commission.

Commissioners Tuesday granted Wilma Ketchum a six-month permit to keep the mobile home on the property on the north side of Chapman Road and advised her to seek a permit of longer duration from the county Board of Adjustment under a new application.

Her request for renewal of the permit for the mobile home was based on a medical hardship. Her son, Franklin Allen, submitted a doctor's certificate and federal approval of her medical disability as proof of

Following intense questioning by Commissioner Sandra Glenn, it was determined that Mrs. Ketchum may come under a county regulation allowing the permanent location of the mobile home at the site under a life estate agreement - meaning the mobile home could remain as long as she lives, but must be removed after her death. The major problem with permitting the

mobile home to remaiain where it is permanently is that a house was also builton the property several years ago and this may have violated some county regulation involving the splitting of property. Part of the property was deeded to Allen and he built the home

However, Mrs. Glenn pointed out that if the five acres was under a single ownership. in 1970 the regulation against splitting the property would not apply

### Osteen Woman Pleads Guilty To Check Fraud At Sun Bank

Herald Staff Writer An Osteen woman charged with bilking Sun Bank of Seminole County out of \$8,500 by depositing checks from a closed account into a money market account has pleaded guilty to depositing checks with Intent to defraud.

Sheila Daniel Clark, 33, could receive up to a year in the county fail when sentenced May 10 by Seminole Circuit Judge C. Vernon Mize Jr.

Sheriff's investigators reported the woman opened a money market account at Sun Bank in downtown Sanford by making a \$4,000 cash deposit on Sept. 25. Through Dec. 12, she reportedly made numerous transactions at various Seminole County Sun Banks, using that money market account to guarantee checks drawn on a closed account at First Federal of Seminole County, a sheriff's report said.

Ms. Clark was arrested Jan 24. In other court action, an Orlando man who tried to outrun sheriff's deputies trying to arrest custody, could receive up to a him for using an invalid credit card pleaded guilty to forgery and uttering a forgery.

"Our objective is to market a new brand which will become the new standard of stylishness in the eigarette industry." says R.J. Reynolds' president, Gerald H. Long.

Says a vice president for marketing: "Smokers are selecting brands that make a statement."

There's nothing very radical about that, The idea that consumers buy into images everytime they make a purchase is the cornerstone of every building that lines Madison Avenue.

What is startling, though, is that Americans are still gullible enough to let such eigarette advertising appeal to them.

Yet they apparently are. One of the Jarring notes in the HHS report was the finding that lung cancer deaths among U.S. women are on the rise, with smoking directly to blame.

There's nothing very stylish in a backing cough, and absolutely nothing sophisticated in succumbing to the ravages of cancer or heart discuse

Just how long will it take Americans to figure this out?

Cigarette smoking has been linked to bladder cancer, but evidence on pipe and cigar smoking. anuff dipping and tobacco has been

A new study from the National Cancer Institute has found pipe and eigar smokers may face a slightly greater chance - 20 to 40 percent greater - of developing bladder cancer than non-smokers, but snuff users and tobacco chewers are not at increased risk

The researchers cautioned the pipe and eigar smokers might not be as much at risk as the statistics. indicated because in general, their cancer rates were unrelated to the amount of tobacco they used and how long they had used it.

The researchers' conclusion: "Whether typical eigar or pipe smoking has caused bladder cancer remains unclear

#### Less is More Historically, the approach to

treating ulcers, which affect affect at least 4 million Americans, has been to reduce stomach acid as quickly as possible. Now, doctors are taking the "less is more" approach.

Doctors have found prolonged. intensive suppression of stomach acid may actually be harmful, said Dr. Seymour M. Sabesin, director of gastroenterology at the University of Tennessee Center for Health Sciences.

Since the leading medications have been shown to heal ulcers equally well. Sabesin said he prefers the one that least suppresses stomach acid.

# Defector Helped Crush Iran's Communists

WAHINGTON — A true spy story worthof John le Carre can now be told. s the tale of a rising young KGB gent who defected to the Britis and brought about the bloodyxtinction of Iran's communist ideh party a few months later

Theentral figure in this story of intrigi and betrayal was Vladimir Andryevich Kuzichkin, a 37 yearld KGB major operating out othe Soviet embassy in Tehral Fluent in Farsi, the language Iran, Kuzichkin had been recruit at 28 into Directorate S. the mt secret of all the KGB directores and the one responsible for citonage, sabotage and assusabtion around the world.

