## German Refugee To Leave Sanford

Karoly Koppanyi found a way to America in the Sanford's First Methodist Church Youth Fellowship and the Methodist Committee on Overseas Relief.

The youth who fled to West Germany after the Hungarian uprising and whose English was limited to "okay" at his Aug. 28 arrival in Sanford, left recently for Melrose, Mass., to join a childhood friend who had also come to America under the Methodist Overseas Relief program.

"Charley" arrived here from West Germany where he had been working in a Volkswagen plant. His Hungarian father had spent three years in a Siberian work-camp. Karoly's way to America was paved by the Sanford Methodist youth group through a church supper which brought the money to get the young displaced person here. Final arrangements for Karoly's transportation

were made through the New York office of the M.C.O.R. Youth Fellowship members met "Charley" when his bus arrived in Sanford. German exchange student Norbert Peters provided the language interpretation. Karoly's smile "won the hearts of Sanford Methodist Youth, maybe 'Charley' their hearts too," said First Methodist Church pastor Rev. T. C. O'Steen.

During his stay at the home of E. D. Kirchhoff, Karoly's knowledge of English increased and he was soon saying much more than "Tis good," and "okay." Soon he had a job and was paying his own way. He repaid the Methodist youth for his transportation and had enough savings left to go to Melrose.

Karoly will be helped with a job and a home by Sandor Barcza who also came to the United

States under the Methodist Committee on Overseas Relief program.

The Sanford Methodist Youth group now looks forward to helping another "Charley" Koppanyi, said Rev. O'Steen. "One who will probably say with our first 'Charley', 'Tis good to be in America where you speak with-out fear of being arrested by Communist cop.'"

## Grief-Stricken Family Pays Homage To Lanza

**HOLLYWOOD (UPI)**—The grief-stricken family and thousands of fans pay final homage today to Mario Lanza—the fabulously talented singer whose career was cut short by death at the age of 38.

A solemn Requiem Mass was scheduled at the Blessed Sacrament Catholic Church with entombment to follow at Calvary Mausoleum.

Antonio Cocozza, the pale, 72-

year-old father of Lanza threw himself on his son's casket Tuesday night before 1,500 mourners following recitation of Rosary at the church.

"Say something to me Freddy!" the grief-stricken man screamed. He pounded the casket and wept. Alfredo was Lanza's real first name.

Lanza's mother stood by her husband at the casket crying: "My baby, my baby, my baby."

## Canal, Post Office Coming, Sen. Smathers Tells County

Senator George Smathers gave Seminole County some encouragement on a couple of local projects last night, reviewed the actions of the Congress this year and put "every citizen" on notice that "there may have to be some belt tightening to win the struggle with Mr. Khrushchev."

He wouldn't say whether he will accept the nomination as Florida's favorite son candidate for the presidency, but his administrative assistant said a year or no announcement probably will be made next month.

He also estimated that great population gains will give Florida at least three more seats in the U. S. House of Representatives after the next census.

"And I would like to see all our young politicians concentrate on those House seats instead of the Senate," he joked.

Mayor A. L. Wilson presented Smathers with a key to the city and State Sen. Douglas Stenstrom introduced him.

Smathers told members of the civic clubs present at the dinner in his honor here that the Sanford-Titusville Canal "will be recognized as feasible by the U. S. engineers" and said that "expanded post office facilities can be expected, probably next year."

The engineers finally have agreed that the cross-state canal is justified as a transportation link and "they surely will find the same answer on the Sanford-Titusville canal," the senator said.

Smathers gave an eloquent explanation of why he thinks the visit to this country by Nikita Khrushchev resulted in gains for the free world in the cold war.

"Mr. Khrushchev saw this nation as it really is and not as his propagandists had painted it. He saw why our productivity makes us strong and why it makes our free enterprise system superior to his system," Smathers said.

"And we saw him as he really is—a hard man, zealously dedicated to communism. Now we know that we have a long, hard battle against Mr. Khrushchev to keep

our friendly nations on our side. "During his visit he agreed to negotiate more with us, but every citizen must face the possibility of at some time tightening belts in the struggle to keep the democracies strong."

Smathers called the lag in U. S. missile production "a terrible indictment of somebody," but said he "wouldn't go into that now."

Florida's junior senator called the new labor reform bill "a good bill, long overdue to check union leaders who have become arrogantly contemptuous of the public."

The housing, airport and highway bills passed by the first session of this Congress are "minimum bills and we tried to get better," he said.

The civic dinner for Smathers, who is making a tour of the state, was arranged by the city manager's office with the cooperation of the various civic clubs. A turnout of 300 people gave the senator a rising ovation and he shook hands for 45 minutes after the dinner.

## New Rebellion Breaks Out In Cuba As Anti-Castro Bombers Hit Havana

HAVANA (UPI) — The Cuban Federation of Labor ordered 1,500,000 of its members to stage a one-hour work stoppage today to show their support for Premier Fidel Castro in the latest crisis affecting his regime.

The general strike order came after a series of bombings and an anti-Castro leaflet raid on Havana threw the city into temporary panic Wednesday night.

A count at emergency hospitals this morning showed that at least two Cubans were killed and almost 50 were wounded in the shooting and bombing activity. It climaxed an upsurge of opposition to Castro, put one of his top aides in prison and drove another suicide.

No one seemed certain of the number of planes that dropped the leaflets on the capital. The morning newspaper (information) reported that one large plane and three small planes were involved.

Other newspapers mentioned only a single plane. The confusion apparently was caused by the darkness and the many military planes sent up.

The air force planes fired on the leaflet-dropping aircraft, but the latter was not believed to have fired back. The flash of machine-gun fire from the military planes could be seen on the ground.

