Gross Sales In Seminole Rise

Gross sales showed an increase of 10.3 per cent in Seminole County last November, as compared to November 1962, it was reported today by the Florida Retail Federation, Jacksonville.

Sales during November 1963 were \$5,404,973 as against \$4,898,619 in November 1962, the report shows.

These figures compare with a statewide increase of 7.4 per cent, with sales of \$1.3 billion in last November as compared to \$1.2 billion in November 1962.

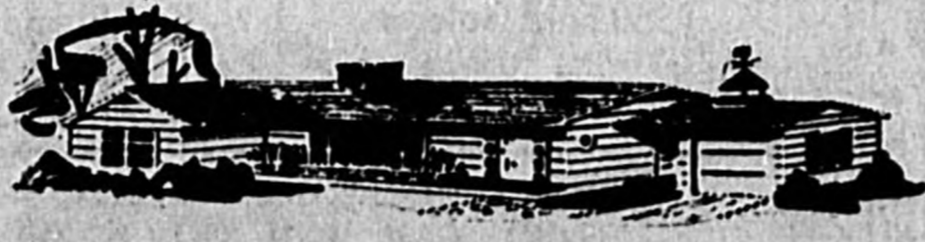

A doctor recently told a group of his colleagues that the woman patient who keeps telling her physician, while he is taking her case history, that her husband is "just wonderful" is neurotic. Women have long suspected there was something fishy about the wife who goes around bragging about having a perfect husband—and now they have a doctor's opinion to back them up. And the interesting thing is that women in general suspect the woman who claims her husband is wonderful in every respect for the same reason the doctor does. They

figure there isn't any such thing as a perfect husband. So does the doctor. Say he: "I'm a husband. Most of my friends are husbands and I don't know of a wonderful one in the lot." But what makes it so frustrating to most women listening to a wife claim perfection for her husband is that it leaves them without any comeback. Active Cases Of TB On Rise In Florida

New active cases of tuberculosis are on the increase in Florida for the fifth consecutive year, according to Dr. Dwight J. Wharton, director of the Division of Tuberculosis Control, Florida State Board of Health.

Dr. Wharton reported a preliminary total of 1,368 new active tuberculosis cases in 1963 as compared to 1,436 cases in 1962—an increase of 129 cases. New active cases for the previous three years were 1,356 cases in 1961, 1,293 cases in 1960, and 1,271 cases in 1959.

"A large increase in the number of new active cases is being found in the age group from birth to age 15, not only in Florida but throughout the nation," Dr. Wharton said. He attributed this increase among children to more thorough case detection activities and better reporting of newly-found cases.

Florida figures reveal that the total of 1,371 new active cases reported in 1963 included 80 children under the age of 15 while in 1962 the total of 1,439 cases included 138 children in that same age bracket. This represents a percentage increase of almost double among children discovered to have active tuberculosis in these two years.

Dr. Wharton cited figures released by the U.S. Public Health Service showing that there were 44,652 new active cases of tuberculosis in the United States in 1962, an increase of 228 more than the 1961 total.

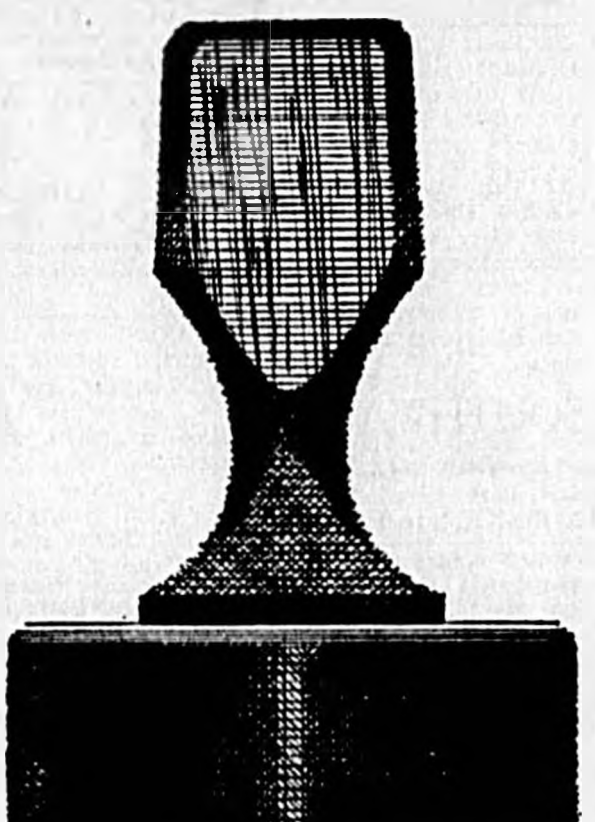

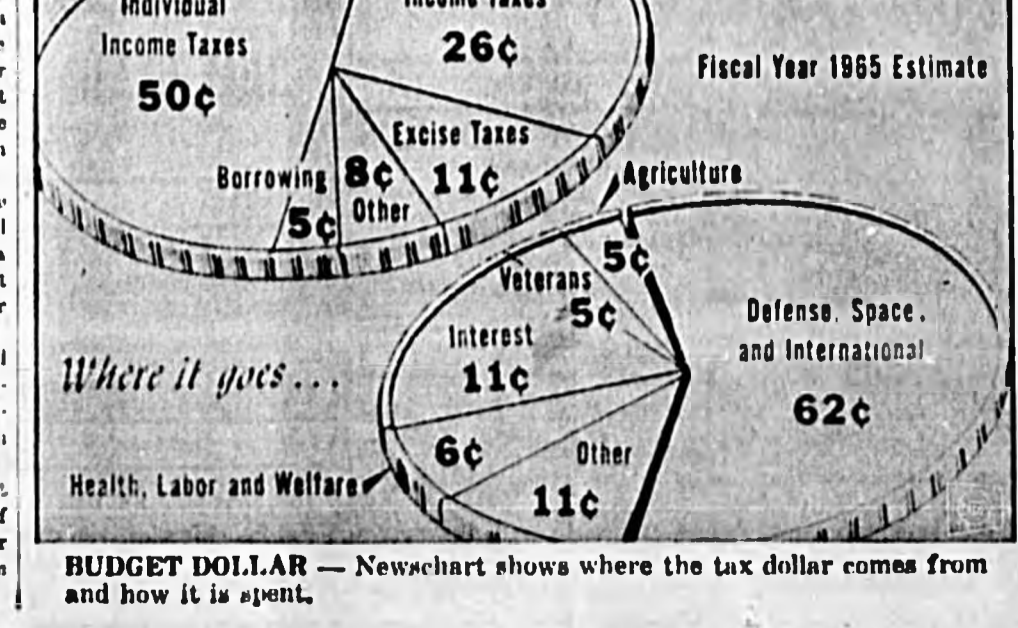
