## Lake Mary police hunt down purse snatcher

LAKE MARY — A man with a recent arrest history for possession of cocaine and fleeing and eluding police officers led the Lake Mary Police Department on a high speed chase near the Lake Mary and Sanford border Wednesday after he was involved in a purse snatching.

The chase began after 24-year-old Robert Guy stole a woman's purse, with force, at the Publix in Timucuan.

Police began pursuit of Guy at 46-A and Airport Boulevard. Lake Mary Police Department Commander Steve Bracknell said the suspect was heading toward Sanford. Police, who had set up a block in, but Guy broke through it, he said.

Guy brushed the side of Bracknell's pants, and that's when Bracknell said the rules changed.

"There was transfer mud from his car to me,"

## Agents find drugs in picture frame bound for Sanford

SANFORD — U.S. Customs intercepted a shipment of cocaine from a country in the Caribbean Nov. 26 that led to the arrest of a local businessman in Sanford.

Edgardo Rodriguez, 44, of Stonebark Cove in Sanford, was charged with trafficking and smuggling cocaine into the country.

Rodriguez owns a small business in the Fulton Office Center on Fulton Street.

Customs agents contacted the Seminole County Sheriff's Office on Nov. 26 about a picture frame they had intercepted containing 45 grams of cocaine hidden inside. Agents had to drill a hole in the picture frame to find the cocaine.

Sheriff spokesman Steve Olson said Thursday that U.S. Customs, now called Immigration and Customs Enforcement, or ICE, keeps an eye out for drugs when

## Middle school rezoning pushed back to February

SANFORD — A decision to delay a final vote by the School Board on middle school rezoning will put the district about a month behind in preparations to open Markham Woods Middle School in August.

"It's not anything we can't overcome," said Ron Pinnell, executive director for secondary education — middle schools for Seminole County Public Schools.

A Core Committee working on middle school rezoning in the northwest section of the county has studied 42 plans. Thirteen rezoning plans remain.

Markham Woods will pull students from Greenwood Lakes Middle School in Lake Mary and

## Jett Aire waits to sue city for \$100 million

SANFORD — Jett Aire will have to wait a few more months to find out if they will go to trial against the city of Sanford, the Sanford Airport Authority and Orlando Sanford International, Inc.

At the motion for final summary hearing this past week, 18th Judicial Circuit Judge Nancy Alley heard from city, authority, and OSI lawyers, on several summary motions, but reserved her ruling on most of the motions.

The founder of Jett Aire seeks more than \$100 million in the lawsuit, claiming secret meetings cheated the business

out of a 20-year agreement.

The case began in the late 1990s, and has almost six years of discovery, lawyers said during the hearings.

Jett Aire alleged that the defendants violated an October 1994 agreement stipulating Jett Aire as the Fixed Base Operator providing jet fuel at the airport.

Attorneys for the defendants argued that there was no violation of the agreement because there were no stipulations for exclusive fueling rights for Jett Aire.

Jett Aire claimed that the city of Sanford and the Airport Authority held secret meetings that eventually led to the cre-



Contestants may enter only one of four categories including: best lighting, best lawn display, overall holiday spirit and most creative.


Judging will take place Thursday, Dec. 15. Winners will be announced Friday, Dec. 16. Prizes will be awarded to the winners.

shipments come into the United States.

The Sheriff's Office had undercover agents deliver the package, which was sent through shipping firm DHL.

The picture frame was addressed to 655 W. Fulton Ave., Suite No. 4. Rodriguez signed for the

package on Nov. 29. A judge signed an anticipatory search warrant prior to the delivery.

About 20 minutes after delivering the picture frame to the business, agents executed the search warrant and Rodriguez was arrested for trafficking in cocaine and smuggling cocaine into the state of Florida.

Olson said that not many details are being released about the case right now because there is an ongoing investigation.

He said although 20 ounces of cocaine doesn't seem like a lot, it's still smuggling. It's not

like Miami, Olson explained, where you'll see boats being ripped apart with drugs hidden throughout.

