Area Head Start Cited As 'Model'

Notification has been received from the Atlanta Office of Economic Opportunity (OEA) designating the Head Start program of Seminole County Action as a model for the State of Florida. Rev. Amos Jones, SCA executive director, reported to The Herald today.

Accompanying the model designation is a federal grant in aid for some \$24,838 to permit the local agency to organize and put into operation a career development program, the director said.

Jones and Head Start director Mrs. Portia Spencer were summoned to Atlanta last Friday to receive the news.

The Seminole County based program, which gives children of low income families a "head start", was one of eight model programs selected in the 11 states in the eastern section of the nation.

The grant will permit SCA to prepare a program that will allow career advancement for persons employed within the agency. For outstanding personnel further education will be provided to permit the employee to obtain better-paying employment outside the agency.

With the SCA Head Start as a model, other agencies throughout the state will be calling on the local organization for advice in setting up similar programs for children.

Head Start in Seminole County currently has 200 students with 10 classes in seven centers in all parts of the county.

Project Head Start here had its official beginning on June 17, 1968, when orientation classes were taught by Mrs. Spencer to the new staff. Child development centers began to get under way on June 24, 1968.

Airport Act; First 1 Signed

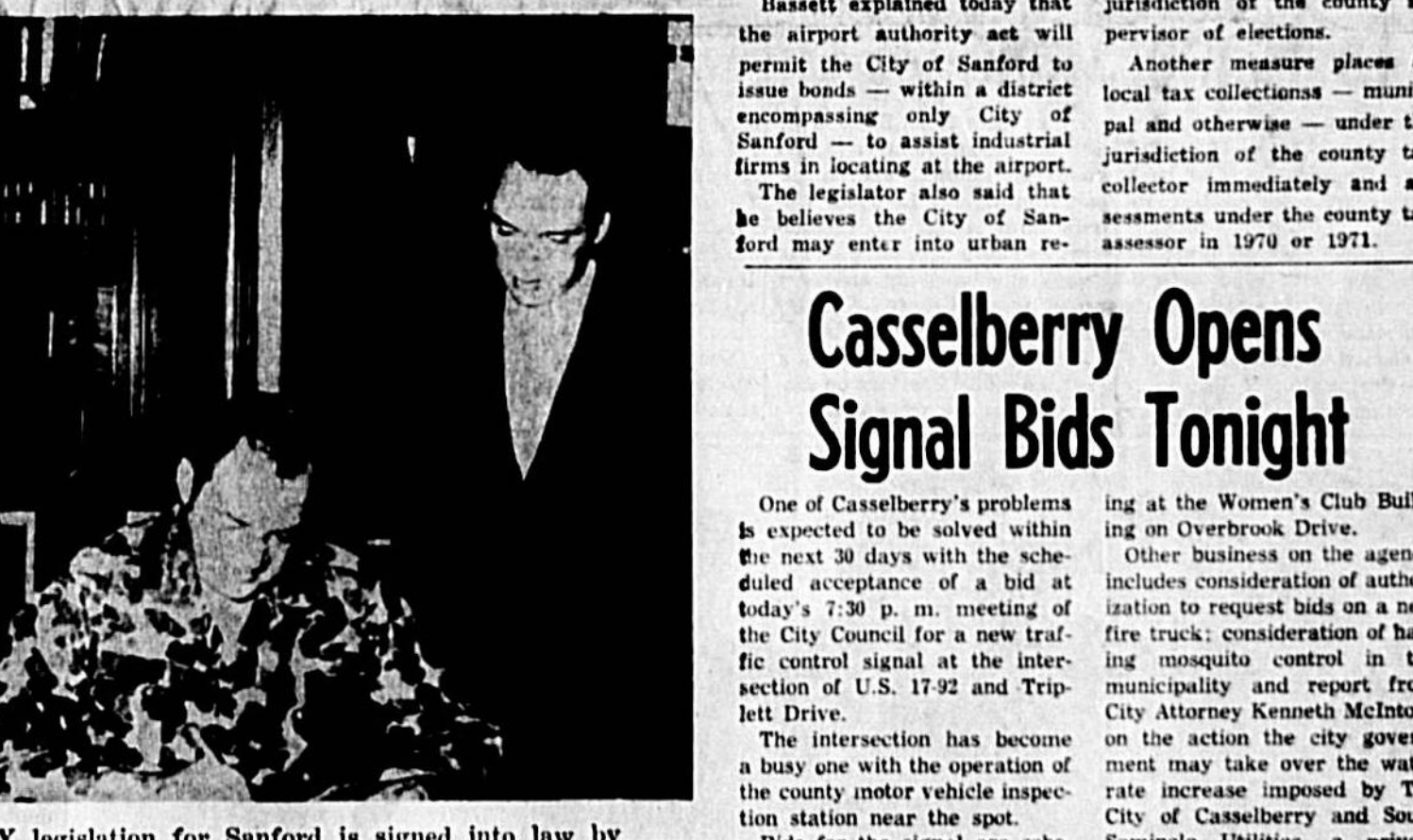
The Sanford Airport Authority Act was the first of 73 legislative measures for Seminole County to become law following passage by the Legislature prior to adjournment sine die Friday evening.

