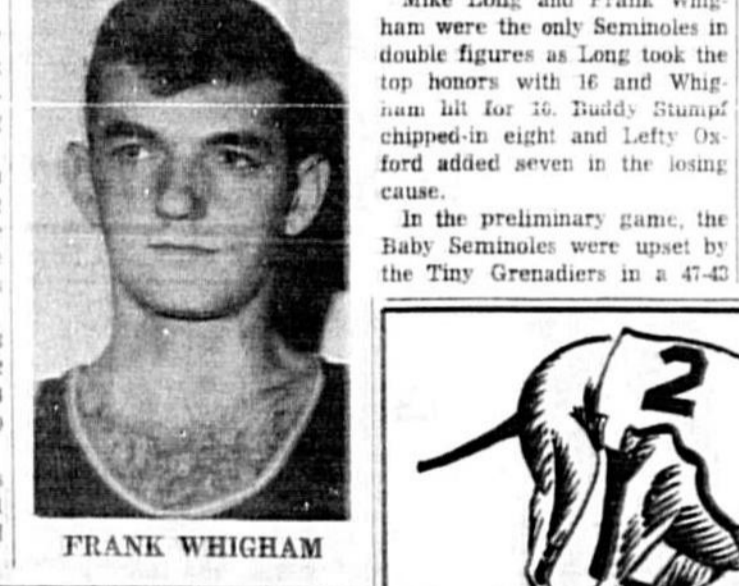

Police Chief Arnold Williams told Commissioners last night the police plan to continue the crackdown on places selling alcoholic beverages to youngsters.

Work on a massive office complex for Jeno Paulucci's Enterprises in Sanford is expected to get underway late this year, A. K. Shoemaker Jr., spokesman for Paulucci said today.

## Mack Cleveland Jr. Calls It Quits

Two incumbent legislators had qualified as of noon today for nomination in primary parties Feb. 28 in the special state election ordered by the U. S. District Court at Miami.

A third veteran legislator announced he would not run.

In other business, the board agreed to close the alley from Fulton Street to the Southwest corner of the Masonic Lodge to alleviate a bottleneck of Florida State Bank traffic.

Earlier the board had wanted to close the alley between Fulton and Commercial west of Park but a compromise agreement was worked out between the lodge and bank officials.

The board also denied a request to close Day Avenue between Third and Fourth Streets.

## Sanford Industrial Commission Established Here

The newly created industrial commission is expected to meet in the near future to discuss budget requirements for the next fiscal year.

At the City Commission meeting Monday night, commissioners created the industrial board, made public a seven-man committee and agreed to let the members decide themselves what they need in the way of funds to hire an "industrial promotion expert."

Named to the board were Howard McNulty, II, a road Hodges, Harold Slama, Ernest Southward, A. K. Shoemaker Jr., Jeno Paulucci and Lee Moore.

Paulucci informed the city fathers by mail that eight "motivated" men have expressed interest in the director's job.

At the same time, City Commissioners, upon recommendation of the city manager, have approved a total of \$30,000 to be cut from surplus, Chamber of Commerce funds, street lighting, and zoo relocation for the industrial board and lakefront project.

However, commissioners felt it would be up to the industrial board to set its budget requirements.

The purpose of the industrial board, as spelled out in the newly created ordinance, is to be "responsible through investigation, development and location of industry within the City of Sanford and its environs."

The budget totaled \$130,752.90 with largest expenditures being police department, \$42,200; professional and community service, \$23,300; reserve for capital improvement, \$20,000 and road board \$17,500.

"The budget is more than \$11,000 off on these two items alone," he said. "We are spending to the hilt. At the rate we are going the city will be out of funds by September or October."