"It's still smuggling and trafficking in cocaine," Olson said. "It's something that you just can't dismiss or ignore."

Olson said that the arrest could lead agents to more leads into cocaine and drug trafficking in the area.

"It goes to show there are all those ways that cocaine, and drugs in general, can be transported," Olson said. "Picture frames — that's not an everyday thing you run into."

Tuesday at Millennium, officials decided to push the completion date back to February.

"What we wanted to do was make sure we built enough time into our schedule to allow for a comprehensive and thorough review of the plans to be presented and discussed at our next meeting," Pinnell said Thursday. That meeting is Monday, Dec. 5 in the Sanford Middle School Media Center.

In the past the School Board has taken public input and made a decision that same night as to what plan they want to advertise as the final one, Pinnell said. More time is now built into the schedule to allow digestion of public input.

Deadlines to submit proposals for rezoning had been pushed back as well, but at this point nothing new can be submitted. Some people still wanted more time, he said, but all that can be done now is to suggest tweaking plans currently under consideration.

"We just had to stop and

say 42 plans is a lot of plans," Pinnell said. "We're getting close to the decision time."

A goal had been to have the plan in place before the district's schools perform what is known as rollover, meaning they move students to the next grade in the district's computer system. Pinnell said the district is devising a plan to help school's do that, since the rezoning will take longer than originally expected.

Discussion among Core Committee members and parents continues to be the same as in previous elementary, middle and high school rezoning processes.

The district wants to meet parameters that will satisfy a court mandated decree to integrate schools. Parents want their children to attend the school closest to them for the most part.

Pinnell said there has been "intense" dialogue between the U.S. Justice Department, which oversees the federal consent decree, and school officials.

"We're getting close to the

point of closure with them," Pinnell said. He added that even in districts without desegregation orders, rezoning is always a difficult process.

"There's always someone on the other side of a boundary line that wants to be on the other side," Pinnell said. That could apply to property zoning, county lines, many aspects of government, he suggested.

He also mentioned that with the current zoning for middle schools, not everybody is going to the closest school.

"We've got close to 600 students choosing to attend Millennium and Sanford," he said, referring to the choice programs at the schools. "These are excellent schools, it's just a matter of habit because some residents have been at one particular school. They know the teachers and the lay of the land, and it's difficult to adjust to something new."

The Core Committee has struggled with these same concerns, he said.

ation of a new category of Fixed Based Operator that favored Orlando Sanford International, Inc.

Jett Aire argued that in 1999 the city and the authority began doing business with OSI, which at the time did not meet FBO standards.

Lawyers for Jett Aire, Bill Pringle and Cheney Mason, claim that the groups violated Florida's Sunshine Laws and engaged in conduct that put Jett Aire out of business.

The defendants claim that Jett Aire was a failing company from the beginning of their agreement, with bankruptcy problems. They said Jett Aire's financials show they lost money in 1996, 1997, and 1998.

"They'd still be operating there today if they hadn't gone out of business," OSI lawyer Todd Steggerda said in court Thursday.

Defendant attorneys want-

ed to know how a lawsuit could seek damages for more than \$100 million on anticipatory profits. They said Jett Aire needed proof of projected profits or a history of profitability over time. During this time, Jett Aire also had a construction lien for their property out at the airport, made by local contractor Spolski Construction. The property was foreclosed on, Steggerda told the judge.

"[Jett Aire] had a construction lien. They were a financially distressed company. [There is] no evidence to prove they were profitable," Steggerda said.

Mason said meetings between OSI and the Sanford Airport Authority didn't happen on accident. He also said that he's seen many cases go to trial where businesses sought damages based on projections.

"Let the jury prove it,"

Mason said. "It's not just pie in the sky. We had contracts."

Alley told Mason and Pringle that they would have to show some reasonable evidence that Jett Aire would have stayed in business.