In calling the general strike for the hour between 3 and 4 p. m. David Salvador, secretary general of the federation, said the stoppage would be a manifestation that every worker was "supporting the revolution." He said it would not apply to electricity and telephones.

Other persons were believed to have been injured by motorized raiders who sped through the city later Wednesday night, tossing home-made bombs or hand grenades out of the windows of their cars.

Delegates to the convention of the American Society of Travel Agents that opened here Monday watched excitedly as warplanes roared low over Havana, their machine guns spitting fire. None of them was injured.

The air battle and the bombings caused momentary panic in the heart of Havana but the city's life went on much as usual. Night spots and gambling places remained open although there were few tourists on hand.

The leaflets that showered down on Havana were signed by Maj. Pedro L. Diaz Lanz, a former commander of the Cuban air force who resigned and fled to the United States last spring in protest against what he described as growing Red infiltration of Castro's revolutionary regime.

Thousands of leaflets fell in the vicinity of the hotels where the ASTA delegates are staying, but few of the American visitors could read them because they were written in Spanish.

## Legality Of T-H Law Attacked

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — A back-to-work court order in the 100-day steel strike was blocked for an indefinite period today when United Steelworkers Union attacked the Taft-Hartley Act as unconstitutional.

The union also challenged the government's claim that the strike imperiled the nation and said the lawsuit "could continue until 1960 without any adverse impact on the economy."

A panel of three judges ordered an indefinite stay of a back-to-work order handed down Wednesday in Pittsburgh. The stay merely supported another ruling which stayed off enforcing the injunction.

Judge John L. Biggs of the third U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals said the "stay will be continued until the arguments on the merits have been heard" — supporting Judge Austin L. Staley's ruling of Wednesday.

The United Steelworkers Union asked the judges to throw out a Taft-Hartley injunction in the steel strike on grounds that the government has not shown that the safety of the nation is imperiled.

"It is plainly not sufficient simply to submit an affidavit from the secretary of defense or some other government official stating that the strike creates a peril to national health or safety," union counsel Arthur J. Goldberg said.

Goldberg told the court that the burden of the government to supply testimony to support its conclusion "is not met simply by submitting an affidavit or simply stating that conclusion."

The union attorney said the government—in its appeal for the Taft-Hartley back-to-work injunction—did not explain its contention that production in "unstruck mills cannot meet the defense needs."

"It is not the burden of the defendant union to show that there is no peril to national health and safety," Goldberg said. "It was the burden of the plaintiff to show that there is."

Goldberg said Congress "did not mean to entrust to a single district judge" the right to "require free men to work or require free industry to operate."

"Once the injunction becomes effective, the damage is done," he said.

HICKORY, N. C. (UPI) — Sixteen students suffered minor injuries today when a loaded school bus ran off a dirt road and overturned in a ditch near here. The students, from the Sheriff's Ford elementary school near Catawba and from Handys High School at Catawba, were treated at a doctor's office and released.

**Plenty Of Water**  
MIAMI (UPI) The Everglades was brimful of water today after five days of deluging rains which drove animals and snakes out of their lairs to high ground. Though the rain caused discomfort to people, beasts and reptiles in the Everglades, it indirectly helped reduce the future mosquito population.

**Plane Crashes**  
NORFOLK, Va. (UPI) — An A42E Navy tanker plane crashed in the Mediterranean late Wednesday night as it was attempting a landing onto the aircraft carrier USS Saratoga.

The pilot was identified as Lt. Andrew J. Goodwin Jr. of Jacksonville.

WEST PALM BEACH (UPI) — The Palm Beach County School Board is studying an amended application of a Negro student to attend a white school here. William M. Holland, Negro attorney, originally applied for his son, William Jr., 8, to attend the white Northboro School.

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (UPI) — Border raiders from Honduras killed one Nicaraguan soldier Tuesday, wounded another and kidnapped an American and two Nicaraguans, it was announced today. An Army communique said a number of the raiders are believed to have been wounded in a skirmish with a small Nicaraguan force in the town of Quallah.

## Ike Shifts Space Program To NASA And Plans To Ask For More Money

AUGUSTA, Ga. (UPI) — President Eisenhower told a news conference today that he plans to ask Congress for higher appropriations next year for the American space program.

The chief executive also said that if Maj. Gen. John H. Medaris, who has announced his retirement as head of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, has any complaints he would like to hear them personally.

The President touched on a broad range of space and missile topics today as reporters pilled him with numerous questions streaming from his announcement Wednesday that the Army Ballistic Missile Agency will be shifted to the civilian National Aeronautics and Space Agency "to strengthen the national space effort."

Mildly but still plainly, Eisenhower rejected the theory of Medaris as stated by a reporter, "that we are straddling the issue of competing with Russia in space."

Administration sources said today they hoped Congress would give quick approval to Eisenhower's reshuffling.

The administration wants to avoid a long drawn-out congressional inquiry into the transfer of the famed Werner von Braun rocket team from the Army to the civilian space agency when the Senate and House reconvene in January.

But initial reaction from congressional military experts indicated the lawmakers want to take a careful look at the shift. The reorganization would become effective 60 days after Congress was officially notified of the plans unless rejected by the Senate or House.

Von Braun said he looked forward to working with the civilian agency. He said the "major concern" of his team was to continue to take part in the U. S. space program.

One of the chief advantages of the shift, administration sources said, could be a speed-up in development of the Saturn rocket booster which will have 1,500,000 pounds of thrust — more than twice the power of the rockets Russia is believed using in its Lunik programs.

The Saturn is the major project at the Army Ballistic Missile Agency in Huntsville, Ala., where the team of scientists and technicians headed by Von Braun is based.

