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
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

SCSO citizens academy begins April 21

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office, Community Law Enforcement Academy's next session is set to begin Wednesday, April 21, with expanded offerings, with traffic and DUI enforcement added to the course outline.

The purpose of the academy is to educate the citizens of Seminole County in the concepts and procedures of law enforcement.

It is now a 15-week course, with the addition of traffic and DUI enforcement added to the mix. It uses scenario-based training, which will allow students to participate in important problem solving that is vital in law enforcement and crime pre-

vention. The course also includes; Riding on patrol with a deputy; observing telecommunications personnel in the Communications Center; and a morning on the gun range, using some of the Sheriff's office weapons. The class meets each Wednesday evening from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. Members of the sheriff's office teach it. It is free and there are no physical requirements to participate.

There are, however, some terms and conditions. Participants must live or work in Seminole County, must be 19 years old or older, possess a valid drivers license, and never have been convicted of a felony. They must file an application with the sheriff's office.

SANFORD — City officials looking to make up a \$700,000 funding gap to renovate downtown's main street are considering a controversial option: closing 1st Street to vehicular traffic during construction.

In public meetings during the past year, some downtown

impacts of Article V. Voters in 1998 passed a referendum that required court expenses to be shifted from counties to the state. But after six years, lawmakers — and local officials - are still figuring out how the process will be

funded. Gov. Jeb Bush recommended \$104.4 million in the 2004-2005 budget to be earmarked to cover the new state court expenses. Officials are optimistic the legislature will boost that figure because it is viewed as a no-growth plan, which could hinder the 18th Judicial Circuit. Although it recently received funds for three new judges, the circuit has not had a new prosecutor position in three years.

"It's a challenge and people are scared to death if it's going to work out, but you know after all the holes are plugged

Goldsboro is example of school diversity

SANFORD — The stars paraded for hours last Tuesday night at Goldsboro Elementary School. Class by class, students of the county's only elementary-age magnet school dazzled the standing-room-only crowds with songs, instruments, science and technology.

After each grade performed, families and friends toured the child's classroom and the school's NASA Space Lab for an out-of-space simulated experience.

It was the awesome Space Lab where the simulated space voyage made a striking resemblance to the school's skyrocketing ride to the top as one of the district's premier elementary schools.

It is this small but glowing of Goldsboro portion Elementary School that demonstrates the district's commitment to diversity. Last week, the district and the U.S. Justice Department submitted a unitary status report to a federal judge detailing compliance to and release from a 34year-old federal court consent decree ordering the district to desegregate its "dual system based on race" and implement long-standing practices and procedures that ensure equity.

As part of the 1996 consent decree order, the district developed Goldsboro into a magnet school, In 1998-99, Goldsboro became a district-wide magnet school without any mandatory attendance zones.

Goldsboro, a historically allblack elementary school, currently enrolls students from 32 of the 34 elementary school districts in Seminole County, as well as students who previously attended private schools in the area. The school's 1997-

Sanford Plaza welcomes new tenants, shopping center revitalization plan

SANFORD — Changes are taking place at one of Sanford's older shopping centers.

Much of the Sanford Plaza located near the intersection of U.S. Highway 17-92 and State Road 417 — is under new ownership and a newly opened venue at one of the larger spaces in the commercial center is expected to spark additional interest in the once dilapidated shopping district.

With two new tenants — an equestrian shop and a countrywestern bar, — which opened for business Friday — the Sanford Plaza has only one vacancy. That's definitely not something plaza corporation


During Wednesday's Downtown Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) meeting, Woodruff questioned whether the 1st Street renovation project is the "best investment we can make."

After the meeting Historic Trust President Linda Kuhn and Art had a vigorous discussion about Woodruff's views of 1st Street. Kuhn ranted that Woodruff has previously voted for the project and should continue to support

Part of the problem (if you call it a problem) is the way Art approaches issues. Mayor Brady Lessard on several occasions has said his job as mayor is to see the big picture. "I get paid to sell not spell," Lessard has said. Art, on the other hand, is the speller. He loves to dig into the minutiae and ask 11-part questions which bugs some people.

So will the district put up a viable candidate against Woodruff? I'll believe it when I see it. Though they're a vocal bunch, the Historic District hasn't had much success at the ballot box. Kuhn, in fact lost to Woodruff in the 2001 city commission election. And an initiative to create a special taxing district to purchase and install street lights failed rather handily. So far no names have been floated as a possible candidate.