Assiged to Tehran in 1977. Kuzicha helped in several communist-forts to overthrown the shah line succeeded. But when the Ayollah Khomeini's Islamic fundamitalists seized power early in 197fTudeh leaders, with prodding fro Kuzichkin, declared their

unswerving support for the revolu-

Khomeini never really trusted the Iranian communists, but he used their administrative expertise in middle-level government positions, just as he accepted Soviet KGB advisers to help his own intelligence

Despite two promotions while in Tehran, Kuzichkin grew disenchanted with the KGB. In early 1982, he contacted the British and became a double agent. He was given a radio for transmitting secret reports to his new bosses.

In June 1982, things got too hot for Kuzichkin, and he defected to the British. We don't know his whereabouts from June until October, but in the latter month he was finally spirited to London for extensive debriefing by British intelligence.

It was a stunning coup for the British - the first known defection of a staff officer in Directorate S. And like any clever defector. Kuzichin had brought along his

"passport" to the West: two trunks full of documents on the Soviets' total domination of the Iranian communist party.

Some of Kuzichkin's documents detailed Soviet-Tudeh plans to overthrow Khomeini - by assassination, if necessary.

The British showed a talent for manipulative treachery that would have made George Smiley blush. They secretly turned the information over to Khomeini.

Khomeini put the purloined KGB information to deadly use. Late in 1982, he began a ruthless crackdown on the Tudeh party. In January 1983, Radio Tehran was boasting of widespread executions of Tudeh members — as many as 22 in a single day.

In May 1983, Khomeini tool: a leaf from Stalin's primer and produced Tudeh party leaders to confess publicly that they had been spies for Moscow. The party's secretarygeneral. Nureddin Kianuri, outdid himself, claiming to have spied for

the Soviets since 1945. On May 4. Khomeint summoned Soviet Ambassador Vii K. Boldyrev and gave him a list of 18 embasay personnel who had been identified as KGB agents. They were given 48 hours to leave fran.

The Soviets didn't have to ask who was responsible for their diplomatic embarrassment and the Tudeh party's disaster. They knew it was Kuzichkin.

The KGB had clearly been stunned by Kuzichkin's detection. They treated it with absolute silence - no claims of kidnapping, no protest to the British, no demand to speak with the defector. The KGB apparently hoped that Kuzichkin

would keep his mouth shut if he were not subjected to public pre-But Kuzichkin didn't keep quiet. And the result was an impressive triumph for the British secret service: the total destruction of a Soviet-directed communist party in

a key Middle Eastern country. Footnote: A British Embassy spokesman said, "We don't discuss intelligence matters of this kind."

### Sutton Says New Job Is Nation's Best

LEXINGTON, Ky. (UPt) = There was only one Job in the land that could lure Eddle Sutton away from Arkansas, where he built a basketball tradition that yielded nine straight NCAA appearances and an average of 23 wins a year.

That offer came and the 49-year-old Kansas native accepted, leaving the Razorbacks' tradition he created for a Kentucky tradition that was built before he was born.

"This is the only job I'd ever take," Sutton said Tuesday, after it was announced he was replacing Joe B. Hall on the Wildcats' bench.

Hall, who compiled a 297-100 record in 13 season after replacing the 42-year coach Adolph Rupp, said the program should continue to prosper with Sutton at the helm.

"In stepping down, I didn't want to let the program down, but with Eddie, I see nothing but great days ahead," said Hall, 56. With the naming of Eddle Sutton, this is a great day for Kentucky basketball."

Sutton, who was mentioned as a possible successor to Hall but was not interviewed until Monday, was offered and accepted the job just before Monday's NCAA tournament title game in Lexington.

Arizona coach Lute Olson, who was tentatively offered the job before Sutton but couldn't reach agreement on a contract, Alabama-Birmingham coach Gene Bartow. South Florida coach Lee Rose and former Kentucky assistant Dick Parsons were also interviewed for the

"I'm flattered and honored to be named the new Kentucky accompanied at an afternoon news conference by his wife, three sons and mentor Henry Iba. "Believe me. I would have crawled all the way to Lexington. for this job."

Until finally receiving a call from Athletics Director Cliff Hagan, who was coordinating the search for a new coach, Sutton said he was not hopeful of getting the Kentucky position.

"I didn't apply and I told Cliff yesterday that I didn't really think he'd call us," said Sutton, who compiled a 260-75 record in 11 years at Arkansas.

Sutton, who played for Iba at Oklahama State and later coached with the three-time U.S. Olympic team coach, was credited with bringing Razorbacks' basketball up to the level of football at the Fayetteville school.

In 1978, Sutton's team advanced to the Final Four, before losing to eventual national champion Kentucky. Sutton was named UPI's coach of the year that season.