## Ike Favors West Summit Meet Soon As Possible

AUGUSTA, Ga. (UPI) — President Eisenhower said today that he still strongly favors a Western summit conference as soon as possible, but told reporters he does not feel the same sense of urgency about a full-scale summit meeting with Soviet Russia.

Other major news from the President's conference with reporters:

He called "fixed" television quiz shows, as revealed in recent congressional disclosures, a terrible thing to do to the American people. He said he had asked Atty. Gen. William P. Rogers to determine the proper role of the Federal Communications Commission.

Despite his use of the Taft-Hartley labor management law, he is still hopeful that both sides in the steel strike will, as he put it, awaken to their obligations to the American people and resolve their differences in free collective bargaining.

He looked askance for the time being at additional labor legislation, saying he opposed the idea of adding to punitive laws. But on the other hand, he said, if the American people do not exercise the required self-discipline in their economic disputes the role of government in such disputes will have to be re-examined.

He disclosed that the "cold" he contracted three years ago actually was bronchitis which has become chronic. He said that in late September he found himself suffering from an acute cold and as he put it, a flu attack on top of it. This was why he went to Palm Springs, Calif., and why he has been searching for warm weather since then. The President seemed to be feeling fine and in excellent spirits today.

## Quints Mother Wants Children

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (UPI) — Pretty Mrs. Charles G. Hannan said today in her first interview since she gave birth to quintuplets that she wants more children and hopes they are girls.

She gave birth Tuesday in Lackland Air Force Base hospital to five girls, all of whom died because they were three months premature.

Her husband, an Air Force first lieutenant and aerial tanker navigator, sat on her bed today while she talked to two women reporters.

"I can't believe it all happened to me," she said. "I am happy to have brought five daughters into the world. I understand God's will; not his why."

She wore a flowered bed jacket and lipstick and seemed in good spirits. Her spirits actually seemed better than those of her husband. Mrs. Hannan, a blonde, is 27.

Hannan said she had told his sons about what happened.

"The older boy (5) understood but I don't think the smaller boy (4) did," he said. "Robert seemed quiet and sort of withdrawn because he had been anxious to have a sister."

The babies—Deborah Lynn, Janet Lee, Karen Denise, Melissa Jane and Suzanna Kay—will be buried Friday in separate coffins in Taylor, Tex., the hometown of the Hannans.

## Italian Writer Wins Nobel Prize

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (UPI) — The 1959 Nobel Prize for Literature was awarded today to Salvatore Quasimodo, a left-leaning Italian poet who once wrote that the Soviets took over God's work when they launched their first Sputnik.

It appeared the awarding of the prize to the 55-year-old Quasimodo might touch off a major controversy in Italy where Roman Catholics were outraged by his reference to "God's work" in his poem "The New Moon."

The winning of the prize also may alienate anti-Communist elements who look askance at Quasimodo's falling in step with Communist attacks last year on Russia's Boris Pasternak who won the 1958 Nobel Prize for Literature. Quasimodo described Pasternak as a little bourgeois who lives like a lord.

## Bribery-Lottery Trial Of 4 Men May Go To Jury

CLEARWATER (UPI) — Defense attorneys for two leading St. Petersburg Republicans and a pair of Tampa men began presentation of their case today in a bribery-trial that could go to a jury later in the day.

The state rested its case Wednesday and Circuit Judge John U. Bird immediately denied a defense motion for a directed verdict.

## One Way To Prove A Point

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI) — A freshman at the University of California ended a 50-hour hunger strike against the school's compulsory military training program Wednesday at the request of his father—an Air Force colonel.

The youth, 18-year-old Frederick Lawrence Moore Jr., withdrew from the university and departed for his home in Arlington, Va., with Col. Moore.

Young Moore started his hunger strike at midnight Sunday to protest, as a conscientious objector, the university's compulsory ROTC program.

Col. Moore, who is assigned to the Pentagon's Research and Development Command in Washington, met with his son and Dean William Shepard to discuss the protest and to arrange for his "honorable dismissal" from the university.

"We talked it over and decided he had gotten the response he was seeking," the colonel said.

"It wasn't fair to be any more of a burden on the university."

The 116-pound youth got a definite response to his strike — although he lost eight pounds during the protest. By Wednesday morning he had more than 1,000 signatures, some of them from ROTC members, on a petition to put the training program on a voluntary basis.

He also gained the backing of the 15,000-member Associated Students of the University of California, which will hold a mass meeting on the question Friday.

Col. Moore described his son as a deep and thoughtful youth "who has read a lot of philosophy."

"Sometimes I wish he had read some comics or something lighter once in a while," the father added.

## Kit Makes Satellite Tracking Easy

SAN CARLOS, Calif. (UPI) — School in Redwood City, Calif., wrote down the perigee, apogee and orbit time, which had been published in the newspapers.

That he went to work with a home tracker and two hours later had drawn up a schedule of a dozen cities with the time the satellite would pass over each.

The home tracker was developed by W. O. Holmes, an inventor, writer and astronomer, who was perched in his private observatory in the ghost town of Dayton, Nev., when the Russians launched Sputnik 1 in October, 1957. Celestial navigation was his specialty and he immediately went to work tracking the Soviet satellite and later, others launched from both sides of the Iron Curtain.

Holmes found that, using a few fairly simple charts, he could calculate where a satellite would be at any particular time once he knew its farthest distance from earth (apogee), its closest distance (perigee) and the time it needed to complete one orbit.

He developed these charts further and then conferred with several space scientists. West, Research Publications, Inc., added some space art and the charts were ready for anyone interested in tracking the man-made moons.

George Dunton, manager of the Alex Morrison Planetarium in San Francisco, said it is possible to keep track of satellites by Holmes' method.

