## Leffler Lists 7 Points For Future Work

(Continued from Page One) ed the Chamber of Commerce as one of the outstanding organizations in the state, and commended President Leffler and Secretary Ed Higgins.

O. P. Harndon recalled that for years the Chamber of Commerce had been seriously handicapped in its work by insufficient funds but added that within the past year or two with more help from the City and County this disadvantage had been partly overcome with beneficial results plain in everyone. He said that finances at the start of any business are of great importance and that you can't go much without them. Urging the campaign workers to do their best, he recalled that "the scarcer the worms are the more the more the hen scratches."

T. Bradford Hynd traced the achievements of the Chamber of Commerce during the past year, bringing attention to its work in bringing the Boston Braves here, its successful tourist drive, and also the war, resulting largely from its large advertising program, and its successful efforts in behalf of the local airport. He said that he had served in many drives both here and in Atlanta but that he had never had as fine a bill of goods to sell as he had in this drive. He declared he knew no secretary more efficient than Ed Higgins, no president with more leadership than Hynd.

Mr. Leffler thanked the workers for volunteering to serve in the membership drive and recalled that last Saturday with several other Chamber of Commerce leaders, he had attended the membership dinner of the Orange County Chamber of Commerce at which Senator Claude Pepper was the principal speaker. At this meeting an Air Base officer reported Mr. Leffler continued, that more than \$19,000.00 had been spent in Orlando by the Air Base.

Pointing out that it was the practice in Orlando to rotate the presidency of the Chamber of Commerce and for no one to serve as head of it for more than one year, Mr. Leffler declared that he favored that practice for Seminole County and revealed that he intends to recommend a change in the law so that the president of the Chamber of Commerce can serve more than one year. This would tend to develop more leadership in our community, he said.

Declaring that a town is the composite of the people who live in it, Mr. Leffler declared that "If there is anything wrong with our town, there is something wrong with us. The town is us. It looks just like us and it acts like us."

"The job of the Chamber of Commerce is selling the town, selling it not only to outsiders to get them to come here and live among us, but also to sell it to ourselves. If a person is not willing, or is unable to give his time to the Chamber of Commerce, he should be willing to give his money."

Mr. Coleman explained the plan of campaign for the coming week and detailed the names of the various colonels, captains, and team members. He said that the drive would start Tuesday morning and urged everyone to get an early start. "If everyone will do a little," he said, "then nobody will have to do too much".

Secretary Higgins expressed his optimism over the prospects for the drive and said: "We have a good record to point to and a fine group should be behind the others who spoke briefly in behalf of the Chamber of Commerce were Frank Talbot of Oviedo, Hubbard Casselberry of Casselberry,

## Reds In Sevastopol Stand Firm Against Land And Air Blows

Bitter Tank Battle Is In 14th Day As Wild Fight Occurs In Scorching Heat

RAF Ships Germany To Drop Bombs On Holland, France; Nazi Planes Active

Meantime, the RAF skippered Germany and bombed France and Holland.

The British warned French coastal residents to move inland.

The fury of the Nazis at Sevastopol was indicated by last night's communiqué which listed 800 German planes destroyed in the week ended yesterday against 150 Soviet losses. In the absence of large scale aerial activity on any other front, this communiqué told pressmen was paid to the Germans in their renewed efforts to knock out Sevastopol.

The big naval base has been under siege since last October and after the fall of the Kerch peninsula the Nazis now seem intent on the last Soviet foothold.

The Germans, claiming superiority for themselves over the eastern front, broadcast a communique saying that in the past week the Russians lost 1,000 planes.

This apparently supreme effort to reduce the long and stubborn resisting naval base apparently accounted for the enormous tonnage of German planes.

Up and down the long front fighting of local importance continued between the Nazis and the Communists also noted considerable patrol activity.

Another long arm of the RAF bomber command, striking from Mediterranean area bases, stepped up its series of blows at naval and continental Italy which only two nights ago reached to within 50 miles of Rome.

**Sanford Man's Brother Died At Lake City**

Funeral services for Sylvanus DeCotter, who died at Lake City hospital Friday, were held in Jacksonville Saturday. It was reported.

Mr. DeCotter was a brother of Lieut.-Col. George A. DeCotter, who maintains a home here. He was stationed at the AAC Camp at Boca Raton.

Mr. DeCotter was a 54 year old World War veteran and a member of one of Jacksonville's pioneer families. He was born in the city in 1887 and served overseas from July 7, 1918 until January 7, 1919, taking part in several major engagements, a service medal bears bars denoting service in the Asiatic Marine campaign, the Mexican campaign, the Philippines, and the Pacific theater.

He was the son of George Augustus DeCotter, who died in 1904, and Mary A. DeCotter, who died in 1938.

Survivors include four sisters, Miss Alma DeCotter, Miss Louise DeCotter and Mrs. R. C. DeCotter, all of Jacksonville, and Mr. W. Jennings, Haddenfield, N.J.; two brothers, Lieut.-Col.