Lawyer Steggerda told the judge on Tuesday that profits 40 years into the future is a lottery ticket.

"That's why they're working so hard to get it in front of a jury," Steggerda said.

Alley signed an order for partial summary judgement in regard to the International Terminal. The court will be reviewing the affidavits on an item by item basis, the clerk records showed.

The hearings have been pushed back to the March 2006 docket, and Judge Alley told both sides that it would take her quite some time to make her ruling on the motions for final summary.

## Christmas Songs

By now, subscribers of *The Sanford Herald*, *Lake Mary Herald* and *Longwood Herald* should have received their copies of a holiday songbook we produced. What are you going to do with it, use it or toss it away? We would be greatly disappointed if you toss it. After all, music is one of the mainstays of the Christmas season and in this publication we have not only the words, but the music for accompaniment.

I should add, that in addition to the books included with your newspaper, we will be giving them away at the Sanford Christmas parade today (Saturday). Folks have also requested copies for schools, churches and groups, which we will be honoring.

Not necessarily in this publication, there are many types of holiday music going around, from the classic of Handel's Messiah to Grandma Got Run over by a Reindeer. Having a musical past, there is always a song running through my brain and the one that is most predominant these days is Rudolph, the Red Nose Reindeer. From time to time, that will change to Silent Night, or the Twelve Days of Christmas. I never know when I wake up in the morning, what song I will have haunting me all day.

Barring that little snowman in front of the toy piano, (you know what I mean), gathering around and singing Christmas carols should be traditional in your family. Even Uncle Louie, who can't carry a tune in a bushel basket, can chime in and have fun. Many folks even go outdoors and carol in their neighborhoods. Others, mostly church groups or school choruses will visit shut-ins to cheer them up in the holiday season.

For those attending church, be prepared to sing, sing, and sing on Christmas Eve and/or Christmas Day.

Each year at Christmas time, an Orlando radio station has traditionally presented a program of the "most ridiculous" holiday music. This generally includes songs by Alvin and the Chipmunks, (Christmas, Christmas time is here); Eartha Kitt (Santa Baby); and many others with humorous lyrics.

When I was a disc jockey at WTRR back in the late 50's, I would start out on December 1, playing one Christmas song per hour. On Dec. 2, there would be two songs per hour. By the week before Christmas we had complete 15-record per hour Christmas music programs. We did this on all types of programs, the country music show, "Bar None Ranch", the evening show "Dance Time", and even the Rock & Roll show, "The Rhythm Hour". In this way, I believed folks would get more used to the songs rather than if they were all presented in one batch. People seemed to enjoy this approach.

If you haven't done it before, at some time before Christmas, or on Christmas Eve, gather the family around the piano and sing. Do any song from Silent Night to Rudolph. They will all make you feel good. If you don't have a piano or some musical instrument, sing anyway. Most families have at least one person who can carry a tune and you can follow their lead. If you have tapes, CD's or DVD's, play them and sing along. Some TV's, where reception is from a dish or cable, will undoubtedly have holiday music channels and here is another opportunity to sing along.

Another suggestion: when you are going over the river and through the woods to grandmother's house, keep the children entertained by singing. We tried that the other day and it kept them well entertained.

If you have the opportunity at your church or elsewhere, attend a gathering where the singing of holiday songs will be featured. Let your voice ring loud and get with the spirit of the occasion. Christmas is still several weeks away, but there is no time like the present to begin lifting your voice in song.