Other experts agreed, but pointed to the system's limitations. Joseph Brady, a missile expert at the University of California, said, for example, it was unlikely any such tracker could take atmospheric drag into account.

Using only the home tracker and maps, a 14-year-old boy was able to predict accurately the times when Discoverer V would pass over various cities of the world.

When the Air Force launched the satellite Aug. 13, George Kirchner, a student at Sequoia High

CASE C — 478: Dolly M., aged 4, has a superior I. Q.  
"But, Dr. Crane," her mother protested, "Dolly will not eat properly."  
"Why, she just dawdles along for an hour or two, and even then would scarcely touch her food if her daddy and I didn't coax her to clean her plate."  
"Doesn't she look too thin? I'm afraid she may contract tuberculosis or something."  
"What can we do to improve her appetite? Does she need a tonic?"

**SOCIAL TONICS**  
Yes, Dolly needs a tonic of the "social" variety.  
Alone, in a modern city apartment house, she lacks proper incentive for athletic. She doesn't romp and play enough to gain a healthy appetite.  
For adults, even though they think they spend a lot of time with their children, cannot equal the stimulation of other youngsters.  
And Dolly should have had a baby brother or sister at least two years ago.  
Space your youngsters so they are preferably within two years of each other. Then wait a few years if you wish another pair, but try to have your children two by two.

## Citrus Picture Called 'Rosy'

LAKELAND (UPI) — Florida Citrus Mutual is picturing a rosy citrus season despite its prediction that the overall return on the orange crop will be less than last season.  
Mutual General Manager Robert W. Rutledge came up with an encouraging forecast which he presented Wednesday to Mutual's directors.  
The market analysis showed that current prices for oranges and grapefruit are not as high as they were at the same time last year. But it pointed out that the current supply is much greater than the supply at this time last year.  
Rutledge said the over-all return for oranges this season should be "considerably more than that of the 1956-57 season but less than last season."  
He also said a supply-demand relationship will bring on some adjustments in the pricing pattern — with comparatively more fruit going into fresh channels and less to frozen orange concentrate.  
The directors, acting on the advice of their advisory committee, took no action on a proposal that a "starting date" be set for initial fresh fruit shipments to Northern markets at the beginning of each season.

## Li. Col. Moye Gets Honors From Army

A Sanford native, Lt. Col. Ralph G. Moye, has been awarded the Army's Commendation Ribbon with metal pendant for his research and findings in artillery gunnery and for discovering the mismatch in the ballistic of the eight inch howitzer atomic round-spotting round combination.  
The son of Mrs. M. E. Moye, 232 W. 11th St., Sanford, received the award from Colonel Eugene Surwyk, commanding officer of the 21st Artillery Group, in a recent ceremony at Henuu, Germany.  
Lt. Col. Moye, a Seminole High and U. of F. graduate, furnished ordnance with corrective data to provide the basis for a new firing table addendum after he discovered the howitzer round mismatch. If the lack of ballistic match had not been found the battlefield atomic capability of the eight inch howitzer "would have been seriously impaired," according to Army officials.  
Col. Moye also developed a new approach to the solution of the artillery gunnery problem, which proved to be more accurate and less time-consuming than standard practices.

Besides, they permit a child to romp and play. Such activity strengthens his muscles and drains off surplus nervous energy via juvenile games.  
As a result, his appetite improves so he devours his food with gusto.  
We psychologists aren't much concerned over their writing the alphabet or the crayon drawings of children in nursery school for they can pick up those skills later on.  
But toddlers need to learn how to harmonize socially with others of their own age.  
This give-and-take is a prelude to later adult happiness and even an antidote for divorce.  
So launch your children into nursery school at least by the age of 3 years. If no such school is in your area, urge a local church to start one, with the Women's Society as sponsor.  
**FOOD TONICS**  
And you parents should NEVER let meal time degenerate into theatricals where you beg and coax or dramatize the simple matter of eating.  
Otherwise, your child will soon be ruling you with an iron hand. Instead, see that your youngster has plenty of outdoor and nursery school play.  
Then place the food before him. Smile and go on eating your own meal.  
If the child dawdles, remind him he can't have dessert unless he cleans his plate. And don't let him outbluff you: Stick to your guns.  
If he doesn't eat, then take him from the table when you adults are finished, and don't grow sentimental about his starvation.  
He will try to dominate you for one or two meals, or sometimes longer, but a healthy child will always surrender if you adults don't do so first.

# Editorials

## Decision May Be Forced On Union Political Funds

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The National Labor Relations Board has reached the decision in a case which probably will compel the courts to decide, finally, on the propriety of the union's political activities.

The issue raised involves minority and individual rights of union members. The union of the meat and poultry packers has been the subject of a long and bitter fight. In the TV case, which arose in Michigan, three electrical unions held that if minority rights were involved at all, this was simply the concern of internal union management.

"To date," these three suggested, "unions have operated under the assumption that they were not to be involved in political activity."

The three were Chief Justice Earl Warren and Associate Justices Tom Clark and William O. Douglas.

## Milk Production Costs Are Studied

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The University of Florida has today the first report of the study of the cost of milk production in the state.

The report showed that costs in the Central Florida area averaged 22.6 cents a gallon while in the Northeast Florida area the average was 23.5 cents.

The commission has contracted with the university to make the study to enable it to better control and regulate the milk industry.

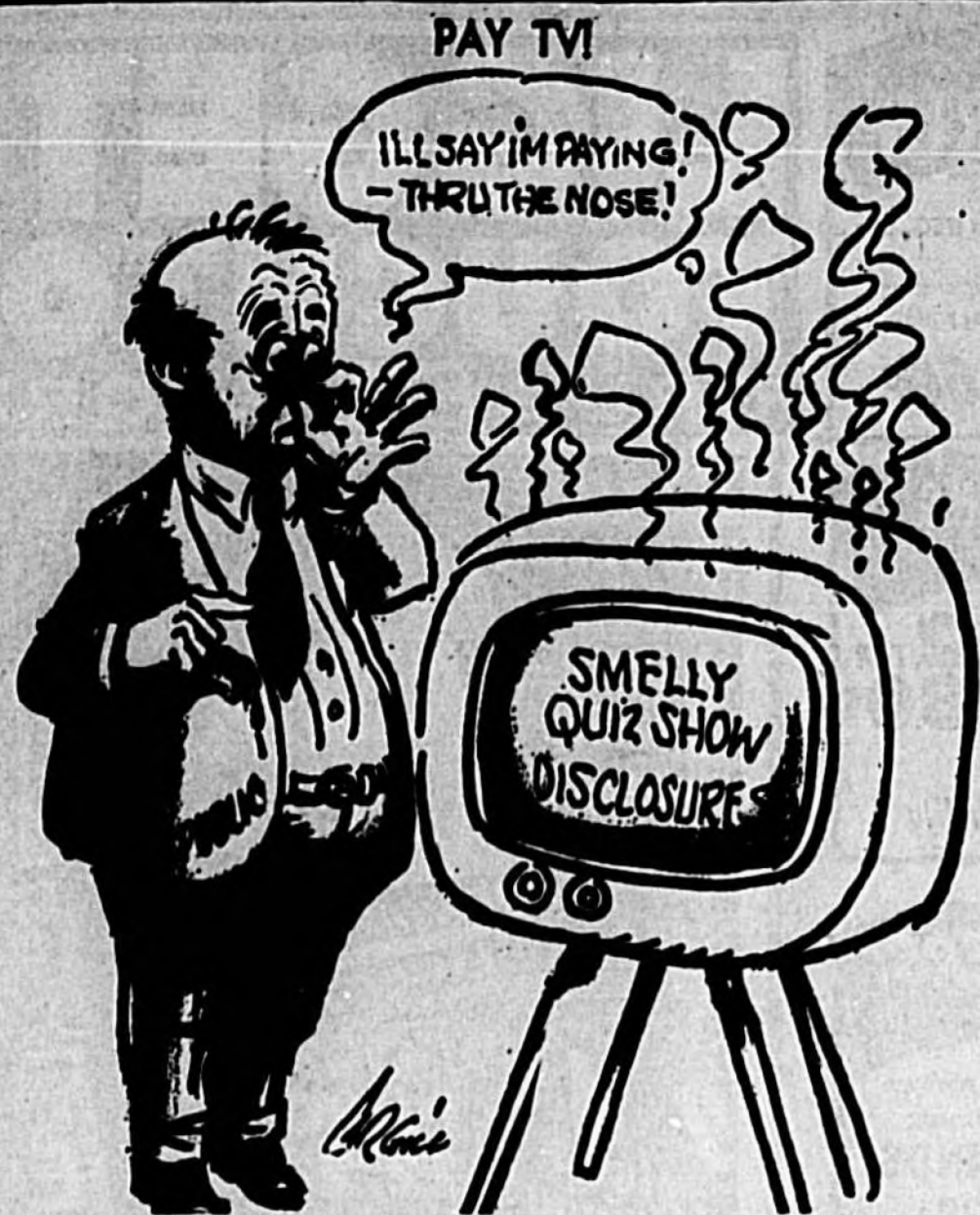
Present producer prices, which are controlled by the commission, were set on the basis of what farmers said they needed to keep their businesses in the black.

However, the study showed that the average price paid to the farmer was 18.5 cents a gallon. The average price paid to the processor was 22.6 cents.

The commission did not act on the report, indicating it would be studied prior to any action. However, producers indicated they might ask the commission to use the price paid them for their milk.

WASHINGTON — It may be that the best news of the past few days was that General George Catlett Marshall will receive his just due as a self-satisfied man in this country soon far more than it has ever known.

The treatment accorded him during the latter years of his life has been only too well known. It is a shame that the man who has given the world the greatest gift of the war, the Marshall Plan, should have been treated in this manner.

How to stop the most wasteful and destructive of all nations had ever perpetrated on itself, how to make the public understand what it meant, this was his only consideration as he sat at his desk and looked with the remote, seemingly impersonal gaze on the map of Europe.

## Civilians Often Go Unpunished While Overseas

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Justice Department told the Supreme Court today that a 1957 ruling on over-sea-marital has allowed civilians to go unpunished for crimes committed overseas with the armed forces.

Government attorney Oscar Davis gave this report in the high tribunal as arguments began on four cases dealing with the power of the military to try civilians abroad. He said there just isn't an "acceptable alternative" to the military trials.

Chief Justice Earl Warren and several of the associate justices showed keen interest in Davis' statement and asked for details. The 1957 ruling held that in a capital case a servicewife accompanying her husband aboard is not subject to trial by court-martial. The decision was reached in the cases of two wives convicted of murdering their husbands.

Justice John M. Harlan asked Davis if the armed forces have gone ahead with trials in non-capital cases since the high court ruling.

Davis said the answer was yes but that the military had been "submitting a great deal of reports." In 1956, he explained, there were 121 overseas court-martials of dependents and other civilians, but the number dropped to 35 in 1957 and to 34 in 1958. "The number of offenses has increased, however," Davis said. Warren asked if those not tried by the military were brought into any other court.

He said they were not tried at all, Davis answered. Justice Potter Stewart wanted to know if these people committed "the less serious offenses."

Davis said in general this was true, although some "minor offenses" may have been included in the unpunished group. But he added that "no capital cases or homicides" have gone unpunished.

## Persian Beauty May Marry Rich Shah

TEHRAN, Iran (UPI)—Farah Diba, a home-grown Persian beauty, refused even to admit today she might marry Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi. But she made it clear they wouldn't have to drag her to the altar.

The 24-year-old Farah would neither confirm nor deny reports of an impending betrothal announcement. But the marriage reports were circulated by her relatives, court social circles and the nation's press.

The 39-year-old Shah maintained a royal silence although it was generally believed he would announce his engagement to Farah on his 40th birthday next Tuesday.

As for Farah . . . "Naturally you can't expect me to say anything on this matter or even hint anything until this matter is decided," she told United Press International.

"I will accept any decision that is made in regard to me, and I personally am not at all sure about the outcome." The Shah admittedly has been hunting a bride to bear him a male heir to the throne since he dissolved his marriage with former Queen Soraya.

Neither Soraya nor his first wife, Princess Faqia of Egypt and sister of ex-King Farouk, produced a son. Princess Faqia produced a daughter, Soraya had no children.

Farah's relatives flatly stated the Shah's search for a bride ended in Paris last May when he renewed his acquaintance with Farah.

"We're beginning to feel practically certain the marriage will take place," one relative said. "The official announcement will be made within a month."

Farah is no stranger to Iranian royal circles. She is a close friend of the Shah's daughter, Princess Shahnaz. She also has a foot inside the palace door because her uncle, Isfandiar Tabatabai, is a member of the Parliament and is the Shah's adjutant. Her father, who died 10 years ago, was a foreign ministry official.

She also has a less-discussed royal connection. She is a step-niece of the Shah's former arch political enemy, former Iranian Premier Mohammed Mossadegh.

## U. N. Hits Out At Red China On Tibet Crisis

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI)—The United Nations gave overwhelming condemnation late Wednesday to Chinese Communist actions in Tibet and turned today to the pressing problem of world disarmament.

Jules Moch of France was listed as the principal speaker in the main political committee debate on disarmament. Also listed to speak were representatives of Italy, Greece, Romania and Cuba.

France and Italy are members of the 10-nation disarmament committee, formed by the Big Four foreign ministers, who will meet in Geneva in February to take up the arms reduction plans discussed before the 82-member world organization here.

Most veteran U. N. diplomatic observers admittedly were surprised by the overwhelming margin for indirect U. N. censure of the Peiping regime's oppressions of human rights in Tibet.

The General Assembly voted 45 to 9, with 26 abstentions, for an Irish-Malayan resolution calling for "respect for the fundamental human rights of the Tibetan people and for their distinctive cultural and religious life." The vote came after two days of debate.

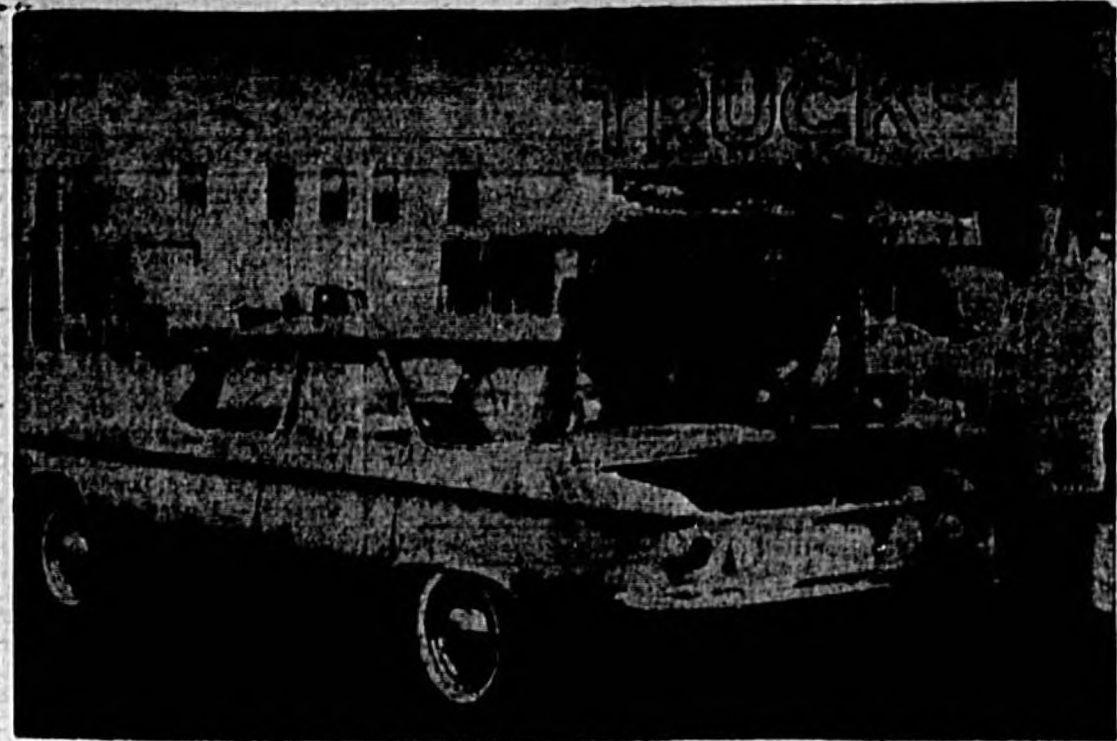
The censure was an indirect one. The motion did not even mention Communist China by name. The Peiping regime is not a member of the United Nations and many speakers, including U. S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge, conceded there was nothing the organization could do to help the Tibetans.

The United States supported the resolution. Great Britain and France were among those which abstained.

## County Begins Study To Find Way To Control Flood Water

### Loch Arbor, Tanglewood Temple Terrace 'Critical'

The Seminole County Commission has authorized an engineering survey of three critical areas in the county to control flooding, Chairman John Krider said today.

The three areas termed "critical" by Krider are Loch Arbor, Tanglewood and Temple Terrace.

Krider said the survey is being done by the engineering firm of Lottor and Bush of Sanford.

The purpose of the survey is to determine what the county can do on flooding conditions in these areas and to "clean up" the critical drainage problem there.

Krider said that lakes in the county are at their highest level in 30 years and the recent rainy spell has added to the woes of residents in these areas.

County Engineer Bob Davis said this morning that the biggest problem now is that there are no outlets for overflows for some of the larger lakes in the area.

"I don't know what will do if these rains continue," he said.

"We have the threat of many lakes overflowing unless the rains let up," Davis emphasized.

One possible way to alleviate the problem is installation of new pipes in these flooded areas that will have sufficient capacity to carry off the excess water in a reasonable length of time, Davis said.

Another serious problem, Davis said, is that many flooded septic tanks are not functioning and are creating a health menace.

Krider said the commission plans to take emergency measures when possible as they have been bombarded with complaints from all over the county.

A survey is being made to find the necessary width and length of a proposed ditch to drain the Temple Terrace and Tanglewood areas, Davis said. A path has been cleared for the mile-long channel to run from Tanglewood to Eastbrook in Winter Park where a ditch built by Orange County starts.

Even if Temple Terrace and Tanglewood residents decide they don't want to pay part of the ditch's cost, the survey information will be valuable, since ultimately a permanent drainage system must be made available to the south Seminole area, Davis explained.

If residents don't participate in a drainage system plan, a permanent system will be delayed for Temple Terrace and Tanglewood, Davis said. However, the county may pay for taking off the flood waters sooner, he explained.

The cost of a drainage district to residents of the area should be known in six weeks, Davis said.

Complaints about washouts and flooding should be made to the engineer's office, Krider said.

### Living Costs Reach New Record High

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Living costs climbed to an all-time high in September, the government reported today.

Consumer prices rose for all major groups of goods and services except transportation. Food, housing, medical care and personal services all cost more.

The Labor Department's consumer price index rose four-tenths of a point from August to a September level of 125.2. The index is based on a 1947-1948 average of prices taken as 100.

The September index meant that a market basket of goods and services costing \$10 a decade ago cost \$12.52 last month.

The index has gone up in five of the past six months. It dipped slightly in August after setting a record of 124.9 in July.

The Labor Department's price chief, H. E. Riley, pointed out that some of the increase in food prices was seasonal. He said the outlook for October and November was for declines in food prices, possibly including big reductions in meat costs.

#### March Postponed

DETROIT (UPI)—Negro Congressman Charles C. Diggs of Detroit today informed Mississippi Gov. J. P. Coleman that he has "postponed for the time being" his proposed "national march on Mississippi."

#### Clash Kills 17

NEW DELHI (UPI)—Chinese Communists killed 17 Indian soldiers, wounded three and captured two in a clash Wednesday at a point 40 miles inside Ladakh. It was announced officially today. The Indians protested, but the announcement said the Red Chinese accused the Indian forces of intruding into their territory.

#### Army Drops Project

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Army has dropped a \$7,500,000 food preservative project after experiments with animals showed the new high-energy atomic process resulted in possible radiation damage. Some congressmen and newsmen had eaten food subjected to the process but they were assured they were in no danger.

#### Rickover Wins Fight

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A federal judge ruled today that Vice Adm. Hyman G. Rickover is entitled to copyright his public speeches if he wants to. Judge Alexander Holtzoff of the U. S. Court for the District of Columbia denied a publisher's claim that Rickover's speeches were public property and could not be copyrighted.

#### 4 Missing In Crash

PORTLAND, Ore. (UPI)—Four men are missing in the crash of two jet fighter-interceptors which collided on a routine training mission Thursday night east of here. Air Force operations officers at Portland Air Base said the downed planes, both F-99H Scorpions, were manned by members of the 123rd Oregon Air National Guard Fighter-Interceptor Squadron based at Portland International Airport.

#### Art Show Deadline Set By Association

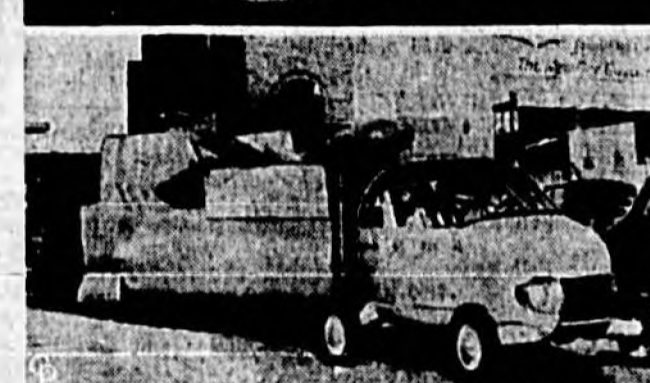
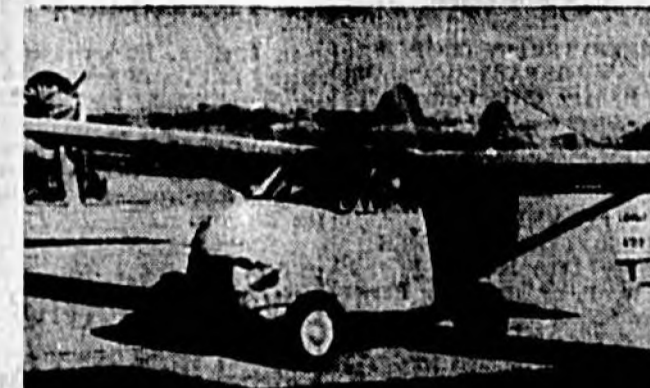
The Sanford Art Association has set Nov. 9 as deadline for exhibitors to register for the Nov. 23 art show.

### Van Doren Admits Giving DA Office Wrong Answer

NEW YORK (UPI)—Dist. Atty. Frank Hogan said today that Charles Van Doren has admitted he gave an incorrect answer to the district attorney's office when questioned as to whether he had received questions or answers while winning \$129,000 on the television quiz show "Twenty-One."

Hogan refused to say whether Van Doren admitted receiving any questions or answers in advance of his appearance on the TV show.

Asked if Van Doren, in appearing at the district attorney's office, had given incorrect answers to the same questions asked by a grand jury, Hogan said: "You will have to conclude that they were in the same area."

Doren previously had told the grand jury that he did not receive either questions or answers in advance.

"I think he gave truthful answers today," Hogan said, referring to a 5-minute conference with the 33-year-old Columbia University instructor.

Van Doren, who said he met with Hogan of his own volition, told reporters on leaving the district attorney's office: "I'm sorry, I can't comment. I'm in a hurry. I have a class."

Years of a federal crackdown on TV quiz shows spurred major networks today to police their programming practices.

President Eisenhower got the clean-up operation into high gear Thursday after he ordered the Justice Department to investigate the rigging of television shows.

The president, at his vacation retreat in Atlantic, Ga., said that if true, the practice was deplorable and "a terrible thing to do to the American public."

The Justice Department in Washington announced immediately that "Appropriate action will be taken."

The Columbia Broadcasting System, first of the major networks to voluntarily police its programming practices, already has dropped quiz shows and give-away programs.

John A. Aaron and Jesse Zousmer, co-producers of the popular interview program, "Person-to-Person," resigned Thursday after CBS President Frank Stanton revealed the program was rehearsed.

Aaron and Zousmer accused Stanton of making an "unwarranted slur" about the program and requested release from their contracts. Stanton agreed and accepted their resignations.

"All I have asked you is that you inform the viewing public of the production practices on 'Person-to-Person' so that the program can be exactly what it purports to be," Stanton said in a letter to the co-producers.

The National Broadcasting Company, whose quiz shows have been the chief targets of congressional investigators, pledged its full cooperation to the attorney general in his investigation.

The National Broadcasting Company, which has not been involved in any charges, had no immediate comment.

In Chicago, Earl W. Kintner, chairman of the Federal Trade Commission, said that thus far "there can be no doubt that the self-policing job was muffed and added that the question of self-discipline was basic to the network's survival."

### Disillusioned Fighters Form Anti-Castro Underground

MIAMI (UPI)—The former commander of Fidel Castro's air force said Thursday an anti-Castro underground has been formed by former comrades-in-arms of the Cuban revolutionary leader.

The ex-officer also blamed Cuban government anti-aircraft fire for the death of two persons during a leaflet-dropping air raid on Havana Wednesday. He said the government attempted to make it appear the leaflet airplanes caused the deaths by dropping bombs.

Pedro Diaz Lanz, who quit Castro because he said Communists were taking over the revolution, said the object of the new organization was to "bring democracy to Cuba."

Diaz Lanz, in a gesture sure to draw the special ire of Castro supporters, said the name of the underground is "the 26th of July Anti-Communist Movement," Castro's own revolutionary party is named "the 26th of July," from the date Castro landed in Cuba several years ago.

Diaz Lanz said it was made up of "thousands" like himself who fought with Castro but became disillusioned because of Red influence.

Diaz Lanz refused to be drawn out on the specific aims of the new organization. He refused to answer the question of whether the movement planned to overthrow the Castro regime, or if it contemplated violence.

Diaz Lanz denied Cuban charges that he was responsible for the leaflet dropping, but hinted that the new organization was behind it.

Castro today promised to turn all of Cuba into a great armed camp to battle mounting counter-revolutionary attacks and "bombings" by planes which he said were based in the United States. His promise to mobilize "all workers, farmhands, professionals and even down to and including our women," came near the end of a marathon television appearance in which he delivered his bitterest attack yet against the United States.

The broadcast ended at 3 a. m. Castro called a huge rally for 4 p. m. Monday in Havana to protest what he called the economic and military threats of the United States against his revolutionary government. He said details of the rally would be carried out by the Cuban Confederation of Workers.

Throughout his long speech Castro castigated the United States for permitting Florida-based planes to "bomb" Cuba and asked what would the U. S. reaction be if Canadian planes bombed automobile plants in the United States and the capital city of Washington.

### Meat-Packers End Seven Week Strike

CHICAGO (UPI)—Agreement was reached Thursday night to end a seven-week-old strike by 17,000 workers against Swift & Co., giant of the meat-packing industry.

Spokesmen for the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen and the United Packinghouse Workers predicted most of the strikers would be back on their jobs by Monday.

Union officers said picket lines would remain at Swift plants around the country until local unions approved the agreement.

The two-year pact called for pay hikes ranging from 8 1/2 to 15 cents an hour.

Workers in the South received the lower wage increase, Swift said, to keep costs in line with competitive conditions there.

This was seen as a major victory for the company. The two unions had waged a bitter fight for equal pay for all areas of the country.

But Swift negotiators fought against higher pay for the South, contending that pay to workers in the area "already far exceeded that of competing companies."

### \$105,000 In Funds Unaccounted For

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Auditors are unable to account for \$33,000 worth of supplies and \$72,000 in fees because of poor records in the State Department of Education.

State Auditor Bryan Willis said Thursday "no opinion could be expressed" on the accountability of the supplies, which were office supplies used by the department. He said the reason was inadequate records.

Willis said the \$72,000 was in fees from teacher certification and accreditation.