"When you talk about Kentucky, you're talking about baskethall," Sutton told about 200 members of the media at a news conference. "It's the only job I'd leave Arkansas for. It's the No. 1 coaching job in the country, including the NBA."

Arkansas' 13 losses this season were the worst since Sutton's arrival at Arkansas from Creighton in 1975. In his previous 10 seasons, no Sutton-coached Razorbacks' team lost more than nine games in

one year. Sutton's first official move as coach was to convince associate coach Leonard Hamilton to stay with Kentucky, whichld suc-

cessfully. Hamilton is regarded by many as one of the best recruiters in the country and is credited with bringing stars Sam Bowie, Kenny Watker and Richard

Madtson to UK. Sutton said he has not yet signed a contract, e and the UK Athletics Association had agreed to a five-year pact in principle.

Sutton said he thought his coaching philosophy, utilizing an aggressive man-to-man defense and a deliberate offense, was not much different than

"I don't think our philosophies are that different from the way Kentucky has been playing the last two years," Sutton said. "If you win, the fans don't care how you play the game."

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# Old Days

### Hear That Whistle Blowin'

NEW YORK (UP) - Long before expansion, travel across three time zones, 26 teams, the Major League Players Association and Peter Ueberroth, baseball prospered in a world bounded by Boston in the Northeast and St. Louis in the West.

It wasn't until after World War II that night baseball, expansion and plane travel brought sweeping changes to baseball. St. Louis was no longer the game's Western

In 1957, the New York Giants and Brooklyn Dodgers jumped across the continent to San Francisco and Los Angeles, respectively, and America perhapa coincidentally, crowned a world champion, the transplanted Milwaukee Braves, in its heartland

There's no stopping the future," as Yogi Berra says and baseball is bigger and better than it was in the Toonerville Trolley days of 16 teams playing mostly day games and travelin' the trains.

Travelin' the trains. Can anyone brought up on modern baseball understand the meaning of those words? Can players and newspapermen who zip from city to city in Jet planes comprehend the difference in the eras? Have they ever wondered why baseball has a greater collection of human interest anecdotes, by far, than any other sport? Where, one asks, did the newspapermen get them?

They got them travelin' the trains. They got them by living with the players. By sleeping in the same Pullman cars, eating together in the dining cars, playing cards. popping bofferoos, sitting up all night in the parlor car. making the 32-hour trips from Boston to St. Louis, constantly talking and arguing baseball and getting to know their subjects in a way no other newspapermen or women have been able to do in any exter sport before or since.

Little finps among the players and newspapermen


were easily resolved. Players resentful of something that had been written often found themselves having breakfast with the author the next morning. Potential feuds usually ended by the time coffee was served. The players and reporters saw themselves in a way their modern counterparts cannot.

Some may argue that the newspapermen became too much a part of the team. There's some truth to that but the point can be overdone. The newspapermen kept confidences. There were personal things they didn't write about stars. Is it really news some hanky pank will occur when 30 virile young men are away from home for two weeks?

Sleeping arrangements were the same with every club. The last three cars, one a dining car, were reserved for the club. Regulars and starting pitchers were assigned lower berths and subs, relief pitchers and news reporters upper berths. The manager was entitled to the drawing room and no case of a refusal has ever been recorded.

There were always two or three guys who couldn't sleep on the trains - just as today there are guys who hate to fly. They sat up all night talking and who knows how much of the lore of the game was produced during these nocturnal scances as the trainsped through darkness?

At least the trains were air-conditioned. Some of the hotels were only beginning to install air conditioning in the late 1940s and summer temperatures in Washington, D.C., Cincinnati and St. Louis were stifling. Lou Gehrig, for example, used to order buckets of ice cubes, soak his bed sheets in them and then wrap the sheets around him. Some wonder if the practice didn't contribute to the dis-



Travelin' the trains was the only way to go for the ballplayers of old.

Getaway day presented unusual problems for the reporters. The guys who worked for morning sheets filed their stories via Western Union from the ball parks. But then, as now, clubs fled cities like bagmen, sometimes as little as an hour after a game. The afternoon paper reporters didn't have time to write and file their stories before the train was scheduled to take them to the next town.

The solution for this problem required consultation with the club's road secretary, whose authority approximated. that of Caesar. The trick was to find a station at which the train was scheduled to stop for 15 minutes and wire ahead to Western Union to have a messenger meet the train for a dropoll of the reporters' copy. Often such a dropoff could be made only at 1 or 2 a.m.

