FOLSOM STATE PRISON, Cal. Nov. 26 .- (INS) - With the toll of dead remaining at 11, nine con victs and two guards, three other convicts near death from wounds, and 24 others seriously but not dangerously wounded, prison offi cials today are conducting an in vestigation to fix responsibility for the bloody Thanksgiving day prison riot here.

Six convicts, a "lifter" and killer, three robers, a burgular and a forger-six men who are designated as "hard" even by the other prison inmates—have been singled out as ringleaders of the attempted prison break. They were facing the gallows today for their part in the rioting.