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## Rev. E. Ruth Grant

Rev. E. Ruth Grant, a longtime resident of Longwood and former pastor of the First Pentecostal Church of Longwood, passed away on

November 25, 2005. Rev. Grant was born October 14, 1916 in Milton, Florida. She was the eldest daughter of Benjamin R. Ansley and Dora Varnum Ansley in a family of four sisters and seven brothers, all of whom preceded her in death. The family later moved to Summerfield, FL where the then Miss Ansley attended school and was active in community activities. In 1932 she was one of two females selected as Florida's statewide 4H representative and was awarded a trip to Washington, D.C. She met President Herbert Hoover while attending a tea hosted by Mrs. Hoover. In 1934 she married James Russell Grant. They celebrated their 71st wedding anniversary this past September 1st. They lived in Belleview church until they relocated to Panama City at the outbreak of WWII. Both the

Grants worked at the Wainwright Shipyard and Rev. Grant also taught the third grade. After the war, the Grants settled in Central Florida and have resided in Longwood since 1948. Prior to marriage Rev. Grant was active in church work and her abiding faith led her into the ministry. She traveled throughout the state evangelizing in churches and tent revivals.

She was renowned for her musical abilities. She possessed a beautiful voice and loved to sing and often played the guitar and accordion. In November of 1947 she became one of the earliest female ministers in the United Pentecostal Church. By that time she had been active in the formation of Pentecostal churches in Cassia, Orlando and Apopka. Rev. Grant was a pioneer using her deep knowledge of the Bible and her recognized communication skills to win the respect and enduring admiration of her peers, parishioners, friends and acquaintances. In 1955 Rev. Grant started the First United Pentecostal Church in Longwood by holding prayer meetings in her home. By 1958 the first sanctuary was built and she continued to pastor and shepherd the church through congregation growth and campus construction. After 28 years

Rev. Grant retired as pastor but remained active for another 15 years as pastor emeritus. In 1988 Rev. Grant began researching the history of the Ansley family. Her research took her to England twice and resulted in the publication of the Hills of Annesley in 1988. The book chronicles the various spellings of the Ansley name and its rich history and association of Annesley, England. It includes references back to the early 1200's and the possibility of a kinship to Robin Hood. In addition to her many church duties, Rev. Grant was actively involved in numerous civic, school and community activities. Rev. Grant is survived by her husband, J. Russell Grant, daughters Shirley DePress of Plainfield, Indiana, Sibyl Coombs of Ocoee, Patsy Powell of Rome, Georgia, and sons Fred of Manhattan Beach, California and Richard of Rome, Georgia and Doris Grant Bradley, sister-in-law, Fruitland Park, Florida. 11 grandchildren and 7 great grandchildren also survive her. Rev. Grant's funeral service was held on Friday, Dec. 2nd at the First Pentecostal Church in Longwood. Donations may be made to the E. 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
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

## The Way We Were:

### Ambition to grow oranges

The following is edited from an undated newspaper article, probably *The Sanford Herald*, found recently at the Sanford Museum.

Eighteen-year-old Sidney O. Chase departed from his home in Germantown, Pa., for Sanford, Florida, a new little town. The year was 1878 and he had a letter of introduction to General Henry Shelton Sanford, given to him by a member of the Shelton family. Sidney's ambition was to grow oranges.

When he arrived in Sanford, he contacted the General's representative, J.E. Ingraham who hired him as a clerk.

The adventurous young Chase wanted to see more of the state so when he heard he could purchase a pony in Orlando for \$25, that he could use for this purpose, he and a guide walked to Orlando.

Upon arrival, he found that the man had raised the price. Sidney refused to be swindled, so he and the guide started walking to Tampa.

Another route was chosen for the return trip so he could get a view of more of the state. On this trip, he first saw grapefruit which was not grown in the Sanford area at the time. Clerking was monotonous for Sidney so he thought that his brother Joshua could help. Josh had told him that he needed him he would come, so in 1884, Joshua Chase arrived in Sanford.

The two Chases took stock of their situation and emerged with the original Chase and Company, shippers of citrus commodities, with offices above the Lyman Bank at the corner of First Street and Park Avenue.

As the shipping business only lasted from Thanksgiving to Christmas, it soon became apparent that they needed something else to bring in more income. They decided to sell fertilizer and insurance as they would require little capital to start.

Joshua Chase started combing the territory, stopping at every grove. If he couldn't sell them fertilizer, he would write them insurance on their house and property.

They were able to form the Chase and Harney Partnership, which packed and shipped limes, citrus fruits and vegetables, in addition to selling the old standbys, fertilizer, insurance and crate materials. This partnership lasted until the 1926 hurricane blew them back to "the safe part of the state."

But these sideline businesses were only to be endured until their fascinating business of buying and shipping in the fall came around.

By 1894, the business was undergoing growing pains, yet was prospering with Florida's output far exceeding that of California.

But in December of that year, disaster struck. A sudden freeze ruined the entire citrus crop in this section, painting a bleak picture for both grower and shipper.

The Chase boys were able to sell fertilizer to those who wanted to bring their trees back. The weather cooperated with an unseasonable warm spell which lasted through January. Then in February, 1895, the temperature dropped to an even lower degree than before; devastation and heart-break followed.

Trains and boats going north were filled with disheartened people, many leaving all their belongings here.

To the Chases it was just a test, weeding out the weak and leaving the determined.

The business had moved into the new Plant Investment Company (PICO) building on the corner of First Street and railroad Avenue, but it could not support both of the brothers due to the set back from the freeze.

Josh went to California to study the agricultural products grown and shipped from there and to try and devise a method of growing them in Sanford.

After the freeze, the purpose of Sidney Chase's migration to Sanford was fulfilled when he bought an orange grove southwest of the town. He also acquired General Sanford's experimental acreage, Belair Grove. After the General's death in 1891, the grove became a liability to his heirs so they wired Sidney to make an offer. He wired an offer of \$1,000 which was accepted by return wire. The near bankrupt firm had to scramble for the money. The property included a part of the present Mayfair Country Club and a good deal of Loch Arbor, plus the grove.

Orange shipments came up slowly so Sidney cashed in his insurance policies and took out loans to operate until his dream of the area's untapped resources could be realized.

Meanwhile J.J. Whitner was experimenting with various kinds of crops and farmers such as Terwilliger, Robbins, Rossetter, chapel, skyrocketed agriculture into big business with Chase and company ready and waiting to handle the shipping.

Josh Chase returned in 1904 and opened an office in Jacksonville where he could reach shippers in other parts of the country.

The Sanford office remained in the PICO building until the Chases received orders to vacate. The building was to be turned into apartments. They ignored the notice until one day, the remodelers tore off the roof and a sudden shower drenched their office. The next day they moved their damp equipment to a brick building on the corner of oak Avenue and Second Street. They remained there until a new office building was completed. On Labor Day, 1920, the business moved into new quarters on that same corner. Their orange shipping business soon expanded to include the most modern wash house in the county, two pre-cooling plants and building supplies. Shipments went by rail and truck from the office, wash house and their stall at the Farmer's Market. Carloads of citrus, beans, cabbage, celery and escarole were shipped to all parts of the United States.

At Sidney Chase's death, March 31, 1941, the business passed on to his three sons, Randall and Sidney Jr. continued to be actively engaged in the company operations in Sanford. Frank, a director in the company, lived in Windermere where he, like his pioneer father, grew oranges.

Guy was taken in and charged with a strong arm robbery, aggravated battery, vehicle theft, resisting an officer and aggravated fleeing, obstruction without violence and driving with a suspended license.

Bracknell said that Guy was out on bond from another case and was scheduled to go to court on Dec. 6.

Two recent arrest reports from the Seminole County Sheriff's Office show that Guy had been involved in a high-speed pursuit before in Maitland.

On Aug. 12, Guy refused to stop for law enforcement officers in Altamonte Springs. He led police on a chase that ended near Interstate 4 and Maitland

Blvd. When he was finally stopped he again was near water and attempted to submerge himself in it to elude police.

According to the arrest report, when he was caught, he admitted that he just snorted cocaine. He was charged with fleeing and eluding law enforcement officers at a high speed and recklessly; resisting an officer without violence; and driving with a suspended license.

On Oct. 24, Guy was arrested in Sanford on Orlando Drive for possession of cocaine and possession of narcotics equipment. He had a crack pipe containing crack cocaine in his pocket.

Bracknell said Thursday that because of Guy's back-

ground, it was just a matter of time before he did something again.

"When is it going to end?" Bracknell asked.

According to Bracknell, a pit maneuver is considered using deadly force to stop a subject. When one of the officers, who is the only one at the Lake Mary Police Department trained to do a pit maneuver, requested permission to do it, they agreed. Bracknell said that they agreed to use deadly force because Guy had attempted to hit Bracknell when he brushed up against his leg earlier in the chase.

"It was remarkable," Bracknell said. "It just goes to the well-trained, professional officers that we have. It was remarkable that [Guy] didn't kill someone. But, it was a matter of time."

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



have both distinguished ourselves, us in the West and them in the East, of being the teams that had the best records. Now we are deserving of having an opportunity to play in this game. I think it is exciting for both teams and a great storyline."

ABOUT TULSA

The Golden Hurricane come into the championship having won five of their past six games. Their only defeat during that stretch was a three-point loss at the hands of UTEP. One of their biggest wins of the year came when they handed Southern Miss just its sixth home conference loss in school history.

Senior tight end Garret Mills, the nation's leading receiving tight end and an All-America candidate, is the focal point of the Tulsa offense. Mills has caught 75 passes for 1,031 yards and eight touchdowns so far this year. He has produced six 100-yard receiving games this season, including a season-high 13 catches for 152 yards against Oklahoma on Sept. 10.

"He (Mills) has 75 catches," said UCF head coach George O'Leary. "That is a lot for a tight end, so we'll know where he is. He's a good player. He catches everything thrown at him - short, long and he blocks. I look at him as an H-back, not a tight end. He's more of a move guy. He's not going to sit at the line of scrimmage and pound you. They do a good job of utilizing him in that offense."

Sophomore quarterback Paul Smith has led the Golden Hurricane offense all year. Smith has had eight games this season where he has thrown for over 200 yards. For the year, Smith has completed 61.8 percent of his passes and thrown for 17 touchdowns with just six interceptions.

The Tulsa rushing attack is anchored by four different runners. Senior Uri Parrish, freshman Tarrion Adams, junior Brandon Diles and sophomore Cauvey Jackson have helped account for 1,500 yards on the ground and 18 rushing touchdowns. Parrish leads the team in rushing with 624 yards and seven touchdowns.

Tulsa, much like UCF, is one of the nation's leaders in forcing turnovers. Tulsa is currently sixth in the nation in takeaways, with 18 interceptions and 12 fumble recoveries. Of their 30 takeaways on the year, 19 have occurred in the last six games.

ABOUT UCF

The Golden Knights come into the game having won eight of their final nine games, including their last five in a row. The squad's plus eight win differential this year has made them the nation's most improved football team.

Junior quarterback Steven Moffett continues to lead the Golden Knight offense. Moffett has enjoyed his finest season under center. He has completed 191-of-312 passes for 2,434 yards and 18 touchdowns. His passing efficiency rating of 141.94 continues to rank near the top of C-USA.

"Your offense goes as your quarterback goes on most teams I've been around," said O'Leary. "If he's on target, making the right decisions, you have a chance to move the ball. That's the one area that he's (Moffett) really gotten better in is fieldmanship, just understanding what's in front of him. We do check a lot and he's done a good job of checking out of bad situations and putting us in a good situation."

Moffett has had the benefit this year of having one of the best receiving duos in C-USA. Senior Brandon Marshall from Lake Howell High School, an All-C-USA Second Team selection, has 56 catches this year for 876 yards and eight touchdowns, while junior Mike Walker, also an All-C-USA Second Team pick, has 64 catches for 855 yards and nine touchdowns on the year.

Unfortunately, UCF will be without the services of Walker for the championship game. Walker injured his knee in the regular season finale at Rice and has been ruled out of the game this weekend.

"He (Walker) was no question a very dominant player for us," said O'Leary. "When this happens, the good thing there is that it allows the young kids to step up. I don't know if they can fill his shoes, but they're going to wear them."

Kevin Smith, C-USA's Freshman of the Year, continues to give the Golden Knights a spark in the backfield. Smith, who is nearing 1,000 yards for the season, has rushed 205 times for 915 yards and five touchdowns.

Cornerback Joe Burnett, a first-team all-league and all-freshman pick, continues to shine defensively for the Golden Knights. Burnett is currently tied for the league lead in interceptions with five. His interception against Rice in the final game of the regular season helped to seal the victory for UCF. He also returned a punt 58 yards for a touchdown versus the Owls. His 14.7 average per punt return is good for first in the conference.

In addition to Walker, Marshall, Smith and Burnett, the Golden Knights had seven other players receive all-conference honors. Senior defensive end Paul Carrington and junior center Cedric Gagne-Marcoux were named to the first team, while senior tight end Darcy Johnson was named to the second team. Two freshman offensive tackle Patrick Brown, redshirt freshman guard L.J. Anderson, true freshman linebacker Jordan Richards and redshirt freshman Jason Venson were all named to the all-freshman squad.

UCF MEN HIT THE ROAD TO FACE NO. 11 FLORIDA TODAY ON SUN SPORTS

The UCF men's basketball team will hit the road for the first time this season, traveling north to face 11th-ranked Florida in Gainesville Today (Saturday). Tip-off at the O'Connell Center is set for noon.

The Golden Knights (4-0) will be looking for their first 5-0 start since the 1993-94 campaign. UCF head coach Kirk Spraw has 199 victories and needs one win to reach the 200-career victory mark. The Gators have won four games at home this season and enter the contest with a 6-0 mark.

The game will be broadcast on Sun Sports. Larry Vettel will have the call and Bill Koss will provide the color commentary.

In Orlando, the contest will be aired on WORL-660 AM. Coverage begins at 11:30 a.m. and Steve Egan will call the action live from courtside.

UCF is off to a 4-0 start for the second-consecutive season and for the eighth time in program history. The Golden Knights will be playing on the road for the first time in 2005-06 when they travel north to Gainesville.

On Tuesday, UCF posted a strong defensive effort in the second half to hold off visiting Bethune-Cookman, 61-48. Jermaine Taylor led the way versus the Wildcats, scoring a team-high 15 points. The Golden Knights limited Bethune-Cookman to just 4-of-30 (25 percent) overall in the second half. For the contest, the visitors shot 2-of-16 (12.5 percent) from three-point range. The Wildcats' 48 points were the fewest by a UCF opponent since Indiana State mustered only 49 on Dec. 1, 2002.

Josh Peppers paces the squad in scoring on the season, averaging 11.8 points per contest. Justin Rose is averaging 10 points and a team-high 6.5 boards an outing.

Florida is currently ranked 11th nationally in the Associated Press poll. The Gators began the season by claiming the 2K Sports College Hoops Classic title. Playing at Madison Square Garden in New York, the squad topped No. 18 Wake Forest in the semifinals, 77-72, and then posted a 75-70 win over No. 16 Syracuse in the title game.

On Monday, the Gators recorded an 87-60 victory over visiting Alabama State. Taurean Green, who played at Lake Howell as a freshman before moving to South Florida, paced the hosts with 18 points and Al Horford totaled a double-double with 12 points and 11 rebounds.

Green is the team's top scorer, averaging 15.7 points per game to go with 4.5 assists. Corey Brewer is averaging 14.3 points, 6.5 boards and two blocks an outing. Horford (11.2 ppg, 7.3 rpg) leads the squad on the glass. Behind Lee Humphrey, who has made 22-of-41 attempts from deep, Florida is shooting 42.2 percent from three-point range. Overall, the team is shooting at a 53 percent clip.