LONGWOOD - When Sherri Nicole Smith died earlier this year it left a gaping hole in a caring family and a community.

The procession line for the January funeral wrapped clear around the building as city of Longwood employees visited the daughter and niece of two fellow workers. Her father, Public Works Department Manager Tom Smith, and uncle, Pat Smith, backflow coordinator in the Utilities Department, recalled more than 600 people in attendance.

The death of the 24-yearold graduate of Lyman High School and mother of 3-year-Jaylun shocked Longwood. Tom, an 18-year veteran of the city and his wife Pat, said Sherri's sudden death "started with having her teeth pulled and then she contracted pneumonia and then...it was found out she had leukemia."

Tom's co-workers pooled vacation time and donated it to defray funeral costs and to start a trust fund for Sherri's child. The Smith family, which includes Sherri's sister Wendi and uncle Pat, who both work for the city, is about to receive another generous gift from the Longwood community to help provide for Jaylun.

Two blocks from City Hall is sort of rallying point for past causes in the small town. Mike Holland, owner of Holland Pools located at 115 W. Pine Ave., started a golf tournament four years ago with the sole purpose of giving back to the communi-

"We wanted to have an annual event that would help the city," he said.

"It wasn't but a few years ago we were working for other people," he added. "We have been very blessed. This is our opportunity to give back."

The Fourth Annual Holland Pools Tournament Fundraiser is May 3 at Rolling Hills Country Club. The 10 a.m. shotgun scramble includes an awards luncheon, course contests, door prizes and silent auction.

Crowded Churches

Easter Sunday is one of the most well attended services

Going to church this Sunday? Most folks will be. Members of the clergy tell us that Easter traditionally has the largest turnout of church-goers in the entire year. Christmas runs a close second. Many people who are not church members, and those who perhaps never attend a church service, have a tendency to go on Easter Sunday.

Years ago, one minister jokingly called them "PEC Christians" that is — Palm Sunday, Easter, Christmas Christians. Palm Šunday, last weekend, saw a relatively good turnout I hear, but nothing compared to what we can expect this Sunday.

I'm glad I don't have to determine when Easter is to be held each year. It's too confusing to me. One explanation 1 have says, "The date of Easter is derived from the lunar calendar; the first Sunday following the first ecclesiastical full moon on or after March 21, always

between March 22 and April 25 The Council of Nicaea (AD 325) prescribed that Easter be celebrated on the Sunday after Passover, as that feast's date had been established in Jesus' time.

After 1582, when Pope Gregory XIII introduced the Gregorian calendar, Orthodox Christians continued to use the Julian calendar, so Easter can sometimes be as much as five weeks apart in the Western and Eastern Churches."

According to statistics I have found, Easter will not be held again on April 11 at least through the year 2050. That year it will be on April 10. But for the next few years, Easter will be on March 27 in 2005, April 16 in 2006, April 8 in 2007, March 23 in 2008, April 12 in 2009 and April 4 in 2010. Don't worry about writing this down — you will be informed.

Regardless, Easter is the most important holy day in the Christian religion. It is the celebration of Christ's Resurrection from the dead, which gave Christians the hope of salvation and eternal life. Although Easter is only one day, the full observance of the holy day spans from Septuagesima Sunday (70 days before Easter Sunday) which may fall as early as January to Pentecost, which can occur as late as June.

Now I fully realize that not all folks in Central Florida, or the nation and world for that matter, consider Easter as a religions celebration. Many however, will be coloring eggs and holding their own Easter Egg hunt for the children. While I don't know where the "Easter Bunny" came into the scene, I do know that the col eggs date back many centuries, especially in the Christian nations of Europe, as typifying the celebration of Christ's resurrection.

I I do hope that non-believers will at least pay respect to believers, and allow this holiday to be important to them. At Christmas time, we sing, "Let there be Peace on Earth." Possibly that belief should go on year 'round.

With the turmoil in Iraq, the Middle East, and other nations, it may be difficult to project peace, but at least we can hope and pray for it, with the expectation that it could come - some day in the future. Wouldn't that be

Hotel manager asks city to step up midge control

To the editor:

Re: Midge Control on Lake

Dear Mayor, City Commissioners, City Manager and members of the CRA,

I have seen the data compiled by Volusia County Mosquito Control and feel that it is very misleading. As I understand it, Mr. Joseph Faella is the person in charge of compiling and analyzing this data. Statistical analysis of data can sometimes be very misleading. When one looks at the graphs produced by Volusia County, it appears that the midges are under control and on the decline.

While that may be true in some areas, it does not apply to the area surrounding the Best Western and Marina Isle.

(The year of) 2003 was by far the worst year for midges in my four years at this location. The Midge Bloom of June 3, 2003, carpeted my entire property with a half-inch blanket of dead midges. Possibly the wind direction, which I understand Volusia is going to monitor, caused it to be worse on the peninsula than in other areas.

In 2003 we had them in cooler months, which hasn't been the case previously. If this area is to be developed in the future, a more aggressive approach needs to be taken.

On behalf of the members of the Waterfront Steering Committee, we urge the City to continue to strengthen the attention and funding for a better system of control of these insects. Part of the success of the current trend for development in downtown and along the lakefront is dependent on the ability of the City and Volusia County to maintain the midge population at the lowest level pos-

> But there is no area that better demonstrates the Orwellian quality of the Bush administration — its insistence that black is white, up is down, war is peace - than its deceptions about Iraq. Testimony under oath before the Sept. 11 commission and the Iraq uprising make increasingly clear that the central underpinning of the president's re-election campaign that he has conducted a toughminded war on terror — stands

the truth on its head.

In fact, ousting Saddam Hussein has been a costly diversion from the war on terror. The Bushites came into office obsessed with Saddam, and when they could find no evidence that he represented an immediate threat, they simply manufactured it.

Now, our troops are trapped in a quagmire. Osama bin Laden is still at large. And the occupation of Iraq cannot help but breed a new generation of terrorists: Every time U.S. soldiers hit a mosque with mortars or strafe a carload of civilians mistaken for insurgents, another dozen teenaged boys in Egypt or Saudi Arabia or Iran become America-hating jihadists.

Bush and his underlings lie when there is no reason to. In

response to Richard A. Clarke's charge that his administration didn't view the al-Qaida threat as urgent, the president might simply have agreed and apologized. Few Americans would hold him responsible for failing to anticipate an attack as evil in its creation and brazen in its execution as 9/11.

Besides, Bush had already admitted his failure to forecast the immediacy of the al-Qaida menace. In "Bush at War," published last year, Bob Woodward quoted the president as saying he "didn't feel that sense of urgency" about bin Laden before the attacks.

Nevertheless, the administration greeted Clarke's charges with character assassination and fabrications. Vice President Dick Cheney went on Rush Limbaugh's radio show to dismiss Clarke as "out of the loop," a characterization National Security Adviser Condoleezza Rice was forced to refute, since Clarke was at the center of the administration's anti-terrorism

The entire premise of the Bush presidency — that he is a man of principle, of honor, of candor - is crumbling. The chaos engulfing Iraq is not just the result of guileless miscalculations. It is the inevitable outcome of a policy built on mendacity.

The same media have for the most part been opposed to the war in Iraq from the very beginning, and they are exploiting the deaths of Americans to prove that they were right in opposing the war and our presence in Iraq ever since.



The Way We Were: Sanford, U.S. events from year of 1934

The Seminole High School Class of 1934 is having its 70th year reunion on Saturday, April 17. To help you understand what was going on in the United States and Sanford at that time, I have gleaned the following information from the "Encyclopedia of American Facts and Dates" edited by Gorton Carruth and Peter Schaal's "Sanford as I knew

The United States, 1933-34 At the beginning of 1933,

was still in a depression and the change in administration deepened the economic cri-

sis. By inauguration day, the nation

gripped by a bank panic. To meet the situation, the new administration was given unprecedented powers. This led to the creation of an array of federal agencies to stimulate private industry and find jobs for the unemployed. This program became known as the New

During February, 1933, the 20th Amendment was adopted which changed the presidential inauguration date from March 4 to Jan. 20. Also, the 21st Amendment pealing the 18th Amendment was adopted on Dec. 5, when it was ratified by the 36th state. Prohibition was therefore repealed.

In March, several bank holidays were declared to prevent runs on bank assets by worried depositors.

On March 4, Franklin Delono Roosevelt was inaugurated as President. In his address he declared "The only thing we have to fear is fear itself."

During the next few weeks, the following occurred; Frances Perkins, first woman to hold a cabinet post, was appointed Secretary of Labor by FDR; the president held his first Fireside Chat; banks began reopening; and the Civilian Conservation corps (CCC) was initiated to create jobs through a reforestation pro-

Also created were the Federal Relief Act, the Tennessee Valley Act (TVA), the Federal Securities Act, and the National Industrial Recovery Act which established the Public Works Administration.

Other acts and programs were established in 1934 including the Home Owners Loan Act, and the Trade Agreements Act. Social Security was established in

In 1933, the first aircraft carrier specifically designed for this purpose, the USS Ranger, was christened, and a rise in employment was

During 1934, Billy Sunday began a two week revival campaign in New York City at Calvary Baptist Church. Henry Ford restored the \$5 per day minimum wage to the majority of his workers. Nylon was first produced by **Dupont Laboratories**, and the first general strike in U.S. history took place in San Francisco in support of the Longshoremen's Association.

The two most popular films in 1933 were "Little Women" starring Kathryn Hepburn, and "She Done Him Wrong" starring Mae

Plays opening in New York City were "Ah, Wilderness" by Eugene O'Neill, starring George M. Cohen (Will Rogers in San Francisco), "Roberta" with music by Jerome Kern (Smoke gets in your Eyes

home of Patricia Merritt Whatley on Hays Drive in 1988. Because of the desire to help Whatley to continue the program to educate our children in the arts, former Mayor Larry Dale and the Sanford City Commission donated it to Tajiri Arts.

and the Touch of your Hand), and Tobacco Road, which became one of the longest running plays in Broadway history. Sanford's Sam Byrd starred in this production for several years.

Academy Awards in 1934 were presented to Cavalcade, **Charles Lawton for Henry** the VIII and Kathryn Hepburn for Morning Glory. Disney received an award for Three Little Pigs.

In the bowl games in 1933, Miami defeated Manhattan in the first annual Orange Bowl game, and Southern California defeated

Pittsburgh in the Rose Bowl. The Century of Progress Exposition was held in Chicago in 1933 in honor of the Centennial of the founding of that city.

In the first All Star Baseball Game on July 6, 1933, the American League defeated the National League

The first annual Masters Golf Tournament was held in 1934 and was won by Horton Smith, and the 60th Annual Kentucky Derby was won by Cavalcade.

Sanford in 1933-34

Considering the state the country was in, city clerk (since 1928) Frank Lamson was pleased to announce that building permits for 1932 had increased from \$14,435 to \$15,165.

In June of 1933, 150 Sanford celery growers agreed to plow under onethird of their crop in an effort to boost sagging prices. Two weeks later, celery was bringing in \$175 per crate in New York City. It had cost the farmer \$147 to produce and ship. A few years before, celery was going for \$6 to \$9 per crate.

On Feb. 1, Otto Caldwell's all steel boat "City of Sanford" sank at the dock while being loaded. It had been in use since December of 1931, meeting with moderate success. It was soon floated and put back into use.

The First National Bank Building, erected in 1923 for \$225,000 was purchased by Frank Evans for \$43,500 plus back taxes of \$5,530. On July 31, Dr. W.C. Touchton paid only \$15,000 for the old Seminole Bank Building.

A large crowd gathered on March 4, outside the Hoffman Radio Store at Second Street and Magnolia Avenue, to hear Roosevelt's inaugural address. According to Peter Schaal, the mood of the people was one of depression, gloom and shame at their present circumstances.

Joe Marentette managed to lighten things up a bit by having stage shows at the Milane Theater. First to appear was Gene Austin and his Broadway Rhapsody Review. On Oct. 11, Tom Mix came riding into town in his \$15,000 Rolls Royce. His horse Tony was also along for the show.

In mid June, the city commission had to cut salaries for all city employees. City Clerk Lamson was cut from

\$250 to \$200 per month. Police Chief Roy Williams from \$160 to \$130 and Fire Chief Mack Cleveland from \$133 to \$100.

The National Recovery Act (NRA) brought government regulations and Sanfordites sought to comply. Celery growers signed the code with mixed feelings. Sanford barbers announced that haircuts would have to jump from a quarter to 50 cents, and every

barber expected a salary of

\$14 per week.

Compliance included these factors; pay a minimum wage of \$12 per week to employees; white collar workers would get \$14; machinists and factory workers were to be paid 30 to 40 cents per hour. The work week was 52 hours for all stores that employed clerks. Grocery stores would have a

48-hour week. White Collar

workers 40 hours, and

machinists 35 hours. On Sept. 15, Bob Holley became postmaster, replacing J.P. Hall. He was previously Sanford Herald publisher/editor and later a state legislator.

On Oct. 10, county residents voted 4-1 for a return to legal liquor sales. Geneva and Osceola remained dry by a narrow margin, but bootleggers operated just outside both town limits.

On Oct. 13, Mrs. Julius Dingfelder presented a flag to Girl Scout Troop 1, during the ceremony at their new headquarters in the former Atlantic Coast Line passen-

ger station. (I was a Girl Scout there, 1946-54, meeting every Friday afternoon after school.).

On Nov. 3, the local Relief Council announced that it had distributed 5,000 pounds of free pork and dried beans in two weeks to city and county residents. On Nov. 27, it was announced that the Civil Works Administration (CWA) would be hiring 625 men to work on city streets and county roads. Each would be paid \$12 per week but would be given no more free food. Spirits were lifted when more than \$5,000 cash was paid out Dec. 26 to 754 CWA employees.

Only 32 people cast votes in the city election on Dec. 5. T.L. Dumas and S.O. Shinolser, Sr. were elected to the city commission.

On the night of Dec. 8, Mrs. Ralph Warren, the former Demarus Musson, fell to her death from an upper floor of the Sanford Atlantic National Bank Building.

Banker Linton Allen announced his resignation from the Sanford Atlantic National Bank effective Jan. 1. He was going to help with the organization of the new First National Bank of Orlando. His successor was J.L. Ingley.

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
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
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S.O.D.A Pops to dance at Epcot Flower Festival


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






in the dike I have confidence it's going to work," said State Attorney Norm Wolfinger, whose 18th Judicial Circuit covers Seminole and Brevard counties. "Everybody is scared because even though we've got the governor's recommendation and the governor's recommendation appears to fully fund what we think it should there's still - even under the best circumstances - so many circumstances that need to be resolved that could change the deck of cards."

Tops on the list of those "scared" are county officials. For nearly two years, Deputy County Manager Sherman has been dealing with Article V.

"We are still trying to deal with the impacts of Article V," she said last week. "Right now according to our numbers we are going to be impacted by more than a \$1 million annual-

Much of the negative impact to Seminole County comes from the loss of fees collected by the clerk of the courts office, which is nearly \$2 million annually. However, there are many other concerns for the county as the future funding of some programs is "questionable," Sherman said.

Another issue Seminole County and other area cities are paying close attention to is the proposed cost of prosecuting county ordinances,

Legislators passed House Bill 113A last summer as the first measure in overhauling the court system to become the financial responsibility of the state by July 1, 2004. The bill shifts the financial burden of bringing county and city ordinance violators to justice to the local governments as it prohibits state attorneys from appearing in court for these cases and proposes to charge a \$200 filing fee for each code or ordinance violation.

Some officials, including Wolfinger, believe a glitch bill will alter the proposed plan of prosecuting ordinances.

"Everybody has their issues and everybody has their own little glitch bills they are prepar-

ing," he said. "Like the county is concerned about being charged for going into court on county ordinances. Which to me would be foolish. We do city and county ordinance violations and frankly there are several hundred thousand total maybe in the whole circuit. And frankly that's the way it should be done because there is unifor-

mity." A constant wave of proposed glitch bills from Tallahassee makes it difficult for Sherman and the county to interpret the potential Article V costs.

"It's changing every day," she said adding that received another proposed glitch bill last week. "The county feels as though our legislators need to recognize the impacts of unfunded mandates.

Another realm of concern is with technology. As the state attorney's office moves into the new Seminole County courthouse this summer, uncertainty remains on who will fund certain aspects of the facility.

Of the many quirks in Article V is that the county will supply the furnishings in the new building, but then all of it will become the property of the state. The phone infrastructure, however, is slated to remain with the county, Sherman said.

"It is so convoluted we're having an attorney sitting down and spending hours trying to make some sense out of it," she said.

Not until the July deadline will the county and state attorney's office absolutely know the total ramifications of Article V.

"I'm not going to be able to rest comfortable until the legislative session is done and then give me a few days to digest what is done," Wolfinger said. "Even then there is going to be cracks and we're all going to have to recognize that and step up to the plate and work together."

Sherman said the county would probably begin to address any funding shortfalls brought about by Article V during the budget process.

"There are so many outstanding issues that we will need to address," she said.

1998 student enrollment was 67 percent black. By the 2003-2004 school year, the black enrollment had been reduced to 32

Magnet programs, not as detailed as the magnet schools, have been established at three other Sanford-area elementary schools, two middle schools and its high school.

"Each magnet program has contributed significantly to the desegregated enrollments at Seminole High School," according to the report.

Some community members say Goldsboro has made significant progress.

"They have accomplished a lot at Goldsboro," said Ann McKinney, one of the original five plaintiffs who sued the school board in 1970 for operating an unequal school system. "How they accomplished this was by turning the school

around (from the black community of Goldsboro) and opening it to a wider community."

For some parents, the magnet concept is a dream come true. Kelly and Gregg Perko of Geneva have three children enrolled in Goldsboro.

"I would go above and beyond to get my children to Goldsboro," Kelly Perko said. "We pulled them out of an Aplus school in Oviedo starting three years ago. At that time Goldsboro was a C rated school (2003 rating: B-plus), but we wanted out kids to get a broader, diverse education. Although it's a math and science magnet school, our kids have experience to realize their artistic abilities and other subjects because it's integrated in the curriculum. They get hands-on artistic experience."

cuts in the renovation project. Transferring money from the utility department would require city commission approval

"In my mind the first two just aren't feasible," Parsell said. "We need to move forward with 1st Street. We don't need to delay. And I would not be in favor of taking money away from other projects."

Parsell and City Manager Al Grieshaber met Monday with Gomes Construction Company of Winter Park. In a letter to Grieshaber sent a few hours before Wednesday's CRA meeting, Gomez's branch manager Robert E. Lacey identified \$515,000 in cuts. Combined with the funding from the utility department, Lacey's cuts would met the CRA's budget of \$2.1 million.

"I have not had the opportunity to thoroughly study these options to see which ones are feasible," Grieshaber said.

Closing 1st Street would save the city about \$55,000 and, maybe more importantly, 7 months of construction time. Parsell is still pushing for a June

1 start date, which would mean construction would finish near the new year.

"The merchants have told us that their busy season begins in January," Parsell said. "We could be done before they get into their best months."

Other savings recommended by Lacey include:

• \$25,805 — delete the stabilized subgrade under sidewalks. Grieshaber explained that sidewalks don't carry the same loads as roadways, therefore the do not require the same

• \$89,580 — provide 300 psi (pounds per square inch) soil cement rather than 500 psi. Tom George, director of public works, said 300 psi soil cement is the standard specification and would meet the projects needs. He added that it is hard to find suppliers of 500 psi soil

 \$247.923 — delete new traffic signals but include underground conduit so the lights could be installed in the future. Next to closing 1st Street, this may be the most controversial suggestion. The city has two options if waits to install new traffic signals: the signals currently in place could be used until new ones are purchased, though they would be out of place with the new landscaping and streetscaping improve-ments; or stop signs could be

• \$10,000 — change Live Oak trees to a smaller specification than called for in the project specs and switch from "Razzleberry" shrubs to Indian Hawthorn shrubs. This suggestion appears the least likely to

used in place of traffic signals.

"I would skimp on the landscaping just to save \$10,000," said City Commissioner Kevin Hipes, who attended the meet-

• \$53,800 — delete the line item which requires the contractor to compensate for 4,000 cubic yards of "unsuitable soils." Lacey indicated that this line item is more of a contingency than a reality because a roadway soil survey does not indicate there are unsuitable soils in the work area.

• \$14,000 — eliminate the requirement that Gomez remove and store bricks in Magnolia Square and have city crews perform the work.

• \$15,800 — eliminate the under drain system under some of the valley gutters, if not required. This suggestion also appears likely to not occur.

"We believe that system is, in fact, needed," Grieshaber said.

The CRA made no final decision, but instead set a special meeting for Monday, April 26 at 4 p.m. That will give Grieshaber time to study Lacey's recommendations and possibly uncover other funding sources. Whatever action the CRA takes on April 26, city commissioners will have a chance to approve or reject at their regular meeting later that same day.

for quite some time. Smith also announced this week that he sold about 27 per-

cent of the 150,000-square-foot center to a private investor. The stores occupied by Tire City, Thrift Depot and Save-A-Lot were the first to be bought as the center is in the process of selling off other individual units to tenants and investors, Smith said.

The purchase enables Smith to focus more on improving the overall aesthetics of the center while reducing the monthly rents for tenants.

The Sanford Plaza corporation is preparing to break

ground on a new parking lot layout that will feature improved landscaping, lightning, signage and store canopies. A small park is also being considered for the parking area near the Laundromat and the Speak Easy Comedy Club, Smith said.

"In a month it's going to look like a pretty fine center," Smith said. He wasn't always able to tout

the Sanford Plaza as a shopping center progressing forward. When the corporation purchased the center in 1996, J.C. Penney had moved to the Sanford mall and the area was struggling.

"We bought it when it was empty," Smith said. "It's been an uphill battle, but I think

we're finally getting there."

Some of Sanford Plaza's newer tenants focus on entertainment and activities including Metro Skate Park, the second largest indoor skate park south of Atlanta; Florida Xtreme Baseball, an indoor baseball facility; and The Facility, a Christian sports youth center. Smith hopes to continue to appeal to area families with the addition of the proposed park and possibly a fishing pond and

rock climbing wall. The shopping center's two newest tenants, The Saddler Equestrian Store and Mickey's Roadhouse, are expected to further grow the customer base.

Mickey's Roadhouse is owned and operated by Mickey and Karen Stevenson. The long-

time Sanford residents are hoping to pull patrons from other country western nightspots by offering better prices and more live country-western music, including from house band Stampede.

"Everywhere you go you get a 60-40 percent mix of country western and dance music," Mickey said. "We're planning on upping the ante a little bit by keeping it all country.

"That's what we're doing here — bringing back the honky tonk."

The new country nightspot features pool tables, dartboards, a full bar and one of the largest dance floors in the area. Because the location used to be a movie theater, the dance floor is not only large, but also uniquely


As usual, senior team captain Tim Spencer led the Rams with 35 kills, most coming on set ups from senior Rob Green, who had 41 assists in the contest.

Lyman continued its good play, picking up straight-game wins over both Lake Howell and DeLand to improve to 13-5 on the season.





Program reaches out to schools

HEATHROW — An innovative community program is being introduced to Seminole County during a corporate volleyball challenge next month in Lake Mary.

The Lucky Star arrives

SANFORD — Few 62 year olds arriving at the Orlando Sanford International Airport gather as much attention as the most recent arrival.

A PV-1 aircraft, named the "Lucky Star," is now in the repair facility at the airport, awaiting 18 months or more of restoration, before being placed in a display of honor.

The PV-1s were used extensively during World War II as bombers, night fighters and maritime patrol aircraft. They were flown by Navy, Marine and Air Corps pilots as well as some of the allies. After the war, most of the PV-1's were sold outside the country as war surplus.

According to Patty Mahany, coordinator of the Sanford Airport Memorial Committee, "Ours is the only known PV-1 in the United States."

In obtaining the aircraft, she commented, "Imagine our surprise when we found out shortly after the dedication of the Vigilante that this aircraft was available to us."

The Vigilante stands at the entrance of the airport, as a memorial to the many men and women who served at the airport during World War II, the Korean War, and during peacetime. The Lucky Star is to be on display as well, after it is completely restored.

"While the aircraft is in unbelievable condition," she said, "with not even any dents, it is missing a gun turret."

Even though the aircraft was built by Lockheed's Vega division in 1942,



Mahany said they are still selling parts for these aircraft on e-bay, and a gun turret has been located.

"The problem is," she commented "that they want \$12,000 for the turret, and our funds just can't handle that right now."

She is hoping contributions to the Memorial Committee will make the purchase possible. Financial help is also needed for additional restoration of the PV-I, long-term maintenance of it as well as the Vigilante, and additional park infrastructure.

The PV-1 is considered the second in what is planned for a three-aircraft to be displayed at the airport entrance, as aircraft