It was the job of the designated reporter to stay sober

and or awake so he could make the dropoff. Today's reporters use portable video display terminals which put them, when plugged in, in the newspaper's city rooms. In the old days, the flower of Amerscan baseball literature often was delivered to a nondescript. Western Union messenger at some descried station in Middle America at a time when honest men and women were sleeping. These were "the good old days?"

When 40-odd men travel together, off and on, from spring training in March to the end of the season in September, there are bound to be a million laughs and an equalnumber of problems. Why ballclubs insisted on catching the first train out of town (like boxing promoters) will never be understood. But they did and led one day some 60 years ago to a famous story suitable to bring this nostalgic tale to an end

# Flannery: Tijuana Trafficker Who Borders For The Poor

YUMA. Artz. (UPI) - A day doesn't go by that some drug trafficker looking to outsmart U.S. Customs gets nailed trying to sneak that flendish white powder inside one of our borders.

We hear about those wrongdoers frequently enough.

But how come hardly anyone has heard of that big league ballplayer operating completely the other way around, lugging such staples as milk. bread, rice and beans across the border to feed as many hungry impoverished Mexicans as he possibly can.

The reason you don't hear all the good Tim Flannery has been doing for so many of the poverty stricken in Tijuana.

is simple enough. He doesn't talk about it.

"Ordinarily, I'd rather not," says the San Diego Padres' 27-year-old backup infielder and pinch-hitter, "but these people can use all the help they can get. Any little bit I can do for them makes me very happy. Hove doing it.

"A lot of food here in our country gets thrown away. We pick it up and bring it down there to feed the poor people.

"You should see the nearest hospital to them. It's called Sacred Heart and the last time I heard, it didn't even have one pint of blood or one X-ray machine. These people have no money so they can't get any help."

#### New Law To Establish Order

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The sponsor of a bill passed Tuesday by the Senate Commerce Committee said the measure giving the NFL power to block teams from leaving their hometowns "re-establishes order out of chaos" in professional sports.

The bill, approved 10-6, would give the NFL and several other professional sports leagues limited antitrust exemptions in the areas of franchise movement and revenue sharing, and allow individual leagues to establish guidelines for restricting owners from moving their teams. If it finally becomes law, the measure would apply to the

NFL and U.S. Football League, and basketball, hockey and soccer leagues - but not baseball. Sen. John Danforth, R-Mo., who sponsored the bill along with fellow Missouri Sen. Thomas Eagleton, a Democrat. said the legislation "re-establishes some order out of what

has become chaos" in professional sports leagues. Danforth said NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle had assured him in a letter that, should the legislation pass, Rozelle will recommend NFL owners "consider favorably"

expansion by two teams by 1988 or 1989. Rozelle told the Senate Judiciary Committee last month that the league has no plans for expansion until all franchise and antitrust litigation, including a suit by the

USFL, is cleared up. A skeptical Sen. Bob Kasten, R-Wis., said of Rozelle's expansion promise, "If you believe that letter, I've got a bridge to sell you."

The Missouri lawmakers have particular interest in the question because three Missouri teams - basketball's Kansas City Kings, the St. Louis Cardinals football club, and hockey's St. Louis Blues - have been fingered as

possibilties to shift operations elsewhere. The Danforth measure requires specific guidelines be considered in approving franchise relocations, such as the move of the NFL's Baltimore Colts - in the dead of night to Indianapolis last year.

### Congress Moves Swiftly To End Jobless Program

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Bowing to threats of a presidential veto of an extension of benefits for 340,000 jobless Americans, congressional leaders are swiftly moving a bill to phase out the program, which they say will likely be signed.

The Democratic led House Tuesday quickly approved legislation to gradually end the supplemental unemployment program, which provides federal payments to people who have run out of state unemployment checks. The measure was sent to the Senate, where floor action-

could come as early as today. The voice vote in the House Casselberry Senior Center, 200 came only hours after the Ways and Means Committee and the Republican led Senate Finance Committee both rejected plans to extend the program, opting instead to back the \$180 million phaseout.

Congressional leaders - both Republican and Democrat were united in favor of a phase out, arguing that President Reagan was certain to veto anything more generous.

The plan would allow no new recipients beyond this week, but would let those currently in the program receive the checks they have coming. Without any legislation, benefits for all recipients would end with the checks being

sent out next week. "I think it's safe to say there

Senate Republican leader Robert Dole said.

"The choice is either to showboat with something more. or get a bill signed with some thing less added House GOP leader Robert Michel of Illinois.

Democratic leaders agreed, despite some arguments last week that a limited extension of the program would be a way to stand up to Reagan

hope." House Speaker Thomas. O'Neill said the phaseout is "the only thing that's going to be signed."