Rep. E. Pope Bassett said this morning that he and Rep. Lewis Earle prevailed on Gov. Claude Kirk early Saturday to sign the Sanford Airport Authority Act into law.

The original Sanford proposal, Bassett stated, was revised by Earle and himself in order to conform to requirements of the general industrial bonding law. They said Sanford needed the authority as soon as possible in order to attract new industry to the area.

Dr. Earle said today: "Con- trary to recent irresponsible statements by some local politicians, most members of the Seminole-Orange delegation have worked diligently on nearly 100 local bill proposals and we successfully passed 73."

Bassett explained today that the airport authority act will permit the City of Sanford — to assist industrial firms in locating at the airport. The legislator also said that he believes the City of Sanford may enter into urban re-

25,000 GIs Will Leave Vietnam

WASHINGTON (AP) — The 25,000 U.S. troops being withdrawn from Vietnam this summer will not come all the way home, but are expected to be held in reserve in such areas as Okinawa or Hawaii, according to Pentagon sources.

The broad outline for the phased American withdrawal was set Sunday when President Nixon announced that 25,000 men — "a division equivalent" — would be out of Vietnam by August.

The decision was greeted in Washington with some surprise. "They said the scaling down of U.S. manpower is expected to begin with an initial pullout of several combat battalions or support-type forces. Identification of the units may not come for several days, the sources said, possibly only after the troops already have left the war zone."

One unformed officer who was familiar with the various options the administration was studying commented: "That's weird. I've seen numbers of 30,000 and higher. We could have pulled out more."

Pentagon sources noted that the 25,000 means the President probably is authorizing the withdrawal of various small units, not a regular division, as started.

Thus the Vietnam scaling down will take place in much the same way as the buildup which began four years ago: in piecemeal fashion.

NEW YORK (AP) — One of the major banks in New York today raised its prime rate—the interest it charges its highest and best customers for loans—to a historic high of 8 1/2 per cent from 7 1/2, effective immediately.

An increase had been expected for some time, but the amount of the increase—a full one per cent—was surprising. The increase by Bankers Trust Co. of New York was announced without comment. When one bank increases the prime rate, others usually follow. The prime rate is used in determining the interest rate charged most large corporations. Other rates, such as interest rates to consumers, are scaled upward from the prime rate.

Russian Missiles Pondered By U. S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Observers of a series of Soviet missile tests in the Pacific have watched three or four test launches since April.

A study of telemetry and other data gathered by the observing U. S. vessels has been inconclusive as to whether the Soviets have mastered the technology of separately targeting each of the warheads, sources say. Opinion thus is divided, although there is general agreement that at a minimum, the Soviets have been testing multiple warheads with sufficient dispersion to threaten knockout of individual Minuteman missile sites in the United States. The United States has conducted at least 14 tests of Minuteman III land-based missiles and Poseidon, a submarine-launched missile equipped with multiple independently targetable re-entry vehicles, called MIRV.

Editorial Comment

To The Graduates-Class Of 1969-Greetings!

Diplomas in hand, degrees achieved, the 1969 crop of graduates is being harvested. Whether it be in high schools, junior colleges, technical schools, scientific institutions or the sprawling universities this phenomena is being repeated all over the United States.

He stressed the true value of a teacher. Such inspirational instruction was to be rated far above "... all the buildings, apparatus and libraries without him."

Yet it is a time to recall what Arthur Guiterman wrote: "For Education is making Men; So is it now, so was it when — Mark Hopkins sat on one end of a long — And James Garfield sat on the other."

President Garfield had made his much-quoted remark about the value of such a teacher as Mark Hopkins, president of Williams College, in a speech to Williams Alumni in New York in 1871.

Change-Making!

This was to have been an editorial about the right way to make changes on college campuses, versus the militant method. It contained pertinent remarks by a well-known and respected professor, embellished with our own comment on how to do things right. But something happened to our erudite effort on the way to the press. It never got through the mysterious mists of the new computer-mechanical technology.

Somehow the headline, "The Only Way To Make Changes," made it safely through the composition process. (We still set heads the old-fashioned way, without the "assistance" of computers and tape-fed machines.) But the body type has vanished. Diligent searching reveals neither copy, tape nor type. It has disappeared.

We don't know exactly what happened. But we are beginning to get a faint suspicion those computers have minds of their own, and one of them didn't like what we said about making changes. In other words we have a sneaking idea we have been censored by a computer, and we are trying to figure out how to invoke the First Amendment against a machine.

The publisher doesn't censor editorials, and we aren't about to stand still for a computerized system doing it, either. Is this 1968 already?

At any rate, good readers, you'll never know what we and the professor had to say about that. But just to make sure the computer doesn't object to this discussion and censor it, we're making a special request that it be set on an old-fashioned, man-operated machine. Fortunately we still have a couple for use in emergencies. We're using the original headlines. Somehow it seems to apply to computers as well as to colleges. — The Greenwell (S.C.) News

Mafia Charged With Fraud Insurance Companies Bilked

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Mafia loan shark and his son are involved in a nationwide series of deals in which millions of dollars of commercial loans were obtained by using questionable insurance policies and bonds as collateral.

The names of John A. Masello Sr. and his son, John Jr., turned up in an investigation of the severe financial problems of insurance companies in Oklahoma, Florida and Arizona.

Earlier this year, the elder Masello was also in the news when the New York State Investigation Commission disclosed that companies he controlled had received more than a half-billion dollars in Small Business Administration loans. The commission identified the elder Masello as a member of the Mafia organization formerly headed by Vito Genovese. Both father and son also are under indictment on bribery and conspiracy charges in connection with Post Office Department mail hauling contracts.

As part of the insurance deals, the Masellos received more than \$350,000 from a New York bank. Collateral for the loans was insurance policies and surety bonds issued by companies in Oklahoma and Florida.

And a \$150,000 bond issued by the Florida company was used to purchase a paid up annuity from the Arizona insurance firm for John Masello Jr. Annuities from the Arizona firm also have been used as collateral for loans.

Rep. Wright Patman, D-Texas, chairman of the House Banking Committee, recently warned federal banking officials that "a large number of banks across the country stand to lose millions of dollars in loans collateralized by questionable insurance policies." Patman put the total at \$25 million.

The Masello loans are just a small part of the wheeling and dealing now unfolding.

Investigators are checking possible links to other Mafia members.

They also are trying to unravel the tangle of deals which have led to financial woes of these companies.

—State Fire and Casualty Co. of Miami, Fla. This firm had been licensed to write insurance in 26 states before Florida officials announced it was \$8 million in the red and asked a court to dissolve it.

—Community National Life Insurance Co. of Tulsa, Okla. It is in court custody while an in-terim management group appointed by the court tries to determine the extent of its losses.

—Financial Security Life Insurance Co. of Phoenix, Ariz. It was suspended by the state after a \$150,000 company check bounced. Officials estimate it is more than \$7 million in the red.

But, say investigators, hard-est hit are thousands of people who may lose their investments in life insurance issued by the companies and whose claims may never be paid.

Training School One Step Nearer

Establishment of a job training school — at Sanford Airport — provide skilled labor for industry throughout Florida — at Sanford Airport was given impetus in Washington Monday when the proposal was approved by the National Inter-Agency Review Committee, it was reported.

With the approval of the Sanford City Commission and Sanford Industrial Commission, Avco Corporation had requested a federal grant of \$2.5 million from the Department of Labor and the Department of Housing, Education and Health, Education and Welfare (HEW). Officials of the two departments comprise the review committee.

The committee is scheduled to meet again this week to study cost ratio per trainee for the proposed school. If the cost ratio is disapproved, the grant will be denied, it was said.

There was a report, however, that the program may be delayed for a year anyhow since the Labor Department has said it has over-committed itself for such schools.

The school was first proposed by Don Rabbel when he came to Sanford two years ago as executive director of the Sanford Industrial Commission and has since been approved by Gov. Claude Kirk of Florida and Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York following a study of migrants' movements from Sanford to Rochester, N.Y.

Water-Sewer System Will Be Costly - McIntosh Casselberry Faces Realty Taxation

The "really tax-free town" of Casselberry may have to change its motto if ownership of a municipal water and sewerage system is pursued. This was the crux of the information given to the City Council last night by City Attorney Kenneth McIntosh.

"It's time the citizens wake up to the fact that if the city goes into the water business it will be a tremendous expense," McIntosh told the City Council in a report giving the opinion that ad valorem taxation probably will be necessary to finance a municipal water system.

Construction or acquisition of a water system, long considered by the Council, was brought to the forefront recently with the announced increase in water rates in the city from \$3.50 for 7,000-gallon minimum to \$3.50 for 1,000 gallons.

The city, unable to control the rates of the privately owned City of Casselberry and South Seminole Utilities because of the expiration of a franchise agreement with the company, has refused to renew the franchise while it attempts to gain federal financing to purchase or build a system.

McIntosh made it clear to the Council last night that without a franchise, it is nearly impossible to impose any controls on the system.

Actually the increase went into effect for some of the "sawtooth" far and live reports to the city for meter reading for the June bill.

McIntosh said he would need testimony of expert witnesses to obtain a court injunction to force a decrease in the rate and that the city engineer and his assistant had been unable to examine data of the company to gain the necessary information for the court action.

Council, at McIntosh's request, authorized the attorney and Mayor Curtis Row to "search" far and live reports to the company to gain the necessary information for the court action.

The attorney advised that should negotiations be unsuccessful for the decrease, the city might consider granting a limited franchise as a stop-gap measure.

In the meantime a work session with the city fiscal agent and city engineer will be scheduled to discuss feasibility of purchasing or building a system.

Commissioners 'Sizzle' Jane

Constable Bob Jane, still smearing from a reprimand from the Republican Party and its request for an investigation of his activities, was burned again today—this time by the Board of County Commissioners.

The county board demanded an explanation from the law officer of only six months' tenure.

"No later than next meeting" for his questionable billing to the county for a guard to transport prisoners, serving of warrants outside the territorial limits of Seminole County and mileage charges on two consecutive days for round trips to Panama City.

Making the motion requesting the explanation was Commissioner Greg Drummond, only Republican member on the board. In addition, the District 3 county officer asked Jane to explain why he has attempted to bill the county for attendance in court on other than regular court days.

According to Deputy County Clerk Ashby Jones, Jane included on his cost bill for the month court appearances on 20 of the last 30 days.

Alexander expressed an interest in the type of prisoners Jane has been using a guard to transport, terming use of a guard in certain instances a "frivolous approach."

Only legal authority that could be found by County Attorney Harold Johnson for Jane to serve warrants outside the county is in process of "hot pursuit." It was noted, however, that it would be unlikely Jane would be pursuing a law violator some 355 miles to Panama City with warrant in hand.

Legal term given to Jane's attempt to be paid mileage for two consecutive days for the trips to Panama City is "concocted mileage" while Drummond called the item a "dual charge."

Jones explained normal practice on the court appearance billing is to permit payment for two days a week while Jane appears to be billing for each appearance.
