



Area Head Start Cited As 'Model'

Notification has been received from the Atlanta Office of Economic Opportunity (OEA) designating the Head Start program of Seminole Community Action as a model for the State of Florida, Rev. Amos Jones, SCA of Bernarr Macfadden Foundaexecutive director, reported to The Herald today.

Accompanying the model designation is a federal grant in aid for some \$24,833 to permit the local agency to organize and put into operation a career development program, the director said. Jones and Head Start director Mrs. Portia Spen-

cer were summoned to Atlanta last Friday to receive The Seminole County based program, which gives children of low income families a "head start", was one of eight model programs selected in the 11 states

in the eastern section of the nation. The grant will permit SCA to prepare a program that will allow career advancement for persons employed within the agency. For outstanding personnel further education will be provided to permit the employe to obtain better-paying employment outside the

With the SCA Head Start as a model, other agencies throughout the state will be calling on the local organization for advice in setting up similar programs for children.





The ugly spectacle of violence on the campus, armed threats in university offices, militare moves by students and faculty members where emotions have been allowed to overbalance logic and reason are. to be sure, unhappy parts of our times.

Yet it should be realized that we have here in Sanford and Seminole County a rather exceptional group of young people who have been subjected to reports which would lead one to believe that the 1969 graduate must take drugs, indulge in rebellion and flout authority to be normal.

Far from it. Quite the opposite. Our pupils have been studying at a time when the entire educational system has been disrupted by a teachers' strike, overcrowded and out-dated schools and debates in private and in public which do nothing to improve the status of the schools or the faculty. Yet we can be proud of the records made in

terms of scholastic awards (and athletic prowess)

which have been earned. New construction at Seminole Junior College, school additions and new buildings in our other schools are facts.

But we would emphasize again the irreplacable value of the devoted teacher. In doing this it is essential that full credit be given those, and there are many, who have kept up their own pursuit of learning and excellence, maintained a balance in their conduct of classes and done well in such respects. The graduates are, indeed, their product. The members of the class of '69 will do their own grad-

ing of our educational systems as the months roll into years and the year into the fateful 1970s. To all of you we would express our confidence in your ability to perform well, to think boldly and positively about challenges your generation must face and finally urge that in all of these endeavors you rely on the eternal verities. (We still set heads the oldfashioned way, without the "assistance" of computers and tape-fed machines.) But the body type has vanished. Diligent searching reveals neither copy, tape nor type. It has disap-

We don't know exactly what happened. But we are beginning to get a faint suspicion those computers have minds of their own, and one of them didn't like what we said about making changes. In other words we have a sneaking idea we have been censored by a computer, and we are trying to figure out how to invoke the First Amendment against a machine.

The publisher doesn't censor editorials, and we aren't about to stand still for a computerized system doing it, either, Is this 1984 already? At any rate, good readers, you'll never know what we and the professor had to say about that. But just to make sure the computer doesn't object to this discussion and censor it, we're making a special request that it be set on an old-fashioned, man-operated machine.