White House spokesman Larry Speakes said while the administration is talking to leaders about the matter, "our position at the moment is opposed."

The program, which provides additional jobless benefits for about 340,000 people who have used up their 26 weeks of regular state payments, expired Monday. A person in the program receives between eight and 14 weeks of additional checks, depending on the jobless rate in the recipient's state.

# French Classic Desserts Laced With Rich Amaretto Carry On Regal Tradition

Nothing beats a time-tested dessert which has been modified to perfection. One example is the Baba au Rhum, a traditional French dessert cake which has undergone several centuries of flavor enhancement.

The latest recipe improvement, a new liqueur taste, produces perhaps the most delectable heir to the "baba" lineage yet - Baba au Coconut

The baba originated in Poland, and according to its connoisscurs, was first made with rye flour and Hungarian wine. It then "migrated" to France during the reign of Louis XV, whose father-in-law, exiled at Nancy, amused himself by pouring a liqueur on a cake and setting it afire. Having been an avid reader of "The Arabian Nights," he called his specialite "Ali Baba."

King Louis and his in-law would have been delighted to taste the most recent version made with coconut almond liqueur. The velvety Coconut Amuretto seeps into a rich sponge cake that's zesty with citrus. Whipped cream made with the cordial crowns it all. This dessert, perfect for drop-incompany, lasts awhile: hi fact, the longer the baba soaks in the liqueur the better it tastes. (Raisins may be substituted for currants in the recipe.)

Another scrumptious classic fit for a king is Amaretto Cheese Pic. The scent and taste of DeKyper Amaretto make it the most elegant of cheesecakes. Easily prepared a day in advance and chilled, this delicious dessert features a graham cracker crust and a cream cheese filling decked with glistening, golden apricot halves.

Desserts of royalty-pleasing ancestry like the baba and the cheese pie become more poble with the addition of such liqueurs as Amaretto and Coconut Amaretto. Serve one of these variations on dessert classics -and carry on the regal tradition.





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busy night shift. CB buffs in the Sanford area all know her as "Coffee Bean." a handle which bespeaks the kind of beverage she favors most. A hearty laugh and a cheerful attitude have always been two of Karen's strong points.

Single parenting sometimes means having to supplement your income with extra work and Karen has tried her hand at selling vacuum cleaners and selling items at flea markets, and is presently a distributor for a food company which packages prepared foods in retort pouches that have a shelf life expectancy of up to 25 years in some cases. "In fact," Karen says, "some workmen place them on their car engine or dashboard and let them warm up and, comes lunchtime, they've got a hot lunch. They are fully prepared meals not dehydrated." This is only one example of the many products which are marketed basically as convenience or

emergency foods. "It's strictly a matter of time and energy," says Karen, "but I love to work with ceramics and liquid embroidery." A cookle jar in the form of a tree stump with adorable little animals pecking out at you is almost always filled with Karne's homemade cookies.

In the Spring, Karen enjoys putting in a small garden Just outside her kitchen window. "I don't know how much luck I'll have this year," she says. "but I've started some rose bushes along with bell peppers, tomatoes, parsley and a few strawberry plants. I do a lot of freezing and sometimes I'll stop at a roadside stand and buy a bushel of corn or other fresh vegetable and blanch it then freeze it for future use, It's a Ilmesaver," says Karen.

'Mother is a good basic coek, but I got most of my love for gourmet cooking from my grandmother," Karen says. "Her-Gumbo is heavenly. She alled it Okra Gumbo, but as far as I'm concerned, it's Shrimp Gumbo. It has shrimp and crab, and she always used some ham for flavoring. It took forever to make, so I use a simplified version."

Karen remembers going to New Orleans and "do nothing but pig out on Creole cooking. Grandmother would go into the kitchen and just whip up all the Although her family is spread out into other states now, Karen says, "It all started in New Orleans. We had some of the best times there, especially during Mardi Gras. The family had a summer home on the other side of Lake Pontchartrain in Mandeville and we'd go there for picnics and on weekends."

From her uncle's second floor office window on Canal Street in New Orleans, Karen recalls "hanging out the windows" with her cousins to watch the Mardi Gras parades.

With a big smile on her face, clean, Karen says "basically I've always been known as a Pollyanna. There's no point in letting life get you down, just pick up the pieces and go on. Put one foot in front of the other and keep on going without looking

Along with her New Orleans grandmother's Gumbo, Karen has added some favorites of her own including an elegant Black Forest Torte for those with rich taste buds:
